New baseball cards have new look

Game company wants your reaction to changes

As everyone is probably aware, Strat-O-Matic has made some changes

As everyone is probably end, in the newest set of baseball cards.

"The batters' cards have been changed somewhat as far as patterns,"

"But on the pitchers' cards there's cards the cards there's ca says Harold Richman, creator of S-O-M. "But on the pitchers' cards there been a dramatic change. Now, everyone has the same pattern. A 4-4 is a home run chance on every pitcher's card, for example."

Richman adds that the groundball x and flyball x chances will still

vary on each pitcher's card, as in the past, and that the cards will all

be statistically correct.

"It will now be a lot easier to compare pitchers," explains Richman as to why such a change was made. "Many people new to the game didn't really understand, or pay much attention to pitchers' cards. Now, with all the hit possibilities in the four column everyone can quickly tell Now, with the better pitchers.

"People who have played the game a long time will be the most upset by what we've done," predicts Richman. "People usually dislike, or are afraid of change. But what we're asking is for everyone to give it a fair test--then respond to the changes. Don't play a game or two; but

rather play a number of games and then we would like to hear from you, through the Review."

Richman also mentioned that the change was not necessarily a permanent one. "If the response is unfavorable, we can always go back to the old patterns for pitchers."

It should also be noted that S-O-M is the only baseball table game that has both righty and lefty batting and pitching. Some game companies have the righty-lefty factor -- but only as it pertains to batters. Pitchers are not rated as to how they fared against both types of batters.

Looking at the card of Dennis Leonard (left), one has

a sample of what the new pitchers' cards look like. Notice that Leonard, who gave up 30 home

runs, is hit harder by right-handed batters (straight home run on 4-4, partial on 4-5) than he is by lefty swingers (4-4, 1-14).

But Leonard, who issued 80 walks, surrenders free passes much more frequently to left-handed hitters than he does to righties. Every pitcher has the so-called "bad" 4-column, with the hardest hit/or wildest also always to hit wolks. giving up hits/walks in the 5-column.

By checking the numbers in the 4-column and the hit probabilities for each as well as the type of hits, a gamer can easily tell the superior

ones from those likely to be shell-shocked after the batting bombardment.

The Review editors, Warren and Del Newell, have played a few games with the new cards--not enough to form an opinion one way or the other, however--and found the 4-column syndrome causing no consternation. dismay was when the opponent had the hot hand for rolling the 4-column when you were on defense.

Now, let the readers express their thoughts on the matter. Before you do, however, be sure and give the new cards a good test. Then, let us hear from you.

Baseball playing tip

Do-it-yourself clutch hitting

Baseball buffs desiring to incorporate clutch hitting into their dice-rolling endeavors may want to give the following playing tip a try. Proposed by Vinny DiGeronimo, and used in the AMNASOM, a play-by-mail league, clutch hitting is accomplished by use of a chart (below). The chart, as DiSeronimo, points out, can be used with the new cards and also the old. "Plus," he adds, "the good part about the chart is that it does not change the batting average of the good clutch hitters that

Ratings for what consists of a "clutch hitter" are still arbitrary, however, but it's assumed a gamer knows who they are otherwise he wouldn't

be interested in utilizing such a playing tip.

There are some obvious restrictions on its use: one being that at least one runner must be as far as second base for the chart to be in effect. A runner on first only? Then it's no go with the 'clutch' show.

Here's how the chart works: Rate all hitters as follows – GOOD, or

BAD (pinch-hitters are rated the same way). For a GOOD hitter, consult the chart on any flyball reading on the hitter's card and any flyball X off the pitcher's card. For a BAD hitter, consult the chart on any groundball C and also any flyball B. Make a flyball B reading for a BAD hitter automatically a strikeout.

Now for the chart: (roll three dice)

I would like to make what I feel is constructive criticism of the Review. I was a regular subscriber during the early years of the Review and have subscribed only sporadically over the last few years.

What amazes me is that little has changed in your magazine over the time it has been in existence. It is crammed full with lots of schlock--meaningless statistics on obscure replays, playing tips that very few people are interested in, pages of questions and answers which to me should be solely the responsibility of the game company, etc.

Perhaps kids love to wallow through stats, comparing them to their own; maybe an occasional playing tip is of some value; maybe some enjoy reading with a magnifying glass articles that are many times in the form of notes rather than sentences (league scene); maybe some enjoy five completely different games being covered in 24 pages; I don'tl

My suggestions are as follows:

(1) There should be two different magazines, one for baseball and one for the winter sports. If this would be too much of a burden for you, perhaps someone else could take over the other ond.

(2) All articles should be written in larger type, even if it means having less material in each issue. Advertising should be the only part that should be in small print.

(3) Playing tips and question and answer should be eliminated completely. Statistics should be kept at a minimum and should be presented in analytical form only, and only when pertinent to an article on a league.

(4) Increased emphasis should be given to letters to the editor, leagues around the country and other contributions by the readers. Anyone who has a constructive opinion on an issue should be given space as the exchange of ideas is very important. Leagues of all types (play-by-mail, solitaire and and group participation) should

have full-length articles (not just notes), with less emphasis on statistics and more on the league members, unique features the league and memorable happenings that occurred during the past season (more from a human nature point of view than simply a season roundup). Most importantly, you need to solicit quality, creative articles by readers. There have been some in the past but they are few and far between. The editors function should be more of a custodial one; i.e. directing rather than producina.

(5) Efforts should be made to make the magazine more physically appealing. There should be less typing errors, more creative headlines and better organization. Each section should be in a specific part of the magazine and should not be continued 10 pages later. A logical order would be editor's column, letters to the editor, league highlights and other reader's contributions, advertisements.

(6) Somehow the game company must be convinced to play a more active role on a monthly basis. If not a monthly column, perhaps at least highlights from their personnel that only they could offer.

The Review has the potent ial to be of interest to all Strat-O-Matic players rather than the comparatively small percentage of seven-day-a-week fanatics. However, it will take a major change in philosophy, new imagination, higher quality appearance, and most of all, the active participation of interested readers. Ed Grant

- The only other players who finished the season with the 1905 [1] ANSWER: Giants and did not receive cards were Offa Neal, John McGraw and Moonlight Graham, none of whom had a hit all McGraw and Moonlight Graham, none or whom had a hit all season. The only other player finishing the season with the 1906 Cubs was Bull Smith (one at-bat, as a pinch-hitter). Teams used less players then, obviously, especially pitchers. In Fact, if S-O-M had made the 1904 Red Sox, it could have had a maximum of only 16 cards.
- [2] ANSWER: Because of the smaller rosters, the 1905 Giants and 1906 Cubs both received cards for players who played all infield and outfield positions (Sammy Strang and Solly Hofman, respectively).
- [3] ANSWER: All pre-1920 S-O-M teams, except the 1905 Giants, have three catchers.
- [4] ANSWER: Tom Walsh of the 1906 Cubs holds records for fewest at-bats on an S-O-M card (1) and lowest average on an S-O-M card [.000]. He appeared that season in two games as a catcher and S-O-M leagues everywhere have fun at his expense ever since the game company put his name on its card stock.
- [5] ANSWER: The earliest great S-0-M subs were Ham Hyatt of the 1909 Pirates (Four triples in just 67 at-bats) and Jack Lapp, 1911 A's, who batted .353 in 167 at-bats.
- The great 1927 New York Yankees had Lou (Ironman) Gehrig rated at first base. Gehrig's real-life backup, Cedric Durst, did not receive a card from S-O-M. (6) ANSWER:

Baseball playing tip

Here's method of awarding defensive 'stars'

Almost no Strat-O-Matic gamers keep nor desire detailed fielding This is because of the huge amount of time required for such

tabulations. Most gamers simply record total errors only.

When it comes time to evaluate each fielder's contributions with the glove, most managers base their judgements solely on error totals or even worst, on reputations.

With all due respect to the "X" and Advanced Fielding Charts (which give an excellent reflection of a player's fielding ability), here is a simple playing idea which not only produces the chance for an outstanding defensive play and allows a manager to easily keep track of them, but gives us an added dimension by which to compare fielders' abilities.

Now for the playing tip: Now for the playing tip:
Wheneverthere is reading of flyball (X), groundball (X), or catcher's card (X), you follow S-O-M's rules to determine the actual outcome (hit, error, out, advancement, etc.), by drawing, or rolling a split number.
Besides finding the result by the corresponding number on the fielding chart, make note if the split number is a 19 or 20.

If the split number was a 19 or 20 and you were using the fielding action of a field-corrected 4 and 20 years would name on (4) "defensive

rating of a fielder rated 1 or 2, you would award one [1] "defensive star" to that player, thus making the assumption that this player made an extraordinary play on a tough chance.

you were using the fielding rating of a fielder rated 3 or 4, only a split number of 20 would indicate the accomplishment of a fine play and earn that player one [1] "defensive star."

If there were two outs, with runner(s) on base, and the split number was 19 or 20, you would award two (2) "defensive stars" to any player, regardless of fielding rating.

While this method is very basic, it does provide for a quick, but

fairly meaningful way to envision great sliding, tumbling, crashing, diving plays. It would also be easy to keep track of these "star" plays by recording small star symbols next to the player's name or in his error box on the scoresheet. This procedure would give a manager another way to evaluate a player's fielding worth by the number of big plays he has.

Forgetable moments in S-O-M gaming

Here are some moments, contributed by Dick Hunt of St. Johns, MI, that a gamer would just as soon forget when it comes to playing his favorite pastime:

* When people roll the white die to see where to look (batter or pitcher) and then finally, after what seems like an eternity, roll the red dice.

- * When calculator batteries die out at statistics time, and all the stores are closed.

L.A. outclasses Philly in NBA championship contest

Poof! 'Magic' makes 76ers disappear

Poof! Just like 'Magic,' the Philadelphia 76ers disappeared after only five games of the NBA playoffs.

In Strat-O-Matic's version of the 1979-80 final series, replayed by Review co-editor Del Newell, the Magic Man, Earvin Johnson, was again a sensation, particularly with his passing as L.A. shot down the 76ers in one less game than needed in real-life.

Of course, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Jamaal Wilkes gave Magic a little help--almost 50 points per-game worth! Jabbar led all scorers with a 26.8 average and also was the leading rebounder, averaging 14. Shooting, he was uncanny, connecting on 61 of 88 shots--most from inside, of course-for a deadly 69.3 percent mark.

Wilkes, after pouring in 32 in the opener, went on to average 21.6

Wilkes, after pouring in 32 in the opener, went on to average 21.6 (shooting 52.3 percent from the floor, 44-84) while Johnson averaged 18.2 and shot at a 50.6 percent clip (38-75). He also grabbed off 7.2 rebounds. And critics of Magic said he couldn't shoot well enough to make it big in the pros.

One deviation from real-life was that Jabbar, who sat out the sixth game because of an injury, played all five games. The series never got to a sixth game. Spencer Haywood, however, did not play at all, so the L.A. roster was reduced to nine players.

EARLY STRIKE KEY FOR L.A.

The pattern for the series was set in the opener when the Lakers roared out to a 40-22 lead after one quarter and coasted in with a 130-88 victory. It was a scene that would be repeated in games two and three: the Lakers jumping out to a quick lead and Philly futilely playing catchup ball thereafter.

Only in the Fourth game did the 76ers break from the pattern. In this one, L.A. lost three players on fouls, including Jabbar and Wilkes, and had a total of 36 fouls whistled on it. Philly led after one period, 35-31, and put the Lakers away with a 41-point burst in the final quarter, posting a runaway 136-100 win.

The fifth game was the closest of 'em all as L.A. had to score 70 points in the second half to pull out a 120-115 victory after trailing the majority of the game. It wasn't until the last three minutes that L.A. grabbed the lead for good.

THE DOCTOR OPERATES FOR 24.4

Philadelphia, although unable to match the passing wizardry of Magic [1-4 Dazzler, 5-6 Turnover] and Norm Nixon [1-3 Dazzler, 4-5 Percentage Shot, 6 Turnover], had its heroes, too. Julius Erving, the good doctor, operated like a surgeon throughout the series—despite being guarded by Wilkes—averaging 24.4 points. He had 31 in a vain attempt to stave off defeat in game five. Erving netted 53 percent of the 100 field goals he attempted

And Caldwell Jones, the lanky center-forward, matched Jabbar in rebounding with 70--14 per game--and Darryl Dawkins, the 76ers' Gargantuansized center, shot 50 percent, averaged 20.6 points and 9.8 rebounds. Guard play was spotty at best, however, for the 76ers and the floor shooting, except for game four, was always under 50 percent.

Here is a capsule summary of each playoff game: $\frac{\text{GAME 1}}{\text{GAME 1}} - \text{Lakers shot down Philly behind 64.7 percent accuracy in the first half, building a 71-48 advantage, and coasted to 130-88 win...L.A. meshed 33 of 51 shots in first half, 58 of 103 (56.3 percent) for game... wilkes had 32 points after 25-point first half, Jabbar 26 and Johnson 25...Jabbar led L.A. to 59-45 rebounding advantage with 18...Philly, which shot coolish 36.7 percent, was led by Erving's 26 points.$

GAME 2 - Fast start again was key for L.A. as it led 38-23 after one quarter and 71-52 at halftime...Lakers shot phenomenal 60.2 percent (53-88) from floor and sank 23 of 30 free throws...Jabbar had 27 points and 16 rebounds, Mark Landsberger 16 rebounds, while seven players cracked double

rebounds, wark Landsperger 15 repounds, while seven players cracked double figures scoring...Erving had 24, Maurice Cheeks 21 and Dawkins 20 for 76ers, who shot 43.6 percent [45-103]. Final: Los Angeles 129, Philly 109. GAME 3 - L.A. was up by 19--39-20--after one quarter and again game was all but over...76ers, surprisingly, did pull within two points twice in third quarter before being outscored 36-24 in final period and succumbing. 120-97....labbar had 32 points 42 in preping quarter, and pulled down

in third quarter before being outscored 36-24 in final period and succumbing, 12D-97...Jabbar had 32 points, 12 in opening quarter, and pulled down 17 rebounds, with Johnson chipping in with 22 points, Nixon 19...Dawkins had 20, Erving 19 and Caldwell Jones 15 rebounds for losers.

GAME 4 - 76ers erupted and dominated all facets of play...Dawkins had series-high 31 points, Erving 22, Caldwell Jones 20 to go with 13 rebounds as seven players scored in double figures en route to smashing 136-100 triumph...Philly shot 56.6 percent [51-90] and also paraded to free throw line. sinking 34 of 45 chances...Jabbar had 23 noints but only five in line, sinking 34 of 45 chances...Jabbar had 23 points but only five in second half before fouling out; Wilkes 18, all in first half.

GAME 5 - Philly's reprieve was short-lived, however, as L.A. shot 54.6 percent [53-97], outscored it 42-32 the last quarter and wrapped up the series, 120-115...Wilkes led L.A. with 27 points, 10 coming in the final period, Jabbar had 26, 12 in the last quarter during which the Lakers connected on 19 of 29 shots in the clutch... Erving poured in 31, 11 in the fourth, for Philly, which shot 49.5 percent (51-103); Dawkins had 20 and Caldwell Jones snatched a game-high 16 rebounds.

Most of his endeavors are of a solitaire kind, including a recent Tournament of Champions that pitted eight of the greatest S-O-M teams. Matchups included: 1972 Miami vs. 1971 Dallas, 1968 New York Jets vs. 1969 Kansas City, 1958 Baltimore vs. 1962 Green Bay and 1979 Pittsburgh vs. 1976 Dakland.

In the first game, the '72 Dolphins, unbeaten in real-life in 17 games, outpointed Dallas, 33-27, storming back from a 13-0 first-quarter deficit. Larry Csonka scored twice and rushed for 100 yards for the winhers.

The second game was decided when Mike Garrett of the Chiefs fumbled a punt on his own two in sudden-death overtime and Emerson Boozer scored from a yard out for a 32-26 victory by the Jets. Joe Namath completed 19 of 35 passes for 282 yards for the Jets, while Otis Taylor had eight receptions for 197 yards for K.C. The third contest was, well, no contest as 1958 Baltimore ran over Green Bay, 34-9. Alan Ameche rushed for 143 yards in 21 carries for the Colts, who held Jim Taylor to only 45 yards overland. A 40-yard touchdown pass from Terry Bradshaw to Lynn Swann gave Pittsburgh a thrilling 21-17 win over Oakland in the last first-round game. Bradshaw passed for 263 yards and hit game-winning strike with two minutes left. John Stallworth had eight catches for 161 yards for the victors.

In the semifinals, '72 Miami rolled over the Jets, 37-17, as Csonka again thundered to over 100 yards (165 in 20 carries) and the Dolphins amassed 239. Namath completed 20 of 32 passes for 262 yards. The other semfinal was much closer, with Pittsburgh edging Baltimore, 31-28, in what might be considered a mild upset. Bradshaw was sensational-plus, racking up 407 yards and completing 22 of 30 passes--Stallworth catching 10 throws for 190 yards, Swann six for 159. Lenny Moore rushed for 179 yards in only nine carries for the Colts, who missed a 30-yard field goal as time expired.

The final matched '79 Pittsburgh and '72 Miami. And, as might have been expected, a defensive struggle resulted. Miami, which led 10-3 at halftime, pulled out a 16-10 victory and became the 'greatest' of the great. Csonka got only 36 yards in 20 attempts, but Miami's defense was the key as it shut the Steelers down with only 75 yards rushing and limited Bradshaw to 147 passing (8-20).

Finally, in the top of the 23rd. ageless Willie McCovey slapped a two-out single that scored Bill North, giving the Giants a hard-earned 2-1 marathon win...Strat-O-Matic Fanatic I-shirts aren't as popular as yellow ribbons but they do serve as calling cards to other gamers. John M. 1979 ALL-STARS REPLAY - Greg Crouse, Cuyahoga Falls, OH, conducted a unique replay whereby he he selected a 25-player all-star team from the 1979 cards (everyone was represented except for the White Sox) and played it 162 games against the other '79 teams and 81 regular teams from 1971-1978...Advanced game was used and players were limited to real-life at-bats and innings pitched...All-Stars, not surprisingly, won 138 and lost only 24 games...Two personal firsts for Crouse were: Dave Kingman of the 'Stars hitting four home runs in a row against '72 Oakland and J.R. Pittsburgh won the next two, 7-6 and 3-2, as Clemente's double in the 13th inning broke up game two and Bob Robertson's two-run homer decided three...Then it was Baltimore's turn--winning game four, 5-2, as Jim Palmer tossed a two-hitter, and game five, 7-5, as Andy Etchebarren clouted two homers for the Orioles and Robertson two for the Bucs...Clemente had five hits in six at-bats, Hebner a double, triple and home run in game six, won by the Bucs, 8-5.

1977 AMERICAN LEAGUE REPLAY - The Texas Rangers, with the best team "on paper" according to many baseball folks, broke with their real-life tradition of sub-par performances by winning a replay of the 1977 season that was conducted by Mike Ryan, Norwood, MA...Project took two years for Ryan, who was attending graduate school for journalism at Boston University, to complete...The Rangers got their man, er championship, this time as the big four rotation of Bert Blyleven (20), Doyle Alexander (21), Gaylord Perry (19) and Dock Ellis (17) won 77 of the team's 102 victories...Boston, sparked by ageless Carl Yastrzemski, the league's MVP after hitting 35 homers, batting .326 and driving in 111 runs, won the East by one game over New York. Boston's belters unloaded 222 home runs and batted .285...All told, A.L. sluggers crashed 2,094 homers, with 18 hitting 30 or more. Eight had 200 or more hits, the collective batting average was .270, with 15 hitting .300 or more, while 15 drove in 100 or more runs...Conversely, only three pitchers had an ERA under 3.00 and the average was a balloon-like 4.34...Other highlights/lowlights included: Four Boston players--Yastrzemski, Jim Rice, Butch Hobson and George Scott--belted 30 or more homers; Cleveland was a surprising third in the East, thanks mainly to Wayne Garland winning 23 games, Jim Bibby 22 and Andre Thornton's 33 home runs; Detroit had plenty of hitting (Jason Thompson, 37 HRs, 126 RBI; Ron Leflore, 236 hits, .346; Rusty Staub, 31 HRs, .344) but little pitching; Milwaukee suffered as Moose Haas (23) and Jim Slaton (22) lost over 20 games each; Dennis Leonard of Kansas City was Cy Young winner with 23 wins, 333 innings, 252 strikeouts, seven shutouts and 28 complete games; Rod Carew led in hitting, batting 'only' .377 (compared to .388 real-life), while teammate Lyman Bostock hit .363; Oscar Gamble of White Sox had 25 homers, 104 RBI--as a platooner--while Lee Stanton of Seattle won home run crown with 38.


