What it came down to was this: baseball players and owners are unable to put a game on the field, so we've decided to do it for them.

Okay, we can't put a game on the field either. But we can put one on the table. So that's basically what we've done.

Of course, we needed a little help. We got it from a game called Strat-O-Matic and four ambitious Danville youngsters Neil Pearlstein, Craig Meier, John Hawkins and Scott McKeon.

Together, we've set out to play each regularly scheduled major league game

problems. The first was the time it took to coordinate this project. By the time we'd set up the ground rules, selected the participants and established co-commissioners, the strike had gobbled up in excess of

Since we needed to keep four to five days ahead of the actual schedule, it meant an extra 100 or so games had to be played. What resulted from all this lost time was an amazing week in which the guys had to pump out a total of 300 games an average of 11 games per person per

These fellows are incredibly prolific Strat-O players. They whipped out seven games in the very first hour of the project, then apologized, saying they'd get faster as soon as they got used to the newscoresheets we'd supplied them with.

Even so, at eight games per hour, the 300-game load we'd laid on them translated into more than 37 hours of action. What a work week. It also translated into roughly 48,000 rolls of the dice, or about 1,700 rolls per person per day.


We told the guys this. We told them that there was always the chance they'd get 299 games into it only to have the strike settled and the project halted.

Then we asked if they were sure they wanted to go through with it. They never blinked an eye. So much for that problem.

After that, the roadblocks were simply mechanical. Each year, Strat-O-Matic puts out a new set of cards, statistically based on each player's performance the previous season.

Thus, this year's cards, based on last year's performances, didn't take trades and free agency into accont. John Montefusco was still on the Giants, Dave Winfield was still on the Padres, etc.

So the rosters had to be adjusted. Then,



two rookies had to be located.

Since they spent most of last season in the minors, Fernando Valenzuela and Tim Raines have no cards in the current edition of Strat-O-Matic. This, too, turned out to be an iminently solveable dilem-

The guys informed us, after considerable research, that based on his performance through the strike this year, Valenzuela bore a striking resemblence to the 1978 Rich Gossage card. So they made Gossage a left-handed starter instead of a right-handed reliever, and plunked him in the Dodgers' starting rotation.

Raines had all the characteristics of the 1979 Al Bumbry card. His base-stealing capability had to be upgraded slightly, but once that was done, the Expos had a leadoff hitter.

Now there are undoubtedly those of you who will claim that playing this year's games with last year's cards takes the accuracy out of the game. We disagree.

Anyone who's played table top baseball can attest that statistics are just a part of what makes these games so fun. The good players usually do well, and the bad players usually stink, but certain cards seem to take on personalities of their own.

"I don't know what's wrong with Jack Clark," Neil moaned earlier this week. "He has a great card, but I just can't roll that guy.'

Translated: Clark had a great year last year, but don't expect to see him in our All-Star game.

Yeah, we're going to have one of those. And if the strike lasts long enough, we'll have playoffs and a World Series. Maybe even MVP and Cy Young awards, and possibly a season-ending banquet.

Because what this is mostly is an exercise in fun. Goodness knows we can all use a few laughs right about now.
