

New Cards Finally Arrive!

We had heard plenty about "blackouts," "brownouts" and the various types of outages, but the Review editors, in the last month, almost experienced their first "whiteout." The new baseball cards came perilously close to not reaching their destination in time to beat the Review's publication deadline.

But the UPS (United Parcel Service) truck arrived just in the nick of

But the UPS (United Parcel Service) truck arrived just in the nick of time--on the very date the Review was to be taken to the printer in Kalamazoo, MI. UPS was still just that with us--rather than "DOWNS."

The great snowstorm (blizzard) was the culprit as far as the delay, as many midwesterners found out to their sorrow. The box to the Review, for instance, took almost two full weeks to make the journey from Glen Head, NY. People in California, the southern states and many other parts of the country were probably unaffected (and their cards likely came through right on schedule), but the midwest was paralyzed for a couple of days.

According to an UPS deliveryman, Larry Hapner (who had been watching for the package for over a week and a half, Pennsylvania was the trouble area, with many packages being delayed. Extra trucks, we were told, had to be sent into the state to relieve the massive pileup of packages.

Stampede At S-O-M Factory

The game company reported that the first orders started going out on friday, Jan. 27. Before the new cards even began being shipped, however, close to 120 groups of people stopped in at S-O-M and purchased the cards. People came by car, bus, even plane to be among the first to get their hands on the new cards. Three eager young men, from Virginia, arrived with satchels and purchased 26 sets--yes, 26 sets!--of cards, the largest single order ever filled by S-O-M.

Fortunately, pictures of many of the groups were taken, as well as finding out how far people had come (and by what mode of travel) and the Review will be presenting a story (plus pictures) next month of that "opening day" of shipping at S-O-M.

NEW CARDS LOOK GREAT

The new cards, as promised, were filled with hitting might. George Foster of the Reds had home runs in the one column, Nos. 5 and 6 straight and most of 7. And Red Carew had hits splashed all over the one and three columns. Foster, remember, clouted 52 home runs; Carew batted .388.

Ellis Valentine of Montreal is a draft-league manager's dream. Not on is he a "1" in right field, but he has a -5 throwing arm and, against left-handed nitching, has home run changes in the one column on five six several.

is he a "4" in right field, but he has a -5 throwing arm and, against left-handed pitching, has home run chances in the one column on five, six, seven, eight and part of nine. Unbelievable!! The figuring is Mr. Valentine will see very little southpaw pitching and almost exclusively right-handed--since he's a little more human facing that type of hurling.

The new fielding chart is certain to add another whole dimension to the game, as well. Everybody is rated, including the pitchers and catchers. One of the more interesting cards is that belonging to Dave Parker of Pittsburgh-Parker is a "1" in right field, with a -5 throwing arm. But he's an "e-16" as far as error rating--which means he's going to bobble plenty of balls since that rating is the worst possible for an outfielder.

With the new advanced fielding chart, pitchers, catchers, centerfielders, third basemen, shortstops, second basemen, first basemen and left-right fielders all are rated separately.

S-O-M does wish to make it clear, however, that all pitchers are still

S-0-M does wish to make it clear, however, that all pitchers are still rated "2" for fielding. The error rating will vary, but the fielding remains "2". Pitchers are given four ratings on the new chart. But the "1", "3" and "4" categories are, as of this time, just for possible future use. REMEMBER! ALL PITCHER'S ARE "2"!

'Statistics Freak' Researches Pitchers' Home Run Totals

I am without doubt one of the most avid "statistics freeks" in Strat-D-Dom. As my favorite statistic is home runs allowed, I naturally became quite upset when I learned the Old Timers and Hall of Fame teams' pitchers did not have that particular stat on their cards. So I vowed to do something about

My chance came when I learned the periodical collection at the college I attend, UC Davis, had the New York Times, Chicago Tribune and Washington Post from their beginnings, on micro-film. Delirious with joy, I began to tackle the job of determining home runs allowed for the Old Timers. My first assignment, I decided, would be the 1927 Yankees. Many painstaking (but happy) hours later, I completed the task.

I looked at every boxscore of the season, noting each pitcher, starter and relievers, and the home runs hit off each of them (if any). There were two or three instances where the Times did not mention the pitcher, or else was ambiguous about it. In those instances, I checked the Tribune and the Post. After completion of the season, I double- and triple-checked the number of appearances and starts for each pitcher. My results, being identical with those of the Baseball Encyclopedia, became official.

Ouring the 1927 season, Yankee pitchers were nicked for the grand total of 42 home runs. The breakdown is as follows:

Waite Hoyt - 10 George Piperas - 2 Urban Shocker - 8

George Pipgras - 2 Dutch Ruether - 8 Urban Shocker Waite Hoyt - 10 Wilcy Moore - 3 Herb Pennock - 5 Myles Thomas Joe Giard Dutch Ruether Bob Shawkey (no card) (no card)

I do not realistically see how these figures could be wrong--unless the reporters for the three papers were all blind. Each gamer, of course, has the option of using these figures, or he even may want to try this research himself and try to agree with my figures.

However, to prove my honesty, I will send anyone who wants one a copy of my notes for 1927, showing the starting pitcher, relievers, and HRA for every game of the season. He must send me 25¢ (to cover printing costs) and an SASE, and I shall be happy to send him a copy.

My next project, by the way, is the 1905 Giants. When I have finished with that team, I shall report the "official" results to the Review.


Bob Jostes of Maderia, OH, is another who believes Strat-O-Matic Baseball is enjoyed most when played in the pro-

Baseball Playing Tips

Steve Homner of Gary, IN, believes that Strat-O-Matic Baseball is much more than just rolling dice and checking cards for results. There are wind, rain and size of the park factors to be considered, too.

A 26-year-old gamer who's been playing S-O-M for 15 years, Homner and his dice-rollin' cohorts in the steelmill town have added many innovations to the tabletop version of the diamond sport.

Here are some of the changes:

SIZE OF PARKS

Before each league season commences, each manager declares what kind of ball park his team will be playing in for the entire season. Limitations range from -2 to +2, with plus two meaning it's a small park and "+2" is added to every home run possibility (split chance), not to exceed 1-19. A minus two, conversely, would indicate a larger park and "-2" would be subtracted from the home run chance (not less than 1). Managers could also set their parks at -1, even, or +1.

Any solid home run number, of course, would still remain a home run, regardless of the park's dimensions. And remember, parks cannot be changed during the season.

RAINOUTS

In Homner's league, each team is given a rain percentage before the season, with the rating usually reflecting the geological region the team supposedly called "home." Examples: Death Valley Prospectors 1% rain percentage; Caracas Banditos - 11%; New Hampshire Hams - 5%; Mongolian

Muskrats - 8%.

A rain chart, based on percentages, was developed by the league and it's as follows:

As the chart reveals, teams with higher rain percentages are more likely to have more rainouts. How this system works is that before each game the home team rolls to see if the game is rained out. If the home team has an 8% rain percentage, and a 3, 14, or 17 is rolled with three dice, then the game is rained out.

Games also can be rained out while in progress. If a 1-1-1 or 6-6-6 are rolled in a game then the threat of rain has occurred. After completing the play in progress, a "rain roll" is conducted, with the total of three dice then checked against the above rain chart.

If the contest is less than four innings along when the clouds open up, no records will count and the game must be rescheduled. If the game is

no records will count and the game must be rescheduled. If the game is four or more innings old, then the same roller picks a split card to determine at what point the game will be rained out.

The following chart should be used:

Split Card		Result
1-5	-	Game is called immediately.
6-10	-	Complete next batter and then game is called.
11-15	-	Complete next two batters and then game is called.
16-19		Complete next three batters and then game is called.
50	-	Complete next four batters and then game is called.

Note: when consulting chart, intentional walks do not count as a batter.

WIND FACTOR

As every baseball fan is also well aware, wind does make a difference, too. Candlestick Park inhabitants will vouch for that. So, Homner has also taken that into consideration as well. This will encompass whether the wind is calm, blowing out, or blowing in, along with the rate.

Here's how it all works: before each game, select a split card and either subtract or add the result to any home run possibilities, excluding solid

home run chances.

Then consult the following chart:

The result of this is then figured in with park size. Example: If Caracas has a park rating of -2 and a split card of 18 is drawn for the wind index, then the HR ratio is -4. Again, remember lowest possible is 1 and highest 1-19.

'REST' FOR PITCHERS

Last innovation from Homner and his cohorts touches on resting of starting and relief pitchers. A chart (below) has been devised for both:

Baseball Playing Tip

While on the topic of baseball playing tips, Rob Schellhaas of Everett, MA, has chipped in with a couple of offerings you may want to consider for your gaming endeavors.

PICKOFF ATTEMPTS - May be made on any runner on first base. The runner

PICKOFF ATTEMPTS - May be made on any runner on first base. The runner is out if three ones are rolled. The disadvantage is that this maneuver also brings the infield "in" and sets up the "++" possibility. It can be used only once per runner, even though it is done more frequently in real-life.

DOUBLE PLAY SITUATION - With runners on first and second and groundball—A or X-3 to shortstop or third baseman, lead runner is forced at third, and then either runner may be played on for the second out of double play. The other runners are played on according to their running ability (plus 2), with a split number being drawn to determine whether DP was successful or runner beat throw. This maneuver adds more excitement (and puts more pressure on the defense) to a seemingly routine twin-killing. The defensive manager has the dilemma, in some cases, of trying to double a fleet-footed runner steaming toward second, or a slower runner going to first. With bases loaded, ining toward second, or a slower runner going to first. With bases loaded, infield out, play can be made at home by any infielder and then on batter going to first, adding +3 to the runner's ability.

LONGER GAMES: MORE POINTS

I would like to make a suggestion for those who love offensive football games. Instead of using the timing system the rules provide for (30 seconds per play), I use only 15 seconds for all plays.

This allows for more offensive

This allows for more offensive plays and more points, especially when playing solitaire. This proved out when I replayed the 1971 teams (basic version). There was only one team that allowed fewer than 300 points, and only three teams that scored less than 300.

S-D-M IS THE 'BEST'

First of all, I would like to say that I have played many other baseball games and I think S-O-M is beyond doubt the best one yet. The thing I like most about S-O-M is the normalization feature.

Dallas Wins Super Bowl Replay Thriller

Two of the great features of Strat-O-Matic games are that they allow you to replay seasons of past years...and also preview, in a sense, upcoming

So it was three days before Super Bowl XII as co-editor of the Review, Del Newell, decided to match the Dallas Cowboys against the Denver Broncos to see how the game "would come out" in real-life.

Teams based on the 1976 season were used, with Craig Morton being shifted from the New York Giants to the Broncos and Lydell Mitchell's card with Baltimore replacing Tony Dorsett for the Dallas Cowboys.

Dallas wound up scoring 27 points--just as in the real-life game--but Denver didn't perform similar to its "Butterfinger Bowl" showing and instead made the final score much closer than 27-10. In fact, Dallas' Efren Herrera had to boot a 41-yard field goal with no time showing on the clock to win the game, 27-24. It was probably the most thrilling solitaire football came that Del Newell had played. that Del Newell had played.

NO FUMBLES LOST

Most noticeable difference was the lack of turnovers. Whereas in real-life the two teams combined for 10 miscues, the table-top version saw only one pass interception and no fumbles lost. Denver backs had a lot of opport-unities pop up on Dallas' defensive cards, but no bobbles were lost.

Morton, however, did have one pass swiped (unlike the four in the real game, though)—and it was a key play early in the game. Denver had taken the opening kickoff and marched steadily downfield. But Mel Renfro picked off a Morton aerial and raced 69 yards for a touchdown with less than four minutes played.

Denver bounced back, however, and drove to a touchdown--with Otis Armstrong's five-yard run accounting for the equalizer at 5:45 of the first period. At this point, Denver had run 17 scrimmage plays...and Dallas hadn't as yet touched the football on offense.

WILD FINISH

Roger Staubach, who was later selected the game's Most Valuable Player, gave Dallas a 14-10 halftime lead when he tallied on a six-yard run off a

gave Dallas a 14-10 halftime lead when he tallied on a six-yard run off a "must run" situation.

Early in the fourth quarter, with Dallas' "Doomsday Defense II" asserting itself, the Cowboys took the lead for what appeared for good when Golden Richards hauled in a seven-yard pass from Staubach. It was 24-17, Dallas, but still with 12:30 remaining.

Denver, after a couple of aborted efforts to mount a drive, found itself working against the clock in a desperate attempt to tie the game and force an overtime. The Bronces respend the Dallac 32 and the mist all the clock in a desperate attempt to the the game and force

working against the clock in a desperate attempt to tie the game and force an overtime. The Broncos reached the Dallas 38 and then, with only 1:15 remaining and on third down, Morton hooked up with big-play specialist Rick Upchurch on a 38-yard "long-gainer" that tied the score.

Dallas, far from being demoralized, used two timeouts and a 50-yard pass from Staubach to Drew Pearson to move the ball into range for Herrera's win-

ning boot.

STAUBACH NAMED MYP

Staubach, as mentioned earlier, was selected MVP, as he completed 16 of 23 passes for 229 yards and one touchdown plus scored on the six-yard run. The "Orange Crush" defense, however, did sack Jolly Roger four times for 33 yards in losses.

On the ground, Denver had a large superiority, outrushing Dallas by a 167-39 margin. Otis Armstrong picked his way to 130 yards in 23 carries for Denver, gaining 82 of it on 16 first-half totes. Dorsett [i.e. Mitchell] was a flop for Dallas, carrying the ball nine times and ending with a negative

Tennessee-Based League Is First Face-To-Face

One-of the quickest replays, we've discovered, is that using the six Old Timer pro football teams. Replaying a 14-game season for the sextet amounts to only 42 games, plus playoffs--and can easily be accomplished in a month to six weeks by the avid gridiron gamer.

Two more such replays crossed the desk of the Review editors recently; one a solitaire effort by Billy Thompson of Springfield, MD ("Same Ol" Solitaire League), the other perhaps the first head-to-head, full-season replay using the Old-Time grid greats.

Thompson reseled off his replay in just one month, and then probably took much longer to put together a statistic-filled chronology of what took place--a 26-page yearbook.

Meanwhile, the first Franklin-Antioch-Nashville Football League was going at it face-to-face. Randell Witt of Franklin, TN, was commissioner of the league, which was comprised of six members. Teams were doled out on the basis of gaming experience, with the "rockie" coaches being given the best teams and the "veterans" the likes of the 1950 Eagles. A two-division setup was created, with each team playing the others within the division four times (eight games) and teams outside twice each (six games). The basic version of the game was used because of the inexperienced gamers, although keying and double-teaming were allowed.

Thompson's replay went pretty much according to plan, with the 1958 Baltimore Colts finishing first, the '62 Green Bav Packers second and '85

Cleveland Browns third. Experience paid off, however, in the FANFL, as
Witt guided the lowly '60 Eagles to a division title and Richard Brennesholtz
did likewise in the other with the '65 Browns. Baltimore and Green Bay, both
given to rookie coaches, fell into the basement in their respective divisions.
So coaching was obviously the key to success in the FANFL.

individual statistics, team totals in such categories as rushing, passing,
interceptions, kicking and punting, first downs, fumbles and sacks are also

For example, the '65 Browns had 110 first downs by rushing, 149 passing for a total of 259--of a league-leading 18.5 average. And Baltimore intercepted 31 passes as a team, returned them 388 yards--the longest 48 yards--scored

once and averaged 12.5 yards every runback.

Jimmy Brown of the '65 Browns was the SOSL's Most Valuable Player, leading the league in rushing with 1,615 yards, touchdowns with 19 and finishing runnerup in scoring with 114 points.

Baltimore captured the SOSL title, however, finishing 10-3-1 over the

regular-season haul and then downing the second-place Packers in a playoff championship game, 17-10. Ray Brown, a Colt defensive back, was chosen MVP of the title clash after intercepting three Bart Starr passes, the last setting up the game-winning TD in the fourth quarter. Baltimore and the Pack met four times during Thompson's replay, Green Bay winning the first, 20-17, and then the Colts the last three, 24-17, 20-16 and 17-10 in the title -an 18-point margin.

After losing the opener to the Packers, Baltimore won its next six before being upset by Philadelphia, 19-14. The Colts had league's most feared offense, averaging 362 yards per game...Alan Ameche rushed for 1,001 yards, dual threat Lenny Moore rambled for 861 and caught 49 passes for 908 more... plus Baltimore defense led in sacks with 48.

Green Bay, meanwhile, won its five games then played .500 ball afterwards. .Fullback Jim Taylor was second leading rusher with 1,504 yards, had 18
TDs rushing--tops in league--but fumbled ball away league-high 20 times...
Great trio of receivers in Max McGee. (47-901), Boyd Dowler (47-742) and Ron
Kramer [39-564)...plus 227 points was lowest yield on defense.
Cleveland had great offense and awful defense, Philadelphia surprised

Cleveland had great offense and awful defense, Philadelphia surprised somewhat by knocking off Baltimore and Green Bay back-to-back in mid-season and going 5-2-1 down the stretch, the '63 Bears yielded only 303.5 yards a game defensively and featured end Mike Ditka (59 catches, 830 yards) and the 'punting of Bobby Joe Green (45.8], while '58 Giants, after winning first two games, hit the skids and didn't win another the rest of way.

The Giants, surprisingly, gave the Colts fits, losing by a point (7-6) on Pat Summerall's missed extra point and tying them 10-10 in their second game.

New York, which was plagued all season by Charlie Conerly's 38.2 per cent

completion accuracy, went one six-game stretch and scored a mere 24 points.

EAGLES ON TITLE FLIGHT IN FANFL

Witt, who has become something of a folk hero for his S-O-M playing exploits, obviously got the most out of the meager talent on the '60 Eagles. The Eagles won their division, going 6-4-4, and then topped Cleveland in the Super Bowl, 24-21. Clarence Peaks, the Eagles' regular-season MVP, rushed for a whopping 181 yards, and the Bird defense held Jim Brown to 100 in 33 carries, both instrumental in the final outcome.

Witt's defense was dubbed the "rubber band" after allowing 382 yards a game. But Norm VanBrocklin and Sonny Jurgensen combined for 3,788 yards passing and the secondary picked off 39 passes.

Baltimore faltered because Johnny Unitas hed 26 passes intercepted (8.8 per cent), while Frank Gifford was a double-threat for the Giants, who were passed over for a playoff berth because Philly had the better record within the division.

Over in the West Division, Cleveland averaged 30 points as Jim Brown rambled to 1,738 yards and Gary Collins caught 62 Frank Ryan passes. Chicago's defense was magnificent, giving up only 299 yards a game, but the offense was pathetic, scoring only 17 per contest. The Bears couldn't handle Cleveland, losing four lopsided games to the Browns. Green Bay lost a flock of close games under rookie mentor Tim Williams, although Jim Taylor rushed for 1,559 yards and the offense was the second highest scoring.

Other members of the FANFL, in addition to Witt, Brennesholtz and Williams, were Danny Biles (coach of the New York Giants), Tim Whitby (Baltimore) and Chip Schnakenberg (ChiEaso).

Another no-hitter that was far removed from a mundame happening occurred when Debbi Schellhaas, the wife of Rob Schellhaas of Everett, MA, had Don Gullett of the '75 Cincinnati Reds set down her husband's '76 New York Mets through nine innings without a hit.

Rob had just shortly before persuaded Debbi to play a short 16-game series with him involving the two teams. Then Gullett took the mound. As events turned out, Gullett didn't get the win, nor did he pitch a complete-game no-hitter. In fact, the Mets won the game in 11 innings, 1-D.

But Gullett did hurl nine innings without being touched for a safety. He was in trouble in the fifth inning, loading the bases with walks with only one out, but escaped unscathed and unscored upon. John Milner's single in the 10th was the first hit off Gullett, who ultimately watched reliever Rawley Eastwick suffer the loss after the Mets bunched two singles with Pete Rose's error for a run in the 13th.


