Plenty of hitting in new cards

There was the good, the bad, but never the ugly when the Review editors gave the new baseball cards a cursory look soon after their arrival. There were many good-lookin' cards, the usual assortment of I-hope-I-don't-have-to-draft-this-guy cards. But overall, everyone was

tickled, we're sure, just to see the new cards arrive.

Strat-O-Matic reported that on "opening day" the line extended from Strat-0-Matic reported that on "opening day" the line extended from the building out to the road of gamers waiting to purchase the new cards. "We put in a window especially for the purpose of selling the cards," mentions Bob Yonke of S-0-M. "It was nice weather and people didn't mind waiting. And the wait wasn't very long. It fact it went very fast. [Editor's note: Next month the Review will have pictures and a feature story on that memorable day--"opening day"--at S-0-M.)

The Review, in case you're curious, received its order--18 sets worth!--in two days, via United Parcel Service, which may or not be some kind of record.

Now for a look at the new cards. First of all, it's worth noting that eight players were given AAstealing ratings: Bill North, Rodney Scott, Davey Lopes, Omar Moreno,

Julio Cruz, Willie Wilson, Ron LeFlore and Rickey Henderson, the latter of the Oakland A's. There were 37 "A" stealers and a total of 35 "1"  $\,$ fielders. Larry Bowa of Philadelphia was a glittering 1 and e-7 at shortstop. The Phillies, in fact, had five "1s" in Bowa, Manny Trillo [28], Mike Schmidt (38), Bob Boone (C) and Garry Maddox (CF).

# Baseball card corrections

Only card correction brought to our attention by S-O-M involves Dennis and Tippy Martinez, pitchers for the Balt-imore Orioles. The cards are reversed on their backs--Dennis Martinez becomes Tippy Martinez on the flip, or advanced, side; likewise for Tippy. The basic side is correct, and so are the stats. It's just that the wrong flip side was put on the cards.

Many gamers won't notice anything wrong, however, since the mistake was quickly caught and the backs changed. Probe ly less than 1,000 orders—the first 1,000—had the mistake Probab-

Otherwise the cards look "clean."

Now back to the defense. The Yankees, although experiencing an off year, could put out three "1s" in Jim Spencer (18), Juan Beniquez (DF) and Graig Nettles (38). And so can Boston in Dwight Evans (RF), Fred Lynn (DF) and Rick Burleson (SS).

In the thievery department, Houston is the go, go, gone team with six A stealers, while California is a close second with Four. Meanwhile, most likely to deter larceny on the bases are catchers Jim Suniber of throwing) and Rick Dempsey, Gary Carter and Johnny Bench, all of whom are -3, or possess rifles in lieu of arms. Everyone, of course, is aware that Carlton Fisk, because of arm problems, was rated "+5]. That was done to prevent his overuse as a catcher, a position he played very little in 1979.

While on the topic of throwing, Dave Winfield, Ellis Valentine, Dave Parker and Dwight Evans all again have cannons, or "5" ratings, while Cesar Geronimo, Cesar Cedeno, Al Cowens, Amos Otis are rated "-4." With Otis in center, Cowens in right, Kansas City should keep opposing runners from taking any liberties on the bases.

#### PITCHERS WILL TAKE BEATING

The newest set of cards can perhaps best be described as a "hitting set." Outstanding pitchers are few while characteristics. Outstanding pitchers are few while above-average and outstanding cards are many.

Among the hurlers, Steve Carlton is especially tough against left-handed batters; Gaylord Perry has a good all-around 'Gaylord Perry card,' J.A. Richard has probably the best balanced (he shuts down right and left-handed batters equally well) card in the N.L., while Jim Kern, relief ace, is likely to mow down right-handed hitters. Chicago's Rich Wortham, a southpaw, doesn't yield any hits to lefty swingers off his card.

### LEZCAND, NORTH HAVE ACTION CARDS

Sixto Lezcano of Milwaukee and Bill North of San Francisco have the type of cards to make their managers dream of pennants and glory and give the opposition frequent nightmares. Lezcano, for instance, has on-base chances against lefties on 4 through 9 and 12 in the 1 column, 5-10 in the 2 and 5-10 and 12 in No. 3. Plus he's also a "1" and has a -3 arm. North is almost as good against lefties, plus he's an AA stealer and a "2" in center.

Dave Kingman, the major league leader in home runs with 48, punishes both types of pitching equally well, with home run chances on 1-8, 1-9

3-5 and 2-8 (1-19) against southpaws and 1-8, 1-9, 3-5 and 2-8 (1-8) against righties. On the other hand, though, Kingman's teammate, Bruce Sutter, doesn't give up much of anything to anybody. Sutter doesn't even allow a straight hit chance to any left-handed batter, while the righties have only a slim shot, with the 1-5 the only straight hit chance. As far as long ball, Sutter has only a 1-4 [1-7] vulnerable area.

Over in the A.L., Jim Rice unloads on lefties on 1–5, 1–6, and 1–7 (1-17) while teammate Butch Hobson cracks 'em out against southpaws on 3–2, 3–3, 3–4, 3–5 and 3–6 (1-16). Bob Horner's card for Atlanta is another worth cackling over, with home runs on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 [1-18] against lefties.

Ted Simmons of St. Louis, although not normally a power hitter, definitely has a card reflecting his 26 home runs in 448 at-bats. H unloads, against lefties, on 2-2, 2-3, 2-4, 3-7 and 3-8 (1-10). John Wockenfuss, reserve outfielder and catcher for Detroit, is another with card. He clubs lefties for homers on 2-2, 2-3, 2-4, 3-7 and 3-8 [1-14].

A look at Gorman Thomas' card suggests one of three things will happen when he bats: (1) he will hit a home run; (2) he will walk; (3) he will strike-out. There are few chances for much else to occur. Thomas he will strike-out. There are few chances for much else to occur. blasts 'em into the bleachers, against righties, on 2-9 (1-16), 2-10, 2-11, 2-12, 3-11 and 3-12. Mike Schmidt has a similar type card, sans the strikeouts, however. Schmidt walked a whopping 120 times--and his card reflects it.

#### OTHER SUPER CARDS...

One could write a book on the new baseball cards, especially the power hitters (check out Jim Morrison's card with the Chicago White Sox; he's got, against lefties, home run chances on 2-8, 2-9, 2-10 and 3-7 [1-16]. This, then, is not meant to touch on every player, rather just the few that caught our eye in a cursory check.

Here are some other unusual cards worth looking over:

\* Larry Parrish, Montreal - Has chances to hit a double, against

\* Larry Parrish, Montreal - Has chances to Hit a count, egallot southpaws, on 2-5, 2-6, 2-7, 2-8, 2-9 [1-4] and 3-6 [12-20].

\* Ron Cey, Los Angeles - Another power-hitter deluxe, against lefties. He hits 'em out on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7, 1-10 [1-14].

\* Davey Lopes, Los Angeles - More noted for his speed, perhaps, Lopes definitely packed a sting at the plate, having home runs on 1-2, 1-3, 1-4,

2-8 and 2-9 (1-15) against southpaws. \* Steve Yeager, Los Angeles - Never have so many home run card listings [6] amounted to so few chances (13+ chances out of 108).

Versatility awards should go to Derrel Thomas, Los Angeles, and Bobby Valentine, Seattle, both of whom have six different positions listed on their cards.

\* Check out George Brett, who hit 20 triples in '79. He's got a three-bagger, and straight, on 1-7 against righties.

\* There-she-goes award: Has to go to Jessie Jefferson of Toronto, who, when facing right-handed batters, can watch them sail out on 3-9, 3-10 and 3-8 (1-10).

\* Outfielder Joe Cannon of Toronto is anything but explosive when facing lefties. The southpaw swinger has nary a hit chance among the forest of strikeouts on his card.

\* S-O-M made sure Manny Mota, who batted all of 42 times, wouldn't be used for anything other than a pinch hitter (which is listed on his card). He's got a +4 throwing arm as an outfielder.

# Pitching decides replay matching baseball greats

What happens when baseball's greats are matched against each other? According to James Overmeyer, Poughkeepsie, NY, the gamer on the dice-n' end will have a lot of fun and witness plenty of offensive pyrotechnics. Overmeyer played through just such a season--it took him 2% years to complete a 160-game replay for six teams--and said the league average was .269, earned-run-average 4.67 and that 10.38 runs were scored

Overmeyer formed his league from the 80 Hall of Fame players, plus 40 contemporary greats from 1962-1975. There were three teams comprised of American Leaguers--Connie Mack, Casey Stengel and, for the modern-day greats, Joe Schultz--and three from the National--Gil Hodges, John McGraw, and, again the modern-day band of baseballers, Leo Durocher being their

Note that all were former managers, with Schultz remembered for guiding the Seattle Pilots during their infancy days in the late '60s. Over meyer used the lifetime fielding ratings (for the Hall of Famers), but used the best-season side of the card for everything else.

Two no-hitters did pop up in the hitting carnage, with Christy Mathewson (Hodges) and Sandy Koufax (McGraw) both twirling one against Leo Durocher.

#### PITCHING PREVAILS IN THE END

With all the teams possessing plenty of firepower, the pendant-winner

With all the teams possessing plenty of firepower, the pennant-winner had to come from the team that had the best overall pitching. And Gil Hodges fit that role perfectly as five starters performed admirably, plus it had Don Drysdale and Robin Roberts coming out of the bullpen. The staff had a league-low 4.04 ERA and issued only 446 walks.

Grover Alexander (18-5), Dizzy Vance (18-12), Cy Young (16-11), Mathewson (16-12) and Warren Spahn (15-6) were the starters, while Hoberto Clemente (.330, 25 home runs, 93 HBI), Mel Dtt (36, 90), Rogers Hornsby (.328, 104 HBI) and Stan Musial (.316, 31, 125) were the key hitters.

Subs plaved a key role, too, as Hodges had the best bench in the league Subs played a key role, too, as Hodges had the best bench in the league and got maximum mileage out of the 20-player roster. Paul Waner and Jackie Robinson were the top 'relief' men.

Lack of depth in pitching proved to be the downfall of Connie Mack, Lack or depth in pitching proved to be the downfall of Connie Mack, which finished a close runner and had the Player of the Year, Al Simmons, and Pitcher of the Year, Chief Bender. Simmons was fantastic, belting 50 homers, driving in 176 runs-both league highs-batting .328 and scoring 112 runs. Simmons didn't start until the fifth game, and then he served notice what kind of season he was going to have by hitting two homers and driving in six curs. driving in six runs.

Bender, meanwhile, won 23 of 28 decisions--an .821 win percentage-and Walter Johnson backed him with a 22-11 record and league-low 3.21 ERA. But after the big two the pitching staff frequently played pitch-and-duck. Red Auffing was only 8-9 and Lefty Gomez, although compiling a 10-3 record, was shelled for 5.03 earned runs a game.

The team hit with all the authority of a Mack Truck, however, scoring a whopping 1,003 runs. George Sisler batted .365, with 239 hits and 154 runs scored, Joe Jackson .354 and Joe DiMaggio .326 (42 homers, 131 ABI). The team was so awesome that Ted Williams was relegated to a sub's role, during which he hit 16 homers, knocked in 72 runs and batted .347.

## 'BIG TWO' AND THEN...

After the so-called Big Two, the remaining four teams quickly strung out behind, with Joe Schultz and Leo Durocher both losing over 100 games. Here's a team-by-team summary of the remaining four:

JOHN MCGRAW - Had best hitter in Willie Keeler (254 hits, .369), but hitting was downfall...Bill Terry (.329), Joe Medwick (.328, 106 ABI) and Willie Mays (37 HRs, 112 ABI) were other solid swingers, but attack tailed off after them...Three Finger Brown (20-13, 4.22) and Joe McGinnity (19-11, 3.60) were effective pitchers and Dizzy Dean saved 20 games, but others such as Carl Hubbell and Koufax were either snakebit or inconsistent: Koufax, for example, had no-hitter, 15-11 record but served up 44 home runs.

CASEY STENGEL - Picked to win it all in preseason, this team opened by losing first seven games. Never really recovered despite having five players knock in 100 or more runs...Ty Cobb was one of league's sparklers, batting .366, with 246 hits, 154 runs scored and 160 steals in 190 attempts ...Nap Lajoie (121), Babe Ruth (107), Jimmy Foxx (103), Harry Heilmann (100) and Heine Manush (102) comprised the 100-plus ABI quintet...Lou Gehrig flopped, however, batting only .238 with 15 homers. He was eventually replaced by Heilmann...Ed Walsh (17-16, 3.90), Rube Waddell (17-13, 4.16) and Hal Newhouser (15-10, 4.29) formed solid trio of starting pitchers. but rest of staff was cannon fodder.

JOE SCHULTZ - Led league in home runs, 219, but most were of solo variety, thus league-low 657 runs scored...Frank Robinson (43 HRs, 103 RBI, .310) had best year of any modern-day player...Pitchers led in strike-outs, 1201, but staff had three 20-game losers (Wilbur Wood, Gaylord Perry, Sam McDowell)...Dick Radatz did whiff 163 in only 136 innings.

LEO DUROCHER - Collected 205 homers and 318 stolen bases but had

LEO DUROCHER - Collected 205 homers and 318 stolen bases but had lowest batting average, .235, and highest ERA, 5.42...Willie McCovey (1969) was iron man, playing in all games and connecting for 42 home runs ...Joe Morgan had 50 thefts and walked 138 times, Hank Aaron smashed 31 homers and swiped 35 bases, but pitching was flop as Juan Marichal was 6-23 and Tom Seaver 3-17 with 5.67 ERA...Oh, and Johnny Bench and Mike Schmidt hit .177 and .166, respectively, further hampering the cause.

# Here's do-it-yourself 'e' rating system

Strat-U-Matic does provide a way of converting your 'old' baseball cards to "e" ratings. In fact, the conversion table is found on a card that is issued with the 20 nameless player cards.

While not as detailed as some purists would like, the table does

provide a workable guideline for rating your own players. What S-O-M has done is to set up four ratings at each position: Excellent--very few errors committed; Good--less than an average number of errors committed; Average--normal amount of errors committed; and Poor--high frequency of errors committed.

Here are the categories by position for assigning e ratings:

Uf course, the above system is still second-best to basing e ratings on actual errors-to-innings-played as the game company currently does. The e ratings, in case you're curious, are derived from figuring the total errors that would be committed by a fielder if he had played every inning of every game. That's the formula that S-O-M uses.

Adding e ratings to old card sets--especially precise, ratings to old card sets—especially precise, accurate ratings—still would be anything but a snap job. You have to find fielding statistics, for starters, and obtaining those for past years isn't easy. Next, and even more difficult, would be trying to find out the number of innings played. Finding the total games played would be relatively easy, but guesswork would be needed for the latter.

S-O-M's chart (above) is a simple and speedy way of assigning e ratings. But you would still have to know the number of errors committed to use the chart realistically.

James Handford of Gimli, Manitoba, Canada, has another chart whereby e ratings are assigned according to a fielder's fielding rating--1, 2, 3, or 4. Now we refer to that rating as the range rating, but previously it encompassed both range as well as errors committed.

Here's Handford's chart. To use it, find the fielding rating on a player's card and then make the necessary conversion to an e rating.

However, these teams are arbitrary and are based on the plus/minus stats of that player and the lines of a team. Thus some season ticket holders who know better, might question

That's the semifinals lineup in Steve Beren's Gold Cup Challenge Series, a tournament that has been featured in recent months in the Review and which ultimately will pay the winner the tidy sum of \$101. The payoff will be in the form of a check and not in gold, sorry to say.

All told, 55 gamers entered the second tournament conducted by Beren, who resides in Jackson Heights, NY. The participation was up 25 from the 30 the first year when Beren played through 206 games before Glen Strong ('77 Astros/'77 Cubs) of Cranbury, NJ, emerged Gold Cup king. Strong, incidentally, was a first-round casualty in the 1979 tourney.

396 GAMES LATER ...

This year's tournament began on May 20, and lasted until Dec. 31 when Beren cast the final die. All told, 396 games were played; for a total of 602 games over a two-year span.

Enough chit-chat. Here's how the semifinals came out:
Johnson, 21-9 in his first Gold Cup venture, went against Daley,
19-11, who picked off a sixth-place finish in 1978; while Schwanebeck,
24-6, a distant 11th with a 6-5 slate in '78, opposed Fafata, 23-15, who
captured a fifth in '78 with a 14-10 log.

Johnson won four of the six games against Daley, with the '71 Angels defeating the '71 Giants 6-4, losing 7-3 and 5-4, and then the '73 Cards sweeping the '77 Indians, 4-3, 3-1 and 6-2. Quickest game was the last one, with Reggie Cleveland taking only 11 minutes to set down the Indians.

In the other semifinal, Schwanebeck finished off Fafata in five games, running his overall record to a glittering 28-7. The '74 Red Sox knocked off the '73 Pirates in three straight (7-2, 5-1, 7-3), and then, after the '73 Expos clipped the '73 Braves, 7-1, the Braves captured a 4-3 decision to end the series.

So now it was Johnson, 25-11, vs. Schwanebeck, 28-7, for the gold!

#### CROWNING THE NEW CHAMP

The first four games of the championship series were split, with Schwanebeck's Red Sox winning game one, 4-1, over the Angels; the Angels capturing the second, 5-3; the Sox game three, 3-0, as Luis Tiant hurled a three-hitter; and then the Angels gaining a 2-2 standoff by winning the fourth game, 4-2.

The '73 Cardinals then went on to sweep the '73 Braves in the final three games, 6-5, 9-5 and 3-2, giwing Johnson a 5-2 series advantage, an

overall record of 30-13, and the Gold Cup Series first-place prize of \$101! Schwanebeck finished runnerup and collected \$20, while Jaley was third and won \$10\$ and Fafata fourth which was worth \$5.

The rest of the top ten included: 5. Bob Lopeck, Opalacka, FL; 5. Skuli Johnson, Winnipeg, Manitoba; 7. Tom Johnson, North Dighton, MA; 8. Neal Walters, St. Albert, Alberta; 9. Greg Balas, Ponteix, Saskatchewan; 10. Joe Paldino, Brooklyn, NY.

Johnson was not only 30-13, but his Cardinals won their last 15 games. In 43 games, he outscored opponents 188-128, although foes had a 30-21 superiority in the longball department.

One other noteworthy award was the Munson Award (in honor of the late News York Yankee catcher who was killed in a plane mishap). Joe Torre of the '73 Cardinals was the first recipient of the award, which will go to the player who contributes the most offensively to his team's victories in the semifinals and finals.

Beren, although taking a much-deserved break from his dice-rollin' chores, will soon be mapping plans for Gold Cup Series III. And this time, he enthuses, the prize money will be increased to \$450 for the winner, \$30 runnerup, \$20 for third and \$40 for fourth.

BASIC GAME PLAYED, TOO

JAMMING THE COMPUTER

I don't know what computer Jeff Abbott of San Diego used to calculate his odds in "Strat-O-Matic Spotlight" in the Jan., 1980 issue. But I too am a computer scientist.

For three consecutive errors, one must multiply the chance of one event [1 in 665] by itself three times. Therefore, the final digit had to have been

a 5 (5 times 5 always ends in 5), not 8. The actual odds are in fact 1 in 294,079,625. And for four consecutive, multiply again by 665 to obtain an answe of approximately 195.56 billion, up about 800 percent more than Mr. Abbott's figure.

Additionally, assuming a split deck method where all numbers are reusable on all draws (such as a dice system), the odds for Geronimo committing one error on any throw are in fact 1 in 894, not 1 in 685. Recalculating, three straight errors shows 1 in 784.5 million, and four straight errors 1 in 702.26 billion.

On the other hand, if one was using the standard 20-card split deck, three straight errors comes to 1 chance in about 1.835 billion and four straight 1 chance in 190.26 trillion.

# No-Hitters

'SUDDEN SAM' STIFLES GREATS

No-hitters, a delight to many gamers but a happening many love to hate as far as seeing print in the Review, are back again.

Leading off the no-hit parade is one submitted by Jack Decker, an attorney in Columbus, OH, who matched two all-time all-star teams in a attorney in Columbus, UH, who matched two all-time all-star teams in a solitaire game. One team, dubbed the Giants because of the composition of its roster, featured Bill Terry at first, Willie Mays ('55) in center field, Johnny Mize at first and Bobby Bonds in right field. Going against this hard-hitting lineup, or serving 'em up, wes to be Sam McDowell ('65) of the Indians. McDowell was starting for no other reason that injuries had peressitated his making an appearance. had necessitated his making an appearance.

So it was McDowell against a lineup averaging .332 and 28 home runs per player. A mismatch? No way! McDowell, despite entering the game with an out-of-sight 5.72 ERA, struck out 11 and didn't surrender a hit. Three walks were culled off McDowell, while the Indians were also charged

Back on March 23, 1978, Aon Guidry of the '77 Yankees no-hit Kensas City, striking out 12 and walking one in a game played face-to-face; on July 8 of the same year it was Larry Gura getting revenge for the Royals by no-hitting the same Yankees; on June 1, 1979, the Yanks had their bats turn to sawdust again, this time by Cleveland's Don Hood; while the fourth no-hitter was Phil Niekro's ['74 Braves] blanking of the '74 Yankees, striking out eight and walking nary a batter with his unpredictable knuckler.

#### J.A.'S PERFECT

Another no-hitter out of the ordinary was one recorded by J.A. Richand, pitching for the NL West all-stars, who set down the NL East 'stars by striking out 16 and not yielding a hit or walk. In fact, J.A. was perfect en route to a 5-0 victory. It was the first such pitching perfect for Thomas Johnson, North Dighton, MA, who also reported that it was the AL East all-stars who won his mini tournament. Other no-hitters:

\* Ken Kirk of Cambridge, MA, has witnessed four no-hitters in his 10 years of rollin' 'em, the latest by Vida Blue, '74 Oakland A's, who set down the '74 Dodgers in a World Series replay. Blue whiffed five, walked three and was never really threatened. up over the years by Kirk included those by Tommy John ['69 White Sox], Dizzy Dean of the '34 Cardinals and Tom Seaver of the '69 Mets. John, Other no-hitters chalked however, lost his pitching gem, 2-1, to the '69 Indians.

\* Using the 1978 cards (based on that season), Gaylord Perry notched hitter for manager Joe MacPhee's squad in a Halifax and District S-Da no-hitter M Baseball League game. Losing manager Jim Burke had a lineup featuring Jeff Burroughs, Ron Cey and Ron Leflore.

\* Frank Crapo, flint, MI, has been on the dice-rollin' end of four no-hitters, but calls the most recent one the most incredible of 'em all. John Johnson of Oakland and Buzz Capra locked in a pitcher's duel that saw neither allow a safety through seven innings. Finally, in the eighth, the A's collected a hit off the Atlanta hurler; but no runs and the game went extra innings. Johnson had a no-hitter through nine, but then gave up a hit in the 10th. He still wound up a 1-0 winner and with a one-hitter, prompting Crapo to marvel: "I've played a lot of rainy Sunday afternoon games, but never...a game like that. I'll never forget it!"
