The countdown is picking up for the Strat-O-Matic world's largest happening of the summer of 1978--the fifth annual S-O-M National Convention, Friday through Sunday, Aug. 4-5, at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana.

Between 150 and 200 gamers are expected to descend on the sprawling campus for the annual happening. Rick (Wolfman) Shapiro and Dale Barnes are the prime movers behind the convention, which they expect to be the best ever.

There will be, as always, something for everyone, whether your thing is playing S-O-M games, buying and selling cards, or just the desire to meet others like yourself.

Six tournaments are planned, according to Shapiro (who urges as many contestants are planned, according to Shapiro (who urges as many contestants as possible to bring their own games and teams, beginning with Elementary A and B baseball and Super Advanced football on Friday, Aug. 4, and then Advanced football and baseball plus College Football on Saturday. A person, however, will be allowed to participate in only one tournament a day. There might be a losers' tournament as well, if there is enough interest. Sunday, Aug. 6, will be the finale,

with all the trophies being presented.

Many former champions will be on the scene, reports Shapiro--who's no pushover when it comes to playing the baseball game. Tom Nelson is expected to make the trip from New York to regain the Advanced Football title.

Entry fee for the tournaments and convention is \$3 per person. And, if you hurry, there's still time to get in on the fun. Just send your entry fee to: Dale Barnes, 509 Davis St., Park Forest, IL 60466. Include a list of the tournaments you wish to participate in and send an SASE to Barnes, who will then send back an entry card listing the an SASE to Barnes, who will their sent of the campus as well as additional information regarding the convention.

S-O-M gamers will be taking over the campus (or most of it) that weekend. Shapiro has again lined up lodging at a minimal cost, with the Florida Avenue Residence Hallis reserved for conventioners for \$5.50 per night plus tax. The convention will be staged in the Illini Rooms (A, B, C). People may start arriving for the convention as early as Tuesday, Aug. 1, as some one will be there to greet you at that time.

Among the other activities planned are a two-night bowling tourna-

ment, a one-on-one basketball contest, as well as ample time to buy, sell and trade cards, or just engage in gaming talk and make new friends.

Review Forced To Raise Prices

The upcoming convention is the good news this month. Now for the

The Review has been forced to raise its subscription rates. Increased printing costs, additional mailing rates and just plain inflation-that's an evil-sounding word today, isn't it--have necessitated the changes.

Hopefully the cost increase won't drive away any subscribers or Moperuity the cost increase won't drive away any subscribers or would-be subscribers. For the money, we think the Review is still a darn good buy. Check the newstand near you sometime and you will see what we mean. Any magazine selling for less than a dollar is usually nothing more than a "pulp" magazine. The slick publications, with their pages bulging with advertising, are usually far more expensive than that.

Back to the rate increases. In attempting to keep them as minimal as possible, a three-month subscription will now to the content of the content

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Back to the rate increases. In attempting to keep them as minimal as possible, a three-month subscription will now cost \$1.80 (60¢ per issue), a six-month \$3.25 (54.2¢ per issue) and a year \$5.75 (48.1¢ per issue). That's a jump of 30¢, 50¢ and 65¢ for three-, six- and 12-month subscriptions, respectively, from the previous rates. Of course, the longer you subscribe, the less you pay per issue. A year's order, for example, will save you 12¢ per issue than if you subscribed for three months.

The increased rates were a long time in coming. The Review has not had a rate increase in over two years--so we think we've held the line against the mass charges of inflation reasonably well.

Along with the across-the-board subscription rate increases, first class mailing, as we're all aware unfortunately, has also been raised. With the jump to 15¢ by Uncle Sam for first class, the Review has been forced to raise to 15¢ as well. People who are currently subscribers and who have paid for first class mailing, however, will continue to receive such mailing at the old 13¢ rate.

So much for the bad news this month. Hopefully, it wasn't so bad for most of you. And hopefully you will continue to subscribe and share your ideas, playing tips and replays with us.

Rice, Luzinski Choice Of Readers

Review's MVP Contest Closes

Jim Rice of the Boston Red Sox and Greg Luzinski of the Philadelphia Phillies will be named Most Valuable Players in the American and National Leagues, respectively. At least in the opinion of many Review subscribers.

The dynamic slugging duo was the No. 1 choice of the fans in the Review's latest MVP contest. Rice, in fact, was a runaway winner, $\,$ amassing 86 votes, far outdistancing runnerup in the A.L. Reggie Jackson, who wound up with 28. Rod Carew was third with 27 votes.

Over in the N.L., however, the balloting was much closer. Luzinski polled the most--37--but George Foster was on his heels with 35 and Dave

Parker was a close third with 31.

The prize for the Review subscriber who correctly picks the MVPs is a set of the new baseball cards (plus extras) when they become available the latter part of January of next year. "Mr. Magic Dice," as the AWA has dubbed Christie, has, Neil Christie. "Mr. Magic Dice," as the AWA has dubbed christie, has in case you haven't already noticed, done it again. He and his lengals are again champs of the popular face-to-face Strat-O-Matic league that operates out of Santa Clara, CA. Christie's Super Bowl victory, the third for the Bengals in the last five years, came at the expense of the Baltimore Colts, 27-24, in an overtime thriller that was watched by the league's membership-

all of whom were rooting for Earl Yagi's Colts.

In fact, victory celebrations--for the Colts--were already to begin when, in the overtime, Baltimore marched down to the Cincy 22 and Yagi called on Toni Linhart to finish it off with a field goal (2-10 chance). But a roll of "11" came up, to the groans of the assembled gamers, and Cincy and Christie were still alive for another drive. The Bengals quickly capitalized on the reprieve, moving swiftly downfield, with Chris Bahr's 29-yard field goal finally deciding matters.

1976 LOADED WITH OFFENSE

Mike Applegate, one of the founders of the AWA and an S-O-M player white applegate, one of the foundation of the season was dominated by the since 1964, says that the 1976 real-life season was dominated by the offenses. Dakland set a league record by amassing 439 points (29.3 per game) and Kansas City, although oftentimes defenseless, did muster a league record 61 touchdowns (434 points) when on the attack.

Eleven rushers went over the 1,000-yard mark, with Walter Payton breezing to 1,632, while Pittsburgh and New England both rang up 14-1 records, the first time the feat's been accomplished.

The format for play in the AWA was the same as in previous seasons:

A LOOK AT THE DIVISIONS

Those familiar with the AWA (page 20 of newest S-O-M Directory), remember the popular division names the league uses: Snodgrass, Duck, Black 'N Blue, Granada, Mongo and Apple. Where the names originated, no one knows. The divisions have no criteria as far as team composition, although every year the competition is always fierce within each.

Here are the highlights and lowlights in the respective divisions: Snodgrass - Captured easily by New England (14-1), which defeated runnerup Oakland (13-2) twice, 17-14, 27-21. Good ground game, passing of Steve Grogan in the big games and solid defense made an almost un-Good ground game, passing beatable combination--only loss being to Kansas City, 16-10...Raiders ran roughshod over everyone, except Pats; crushing hapless Jets, 62-7, in one infamous game...Mike Livingston passed Kansas City to surprising 9-6 record and won MVP honor for achievement. MacArthur Lane scored 20 TDs for Chiefs, who had league's most inept defense...Seattle was compet-itive as Jim Zorn passed for whopping 3,544 yards and Sherman Smith rambled to 930 yards, but defense surrendered 437 points...Philadelphia was 3-12, losing seven games by five points or less.

Duck - Bert Jones and Lydell Mitchell paced Baltimore (naturally!), wound up 12-3 and three games ahead of Chicago, Detroit and Dallas, all 9-6...Detroit started fast, winning first four games, but faltered at mid-season...Chicago had tough schedule and wound up losing pair of heartbreakers to Colts, 19-16 and 34-28. Payton was "virtually unstop-pable," according to AWA commissioner Mike Applegate...Dallas suffered from lack of a running game and Roger Staubach had to carry team with

passing. A 1-5 record within division finished Cowboys, who vowed, "Wait until next year!" $\,$

Black 'N Blue - Disappointing division as Washington rode home a winner with 9-6 record, clinching title in 11th week...Jim Hart had great season (3,919 yards, 20 TDs) for St. Louis, but defense was decimated by injuries...San Diego lost seven of last eight after good start...Miami was humiliated six times, giving up over 400 yards, and finished 27th overall on defense...Defense, or lack of it, was also downfall of N.Y. Giants.

<u>Granada</u> - Los Angeles and Denver had 10-5 records, splitting two games, Broncos winning first 28-27, and Rams the finale, 20-7. Latter loss cost Denver playoff berth... Hams set league record with 54 interceptions, 18 by Monte Jackson-another record... 49ers had best one-two ground game in league as Delvin Williams rolled up 1,346 yards, Wilbur Jackson 934... New Orleans struggled all season, except when upsetting Rams... Tampa Bay did surprisingly well, knocking off Saints, 14-10, mauling Miami, 31-21, and bringing down Seahawks, 26-23.

Mongo - Minnesota easily won lacklustre division, despite dropping first three games. Fran Tarkenton guided Vikes to 10-5 record...Cleveland was best team in the league, operating between the 20s, but didn't score enough points...Both Atlanta and Houston had nonexistent offenses.

Apple - Steel Curtain clanged shut often enough for Pittsburgh to have league's No. 2 defense. Terry Bradshaw hooked up with Lynn Swann for 12 TDs. Steeler defense intercepted four passes in 50-0 rout of Denver...Cincinnati split with Pittsburgh, losing 11-10, and winning last game of regular season, 35-13--setting in motion drive to title...Buffalo had D.J., and that was all...Green Bay and Jets weren't much better.

PLAYOFFS

Cincinnati 20, Minnesota 6 - Injury to Tarkenton finished off Vikes, as Stan Fritts burst through Minnesota defense for 144 yards in 23 carries.

Pittsburgh 14, Los Angeles 3 - Mike Kruczek came off bench to complete 14 of 19 passes for 167 yards and one TD while Steel Curtain sacked James Harris eight times.

Cincinnati 7, Pittsburgh O - Ken Anderson connected with Isaac Curtis for 68-yard TD strike on Cincinnati's second possession. Bengals stopped Steelers (Franco Harris) on a fourth-and-one situation at Cincinnati 23 late in game to preserve victory.

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New England 29, Washington 13 - Pats capitalized on late-game bobbles
by 'Skips scoring three times in last 5.45 after trailing 13-8

by 'Skins, scoring three times in last 5:45 after trailing 13-8. Baltimore 24, Oakland 20 - Jones fired a 17-yard TD pass to Roger Carr with 45 seconds remaining to pull out win. Jones was 15 of 24 for 188 yards and three TDs, while Ken Stabler was 14 of 22 for 222 and one score.

Baltimore 17, New England 6 - Jim Cheyunski raced 64 yards with a Grogan pass to spark Colts to win. Baltimore lost Jones early to injury and had to go with Bill Troup at QB (13 for 27 for 180 yards passing).

Super Bowl - Cincinnati 27, Baltimore 24 - Cincinnati had scored earlier Super Bowl wins over Miami (No. III), 19-13, and Los Angeles IV), 30-20. Christie (161-115-9) and Yagi (153-124-8) carried league's best coaching records into showdown game. Jones passed for three TDs, including a 16-yard pitch to Raymond Chester that sent game into overtime. Bahr's three-pointer eventually decides it. Anderson was on-target 15 times in 34 throws for 299 yards, while Jones was 16 of 29 for 203 with three payoff pitches but also three interceptions. Bob Trumpy, who caught four passes, including a 30-yarder that led to the winning field goal, was named MVP of the game.

So another AWA is history. And Neil Christie continues to treat the rest of the league as if they're a bunch of Rodney Dangerfields (showing them no respect). But hopes are high again for next year, especially for Steve Barrett who will have both Dallas and Denver.

Questions & Answers

Editor's note: Questions regarding individual and team ratings will not be answered in most cases, unless a mistake has been made. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, disclose its card-making formula, which would be necessary in some instances in order to answer such questions completely. If your question regarding ratings does not appear in the Review within four months after being sent, you may assume the rating is correct.

QUESTION: Regarding the "T" ratings for catchers: John Bench has T-numbers 1-10. Does this mean all numbers 1 through 10 mean an error has occurred? Or does this mean if a 1 or 10 is drawn an error occurs?

ANSWER:

If on a successful steal of second or third, split numbers 1, 2, or 3 come up, then you consult the T-rating. If this second split number draw results in Nos. 1-10 (Bench's rating), then he has committed a throwing error. But if Nos. 11-20 had been picked, then no error.

QUESTION: I believe S-O-M made an error on Steve Yeager's catcher "T" rating. He's listed as a 1-15 "T" rating. Is this a mistake or is his arm really that wild?

ANSWER: According to S-O-M, Yeager's rating is correct. They have statistics (including throwing errors) for all catchers, and Yeager was off-target more times than you would expect for someone so highly regarded defensively.

QUESTION: Would you please clarify the meanings of the single asterisk and double asterisk after a hit?

ANSWER: Number of asterisks refers to number of bases runners advance on hit.

ANSWER:

A double with no asterisks means runners on base when double was struck could advance an additional base. For example, with runner on first and batter doubling, runner could try for home. That's when the outfielder's throwing rating, runner's speed as well as the number of outs are all taken into consideration. We are not familiar with a "Double*" since runners would have to advance a minimum of two bases on such a hit. While on the subject, some leagues allow the so-called "cutoff rule," whereby the defensive manager may elect to let the runner score or take the extra base, but hold the batter to first or the number of bases of the hit. This is not found in S-O-M's instructions,

however; it is strictly an optional rule, but one that has become very popular.

QUESTION: On hits that don't have an outfield position listed after them, how is it determined to which field the ball was hit?

ANSWER: In all such cases the ball is assumed to be hit to center field.

Hockey game. Can you answer some questions regarding the game? Such as: How many players for each team? Will goaltending be a big factor? Will shooters' abilities count heavily on their overall performance? Will there be penalties?

ANSWER:

S-O-M prefers not to release any information about the hockey game at this time. From our conversations with S-O-M it is safe to assume that there will be enough individual player cards to fill out three lines, that goaltending as well as shooting ability will have a big effect, and that there will be penalties. In fact, there very definitely will be penalties.

QUESTION:

Alan Bannister and Jorge Orta of the Chicago White Sox were both, based on the '76 season, rated "A" stealing and 1-17 running. On the new cards, based on '77, the running rating for both has remained the same, but the stealing has dropped to "D." This seems strange. Are the stealing ratings correct?

ANSWER:

Yes. Bannister stole four bases and was caught attempting to steal three times; Orta also swiped four but was cut down four times. Four stolen bases do not an "A" stealer make.

S-O-M Baseball Trivia Quiz...

Here we go again with Robert Henry's latest batch of Strat-O-Matic Baseball trivia questions. And again, like we did last month, the Review will be presenting both questions and answers each month.

QUESTION: 1. Has any modern batting champion failed to receive at least 30 hit chances on his card?

QUESTION: 2. Using the Earnshaw Cook system (i.e., a player is rated by multiplying his probability of reaching base safely by total bases per plate appearance), who is the best starting pitcher in S-O-M?

QUESTION: 3. It has previously been stated that no shortstop was rated "1" from 1965-70. Who was rated "1" prior to 1965?

QUESTION: 4. Who holds the record for the highest batting average on a modern player's card, counting only hits and walks on the player's own card?

QUESTION: 5. Has any pennant winner been without a catcher rated better than "4" fielding?

QUESTION: 6. Which pitcher holds the record (for modern pitchers) for most total bases allowed via hits on his card?

Note: These questions do not include the 1977 set of baseball cards.

... And Now For The Answers

ANSWER:

1. Although Carl Yastrzemski spared the American League the embarrassment of having no .300 hitters by finishing at .301 in 1968, he received only 29.25 hit chances. Part of the reason for his low hit total was his 119 real-life walks, which resulted in 27 walk chances on his card, thus requiring fewer hits to reproduce the .301 average.

ANSWER:

2. This system can be utilized easily in S-O-M by multiplying total on-base chances on a card (i.e., hits plus walks) by total bases allowed on hits. 1965 Sam McDowell, with a rating of 110.24 (5.2 singles and 16 walks), barely noses out 1972

Don Sutton with a rating of 113.5875 (.4 home runs, .15 triples, .6 doubles, 6.5 singles, four walks).

.6 doubles, 6.5 singles, four walks].

Sam McDowell's calculation: 21.2 on-base chances; 5.2 singles produce 5.2 total bases; 5.2 x 21.2 = 110.24.

Don Sutton's calculation: 11.65 on-base chances; 9.75 total bases [1.6 from .4 home runs, .45 from .15 triples, 1.2 from .6 doubles, 6.5 from 6.5 singles]; 11.65 x 9.75 = 113.5875.

ANSWER: 3. Luis Aparicio (1962-64) and Ruben Amaro and Bobby Wine, both of the 1964 Phillies, were the only ones. S-O-M did not include fielding ratings in 1960 and 1961.

ANSWER:

4. 1968 Gates Brown (Detroit Tigers), with 46.6 hits and 15 walks (card chances), comes away with a .501 average (46.6/93 = .501). Rod Carew, Manny Mota and Roger Freed from the newest card set all either challenged or surpassed Brown. Carew, who batted .388 with Minnesota, had a basic card with 49 hit chances and nine walk chances (108 - 9 = 99, thus 49, hit chances divided by 99) for a .495 average off his own card. Freed, who had only 83 official at-bats with St. Louis in '77, had a .398 real-life average. He also had 49 card hit

chances, but combined with 17 walk chances it all adds up to a .538 average off his own card, thus surpassing Brown's .501. Mota, however, is the best of them all. Although he only batted officially 38 times, the basic side of his '77 card has him with 45.1 hit chances and a whopping 25 walk card chances. Substracting the 25 walk chances from 108 (card possibilities), leaves only 83, thus Mota comes away with a card capable of reproducing a .542 average—the highest in modern S-D-M history. Mota, incidentally, had a .395 real-life average.

ANSWER:

5. Yes, the 1960 Pittsburgh Pirates had two "4" catchers, Smoky Burgess and Hal Smith.

ANSWER:

6. Another dubious honor for 1975 Oscar Zamora, who allowed 84.35 total bases via 10.95 home runs, 1.95 triples, 16.1 doubles and 2.5 singles. Contrasted to McDowell and Sutton, Zamora reached a lofty 2,657.025.

Old Timer League No Ho-Hum Affair

Only 13 Games Separate 1911 A's From Rest Of Field

Craig Heiland's 155-game replay of the 1900-1919 Old Timer baseball teams was anything but a bore. For 16 months the native of South Gate, CA, broke out his S-D-M game--and for 16 months he experienced as tight a pennant race as possible.

At the finish, the 1911 Philadelphia A's were on top with an 82-73 record--nine games over .500. But right behind came the 1919 Chicago White Sox and 1909 Detroit Tigers with 81-74 marks, just a single game off the pace. In fact, only 13 games separated the spray-hitting A's from last-pace 1906 Chicago.

The pennant race came down to the last series of the season in a fitting climax, with the A's in first and Detroit and Chicago within striking distance, but forced to play each other. The A's took two out of three from the last-place Cubs. Three wins by the Sox, however, would give them the pennant, two a tie, while Detroit needed a sweep to forge a deadlock.

Detroit was promptly eliminated, losing the first game. But then it bounced back to post a 4-2 victory in the second. In the finale, with the Sox leading 4-2 entering the ninth and on the verge of salvaging a tie with the A's, Detroit rallied for two runs and a tie. Then, in the 11th, Sox pitcher Bill James committed an error that let in the winning run and ended Chicago's season on a sour note.

HITTING DOMINATES

"It was interesting," concludes Heiland, "that hitting made the difference in a pitching-dominated era." Ty Cobb of Detroit was chosen Most Valuable Player after hitting .402, stealing 77 bases and clouting 10 home runs. Philadelphia had four regulars who hit .300-plus while the White Sox had three.

Most of the pitchers came away less than shell-shocked, however, as Christy Mathewson of the 1905 New York Giants was accorded Cy Young Award honors after compiling a 28-12 record with 240 strikeouts and minuscule earned run average of 1.72.

TEAM SUMMARIES

1911 A's - Danny Murphy led the parade of regulars who topped the .300 mark, finishing at .337, plus he chipped in with 105 RBI and had a knack for delivering the clutch hit...Frank Baker batted .319 with 116 RBI and stole 30 bases...Eddie Collins was a disappointment, however,

batting only .299...Chief Bender (18-8, 2.12 ERA) and Eddie Plank

[19-14, 2.76] were key cogs in pitching crew that was above average.

1919 White Sox - Chicago had blend of good pitching and hitting...

Lefty Williams (22-15), Eddie Cicotte (21-17) and Dickie Kerr (17-6)

were big three on mound, although James-he of the infamous erratic toss--was a dismal hurler, losing 14 of 20 decisions and yielding 6.08 earned runs per game... Shoeless Joe Jackson pounded out a .340 average with 114 RBI and six roundtrippers, while Ray Schalk surprised by hitting .306... Happy Felsch, in an offsetting performance, batted a puny

1909 Tigers - Hitting was inconsistent, despite presence of Cobb, Sam Crawford (.307, 107 RBI) and Donnie Bush (44 steals)...pitching actually was better than hitting...Ed Summers was 19-12, Ed Killian 12-10, but George Mullin and Ed Willett slumped to 15-19 and 15-21, respectively.

Held first place early in season but dropped back 1905 Giants for good after mid-season slump...good speed but lacked hitting...Mike Donlin hit .374 with 10 homers and 29 steals, Roger Bresnahan .313, Art Devlin swiped 54 bases and Sam Mertes 36--thus accounting for the offense... Mathewson was easily the league's best pitcher but the rest of the staff was, for the most part, ineffective. Red Ames, although he blew a third strike past 214 batters, wound up 10-22 with a 5.48 ERA.

1909 Pirates - Pitching was adequate but hitting lacked depth, that's why Pittsburgh never rose from depths of second division...Honus Wagner was top hitter with .329 average, 30 steals, while Bobby Byrne Howie Camnitz (17-15, 2.19) were best of hurlers, as Lefty Leifield (9-19) and Vic Willis (15-22, 4.20) failed frequently in the so-called big games.

1906 Cubs - Chicago started slowly, sinking to last, and never was able to pick up the tempo...Three Finger Brown was a "blue chipper" with his 20-11 record and 2.38 ERA, but pitchers suffered because of lack of support...Jack Taylor was 12-20 and Orval Overall 5-20...some of the averages were average: Frank Chance (.319), Harry Steinfeldt (.314) and Frank Schulte homered 10 times and Chance and Johnny Evers combined for 95 steals, Chance with 53, but there was no big ABI man on the club.

Strat-O-Matic games continue to make news all across the country,

attrat-U-Matic games continue to make news all across the country, as evidenced by clippings sent to the Review recently.

Terry Kelleher, a sports writer for the Miami Herald, for instance, wrote a colorful article on the gaming craze entitled, "Take Me 'In' to the Ballgame," during the course of which he described his own humble beginnings in the world of shake, rattle and roll and then concluded by rating the baseball games on the market today.

Both Harold Richman, creator of S-D-M games, and Del Newell, coeditor of the Review, were interviewed via phone by Kelleher. Richman touched on the gaming market: "The market is growing, but not by leaps and bounds...It's a hard-core following; first you have to be a game addict, then a sports addict...People that buy these games are sophisticated: they want new developments...A new game must be as good as the others and different."

And Newell said of the Review: "The Review puts us in touch with each other. Before, some of us felt like closet queens who rolled dice at night."

Bob Lopeck, a Review subscriber from Opa-Locka, FL, sent along a clipping of the article.

Two other articles also appeared recently, one in the Denton Record-Chronicle and the other in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, both, of course, in the Lone Star state

Ken Sins at the Star-Telegram zeroed in on S-O-M, saying, "This is Strat-O-Matic Baseball, a wing of the passion known as table games which transform normally mild-mannered, rational sports fans into raving He went on to say: "Table games allow the participants a piece of the action, a chance to manipulate million dollar athletes on

Sins also described the typical table gamer as "A male in his mid20s...highly intelligent and [who] likes his games challenging with a
high degree of strategy involved."

Nancy Cochran was the woman behind the prose in the article appear-

ing in the Denton paper. She talked with Carl Kieke, a graduate student at North Texas State University who belongs to a play-by-mail league comprised of friends who met while students at Austin College (Sherman, and Dan Perrine, a student at NTSU and avid fan of the Old Timer

Perrine, although not an introvert, said of table-game baseball: "If you can't go outside and play baseball, you can stay inside and have a good time. You know, it costs \$3.50 or \$4 to get into a baseball game these days," continued Perrine, "so why not stay home and have your own World Series?"

Kieke, a meticulous gamer who sends 1½-page, single-spaced typed PBM instruction sheets with his team on road trips, has never met Perrine. The two play S-O-M, but have different philosophies regarding mode and


SHORT SHAKES
