OLDTIMER TEAMS

Strat-O-Matic Game Company takes great pride in presenting four oldtimer sets (1920 and 1930 oldtimer set, 1940 oldtimer set, 1950 and 1960 oldtimer set and 1960 Series B oldtimer set) enabling you to manage 28 teams of the past. You need not be familiar with the player personnel of each team as each player's card contains all important statistical information (similar to our present player cards).

STRAT-O-MATIC 1920 AND 1930 OLDTIMER TEAMS

1927 NEW YORK YANKEES — Tremendous power and excellent pitching, label the Yankees of 1927 "the greatest team of all." This was the year that Babe Ruth hit 60 homeruns and batted .356; and that Lou Gehrig (voted the most valuable player) batted .373 and smashed 117 extra basehits, including 47 homeruns. Gehrig and Ruth were ably assisted by Earl Combs (.356 B.A. and 23 triples), Bob Meusel (.337 B.A.) and Tony Lazzari (.309 B.A.). All told, the team batted .307 and more than doubled the homerun output of all its American League rivals. In pitching, Waite Hoyt, Wilcy Moore, Urban Shocker, Herb Pennock, Dutch Reuther, and George Pipgras won 101 of 110 games won by this fabulous team. What more could one ask of a ball club.

1931 PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS — Connie Mack's great team was led by Hall of Famers' Al Simmons and Lefty Grove. Simmons batted .390 to lead the American League in batting, while Grove won 31 and lost but 4, and was voted the best pitcher in baseball. In addition to Grove, the A's pitching staff included two 20 game winners — George Earnshaw, who was voted the second best pitcher in baseball, and George Walberg, another fine hurler. Mickey Cochrane and Mule Haas batted .349 and .320 respectively to assist Simmons in the slugging department. Equipped also with a fine defense, the A's easily won the American League pennant despite numerous injuries to key players.

1922 NEW YORK GIANTS — McGraw's finest team of this era! Unbelievable hitting, and fine infield defense highlighted this great team. Led by Casey Stengel's .368 batting average, seven Giant regulars hit over .300. Art Nehf was the leading pitcher of a capable staff. Possessing a fabulous doubleplay combination (Frankie Frisch and Dave Bancroft) and excellent team speed, the Giants handily won both the National League pennant, and world series.

1934 ST. LOUIS CARDINALS — "The gas house gang" combined excellent hitting and pitching to overwhelm National League teams. The Dean brothers were the kingpins of the pitching staff winning 49 games between themselves, while Rip Collins and Ducky Medwick led the hitting department which included five 300 hitters. As a team the Cardinals hit .288 to lead the National League in team batting average. No wonder "the gas house gang" was victor in both the National League pennant race and the world series!

1935 CHICAGO CUBS — The team that defeated the "gas house gang" for the National League pennant! In order to achieve this feat, they won their last twenty-one games. A fine pitching staff, two 20 game winners in Bill Lee and Lonnie Warneke, a terrific doubleplay combination in Billy Herman and Bill Jurgens, and five three hundred hitters in the starting lineup, were some of the highlights of this great Cub team. Most important, they led the National League in both team batting and team earn run average — a feat which few teams have accomplished. Their leading sluggers were Gabby Hartnett at .344 and Billy Herman at .341.

1924 WASHINGTON SENATORS — Won both the American League pennant and the world series from the New York Giants in close hard-fought contests. A fabulous defensive infield, the great Walter Johnson, and good hitting were the primary assets of the Senators. Johnson, who won 23 and lost but 7, was voted the American League's best pitcher. Firpo Marberry, the greatest relief pitcher of his time, was also included on their pitching staff. An infield consisting of Joe Judge at first base, Bucky Harris at second base, Roger Peckinpaugh at short stop, and Ossie Bluege at third base was perhaps both the finest defensive as well as fastest, infield of their time. Incidentally, Harris was the team's manager despite his tender age of twenty seven. A .294 team batting average was sparked by the slugging of Goose Goslin and Sam Rice. One can easily understand why McGraw's Giants lost to this fine Senator team in the world series!

STRAT-O-MATIC 1940 OLDTIMER TEAMS

1948 CLEVELAND INDIANS — Won the American League pennant in a historic single playoff game. Possessing a very fine pitching staff, an amazing doubleplay combination, and the American League's most powerful hitting team, the Indians defeated the Boston Braves in 6 games for the world series championship. Gene Bearden, Bob Lemon, and Hall of Famer, Bob Feller who totaled 59 victories between them, were assisted by an excellent bullpen that also included the renown Satchel Paige. The team's defensive strength lay principally in Joe Gordon and Lou Boudreau, one of Baseball's great doubleplay combinations. Four three hundred hitters, including the second and third best average hitters in the league (Boudreau .355, and Dale Mitchell .336), sparked a powerful attack. In addition, the Indians hit more homeruns than any other team in the league.

1941 BROOKLYN DODGERS — A three hundred hitting outfield, two of the three best pitchers in the National League, and a power hitting first-baseman, formed the backbone of the pennant winning Dodgers. Pete Reiser, the first rookie to win the National League Batting Championship (.343), Ducky Medwick (.318), Dixie Walker (.311), and Dolph Camilli, most valuable player and the league's top homerun hitter (34), powerhoused the Dodgers "firepower". Whit Wyatt and Kirby Higbe split 44 victories between them to pace a formidable pitching staff. Defensively, the Dodgers were capable in both infield and outfield play. Pee Wee Reese anchored a solid infield, while Reiser displayed his defensive ability in the outfield. Brooklyn's second pennant winner was a well-rounded club.

1941 NEW YORK YANKEES — were typical of Joe McCarthy's great Yankee teams of the late 1930's and early 1940's. Such names as Joe Dimaggio (.357 and 30 homeruns), Charlie Keller (.298 and 33 homeruns), Joe Gordon, Bill Dickey, Tommy Henrich (31 homeruns), Red Rolfe, Red Ruffing (15-6), and Lefty Gomez (15-5) dominated American League play for several years. In addition, Phil Rizzuto, a rookie shortstop, forged into the starting lineup with good defensive play, and a .307 batting average. Possessing a defense without weakness, and a hitting attack that included three men with 30 or more homeruns, the Yankees romped over American League opposition by a 17 game margin, and decisively defeated the Dodgers in the World Series. Incidentally, this was the year that Joe Dimaggio hit in 56 consecutive games — a record that perhaps never will be broken.

1946 ST. LOUIS CARDINALS — Displayed sufficient superiority in pitching, batting and fielding, to lead the National League in all three categories. Howie Pollet (21-10), Harry Breechen (15-15), Murry Dickson (15-6) and Ted Wilks (8-0) were the leading pitchers of this distinguished staff. The National League batting champion, Stan Musial (.365 and 86 extra basehits) was the hub of a formidable attack that also included Enos Slaughter (.300) and Whitey Kurowski (.301). Defensively, the Cardinals centerfielder, Terry Moore, and shortstop, Marty Marion, were the finest fielders of their time. With such varied talents at their disposal, the Cardinals defeated the Redsox in 7 games for the 1946 world series title.

1940 CINCINNATI REDS — In winning exactly 100 games, the Reds won the National League Pennant race by a 12 game margin. Instrumental in their victory was the best one-two pitching punch in either League. Bucky Walters (22-10) and Paul Derringer (20-12) led their excellent group of hurlers to achieve the lowest team earn run average in the National League. The Reds were also equipped with a fine all-around defense, setting a record for committing the fewest errors in a season. Three three hundred hitters dotted their starting lineup including the second best hitter in the league, Ernie Lombardi (.319), and hard-hitting first baseman Frank McCormick (.309). Despite the loss of Lombardi for world series play, the Reds nevertheless defeated the Detroit Tigers in a closely contested 7 game struggle.

1946 BOSTON REDSOX — Overpowered American League opposition in gaining the pennant by a comfortable 12 game margin. The incomparable Ted Williams, recipient of the most valuable player award, batted .342, and smashed 38 homeruns, to lead this powerful and greatly feared hitting club. Ably assisting him were John Pesky (.335) and Dom Dimaggio (.316), with Rudy York and Bobby Doerr also contributing greatly. An exceptionally fine defense "through the middle" complimented a fine group of hurlers. Dave Ferris (25-6), Tex Hughes (20-11), and Mickey Harris (17-9) formed the nucleus of the pitching staff. The Redsox led the American League in both batting and fielding averages.

STRAT-O-MATIC 1950 AND 1960 OLDTIMER TEAMS

1950 PHILADELPHIA PHILLIES — The "Whizz Kids" were led by a sterling pitching staff and equipped with an excellent infield defense. The Kingpins of this "deep" pitching staff that led the National League in team earned-run average were Robin Roberts (20-11), Curt Simmons (17-8), and Jim Konstanty (16-7). Konstanty was without doubt the outstanding pitcher of the National League, infact, he was the first relief pitcher to receive the most valuable player award. Eddie Waitkus (1b), Willie Jones (3b), Gran Hamner (ss), and Andy Seminick (c) enhanced the pitching staff tremendously with their fine defensive play. Del Ennis (.311 and 31 homeruns) and Richie Ashburn (.303) formed the core in a consistently competent hitting attack.

1950 NEW YORK YANKEES — Were considered by many to be "the gamest, never-say-die bunch of battlers" in their hard-fought pennant race victory over the Tigers, Redsox and Indians. A well-balanced club, the Yankees excelled in all phases of the game. Four three hundred hitters: Phil Rizzuto, (.324 and the most valuable American League player), Yogi Berra, (.322 and 28 homeruns), Hank Bauer (.320), and Joe Dimaggio (.301 and 32 homeruns) were the mainstays of the attack. The Yankee "big three": Ed Lopat, Allie Reynolds, and Vic Raschi sparked a pitching staff that also included rookie of the year, Whitey Ford. Defensively, Rizzuto (ss) and Gerry Coleman (2b) stabilized the infield, and Dimaggio, Bauer, and Gene Woodling comprised an almost flawless outfield.

1953 BROOKLYN DODGERS — Explosive power and unbelievable defense enabled this great Dodger team to win 105 games. Supplying the basehits that rewarded the Dodgers with the team batting title (.285) were batting champion Carl Furillo (.344), Duke Snider (.336), Jackie Robinson (.329), Roy Campanella (.312), and Gil Hodges (.302). Team leader in homeruns (208), the Dodgers' power came primarily from the hands of Snider (42 homeruns), Campanella (41 homeruns), and Hodges (31 homeruns). The defense gleamed principally due to the efforts of five men who were considered the best at their positions: Hodges (1b), Campanella (c), Billy Cox (3b), Snider (cf) and Furillo (rf). Although the team's pitching did not compare with it's hitting and fielding, Carl Erskine (20-6) and Clem Labine (11-6) stood out among their hurlers.

1954 CLEVELAND INDIANS — Established an American League record by winning 111 games. The chief factor in this record breaking achievement was an overpowering pitching staff that won the team earned-run average title with an all-time low of 2.78. The nucleus of one of the most superb pitching staffs of all-time was formed by Mike Garcia, Early Wynn, and Bob Lemon. Together, they accounted for 65 victories amongst them, and finished respectively one, two, and four for the E.R.A. title. Hall of famer, Bob Feller and Art Houtteman contributed with their records of 13 and 3, and 15 and 7. Relief pitchers Don Mossi and Ray Narleski constantly squelched opposing team's rallies. Steady hitting was supplied by batting champion Bobby Avila (.341), Al Rosen (.300), and homerun champion Larry Doby (32).

1954 NEW YORK GIANTS — Led by Willie Mays, the Giants won the National League pennant and the World Series in four straight games, upsetting the baseball experts' predictions. The combination of a vigorous pitching staff, staunch defense, and Willie Mays explain this unexpected surge. The nucleus of the starters was formed by John Antonelli (21-7 and voted the League's best pitcher), Rueben Gomez (17-9), and Sal Maglie (14-6). They were capably backed by the extraordinary relief work of Hoyt Wilhelm and Marv Grissom. Willie Mays, the first player to win the most valuable player award in his first complete major league season, won the league batting championship with .345, and smashed 41 homeruns. He was ably assisted by Don Mueller who hit .342 to finish second to Mays.

1957 MILWAUKEE BRAVES — Defied an amazing wave of injuries to key personnel to win the pennant and world series. Hank Aaron (.322 and 44 homeruns), Red Schoendienst (.309), and Ed Mathews (32 homeruns) were the mainstays of a solid hitting lineup. The team's pitching strength lay in three outstanding starting hurlers: Warren Spahn (21-11), Bob Buhl (18-7), and Lew Burdette (17-9). Schoendienst (2b) was the sparkplug of a steady defense that also included Del Crandall, an excellent catcher. An another important factor in the team's success was a great bench that provided capable substitutes to replace injured regulars.

1960 PITTSBURGH PIRATES — Fine pitching, terrific defense, and solid hitting, enabled them to acquire the National League pennant and world series championship. Starting pitchers Vern Law (20-9), Bob Friend (18-12)), and Vinegar Bend Mizell (14-8) were backed by the superb relief pitching of Elroy Face. Law received the Cy Young Pitching award for his brilliant achievements. The infield work of Don Hoak (3b), Bill Mazeroski (2b), and Dick Groat (ss), and the outfield play of Bill Virdon (cf), and Roberto Clemente (rf) were almost flawless. In batting, the Pirates led the league in team hitting. Batting Champion, and most valuable player, Dick Groat (.325), and Clemente (.314) formed the hub of the attack.

1961 NEW YORK YANKEES — Considered by many critics to be the second best Yankee team of all-time, the Yanks greatest strength lay in its homerun power. It was supplied principally by Roger Maris (61 homeruns) and Mickey Mantle (54 homeruns). The team hit a record high of 240 homeruns with six men slugging over twenty homeruns! The Yankees were also a spectacular defensive team, particularly in their infield which consisted of Clete Boyer (3b), Tony Kubek (ss), Bobby Richardson (2b), and Elston Howard (c) who were among the best at their respective positions. Their pitching was very strong also with Whitey Ford (25-4) the ace of the staff, and the bullpen captained by Luis Arroyo, a fifteen game winner—all in relief. Although the 1961 Yanks are primarily remembered for Maris's homerun record, the entire team's homerun power, superb defense, and stout pitching are not easily forgotten.

1962 New York Mets—With a record of 40-120, many consider the Mets the worst team in baseball history. Finishing last in batting, pitching, and fielding, the Mets trailed the San Francisco Giants (pennant winners) by 60½ games. Richie Ashburn's .306 batting average topped the team and Frank Thomas led in homeruns with 34. The beleaguered pitching staff was led by Roger Craig (10-24, 4.51 ERA), Al Jackson (8-20, 4.40 ERA) and Jay Hook (8-19, 4.84 ERA). Losers of their first nine ballgames, the Mets quickly dropped to last place, and were mathematically eliminated from the pennant race August 6.

For outstanding super-league play, establish a schedule from the above teams and decide who is the finest team from 1920 to 1967 — and perhaps of all time. Or, if you prefer, play them against your modern Strat-O-Matic baseball teams.
