"We look forward to meeting many of the people who have enjoyed the game for so many years," said Mr. Richman. "This has been a very special year for us and we are glad to be able to host such an event for our customers."

The company's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary is truly a time of celebration and reflection for sports fans. Millions savor their Strat-O-Matic memories almost as much as their "real" sports memories. Thousands of celebrities and sports personalities including broadcasters Bob Costas, Marv Albert, Jon Miller, Dan Patrick, Gary Miller, players like Doug Glanville, Dale Murphy, Cal Ripken Jr, Jim Kaat and entertainers such as Spike Lee, Drew Carey and Tim Robbins trace their lifetime love of sports to Strat."

And who can forget the Mets' Lenny Dykstra's reaction in his historic walk-off home run in the 1986 post-season: 'I haven't done anything like that since Strat-O-Matic baseball!'

The game is just as simple and complex today, as it was 40 years ago. Simple because it can still be played on a cardboard replica field with three dice, 837 player cards and result charts. The complexity is in the more than 1000 hours of statistical analysis necessary to develop a product that produces player cards to accurately reflect the players' on-field performance.

"I truly believe that the accuracy and playability of the game is what has made it transcend time and keep players interested," explains Mr. Richman, who as an 11 year-old in 1948 invented the game that spawned the company that he still owns today. "Although many games and fads have come and gone, Strat-O-Matic endures because fans know that they are coming as close to managing their own team as is possible."

Strat-O-Matic is synonymous with baseball, but the company has developed a strong following in all four major sports over the past 30 years. Strat-O-Matic Football was first released in 1968; Strat-O-Matic Basketball was initially issued in 1973; and Strat-O-Matic Hockey was developed in 1978. In 1985, the company offered the first computer version of the game, and in 1996, the first CD Rom version became available. Although the core Strat-O-Matic audience stills loves to roll the dice, thousands of players have made the move to the computer game.

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In addition to producing a new set of player cards each year to reflect the most recent season, Strat-O-Matic has also gone back in history to produce great teams and seasons of the past. Last year, the company produced its most ambitious undertaking, the Strat-O-Matic Baseball Hall of Fame player card set. Produced in limited quantity (5500 sets), each card encompasses the seven best seasons from the career of every Hall of Fame player (up until 2000). As an added bonus, three controversial "non-Hall of Famers" -- Pete Rose, Joe Jackson and Carl Mays -- are also included.
