# Here's sneak peak at baseball cards

If all goes well, and provided you've already ordered your cards through the Review's early notice that appeared in last month's issue, you should soon have the new baseball cards.

Shipping was expected to start at the end of January, if not sooner, and that means the twain could meet as far as the arrival of this issue and your new Strat-O-Matic Baseball cards.

Some samples of the new baseball cards are found on this page and the next. Only the tri-colored feature is missing. You will notice that the supplementary stealing rating is now found on the card.

Two changes should be made as far as fielding ratings and prices that appeared in the January Review. One fielding rating, that belonging to Pittsburgh's second baseman Jose Lind, was incorrectly listed. Lind should be a "2" rather than a "4."

## Sanders to again host eighth annual midwest tourney

James Sanders is back on the tournament beat again. In other words, the policeman from Gary, IN, is putting the final touches on plans for the 1988 Lyman Bostock Memorial Tournament.

This year's tournament, named in memory of the former major league player who was shot to death (Sanders helped pull Bostock's body out of a car) in Gary, will be the eighth, although the site has been moved from a college campus to a Holiday Inn in Portage, IN.

"The Pavillion and Gigi rooms will be used," says Sanders of the

gathering that is planned for the weekend of June 25-26.

'It will again feature advanced and elementary baseball, super advanced hockey and super advanced football (old and modern version). Trophies (compliments of S-O-M) will be awarded to the winners and runners-up of each event.

Starting time is 8 a.m. (CST) on Saturday and the entry fee will be \$18.50.

"Meet fellow gamers from all over the country and experience the pressure of tournament play," adds Sanders, who almost single handedly has organized and conducted the tournament over the years. Occasionally he even plays in the tournament, but that's not likely this summer.

#### BOSTOCK TOURNAMENT HIGHLIGHTS

A lot of thrilling moments have occurred in tournament play in the seven years, as can be imagined. Among those memorable moments are the following:

\* Rich Newman had a perfect 12-0 record in 1986 mini league play and went on to win the advanced baseball playoffs and world series. He also won the 1985 elementary baseball tournament, thus becoming the first LBMT participant to win more than one event.

\* Frank Luisi won the 1985 tournament and was runner-up the next

\* John Patton won the 1983 and '84 tournaments with the '61 New York Yankees (elementary baseball) and thus became the first gamer to repeat as champion in any event.

\* Mike Beeson was on the rolling end as Dave McNally, hurling for '69 Orioles, no-hit the '06 Chicago Cubs.

\* Kevin Clark won the '87 elementary baseball tourney with the '36 Yankees by winning his last 16 games - the longest success skein in LBMT history.

\* Jan Nalborczyk became the first female LBMT baseball participant in 1987 and guided the '70 Giants to a 6-6 record using the advanced game.

\* Kathy Friederick was the first woman to play in a super advanced football tournament. She won the '84 LBMT with the '70 Detroit Lions.

\* Sanders, trailing 35-14 with two minutes left in the third quarstormed back with his beloved '58 Colts to defeat the '71 Cowboys in the '85 super advanced Super Bowl, 42-35.

\* Paul Friederick, Kathy's husband, won back-to-back super advanced football (modern version) championships. He directed the '82 Saints in 1985 and '83 Rams in 1984 to titles, becoming the first LBMT participant to repeat as champion in football.

Editor's note: Lack of space on the roster sheet is the No. 1 reason, according to S-O-M, for not listing the most frequently used lineups. The information is available to S-O-M (the computer game has such lineups). For past seasons (when there were less teams) lineups are listed. Now, with the supplementary stealing ratings on the new cards, the stolen bases/caught stealing will be on the roster sheet. As far as pitchers' endurance, S-O-M cannot reveal its formula to the public.

# **Questions & Answers**

Editor's note: Questions pertaining to individual and team ratings will not be answered in most cases, unless a mistake has been made on the card. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, divulge its card-making formula, which would be necessary to answer some of the questions completely.

QUESTION: I received the new football cards and have one major complaint (besides having to tear apart the sheets). Why did S-O-M eliminate the team nicknames from the cards? cheapens the look of the cards and detracts from an otherwise great product. Is this practice going to be in effect for other card sets in baseball, hockey, etc.? (Bob Johnston, Saginaw, MI)

ANSWER:

Yes, the team nicknames have been, or will be, eliminated on all future card sets. The reason is because the professional teams have demanded a royalty be paid to them for use of the nicknames, similar to the royalty paid to the various player associations for use of the players' names. The professional teams and player associations seem to have form that teams and player associations seem to have forgotten that without sports simulation games such as Strat-O-Matic, many fans would not have the knowledge of the real-life sport and players they now possess. Playing S-O-M gives a fan an "inside" look at a team's and a player's strengths and weaknesses. Many "basement" game companies have gone out of business, or taken to court, for failure to pay royalties. S-O-M has always paid the players' associations for using names. But nicknames? S-O-M would rather scratch 'em than pay for that right.

QUESTION: S-O-M said (Sept., 1987 Review) that the reason Jerry Koosman didn't get an asterisk with the 1970 New York Mets is because he didn't meet the criteria of a minimum of 30 starts and minimum of 200 innings. Koosman had 30 games, but had just 29 starts. But the following are examples in which S-O-M didn't follow the criteria in the 1970 set:

got an \* on the roster sheet, despite pitching more in relief than Stone. Short got an \* while Foster didn't. Both pitched 199 innings and had an even 30 starts. According to the criteria, neither should have gotten an \* as both missed by one inning. Either both should have received an \* or neither. Johnson and Coleman received an \*, but neither had 30 starts. (Rodney Johnson, Tempe, AZ)

ANSWER: The 30 starts/200 innings criteria is not set in concrete. It (continued on next page)

Also depends on the number of pitchers that exceed those so-called games started/innings pitched minimums. Koosman, for example, was the second-leading pitcher for the Mets in '70 with 212 innings, although with only 29 starts. But he was 79 innings behind No. 1 Tom Seaver. Three Mets' pitchers, in fact, had between 184-212 innings. S-O-M made only Seaver, as a result, an \*. Rooker also didn't meet the starts criteria - but according to the roster sheet he did not have an asterisk. Rooker was also No. 3 on Kansas City as far as innings. Coleman had 29 starts, but he was No. 2 on team in innings, as was Johnson, another who got an \* but didn't have 30 starts. Short was one inning short, but was only 20 innings behind the No. 2 Phillies' hurler. Stone, despite meeting both criteria, was only No. 4 on Atlanta in innings pitched. Stoneman, on the other hand, was No. 3 on Montreal, with 77 more innings than No. 4. Stoneman and Stone had almost identical numbers, though. "What effect it has on the team is also important," adds Steve Barkan, a game company spokesman. "It's usually cut and dry. The few exceptions are made by Hal (Richman, S-O-M's creator and owner)."

QUESTION: I have a question regarding the IBM version of the computer baseball game. How many teams can I put on a manual version team disk, or auto version draft team disk? I have put 45 on a manual version thus far and wonder how many more can go on a disk? (Marv Westendorp, Lake Odessa, MI)

ANSWER: The game company says 50 is the maximum.

QUESTION: When is S-O-M planning on coming out with old-timer football teams that are compatible with the new type of NFL cards? When does S-O-M plan on issuing all-time NBA and NHL cards compatible with the current game? And when will the 1962 baseball season be reprinted, and will it and future reprinted seasons contain more extra cards, like the 1986 set does? (Alan Cohen, Arlington, VA)

ANSWER: There are no plans for all-time NFL, NBA and NHL teams or cards at this time. Regarding the 1962 baseball season, it will be reprinted, with advanced features, in the spring of 1989. The number of extra cards, if any, has not been determined as yet by the game company.

QUESTION: Correct me if I missed this, but I don't recall the Review printing any letters about Ken Griffey not receiving a card (with his stats) with the '86 Atlanta Braves. (Phil Ledesma Hawthorne, CA)

ANSWER: Ken Griffey's stats at the bottom of the card are for 292 atbats, 12 home runs and a .308 batting average, his totals with Atlanta. He also batted .303 with the Yankees in 198 at-bats. S-O-M, in restrospect, said he should have, even though the stats were so close, received two cards.

# Checking out the defensive card

## Should you penetrate or shoot the jumper in basketball?

To shoot or not to shoot is not the question: it's whether to penetrate or take the jumper that most of us worry about. By noting a few basic features about the defense card and its structure, your knowledge and understanding of Strat-O-Matic Basketball might dramatically improve.

In order to keep things simple, let's assume we are dealing with a typical shooter that has 18 of his 36 shooting column chances (O, P and I) filled with positive results (X, F(2), or X+F(1)).

Imagine that this player is shooting against a typical defender

Imagine that this player is shooting against a typical defender (2-5, 11 0, P and I defense ratings), with a typical shot-blocker (1-10) playing inside defensively. What can we expect, versus the average defense card in the normal mode, to occur in the long run?

Outside, our typical shooter will get positive results .405 of the time. Penetrating, the percentage is .448, while inside it would be up to .462. Note that these percentages are for position shots only; the waters really get muddy when you start considering open shots, rebound shots, dazzlers and where the inside defensive man is located. To keep things simple, we will deal with only the standard position shots for

#### POWER OF 'POSITIVE' SHOOTING

First,, every shooting point above (or below) 18 results in a plus/minus of about 1.5 percent (to be technical, it's actually 1,39%). That is, a player with 20 positive results in a shooting column is two 1.39% 'steps' more likely to roll a successful result when shooting than an 18 shooter.

In other words, a 20 shooter will, other things being equal, roll a positive result 2.78% morre often than an 18 shooter.

Interestingly enough, defense ratings are tied into these same 1.39% 'steps.' Each defensive level will give a 2.78% better chance interestingly enough, derense ratings are tred into these same 1.39% 'steps.' Each defensive level will give a 2.78% better chance of stopping a shot than the next lower rating (i.e., two 'steps'). So, an 18 shooter versus a 2-5, 11 defender has a 2.78% better chance of getting a successful result than the same shooter versus a 2-4 defender,

As for blockers, each plus/minus of five in an inside block rati results in a single 'step' difference; a man shooting with a 1-15 blocker inside will connect on 1.39% (one 'step') less than against a each plus/minus of five in an inside block rating

1-10 blocker.

#### BEST PERCENTAGE SHOT

To determine what is the best percentage shot in any given situation, simply add (or subtract) the 1.39% 'steps' involved to the base percentage for each particular shot. Using this formula, you'll be able to weigh the merits of good defenders and blockers when deciding how to

For example, let's say you have a shooter who is a 17 outside and 19 penetrating. He is defended by a 2-6, 10 (outside) and 2-4 (penetrating) defender, with a 1-20 blocker to deal with. Using the average of defense cards as our base, our shooter will get a positive result .419 of the time shooting outside (.405 outside base, minus one 'step,' plus two 'steps' for a net change of plus one), while his penetrating percentage would be .406 (.448 penetrating base, plus one 'step,' minus four 'steps').

We have not dealt with the natural advantages of driving to the hoop (more fouls, three-point plays), nor with different modes or other complications present in the game. Nevertheless, knowing the basics about the structure of the game system should help you in making wiser choices when it comes to shot selection.

#### SBA's longest running Thirteen years of basketball league replays and counting

Gary Graber, the author of the article dealing with the structure of the defensive card, is a member of the Strat-O-Matic Basketball Association (SBA), which has to be the longest running S-O-M Basketball league in existence.

The SBA has now completed 13 years worth of replays and 39 seasons with the first replay year dating back to the beginning of S-O-M Bask-etball, in 1974 (based on '73).

"We play the advanced version, still operate under a salary cap

system (which has appeared in the Review before) and are mostly (though not entirely) play-by-mail," says Graber.

Every year the SBA puts out a yearbook, replete with voluminous records of teams and individual players (the Shamrocks, for example, hold the record for points, scoring 180 in a single game, 66 in a quarter and also producing the fewest points in a game, 56, and quarter, 9). The Shamrocks have had five different coaches over the span of 35 replay seasons, and obviously with a mixed bag of results.

Another cursory check of the SBA Guide reveals Kareem Abdul-Jabbar

is the all-time leading scorer with 13,615 points (27.5) and also the

1 rebounder (5,110)

No. 1 rebounder (5,110).

Current members of the SBA are; Graber (Hussars), Kirk Summers (Shamrocks), Doug Falls (Virginia), Paul O'Connor (New England), Brian Nichols (86ers) and Jim Schlapkohl (Copper State), with one team open and operated by the league.

#### POWER PREVAILS IN 1986-87

The SBA plays a 36-game regular season plus playoffs. The 86ers were the '86-87 champs, compiling a 26-10 record with a lineup geared for the power game.

SBA veterans have described three systems of play - with, of course, much overlapping - and they are: fastbreaking, power and finesse. The two years previous, fastbreaking teams captured honors.

But not the latest season (the SBA is currently embarked on campaign No. 14, featuring Michael Jordan, making his full-season debut) a

power won out. The 86ers featured Moses Malone (25-point average and 11.8 free throw attempts per game), Charles Barkley (24.5) and Adrian Dantley (26.0). Barkley led the league with a .609 field goal shooting

Running the attack was Maurice Cheeks (16.3 points, 8.3 assists), with 'replay artists' Rodney McCray and A.C. Green splitting playing time at the other forward spot. A 13-5 start made it easy for the

Magic Johnson of the Hussars was named MVP, however, as he led the league in assists (12.9), averaged 21.8 points and was the best rebounding guard with a 7.6 average.

Larry Bird performed for the Shamrocks - naturally - and led the SBA in scoring for the first time (26.7), free throw shooting (.919) (continued on next page)

and 3-point field goals (42). He also averaged 9.5 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 2.25 steals

Other notes gleaned from the SBA Guide:

\* 86ers were the only bona fide power team, with Pellets, Copper State, New England and the Hussars mainly fastbreaking (relying on speed/passing game).

\* Paul Pressey of Copper State was the unsung star of the league with a 22.1 scoring average and SBA-high 2.42 steals. Pressey was third in assists with 9.4.

\* Alton Lister of the same Copper State team led in disqualifications, fouling out 17 times.

\* Jabbar, the all-time scoring leader, played the last part of the season with the Shamrocks and averaged 20 points a game. But lineup of Bird, Jabbar, Kevin McHale, Walter Davis and Danny Ainge couldn't produce any better than a 19-17 record.

\* Pellets had best fastbreak (30.3 points per game) and passing game (30.8 assists). Pellets also featured Akeem Olajuwon (23.3 points, 11.7 rebounds and league-high 2.86 blocks). But his one-man show only produced a 15-21 record.

\* Norm Nixon and John Lucas of the Pellets, the "Dazzle Boys,"

averaged 16 assists each game

st Shamrocks, featuring Bird, Ainge and Kyle Macy, swished the most 3-pointers (118/284).

#### SBA PLAYING RULES

Here are the basic rules used by the SBA:

 In all play-by-mail games, the home and visitor sides of the action deck are reversed. That is, the home team's results are read from the visitor's side of the card and vice versa.

- Injuries are not used. Players who have been issued a card and who averaged 19 minutes or less must rest 24 minutes per game. These players are called "supplemental players" and should not be confused with the supplemental set of extra player cards issued by S-O-M, which are not used

- Shoot all F(1) results; there are no penalty or bonus situat-

- Press defense: While in the press defense, all F(1) results are considered F(2) results. A team may employ the press defense anytime in the game when trailing by more than 10 points and anytime in the fourth quarter, but never more than 12 minutes in any single match.

Shooting limits: Once a player comes within four field goal attempts (FGA) of his FGA per 48 minutes rating, his shooting rating drops to zero. And he may not be selected for "pass to choice" cards, though he may continue to shoot normally when specifically directed to

by the deck. Round off to the nearest whole number when determining when a player's rating is affected by this rule, rounding .5 up.

- Three-point field goal limits: Each player may attempt two 3-point field goals per game in the regular way (unless allowed more: if S-O-M says he may attempt two, then he may attempt three; then he may attempt four etc.) A player may attempt more 3-pointers than he may attempt four, etc.). A player may attempt more 3-pointers than his limit, but on these tries he must observe the following penalty: his 3-point rating on his own card is reduced to zero (it's only possible to score off the defense card).

Defense cards: Only the "normal" defense card is allowed; no

"sag" or "close" options are permitted.

- "Conditional Hatchet" defense (double-teaming); Up to one player may have this defense applied to him at any one time. The defensive coach decides if he wants to double-team ("hatchet") a player; if so, (continued on next page)

the following effects occur: (a) the man being hatcheted keeps his the following effects occur: (a) the man being hatcheted keeps his regular shooting rating and may continue to shoot normally when directed to by the action deck, (b) on all "pass to any 1+," "replay unless 2," and "replay unless 3" shots that he attempts, the player must first roll a die: a roll of 1, 2, or 3 means he takes the shot normally, while a roll of 4, 5 or 6 means he takes the shot double-teamed (meaning that all defense rating and defense card results will be automatic misses). The price the defense pays for this strategy is that all outside shots (an "H" should be written on the Defense Card Outside shot column next to "6," or if there's an I there already, next to "8"). If an "H" is rolled in this situation, the basket is scored to "8"). If an "H" is rolled in this situation, the basket is scored instead of missed. The hatchet may not be used when pressing. # Super-advanced options can be used

BY RICHARD RONZONE, Joliet, IL

I have been playing Strat-O-Matic Hockey for eight years and using these simple, but effective rules, allows me to use all the options available in super-advanced play when there's no one to play face-toface against.

And there's no need for additional dice rolls and it is random enough, in regard to intimidations, to bring some uncertainty to that situation.

I've played over 5,000 games to date.

PENETRATION ATTEMPTS: Players breakaway/penetration is 3 or 4,
always attempt inside shot. 1 or 2 rating, outside shot.

INTIMIDATION ATTEMPTS: I utilize a single die reading, even or odd possible. Even die reading - go for intimidation; odd die reading resolve play as indicated.

PASSING ATTEMPTS/SH SKATING ATTEMPTS: Create passing cards. I use Mark them as above, then shuffle them into action deck.

PRESSURE OFFENSE (automatic): Forward line has 2 or 3 players rated 4 offense.

Here's a playing tip, contributed by Dennis Seybold of Greensburg, PA, that revises the longest run on a player's card in football.

football.

"First roll for long gain.
Then roll for short gain and add yardage to longest play. The total of the longest play and the short gain cannot exceed the long gain.

Second, if touchdown is rolled on the long gain add long gain to longest play (or add short gain and bonus of 10/or 15 yards to longest play).

Example: Long gain is rolled for 55 yards and the runner has a longest run of 35 yards. Short gain is rolled for 15 yards. Add

35 and 15 for a 50-yard run.
On a roll of long gain for a touchdown, the bonus long gain is for 38 yards. Add 35 and 38 for a 73-yard play.

These rules are for kickoff and punt returns also."

# Baseball playing tip

Also submitted by Dennis Seybold, this playing tip gives weak hitters ("W") a slim chance for a home run (i.e., Ozzie Smith's playoff homer),

If a weak hitter rolls a HR 1-15 or higher on pitcher's card, pick split number and if a "1" is drawn, it's a home run.

A late-season slump in which the Cards lost seven straight prevented them from matching the real-life record...Replay took eight months... Advanced features were used, with St. Louis suffering bad luck with ballpark home runs: "It was unbelievable how everytime one occurred in St. Louis (1-4 chance) a 1, 2 or 3 was drawn," groaned Craney. Todd Worrell, for example, gave up 13 homers, including eight at Busch Stadium, with six of the ballpark variety (another happened in the Astrodome)...Batters and pitchers were used realistically...Only highlight was Tim Conroy outdueling Mike Scott at Busch Stadium, allowing only two hits and winning 1-0...Los Angeles was St. Louis's "cousin" with the Cards winning nine of 12. Conversely, Philadelphia and Montreal whipped the Cards 27 times in 36 meetings...Poor hitting was a constant problem with the '86 Cards, just as for real, with Vince Coleman batting only .200. Coleman, the igniter of the offense, did manage to steal 110 bases (107 actual)...As a team the Cards batted .233 (.236 real)... Many of the individual stats were extremely close or exact, including: Terry Pendleton batting .235 (.239 actual), Willie McGee .257 (.256), Ozzie Smith .284 (.280), Pendleton stealing exactly 24 bases, the Cards walking 566 times (568), Rick Horton's 2.21 ERA (2.24), Ray Burris giving up exactly 13 homers and Bob Forsch losing 10 games and allowing 83 earned runs, both exact figures.
