S-O-M Baseball rates place in 'Hall'

Game used for '81 All-Star contest on display

The Baseball Hall of Fame in upstate New York, at Cooperstown, isnt

reserved for the sport's great players, managers and the equipment they used. The 'Hall also contains a game within a game.

Strat-O-Matic Baseball is the game on display in the hallowed 'Hall.

It's the same game that was used for last summer's All-Star game that was played in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium while real-life baseball had

was played in treveland's Municipal Stadium while real-life baseball had been halted by a strike.

The game attracted national attention (it was won by the National League by a lopsided 15-2 score) as former Cleveland pitching ace 80b Feller threw out the first ball (er, die) and two producers from WKYC-TV in Cleveland, Jon Halpern and Jim Schaefer, acted as managers. James Williams of S-O-M, in fact, flew into Cleveland for the happening, and was promptly made honorary umpire.


The dice were rolled on a table set up at home plate. A horde of reporters, photographers and TV camera crews were on the scene to dutifully record the results.

Pictures of that game, the game itself, boxscores, S-O-M's charts and the player cards are all on display at Cooperstown. Being accorded such status would be comparable to an S-O-M version of a "walk on the

What past baseball season is next?

S-O-M may reprint teams of 1960's with advanced features

Don't be alarmed at the open letter from the Strat-O-Matic Game Company that appeared in the June issue of the Review. Sweeping changes in all of S-O-M's games are not planned. The "4-column" pitchers' cards are not going to be resurrected.

Although the game company did not elaborate, most changes contemplated seem to be directed at the pro football game. The new penalty system, with the revised timing system, was a major--albeit still optional--change.

Most of the early response to any changes in the structure of the games was positive, reports S-O-M. Realism and speed of play were two major concerns by the gaming public, but being able to play contemporary teams against those of the past was not a priority item.

The changes in the basketball game, which were certainly sweeping (almost a totally new game was the result), were overwhelming received by the gaming public. The product was definitely superior to the old

and there was little cry of not being able to play the new cards against past teams. Structural changes in the pro football game, however, could be a concern since the table top gridiron product has been on the market in pretty much its present form for over 14 years.

Football has undergone many changes, though, mainly the emphasis on the passing game and more wide-open offense, and as a result the editors of the Review have the feeling that S-O-M wants to make the game more in tune with the times and thus the changes.

Stay tune--any major structural changes or any game revisions will be brought to you first through the pages of the Review.

WHAT NEXT AFTER 1961?

S-O-M, as everyone interested in baseball is well aware, plans on coming out with the 1961 season next spring along with the 1983 edition

But what's next after 1961 (which will have all the advanced features that the recently printed 1956 season had)? S-O-M would like to come out with a past season every year. But what season do you prefer? According to the latest poll in the Review, 1959 and 1930 were the next seasons wanted.

"We could come out with the 1930 season,™ says Harold Richman, S-O-M's creator, sounding a little hesitant. "But I'm concerned many people would not relate to a season that far back. Another possibility would be for us to start with the first season without the advanced side and print just an advanced side for that season. Or it could be both basic and advanced. I have a feeling that more people would be interested in something like that than printing a season from the distant past."

Richman adds that even though Review readers may be all "polled out," he would like to know how they feel about his idea (of printing advanced sides for seasons before 1971)?

"Collectors will still have value in their cards, but it will be considerably reduced," adds Richman.

Look for some high scoring games with the new football cards. not because the offensive cards are earth-shaking, rather because the defenses appear so porous. Aerial blitzes should be common as there isn't one team pass defense that was rated excellent by Strat-O-Matic for 1981 (real-life).

For 1981 (real-life).

Nine of the pass defenses, in fact, were rated poor, while three were adjudged to be very poor--Atlanta, San Diego and Baltimore. Overland, while on the topic of defense, six defenses were rated poor and only two were rated as being excellent--Atlanta and Kansas City.

At least the Falcons came out with a split--being very poor against the pass but excellent containing the run. Poor Baltimore, it was rated poor against the run and very poor defending against aerial attacks.

A cursory check of the new cards just before the August issue was packaged up and shipped to be printedrevealed a number of other interesting team and individual cards. including:

* San Francisco, real-life Super Bowl king, doesn't look that omnipotent. Joe Montana has a great card for flat and short passes but isn't a deep threat except on No. 7, guessed wrong. Only good thing about the rushers is that they don't fumble much (2-3).

MORE ON CHANGES, PLEASE

I'd like to take this opportunity to make a few comments regarding Harold Richman's letter in the Review (June, 1982).

I find it impossible to choose one alternative over the other without knowing the nature of the proposed structural change. I would consider it a great loss not to be able to play current teams vs. past teams or old-timers, but I'd love to see an improved prodout.

It would be ideal, if feasible, to keep the basic side of card sets as is and replace the advanced side with cards set up for the new system. I can certainly see room for improvement in the current game (rare plays, pickoff moves, balks, more realistic advancement of runners, etc.), but I think some of these can fit into the present game and I find it difficult to visualize a structure change that could significantly alter the current product.

One more item I'd like to mention; after 16 years and about 400 S-0-M games, I find that triple plays occur about four times as often as expected. Because of this, I only accept an 'as many outs as possible' result on a split of 1 to 5. Splits 6 to 20 result in a lineout into a doubleplay only. I randomly determine which of the baserunners is caught off base.

I had not played S-O-M Basketball for about five years, but with the revisions in the new game I became a Strat basketball

fan. By far, it is going to be one of the better sports games on the market in that the realism (as much realism as a sports game can produce] is there. There is an explos-iveness to the fast-break and the set-up teams must set-up.

As far as my negative comments about the game, they are actually minute. The steal and blocked shots for a game are a little out of line in that Robert Parish has the possibility to block at least five shots a game or Mike Richardson can pick up more steals than normal.

What I am pointing out is even though you play a player his normal number of minutes a game and he is a great shot-blocker or ball thief, he will average more blocks and steals than he should. The steal factor, I feel, should be reduced some to more turnovers because more turnovers occur than steals.

A suggestion for the Review: Since it is the main voice of S-O-M, why don't you, since you've been printing for 10 years, put together all the playing tips and publish them in a magazine and offer it to your subscribers?

More old-timers given 'e' ratings

Latest are 1967 Cards, Red Sox, '65 Twins, Dodgers

Steve Edell, the 29-year-old gamer from Jerusalem, Israel, has put Steve Edell, the 29-year-old gamer from Jerusalem, Israel, has put the "e" back in the old-timers in Strat-D-Matic Baseball. His first venture (July, 1982 Review) was authenticated via a 162-game replay for four teams--1948 Indians, 1957 Braves, 1922 Browns and 1935 Chicago Cubs.

Edell's formula, based on real-life games played and errors committed, terned out realistic results and has prompted his presenting four more teams from the past with newly assigned "e" ratings.

"This (the ratings) is computed according to games played, and not innings," points out Edell. "So it's not totally accurate, although I feel it is more accurate than anything else we now have. I based the ratings

it is more accurate than anything else we now have. I based the ratings on a 152-game season--multiplying games played of each player and errors I based the ratings made by them to be comparable to a 162-game season, then using that 'error' number as the e-rating."

Edel also mentions that he differentiated between different positions when affixing "e" ratings. An outfielder, for instance, that played the same number of games at shortstop (and with equal ability at both positions) would have 3x more of a chance of errors at shortstop than at an outfield position. Remember the maximum "e" rating for an outfielder is "16" while for a shortstop it is "48."

For example: Stan Musial '46 Cardinals, played 114 games at first base and 42 games in the outfield. He made a total of 13 errors. "According to the ratio of incidence of possibility of error between first and the outfield, and taking into account the amount of games played at each position, I figured Musial would be a 18-e15 and an outfield e10," says Edell.

Here are pitchers 'holding on' ratings

Kurt Smeby, commissioner of the Federal Baseball League, has a playing tip that provides for "holding on" ratings for individual pitchers.

Instead of using a standard reduction when a runner is being held,
Smeby offers the ratings below as an alternative. "A pitcher has as much to do with preventing a stolen base as does the catcher, in most cases,"

argues Smeby. "These statistics and ratings," he continues, "are not just random assignments but are actual reflections of the stolen base rate against each pitcher in 1981; compiled by counting boxscore statistics." Ratings of "O" (no effect) will have pluses indicated in the brack-

ets added (if the runner is not held on) to the stealers' success chance. Also, on steals of home all pitchers are -7 when holding the runner.

Gold Cup IV title quest under way

Defending champ Anthony Johnston passes first test

Gold Cup IV is well under way, as reported in the July issue of the Review. And Steve Beren, originator of the Gold Cup Challenge Series in baseball, is alive and well, as also was reported in the Review.

Beren, swamped with a new commisionership in a play-by-mail hockey

league and a multitude of games in Gold Cup play, admits the dice were silent for a long period this winter. But he reports that all the other entangling commitments have been untied and that he's concentrating his

gaming endeavors now solely on the Gold Cup.

Round one, which took over a year to complete, is now history and Beren, who plays and records all the games himself, says he's well into the second round. Out of the original field of 70 contestants, Beren says that close to 48 advanced into the second round.

For those unfamiliar with the Gold Cup, each manager that signs up to participate chooses two teams with a combined won-and-lost record not exceeding .500. Early series are four games and at least a split is required to advance into the next round.

Each gamer sends Beren a detailed instruction sheet as to how to use the teams, lineups, pitching rotation, when to advance runners and steal, etc. Beren, in turn, follows them to the letter and has even had to replay a game/series if he made a mistake in adhering to the instructions--a mistake that no one, except for Beren, would have ever noticed in

Anthony Johnston of Little Rock, AR, was Gold Cup Challenge Series III champion. He had the 1977 St. Louis Cardinals and 1979 Los Angeles Dodgers and wound up defeated female gamer Cathy Keeley, Corunna, MI, Johnston won \$150 and Keeley, a 21-year-old student studying accounting and computer science at the time, received a check for \$30.
