Record-setting team's offence is murder on 1975 Reds' pitchers in winning title

The 1998 New York Yankees, employing a potent, balanced offensive attack, secured the mythical title of baseball's greatest team by dismissing the 1975 Cincinnati Reds 4-1 in the final series in The Globe and Mail's Best Ever tournament. It was the Yankees' recordbreaking 125-win season in 1998 that instigated the best-ever debate and prompted our computer-simulated playoff.

It should come as no surprise

It should come as no surprise that the Yankees were able to exploit the Reds' relatively weak starting pitching staff. It was the extent to which they did so that may raise a few eyebrows.

The Reds' beleaguered pitchers wilted under an offensive attack that produced 63 hits and 40 runs, ringing up a .337 batting average over the course of the series. New York hit hard and early. The Reds' starters failed to make it past the fourth inning in three of the five
