Over 1000 man hours are necessary to create an oldtimer basic and advanced version of Strat-O-Matic Baseball and an additional 500 hours is necessary for a super advanced version. Why so many hours? Strat-O-Matic statisticians must go over each and every box score in order to extract all lefty-righty data and other information not contained in the official baseball records. In addition, all issues of <u>The Sporting News</u> are read for that specific year. In this way, we are also able to develop accurate player ratings. Are these "monster" exertions worthwhile for the baseball fan? We think so. If Strat-O-Matic did not construct this data, we would be forced to utilize the same statistical technique that our competitors use - contrived standardization of the necessary needed statistics. For example, all right handed hitters might be assigned statistics 30 points above their averages against lefty pitching and 15 points below their averages against righty pitching. Doubles, triples, homeruns and walks would also be standardized in the same manner. Irregularities would not exist. How good is this system? Totally unrealistic! In the baseball statistical world very few players conform totally to statistical standardization. Virtually every player's statistics would be partially or totally incorrectly represented. Yes, we would save "huge amounts" of time developing oldtimer seasons, perhaps as much as 90%, but at too great a loss in historical quality reproduction, for you the baseball fan. you the baseball fan

How accurate are Strat-O-Matic lefty-righty statistics? We feel that they are very accurate for our purposes, although not as accurate as current lefty-righty breakdowns. The following comparison between 1962 major league club data and lefty-righty statistics developed by Strat-O-Matic illustrates the accuracy of Strat-O-Matic's statistical efforts. We were able to obtain major league lefty-righty information for certain teams from the 1962 season. It must be noted that the major league team statistics used for comparison purposes were not necessarily 100% correct as they also constructed their statistics by hand. Major league club lefty-righty homerun breakdowns for 46 players compared to Strat-O-Matic statistics found the following comparison: 34 players or 74% were in agreement, 10 players or almost 22% differed by one homerun and only 2 players differed by 2 homeruns. Thus 96% were exactly the same or differed by one homerun. We think that is pretty good. Concerning batting averages, a total of 74 players were compared for their batting averages hit off righty pitchers. 65 players or almost 88% differed by 10 points or less and only one player differed by more than 20 points. We think that also is pretty good.

1960 BASEBALL SEASON

September 15, Baltimore and its "apple cheek" pitching staff arrive in New York for a four game series, trailing the first place Bronx Bombers by only one percentage point. Baltimore is swept and New York wins the remaining 11 games on its schedule. In a bizarre World Series, New York loses to Pittsburgh in 7 games. Mantle and Maris finished one-two in American League homers with 40 and 39 respectively. The National League batting crown was won by Dick Groat at .325 and the homerun derby by Ernie Banks with 41. 1963 BASEBALL SEASON

Though winning the most games during the season, New York (AL) was humbled by the superior pitching of Los Angeles, losing in four straight games to a staff led by Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale. The Los Angeles starting pitchers threw all but one inning in the World Series. Pitching also dominated the regular season with nine twenty game winners. Koufax led with 25 wins and an ERA of 1.88. Willie McCovey and Hank Aaron shared the NL homerun crown with 44 each. In the AL Harmon Killebrew's 45 homers edged out Dick Stuart's 42. 1965 BASEBALL SEASON

Two Los Angeles pitchers, Sandy Koufax (26 wins) and Don Drysdale (23 wins), decimated the National League hitters! 




