Please, when moving, let us know far in advance. Every month a small number of subscribers write in that they did not receive the latest Review. In many cases it turns out they had moved, on short notice, and assumed mail would be forwarded. Yes, if you have first-class mailing; no, if you have third-class. Third-class is not forwarded.

So, to guarantee that you'll have no interruption in delivery when moving, either notify the Review far in advance (six to eight weeks), or pay the extra 15¢ per month and receive first-class mailing.

MORE PHOTOS, PLEASE

The Review is always curious as to what the rest of the S-O-M gaming world looks like. If you have pictures of yourself rolling 'em, or snaps of your league in action, send them along. Pictures, as the old axiom goes, say a thousand words.

Only thing we ask is that photos be black-and-white, if at all possible, are sharp and don't have a dark background.
While the Review could always use photos, abbreviated replays are

something it could do without. Preference is usually given to full-season replays, then mini replays (less than 162 or 154 games in baseball, etc.), with the abbreviated replays (whereby a gamer plays a third of a season and then multiples all statistics by three] at the bottom of the preference pole as far as seeing print in the Review.

Full-season replays, of course, take a lot more time and work and provide a comparison with real-life statistics, standings, etc. Mini replays have a place, too, because the games are played. But the abbreviated replays (or projected replays) violate the basic rule of table-gaming: playing the games! Players, real-life as well as in card form, seldom, if ever, perform the same throughout a season.

'Book' on Empire State S-O-M League voluminous

Books are as much a part of modern-day baseball as bats, balls and bases. There are books on hitters, books on pitchers—and, in the case of the Empire State Strat-O-Matic League, enough books to fill a library.

The ESSOM (Feb., 1980 Review) has a book on everything, from a booklet of newsletters (the league has both a spring and fall league), guides summarizing the latest season to the minutest detail, to a Register which includes lifetime (in S-O-M) batting and pitching averages/statistics for every player

The Fall League's edition of the 1980 ESSOM Guide, for instance, ran pping 95 pages. The Register, again for the Fall League, ran 63 a whopping 95 pages. pages. Put 'em all together and you've got a volume that is longer than

Stephen King's latest thriller-chiller.

Another King, Larry-no relation to the author-is the commissioner of the ESSUM, which is one of the best organized leagues of its kind in the S-O-M world. The league has been a model of stability, thanks in large part to the tireless efforts of its popular commissioner, and even has a waiting list of managerial hopefuls.

KING'S IN WINNER'S CIRCLE

King, a computer programmer who makes his home in New York city, had never won a league championship, until the 1980 Spring League. Whereas in most leagues the commissioner is at the top, or near the top, in the league's standings, King usually was an also-ran. That may have made the ESSOM a better league, too, since the commish was not the threat he is in most leagues.

But King did strive to win a league title--and not just keep the books--and another goal was achieved when his Manhattan Skyliners defeatbooks--and another goal was achieved when his mannattan akyliners dereated Glen Sarvady's Park Ridge Roadrunners, 4-2, in the championship series. The ESSOM's Spring League (played in the spring, using mostly National League players; 156-game schedule plus playoffs) was its seventh.

There's also a Fall League (using mostly A.L. players) and the 1979

season was its fifth. The ESSOM is play-by-mail and trading is permitted, although not inter-league. Both are 10-team leagues, with the Spring season encompassing March-June; Fall July-December.

In the Spring League's playoffs (the top four teams qualify), King's American Conference champs faced the second-place Roadrunners in the finals. J.R. Richard of the Skyliners won two games and struck the decisive blow in the sixth and final game by slamming a three-run homer, pacing the Skyliners to victory. He was MVP of the playoffs after winning five games, completing four, hurling two shutouts, striking out 64, homering and stealing a base once and compiling a 1.41 ERA.

APACHES ON WARPATH

The $F_{\rm all}$ League, based on 1978 real-life, had Tom Perella's Pawtucket Apaches rising up from a second-place finish in the conference race et Apacnes rising up from a second-place in the championship series. to defeat Don Malaguti's Boston Oaks, 4-2, in the championship series. for Perella, it was the second straight ESSOM Fall League championship. for Perella,

Three 20-game winners--Mike Caldwell, Vida Blue and Larry Sorensen--and hitting triumvirate of Carl Yastrzemski (30 homers, 106 ABI), Larry Hisle (31, 112) and Hod Carew (.296) helped the Apaches count coup on their many victims.

CHRONICLE OF THE PAST

Not only are the ESSOM's annual Guides jammed with past history, both team and individual, as well as managerial, but the Register gives you a Who's Who look at every individual player to participate in the league.

For instance, Rod Carew has played in all five of the ESSOM's Fall (mostly A.L. players) seasons. And his exploits are listed, year by year, in the Register. His high was a .351 average in 1978 and his low a .296 carved out in 1979. Overall, Carew has a lofty .325 ESSOM career batting mark.

As far as pitchers, a cursory look through the Register reveals that Dennis Leonard has been in the league for four years (missing 1975), has a 3.64 ERA and 56-49 record. His best season was also 1978 as he hurled 320 innings and posted a 28-8 record.

Reggie Jackson has a career average of .277 (.311 in 1979 being tops) and has hit an average of 33 home runs, with 45 in 1978 being his best season. Reggie also has driven in 519 runs, with a high of 122 in 1978, and has, after five years of free swinging, struck out a whopping 600 times and walked 358.

Oh, and by the way, George Brett hasn't terrorized enemy pitchers like in real-life. Another five-year veteran, Brett has only a .277 average, with a high of .297 in 1977. That's one career average that's certain to change when the next 12 months become history are a logged in the next Register.

Strat-O-Matic spotlight

DETAILS, DETAILS, DETAILS

Jim Keeley can never be accused of being incomplete when he sends along his play-by-mail instruction sheets for baseball. He sent the Review a sample of his instruction sheets for the 1979 Detroit Tigers, all six typewritten pages.

In addition to the basics--batting lineups against right-handed and left-handed pitching, starting rotation, injury replacements, and when to relieve--keeley has also included detailed defensive changes, depending on the amount of the lead and what inning. Keeley, for example, makes his defensive changes (Aurelio Rodriguez at third base, Jason Thompson at first and Jerry Morales, right field) after six innings if holding a lead of four runs or more, after seven innings if three or more, after eight innings if two or more and after nine or more if ahead by one or more runs.

The above changes would occur if either Tom Brookens or Phil Mankowski was playing third, John Wockenfuss first and Champ Summers right field. As far as holding runners, Keeley has this chart as a guide:

Other instructions include: BUNTING – Runner on first, no outs, "B" or better at plate, use. But do not use if I'm down by three or more after the seventh innings. HIT AND RUN – Runner held on first, O or 1

out, with an adjusted "B" or better up to bat. Do not use if down by three or more runs. Bunting gets preference over hit-and-run unless I three or more runs. Bunting gets preference over nit-and-run unless I lead by two or more. Hit-and-run gets preference over stealing unless steal chances are 1-13+, PINCH-HIT - Eighth inning on, with runner in scoring position and when behind or tied, Pinch hit Rusty Staub for Alan scoring position and when behind or tied, Pinch hit Rusty Staub for Alan Trammell, bring Rodriguez in to third and Mark Wagner to shortstop (right-handed starting lineup only).

How effective our Keeley's detailed instructions? Well, in three PBM leagues he's finished first twice and runnerup once; plus in Gold Cup competition he has an overall 14-7 record.

SISLER IS COMPUTER BATTING KING

Mike Ewen, 23, and a senior majoring in computer science at Moorhead State University, Moorhead, MN, wanted to determine who was the best hitter among the oldies who at one time batted .400 or more during a sea-

Son.

His experiment consisted of taking the nine Hall of Fame cards with averages of .400 or better--1897 Willie Keeler (.432), 1924 Rogers Hornsby (.424), 1901 Nap Lajoie (.422), 1911 Ty Cobb (.420), 1922 George Sisler (.420), 1911 Joe Jackson (.408), 1941 Ted Williams (.406), 1923 Harry (.402), 1911 Joe Jackson (.408), 1941 Ted Williams (.406), 1923 Harry (.403) and 1930 Bill Terry (.401), plus he also included, as a tenth player, Rod Carew, 1977 (.388)--and pitting them against 1913 Walter Johnson and 1979 Dave Goltz.

Computer programs were written for each batter and pitcher and then

Johnson and 19/9 wave boltz.

Computer programs were written for each batter and pitcher and then each batter was given 600 at-bats against each pitcher. "Each program," relates Ewen, "was designed to run for 10 years at a time. I gave each batter five tries against each pitcher--a total of 50 years in 10-year batter five tries against each pitcher--a total of 50 years in 10-year exempts. For companion supposes I weed each batter's best 40-year averages to the companion of the segments. For comparison purposes I used each batter's best 10-year average." Each pitcher was backed by all "2" fielders.

When the smoke had cleared, and Goltz, shell-shocked as his card must have been, was carried off, Sisler emerged as the best hitter, producing a combined average of .402. No one else had a combined average higher than .386, thanks mainly to the "Big Train." Sisler had the best 10-year average against Johnson, .338, but five hitters never topped even .300.

Goltz, meanwhile, was gouged for .400-plus averages by everyone except for Carew, who hit .398.

Jim Muldrow, Monroe, NC, had an unusual series between Detroit and Texas in a mini replay of the 1979 season. Each game wound up 1-0, with a home run accounting for the lone run in each. Muldrow also reported that Burt Hooton hurled a no-hitter and that Matt Keough, 2-17 in reallife, pitched .500 ball and had three shutouts...Greg Balas, originator of the "Tournament of Silver," says there have been delays but the tournament is still progressing and should be finished soon...31 innings! That's how long it took the Chicago Cubs, managed by Tom Barie, to subdue St. Louis, guided by Henry Dressel, Etna, Pittsburgh, PA, 2-1, in a marathon game. The Cubs scored a run in the 19th, after two errors by Ken Oberkfell, only to have Tony Scott homer in the bottom of the inning. Finally, Steve Ontiveros singled home Bill Buckner with the winning run. The Ice Baseball League is alive and well, reports Joe Walker, sports writer for the Saginaw News, Saginaw, MI. The Ice Leaguers include Dennis Desrosiers, Jean-Marie Nicol and Gunner Garrett--all members of the Saginaw Gears of the International Hockey League--plus Bob Froese, who had a brief stint with the Philadelphia Flyers before being sent back to the Gears...Phil Meade and Tom Nahigian of Arlington, MA, took the top 32 NBA teams from 1974-75 through 1978-79, played a single-elimination tournament and found that in 23 out of 30 games the winning team was also the one committing the fewest turnovers. The 1974-75 Boston Celtics downed the 1978-79 Washington Bullets in the final game, 106-100. The Celtics outpointed their rivals 33-16 in the final quarter for the come-from-Dave Cowens led the winners with 32 points while John Havlicek chipped in with 20 points and 10 assists...Weather outside may have been frightful, but inside it was delightful when Steve Schumacher, Houston, TX, conducted his "Hurricane Season" old timers baseball tournament last August. Baseball playing tip Here's three-dice split-number system

Here again is one of the most popular baseball playing tips ever gross the desk of the Review—-Bryan Baker's split-number dice system! Although it's reprinted mainly for the benefit of new subscribers, it might provide 'veteran' Review readers with a refresher course on the subject.

The split-number dice system, of course, replaces the split deck and makes it possible for any number, 1-20, to occur on any roll of the

dice.

Checking the split-number chart below, note that it is subdivided: columns 1, 2, and 3 always refer to split numbers 1-10, and columns 4, 5 and 6 always to numbers 11-20. NEBRASKA LONE TEAM TO GO UNBEATEN

Every team, except for Nebraska, 1971 vintage, tasted at least one defeat in the nine games. Balance was Nebraska's secret, as the Cornhuskers didn't have an apparent weakness. Closest game was in the season's finale against Alabama when, after trailing 22-0 at halftime, Nebraska roared back for a 27-22 triumph.

Now, here's a quickie look at the divisions:
DIVISION I - Texas was far from overpowering, even though easily winning the division; the Longhorns twice got hooked and handed lopsided losses, 28-7 by UCLA and 30-3 by Pitt...Dklahoma featured great running attack but non-existent passing game; backed into playoffs after Mississippi and Alabama both dropped their last games...Michigan State was inconsistent, trouncing Oklahoma one game, 42-9, and then being upended by lowly Georgia in the next, 17-7...UCLA was ball-controlled into submission, as 24.1 defensive yield attests to.

derensive yield attests to.
DIVISION 2 - Pittsburgh had best offense (28.4 points) and secondbest defense (9.3); pass defense particularly stifling; routed Purdue
twice, 55-0 and 52-3; only loss was to Alabama, 24-10...Alabama, meanwhile, relied on strong defense in bid to reach playoffs; season-ending
loss to Nebraska (after that 22-0 halftime, no less) ended Crimson Tide's
season for good...LSU had knack of playing well against good times, bad
against bad...Purdue's lone tie came against LSU, 27-27, but in most games
Boilermakers were hopelessly out of it by halftime; Purdue gave up 35.7

points and gave up 239 more points than it scored.

DIVISION 3 - Notre Dame was another consistent team--and it had to be for Division 3 was probably the toughest of them all; only loss was to (continued on next page)

Army, 27-23...Army won first five games, mainly because of strong defense, but then lost three of last four...Michigan battled Notre Dame to 14-14 tie in opener, was blanked by Army, 24-0, in second and went downhill from there on; U-M was often victimized by aerial blitz and run-oriented attack couldn't muster enough firepower to keep pace...Arkansas had no great strengths or weaknesses; defense picked off four passes and returned all for touchdowns against Purdue [56-0].

DIVISION 4 - Penn State was another ball-control team, but with best defense in league; Penn State was in weakest division, though, thus stats were misleading...Mississippi did defeat Penn Staters, 20-14, but missed playoffs by losing to Minnesota in last game...Stanford had porous secondary and feeble ground attack; only victories were over hapless Georgia...Bulldogs had worst offense in league (7.7) and second worst defense,

trailing only Purdue in points surrendered.

OIVISION 5 - USC started slowly, losing four of first five games, but recovered to win last four and slip into first place in another subpar division...Navy, ironically, was strong passing, but could do little else right; Navy lost the 'service war' to Army, 20-14...specialist teams were terrible for Syracuse and the Orangemen saw red as result, finishing .500...Florida, not figured to do much against star-studded competition, instead surprised by winning three games.

DIVISION 6 - Nebraska dominated division as no one else even had

DIVISION 6 - Nebraska dominated division as no one else even had winning record...Ohio State stumbled along until bushwhacking arch-rival Michigan in finale, 35-21...Kansas outscored foes but still wound up under .500; did clobber USC, 37-3, and play Oklahoma to 13-13 tie...Minnesota lost first six, then won last three, including knocking Ole Miss

out of playoffs.

1976 PITT IS GREATEST OF THEM ALL

In the playoffs, Nebraska remained unbeaten by shutting down Oklahoma, 10-3; Pittsburgh pummeled outmanned Army, 38-14; Notre Dame topped USC, 17-6; and Texas nipped Penn State in overtime, 23-20, all in first-

Nebraska had little trouble shutting down the Sooners, limiting them to a paltry 85 yards rushing and intercepting six passes. Oklahoma, surprisingly, led 3-0 at halftime, but Nebraska's defense took over in the second. Pittsburgh, meanwhile, drove 80 yards for a score with the opening kickoff and Army's fate was sealed quickly. Pitt rolled up 423 yards total offense, 252 via the ground, while Army's only scores came after the Panthers fumbled the ball away deep in their territory.

Notre Dame's defense kept USC under wraps most of the game, recovering two fumbles, one that resulted in a TD and the other occurring on the game's last play and the Trojans at the Irish two. Texas, trailing 20-3 at halftime and on the verge of being blown out by Penn State, stormed back in the second and tied the game on a field goal on the last play. In the overtime, Texas drove down the field and kicked a 21-yard field goal to end matters on its first possession.

In the semifinals, Pittsburgh eked out a 13-10 victory over Notre Dame, the difference a 90-yard pass play on a third-and-two gamble late in the game by the Panthers. Pitt limited Notre Dame to just three comp-

letions in 14 passing attempts for a mere 43 yards.

In the other semifinal, Nebraska rallied from a 14-0 deficit to nip

In the other semifinal, Nebraska rallied from a 14-0 deficit to nip Texas, 24-17. An 87-yard punt return, 84-yard kickoff return and a 21-yard interception return for a TO--all by Nebraska--wrote finis to Texas' hopes. Texas did tie the score at 17 early in the fourth quarter, only to have the key pass theft occur shortly afterwards.

So, for the championship it was 1976 Pittsburgh and 1971 Nebraska. Nebraska scored twice in the first half, on a 26-yard run and 33-yard pass play, and led 14-7 at intermission. But Pitt controlled the second half, scored once in the third quarter and 10 points in the fourth and rode off with a 24-14 victory and the mythical all-time championship. The winners rolled up 230 yards rushing and had a slim 287-264 yardage advantage, but it was the Panther defense that won the game, intercepting four passes.

PITCHERS' HITTING CARDS?

I think it's time for S-O-M to be a bit more "generous" when it comes to assigning pitchers'

hitting ratings.

In last year's set, Steve Carlton, Bill Lee and Dan Schatzeder were all rated "3" hitters. Carlton hit .223, Lee hit .216 and Schatzeder .216. These averages cannot be accurately reproduced if one uses the "3" hitting card, which doesn't even reproduce a .200 average. The above pitchers deserve a "4" hitting rating.

In fact, it's time S-O-M revised the whole concept of pitchers hitting, because the good hitting pitchers are being discriminated against. In 1978, Steve Carlton hit .291, which is a lot higher than the average on

the "4" hitting card.

I think S-O-M should make cards for pitchers who hit .240 or better and batted 50 times or more. These cards would just have the basic side, so you could put two different pitchers on each card. The cards could be sold separately, or included in the set.

There may be a small number of good hitting pitchers, but their presence does make a dif-

Editor's note: S-O-M has long maintained that because of the DH rule in the American League, and the availability of blank hitting cards for those "special" hitting pitchers, it really isn't worth the time and expense to print hitting cards for pitchers. For Carlton, 1978, for example, he could be given the blank card for a .300 hitter, perhaps with a reduction in the power categories depending on his real-life performance.

PRE-GAME MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

I thought you might be interested in our little league down here in Corpus Christi, TX. The group I play with is pri-

marily interested in face-to-face play and we have had several variations to make things more even and interesting.

One variation, for example, is to draft teams in one order and then a player (or players) in reverse order, from the undrafted teams. This hasn't been bad, but is statistically invalid and artificial.

Our best and most popular variation has been our Monday night league. We play on Mondays just before the game comes on TV. Of course, we use the cards from last year. Everyone plays the Monday night game. First we roll two dice. The high-roller gets to choose which team he wants or he can take the ball and let the other player choose the team.

At halftime the players swap

At halftime the players swap teams. The score is kept by player rather than by team. (Although we do keep track of the team score for comparision to the actual game

outcome)

This variation has been very popular because it tends to produce competitive games, plus it provides a buildup for the TV game to follow and an introduction to the players and teams.

I should also note that we do not use the third down long linebacker-run contain rule. We all feel like the "wrong" column on the cards is there exactly for that purpose. You can always contain the run by calling pass and blitzing the linebacker to likely draw zone anyway.

ANOTHER CALL FOR PENALTIES

Does S-O-M have any penalty ideas for football? I can't believe it still doesn't think penalties are important enough to incorporate into the game.

Penalties would bring some of those good offensive teams with poor real-life records down to earth. Most poor teams commit more penalties than do the good teams. But often an offense looks good on

the cards in S-O-M that wasn't quite so good in real-life because of that guard who jumps off-side a lot.

Another question I have deals with first downs. I've replayed the 1972 football season twice and noticed an incredible lack of first downs. In reallife, by season's end, nearly every team has 200 or more first downs. Yet in all my replays, no one comes near that figure.

Why do S-O-M teams have so

Why do S-O-M teams have so few first downs, yet equal or surpass their real-life yardage figures? I've had many teams gain more yardage than that listed on all their offensive cards, yet not one has ever exceeded its first down total. Does the NFL get that many more first downs than in S-O-M, or is it just my league in which this happens? How are other leagues doing?

Editor's note: Check out the January, 1981 issue (Readers roll 'em) for a good pro and con regarding whether or not S-O-M should incorporate penalties. The lack of first downs poses an interesting question. We've never really noticed it before--but we were not checking, either. The lack of penalties would diminish the first-down total, for sure. while a coach's offensive tactics would also affect such totals [i.e., the "Mad Bomber" approach, with few first downs, versus the "grind-it-out" with its plethora of first downs for the successful teams.)

We checked the 1978 season and found that, on offense, there were 723 first downs in the NFL. Divide that total by 28 teams, and there's an additional 25 first downs per club.

GOALS OR POINTS?

The new hockey cards have no mistakes on them, as far as I can tell. But I do have one question: in the 1979-80 season, Buffalo allowed only 110 goals to be scored on its defense, yet goalie Don Edwards has 125 on his card, Bob Sauve 74 on his. That's 199 goals--not 110.

I'd also like to see goalie cards split up into inside, outside and reb/bkwy. I also suggest forechecking ratings of 0, +1 and +2, where the addition of the three forecheckers' ratings provides the maximum "number of forecheckers" allowed (maximum of +3).

Turning to baseball, I think pitchers should have something to do with wild pitches (perhaps "Wild pitch plus flyball (lf) 8" on the pitcher's card). I also feel balks should be instituted into the game and that a pitcher's pickoff move should affect stealing chances.

Editor's note: First of all, the correct total of goals allowed by Buffalo's goalie tandem is 199; Edwards yielding 125 and Sauve 74. There were also two goals into an empty net, so Buffalo gave up a total of 201. The 110 total you came up with refers to the number of points (based on wins and ties by the Sabres) and not goals allowed. The information came from the Hockey News 1981 Yearbook.

Regarding Bryan Baker's split-number system, it will be again reprinted in an upcoming issue. It replaces the split deck and has proven to be among the most popular playing tips, if not the most popular, to grace the pages of the Review.

Hockey goalies were belligerent, too

Hockey goalies were especially belligerent last season, reports Pete Menzolillo, Bellmore, NY, who annually sends the Review penalty/ intimidation ratings for goalies.

There were a couple of "AA" rated netminders for the first time, plus three 'involved' goalies drew "A" ratings from Manzolillo, who bases penalty ratings on percent of penalty minutes compared to total minutes played. His intimidation ratings, however, are arbitrary and based on reputation and his own personal observations.

So,here, for the third year in a row, are penalty/intimidation ratings for goalies (remember the coach has the option to intimidate with his goaltender instead of an assigned player only when that player is rated.

HALL OF FAME REPLAY - Lewis Snyder, Jamestown, NY, took the two A.L. Hall of Fame teams and played a 152-game schedule with each--but against 162 teams, picked atrandom, from his vast collection...The No. 1 team ran off a 151-11 record, averaged 8.67 runs per game, batted .346, had 37 shutouts and a 1.75 ERA. No. 2 unit wasn't bad, either, going 155-7, averaging 8.01 runs, batting .356, shutting out the contemporary teams 50 times and compiling a 1.62 ERA...Nap Lajoie was the leading hitter for the No. 1 squad, batting .412, while George Sisler (.397), Mickey Cochrane (.358), Babe Ruth (66 homers, 181 RB1), Joe Dimaggio [51, 194, .338) were others who fueled a high-powered attack. Four pitchers won 30 or more games: Ed Walsh (38-3, 1.62 ERA), Walter Johnson (38-3, 1.41), Rube Waddell (36-2, 2.06) and Eddie Plank (37-2, 1.95)...The No. 2 unit was even better as Joe Jackson (.403), Lou Boudreau (.382) and Harry Heilmann (.362) were the top hitters for average, and Mickey Mantle (55, 153) and Jimmy Foxx (48, 166) the bulk of the power. Chief Bender was the most amazing pitcher of 'em all, going 39-1, allowing 440 hits less than the 359 innings he pitched, sporting a 1.03 ERA and recording a phenomenal 22 shutouts...Other 30-game winners for the so-called second team were Jack Chesbro (35-0, 1.75), Hal Newnouser (35-2) and Lefty Gomez (36-3)...Modern-day pitchers got in their licks only occasionally, although Ferguson Jenkins ('70 Dubs), Juan Manichal ('65 Giants) and Don Wilson ('72 Astros) all tossed shutouts.

AMERICAN LEAGUE REPLAY, 1979 - A nine-month project undertaken by Keith Miller, Willard, OH, and his brothers, Kent (Hicksville, OH) and Gary (Eastlake, OH)...Basic version used; mostly solitaire...one no-hitter, by Dennis Eckersley, Boston, against lowly Seattle...10 percent at-bats rule was adopted and each team used five-man pitching rotation...New York won East (not Baltimore, as in real-life) by 10 games, going 107-55, with Milwaukee third and Baltimore 13 games back in fourth. Detroit surprised by finishing second in East...Kansas City captured West, but with 86-74 record, which would have put it sixth in the East. California tied for third and finished four games from the top.

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
