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### New baseball cards have arrived

Editor's note: Jeff Green, the author of the article dealing with the new baseball cards, is a member of the GKSM (Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League) as well as a veteran of play-by-mail leagues. He's another of the legion of S-O-M Baseball devotees who's a student of the cards.

Dale Murphy, last year's MVP, probably has the best all-around card for a hitter in the 1983 baseball set. He has 13 home run chances (card chances) against lefties and he also roughs up righties. In addition he's a "1" at all three outfield positions, has a -3 throwing arm and is an "A" stealer. That's what MVPs are made out of.

Atlanta, of course, has Bob Horner, the slugging third baseman. But it also has, in Gene Garber and Steve Bedrosian, an awesome 1-2 punch in the bullpen.

Pedro Guerrero of the Dodgers has a very strong card, with home run chances at 1-5, 1-6 and 1-7 (1-6) versus lefties and almost as good of power against righties. Guerrero is also an "A" stealer, one of three the Dodgers possess (Steve Sax and Ken Landreaux are the others).

The Los Angeles infield, together for so many years, has lost a step, however. Steve Garvey is still a "1" at first base, but Ron Cey (3b) and Bill Russell (ss) are "4s" and Davey Lopes was traded to Oakland.

Joe Morgan, 39-year-old oldie but goodie, apparently has found the

fountain of youth as he's an "A" stealer with hits and walks all over his card.

San Diego has probably the best young pitching arms in the bigs in Tim Lollar, Eric Show, Luis DeLeon and Dave Dravecky. Best cards overall for hurlers in the N.L. belong to Mario Soto, Joe Niekro, Steve Rogers, Steve Carlton, Fernando Valenzuela and Joaquin Andujar.

#### CARDS WON WITH DEFENSE

St. Louis had the best overall defense as Keith Hernandez at first and Ozzie Smith at shortstop are "1s" and there are "2s" at second, third, center and right field.

As far as lefty killers, Mike Schmidt (as usual) and Tim Wallach of Montreal are both murder. Schmidt has 16 home run chances against southpaws, Wallach 14. And they're not bad against righties, either.

Gary Carter, Tony Pena, Lance Parrish, Mike Heath, Rick Dempsey and Buck Martinez are all -3 throwing catchers. But Bob Boone of California tops them all, possessing a -4 rifle.

At shortstop, Dave Concepcion, another oldie but goodie, is still a "1" but Larry Bowa continues to tumble, being rated a "3".

Dave Kingman has a typical, well, typical Dave Kingman card. He has 15 home run chances versus lefties and 10 against righties, with strikeouts sprinkled all over.

Milwaukee, as everyone knows, has an awesome lineup. But California isn't far behind. Its lineup features Reggie Jackson, Doug DeCinces, Brian Downing, Fred Lynn, Don Baylor, Rod Carew and Bob Grich--not an easy out among them.

#### WATCH RICKEY RUN...RUN...RUN

Rickey Henderson of the A's is a triple-A stealer and a "1" in left field. He has 42 on-base chances versus lefties, 56 against righties, all of which enhance his chances to steal bases. Oakland has three other 'routine' A's in Dwayne Murphy, Lopes and sub Jimmy Sexton. Tony Armas is a "2" in right field otherwise Oakland would have again had an all-1 outfield.

If you're looking for pitchers to draft in the American League, steer clear of Minnesota's staff. All serve 'em up.

If you're looking for one player to build a team around, however, Robin Yount of Milwaukee is your man. He's a "1" at shortstop and a good hitter.

Cal Ripken Jr. is the best, in my opinion, of many fine rookies as he has 1-7, 1-8 home run chances versus lefties and is a "2" at third and "3" at short. Other rookies worth drafting high are Tom Brunansky of the Twins, Wade Boggs of Boston, Ryne Sandberg of the Chicago Cubs and Chili Davis of the Giants.

#### DWIGHT EVANS ANOTHER 'FRANCHISE' PLAYER

Dwight Evans of Boston is another you can build a team around, like Yount. He has a whopping 56 chances to get on base against lefties and 49 versus righties. Not only that, but he is a "1" in right field and has a -5 throwing arm.

Goose Gossage is probably the best fireman as he has strikeouts up and down his card and doesn't allow many hits. He has a much better card than Bruce Sutter, who was so effective in the World Series for the Cards.

The best of the American League's starting pitchers are Dave Stieb, Rick Sutcliffe, Jim Palmer, Jack Morris, Dan Petry and Len Barker. Don't trade, or draft high, Cy Young Award winner Pete Vuckovich, however. His card has a lot of "land mines" on it.

Check out Pittsburgh, too, while you're at it. Notice it has two AAs in Omar Moreno and Lee Lacy. Also notice how most of the Pittsburgh hitters struggle against lefties and how few times (percentage-wise) they batted against southpaws.

Remember Tim Lincecum, the AAA of last year's card set? Well, he's still got a good rating, being a AA.

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## Bostock Memorial July 16-17

The word is out early--there will be a third Lyman Bostock Memorial Tournament. It will again be sponsored by James Sanders, the policeman from Gary, IN, trophies will again be donated by the Strat-U-Matic Game Company, it will again be in the summer...but the site has been moved from Gary south to Hobart, IN.

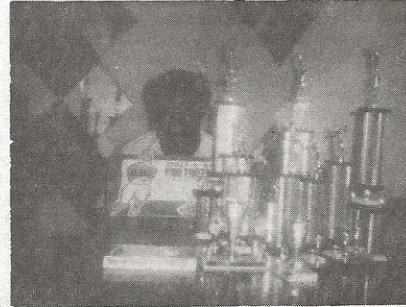
Date for the third annual gathering will be the weekend of July 16-17. And the site switch will be to The Gary Works Supervisory Club in Hobart (County K Road).

Cost to the participants will be \$8.50, which will cover all the costs of the tournament. The tournament schedule calls for five events to be staged: advanced baseball and basketball, super advanced hockey and football and elementary baseball.

Actual teams will again be used, with teams chosen on a first-apply, first-choice basis. Mini leagues will be played on Saturday, opening day of the tournaments, with playoff and championship games on Sunday.

The elementary baseball tourney will be a backup for those who are eliminated on Saturday. Sanders also mentions that the hockey and basketball tourneys will depend on the number of gamers, as far as format and duration.

As far as the trophies, they're again first-class all the way. [see photo]. "My first year the trophies were great," says Sanders, "last year's were better and this year's are bigger and nicer than ever. Some of the winning trophies are over 28 inches tall."



Trophies will again go to the winners and runnersup in each tourney. Last year's winners, most of whom will be back to defend their championships, were: Gary Peck [super advanced football], Steve Poricini [advanced baseball], Steve Dull [super advanced hockey] and Jeff Jenkins [elementary baseball]. As you can see, a fifth tournament--basketball--has been added this year.

"My goal is to draw at least 100 people," continues Sanders, who feels the change in location should boost attendance considerably. He also hopes getting the word out early will help gamers as they plan their summer itinerary.

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SORRY ABOUT THAT...

I've been meaning to write to you for well, about four months now, and the reality of my subscription ending has given me the extra 'urge' to do so.

I am embarrassed and sorry for the difficulties with my e-rating system and am very pleased with the way it was handled. I discovered the statistical 'lapses' in Baseball Digest about three weeks before I received your November issue [with Wayne Hedenschoug's excellent critique] and actually was hoping that someone else had spotted the error I made, and you had stopped printing the information, as it wasn't accurate.

Let me add, by the way, that we are talking about a total of "only" 74 players who played more than one position in all the old-timer cards.

I was in the middle of revising the ratings to reflect the one position listed in BBE (and try to compile, from immediate, past and future years of each player, 'substitute' ratings for the other positions) when I happily received your November issue.

Anyway, if any of your readers (including Strat-O-Matic), have the official league stats for the old-timer teams, I will be more than willing to do the calculations. If anyone else is doing similar calculations, it must be pointed out that accuracy will still be affected with players such as Ted Williams, who in 1956 played 110 games in the outfield, made five errors, and was given an e9 by S-O-M -- obviously, as any baseball fan knows, because Williams rarely finished games and was usually taken out in the late innings for defense.

#### DON'T LIMIT GRETZKY

In reply to the letter by Carl Loerbs and his ideas concerning hockey trends (Jan., Review), I think his statements are totally in the wrong. In particular, his rules limiting Gretzky to one line shift per period are ridiculous.

I feel that I am very qualified to speak about the sport of hockey. I have played S-O-M Hockey since its inception. I am a member of the THMHL II, now in its third year of play. I have won the championship both years. I am the commissioner of the Federal Hockey League and, living in the Detroit area, I see many hockey games via cable and free T.V.

Wayne Gretzky would never score a record 92 goals or record 120 assists if he played only one line shift per period. One of the reasons "The Great One" scores at such an unbelievable rate is that he gets much more ice time than any other player in the NHL (38 minutes, according to an article in Sports Illustrated).

How many cards is 38 minutes in an S-O-M Hockey game? There are three cards for every two minutes in a game (each card is 40 seconds). So, 38 minutes is 57 cards per game. That's what Gretzky should play.

If you played Gretzky the proper way (1st and 4th line, with the Oilers using four lines) he would play 15 cards per period from his two shifts, or a total

of 45 cards per game. Plus he would play about two power plays and kill about two penalties per game. At three cards per power play or short-handed situation, that's 12 or more cards, or a total of 57 cards, which is the accepted value for Gretzky as stated earlier.

I think S-O-M did a remarkable job creating a very realistic card. If you play him on two shifts like S-O-M and I recommend, you will come out with almost exactly 92 goals and 120 assists.

Also, Mr. Loerbs' rule about "2 consecutive calendar days means that you must start a different goalie on the second day" would apply to most teams. But for teams like Pittsburgh (Dion), St. Louis (Liut) and Vancouver (Brodeur), the starting goalie should still be able to start two straight games.

#### PASSING FEATURES EXAMINED

I'd like to comment on the passing features of the basketball and hockey games.

In the ice hockey game, once a player reaches about 45 to 50 assists, he is no better at setting up plays than a player who has 120 assists. By the same token defensemen such as Lee Fogolin, Ken Morrow and Ed Kea, to name a few, cough up the puck regularly for scoring chances. Why? Just because they don't get a lot of assists.

In the basketball game, however, every assist you get in real-life gives you a better chance for an open position shot or dazzler. In S-O-M, one key feature of the game is the ability of players such as Jamaal Wilkes, George Gervin and Tree Rollins to get the ball to a teammate without throwing the ball away. Even though they don't make the great pass to set up a basket, they don't make a bad pass costing a turnover.

Also, a comment on hockey's split deck (action): How about letting the defensemen have a chance at about 65 to 70 percent of the rebound chances. Instead of defense LW if a 3, if not opponent has reb. shot, how about Defense LD if a 2, if not off. LW has reb. shot?

# Much more to '61 than 61 homers

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## Newest past baseball season should be smashing success

SIXTY-ONE in 1961!

That's what the 1961 baseball season has always and will always be known for -- the year Roger Maris hit 61 home runs!

But as those who have already received Strat-O-Matic's newest card set are well aware, there's much more to '61 than 61 homers.

The power-laden New York Yankees had Mickey Mantle (54 homers), too, plus a bevy of other long-ball belters. Even though the Yankee pitching, outside of Whitey Ford, wasn't Hall of Fame caliber, the hitting prowess carried the team to a whopping 109 victories.

Ford, as a check of the 1961 cards reveals, is hard to hit by left-handed batters, the same side he threw from. Making the pitching staff more effective was the presence of three "1s" in Bobby Richardson (28), Cleve Boyer (38) and Elston Howard, a catcher with a -4 throwing arm. Five of the Yankees hit 20 or more homers, with John Blanchard, part-time player and pinch-hitter deluxe, almost as devastating as the "M & M" duo. Blanchard has home run chances on 1-5, 1-6 and 1-7 (1-17) against right-handed pitchers.

Certainly everyone who is into card chances has checked out Maris' home run chances. But, also take a long look at Mantle's card, especially against righties. He sends 'em out on 2-5, 2-6, 2-7 (1-13) and 3-6. And Mantle is a "1" in center field, giving the Yankees a total of four regulars with the esteemed rating.

Maris and Mantle both have cannons for arms, too, as each is rated a -3.

### 1961 GOOD SUCCESSOR TO 1956 SEASON

In many ways the 1961 season is similar to 1956, the first season S-U-M came out with in its ventures into past years. Again both the hitting and pitching are strong, there are plenty of defensive giants and there's speed, personified by 10 "A" stealers, including one AA, Luis Aparicio of the Chicago White Sox, who led the major leagues with 53.

The year 1961 also saw expansion as the American League expanded to 10 teams with the creation of the Los Angeles Angels and another team being put in Washington, replacing the former team that had pulled out and migrated to Minneapolis-St. Paul and was now called the Minnesota Twins.

The 1961 also, of course, was the year before S-U-M came out with its first full set of baseball cards. The 1962 season was the first to include all teams, whereas the two years previous contained all-star or only certain teams.

### DON'T FORGET CINCINNATI IN THE N.L.

Everyone who has been on this planet for long, including E.T., is familiar with the Yankees and Maris in 1961. But a lot of folks probably don't remember that it was Cincinnati--not San Francisco or Los Angeles--that captured the National League pennant.

The Reds, although not possessing the awesome power of '56, still had four players with 20 or more homers. Frank Robinson had a super card, highlighted by 37 homers, while center fielder Vada Pinson (a "1") was second in batting with a .343 average. Robinson, against righties, stroked homers on 2-5, 2-6 (1-13) and 3-6.

The most devastating card, however, belongs to Wally Post. He batted only 282 times, but he homered on 20 occasions. S-U-M rewarded him by placing home runs, against southpaws, on 2-8, 2-9, 2-10 and 3-7 (1-8).

Many of today's managers were playing in the 1961 season. Whitey Herzog of St. Louis and his World Series rival, Harvey Kuenn of Milwaukee, were with Baltimore and the San Francisco Giants, respectively. Kuenn, in the twilight of his career, batted .265 for the Giants.

On this page and the following are some other observations after a cursory check of the 1961 S-U-M Baseball card set:

\* The Detroit Tigers are almost the equal of the New York Yankees,



although not having the fielding and down-the-lineup power. Rocky Colavito batters righties, having home runs on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 (1-9), while Norm Cash, a lefty swinger who led the A.L. in hitting, has home run chances against righties on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 (1-8) plus an all-around great card. Detroit also has two "A" stealers--Jake Wood and Billy Bruton--and two rifles in the outfield in Colavito (-5) and Al Kaline (-4). Southpaw Don Mossi is tough to hit overall, but he does swerve 'em up to left-handed batters on 6-4, 6-5, 6-6 (1-6).

\* Chicago White Sox have two "1s" in center fielder Jim Landis and Aparicio at shortstop. Landis is also an "A" stealer. Southpaw Juan Pizarro, who struck out 188 in 195 innings in real-life, has 44 "K" chances (out of 108) when facing lefties.

\* Baltimore, third-place finisher behind the Yankees and Detroit, has Hall-of-Fame third baseman Brooks Robinson ("1 e14"). Jim Gentile (46 homers) has a great card with long-ball chances on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 (1-16) against righties. Jackie Brandt is a "1" left fielder but a "2" in center or right. Check out the walk chances on Chuck Estrada and Steve Barber's cards. Ouch!

\* Kansas City's lineup includes Dick Howser, manager of the Kansas City Royals today, who was an "A" stealer at the time.

\* Carl Yastrzemski was in his rookie season with Boston in '61, batting .266 with 11 homers. The Red Sox also had towering (he was 6-foot-8) Gene Conley, who as a right-handed pitcher had home runs on 3-5, 3-6 and 4-8 (1-2).

\* Jimmy Piersall, the volatile and vitriolic outfielder turned announcer, had a great season for Cleveland. He was rated "1" in center field, with an "e4" error ranking, plus batted .322. Cleveland also had another "1" in first baseman Vic Power. Willie Kirkland, equipped with a -3 throwing arm in right field, has a strange batting card. A southpaw swinger, he has almost no power against lefties, but against right-handers he homers on 3-2, 3-3, 3-4, 3-5 (1-10).

\* Diminutive Albie Pearson, 5-5, has 28 walk chances versus righties. He and first baseman Steve Bilko [home run chances on 1-8, 1-9, 2-8 (1-18), 3-6 against lefties] have the most interesting cards for the expansionist Angels.

\* Chuck Cottier, although he bats only 344 times, is rated a "1" at second with Washington. Cottier is also a "2" at short--but with an e48 rating.

\* Minnesota has Billy Martin in its infield and another big league manager in Joe Altobelli. The Twins also have some excellent fielding [catcher Earl Battley, -3 throwing, "1"] and outfielder Bill Tuttle ("1"). Right-handed slugger Harmon Killebrew homers against lefties on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 and 1-10 (1-12).

\* Over in the N.L., the Los Angeles Dodgers have some interesting cards: Sandy Koufax, 44 strikeout chances against lefty batters; Johnny Podres, 18-5 record but home runs on 1-9 (1-18) and 1-10 against batters who hit the same side he pitches from; Frank Howard, a 4 e16 at every outfield position but yet with a -2 throwing arm, and John Roseboro, a "1" catcher with a great slugging card against lefties but with a 1-16 "E" rating.

\* Roberto Clemente, of course, has a super card, with 48 hit chances against righties and almost the same number against southpaws. He's also a "1" with a -6 throwing arm in right field, the best arm in the 1961 card set. Dick Stuart, "Dr. Strangelove," is a terrible fielder (1b4 e25) but a terrific power hitter against southpaws.

\* Milwaukee has Hank Aaron, who tears lefties apart, a "1" at short in Roy McMillan, Ed Mathews, who also works lefties over good despite swinging from the same side (2-5, 2-6 (1-16) and 3-6 home run chances) and Warren Spahn, who handles righties better despite being a southpaw hurler. Charlie Lau, famed batting coach, also played with the Braves. He batted .207.

\* San Francisco, third-place finisher in the N.L. behind Cincinnati and L.A., also packed plenty of power in Willie Mays and Orlando Cepeda.

## Jerry Dattilo reigns as hockey king<sup>18</sup>

Jerry Dattilo, a 16-year-old gamer from Philadelphia, PA, reigns as king of the 1981-82 Hockey Challenge Tournament and is \$60 wealthier because of his feat.

Dattilo, guiding the 1980-81 Quebec Nordiques and '80-81 New York Rangers in Larry King's first national hockey tournament, defeated John McDonough of Jackson Heights in the finals to capture the championship and the \$60 that went to the winner. McDonough, who lives in New York state, won \$30 for finishing second.

King, commissioner of the well-known Empire State S-O-M Baseball League, gave out \$120 in prize money to the four semifinalists. Results of the tournament have been found in the Review's Scoreboard section, with the second and third-round results in the November, 1982 issue.

King, who makes his home in Forest Hills, NY, also reported that the 1982-83 Hockey Challenge Tournament is starting Wed., Feb. 23, and that results will again be sent to the Review as he plays the games.

Now for the finals of the 1981-82 tournament, pitting McDonough's 1979-80 New York Islanders and 1979-80 Edmonton Oilers against Dattilo's tandem of 1980-81 Quebec and '80-81 Rangers. Remember, when coaches choose teams they couldn't exceed a combined 160 points.

The first three games pitted Quebec (78 points) against the Islanders (91 points).

In the opener, Quebec scored the first four goals for an easy 4-2 victory. In the second, however, Butch Goring's four goals, including a short-handed tally (Anders Kallur also had a short-handed goal), gave the Islanders a 6-4 victory. The third game was a 5-5 deadlock so the two finalists were tied going into the final four games, which matched the 80-81 Rangers (74 points) against Edmonton (69).

The crucial series opened with the Rangers, trailing 4-0 and 5-1, rallying for a 5-5 stalemate. Three power play goals by the Rangers decided game five of the championship series, 4-2.

Edmonton extended the series to a seventh game by scoring five consecutive goals, overcoming a 4-2 deficit, and raking the Rangers, 7-4. Wayne Gretzky scored twice for Edmonton and Eddie Johnstone duplicated that for the Rangers.

Nordiques goalie Dan Bouchard was the hero of the finale as he turned aside 13 of 14 shots in the third period to protect a Quebec lead that ended up in a 4-3 win over the Islanders. Michel Goulet's goal proved to be the game, and tournament, winner.

King, because of the deadlock after six games, had gone back to the first two teams--Quebec and the New York Islanders--for the decisive game.

Semifinalists in the tournament and also money-winners were Irwin Steinberg, Brooklyn, NY (1979-80 New York Islanders/1979-80 Edmonton) and Robert Scott, Bossier City, LA (1980-81 St. Louis/1979-80 Winnipeg). Scott, with 28 points in the tourney, finished third and won \$20, while Steinberg, 23 points, received a check for \$10 for fourth place.

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## Expanding NAHA completes third season

Most play-by-mail leagues leap onto the Strat-O-Matic scene...and then plummet out of sight almost as quickly as they appeared.

There are some exceptions, of course, with one of the most notable being the North American Hockey Association, which recently completed its third full season and expansion from 10 to 14 teams.

Co-commissioners Dave Oldham of Newark, DE, and Harold Coleman, Bear, DE, were stabilizing influences and had a lot to do with the league's success. The NAHA initially played a 44-game season...then 56 its second year and finally for its third campaign went 70 games. The growth in number of games and lineup of coaches is proof that the NAHA is here to stay as one of the few successful PBM hockey leagues.

The league holds an annual draft and each team is allowed 26 skaters, 4 goalies and 5 inactive players. Only 18 skaters and 2 goalies can dress for each game, however.

Winner of the NAHA's third season was Louis Ferrara of Newark, DE, who took over for a departed coach in mid-season and directed the newly-named Newark Steamer to a championship. The Steamer's main source of firepower was in the form of a trio of 100-point-plus scorers: Marcel Dionne, 129; Dave Babych, 111; and Darryl Sittler, 101. Overtime was also a Steamer specialty as Ferrara's Mr. Clutch Squad was 4-0 in overtime playoff games.

Wayne Gretzky was, of course, the regular-season scoring king, producing 70 goals and 66 assists for the expansionist Minnesota Lynx (coach: Lonnie Whitehead, Amboy, MN). Other outstanding individual performances were turned in by Charlie Simmer, who had 81 goals in only 63 games; Mike Bossy, who had a second-best total of 74 goals; Bobby Smith, who led with 89 assists; Wulf Paielement, with 21 power-play goals; Bob Bourne, 12 short-handed goals; Peter Peeters, 2.53 GAA; and Simmer, who had 14 game-winning goals.

The NAHA also featured a newsletter, entitled the "NAHA News," with its final issue chronicling the playoffs and the season's highlights.

Some team highlights included Joe Paldino's Brooklyn Assassins allowing a league-low 189 goals (2.49 GAA); brother Tony Paldino having the highest scoring team (351 goals; 4.62 average) while guiding last year's league champions, the Brooklyn Kingsmen, from afar as Tony was stationed in Germany while serving in the army. Junu Kim, who annually supplies the Review with most frequently used power-play and penalty-killing lines, was also a member of the NAHA, guiding the expansionist Northern Illinois Maple Leafs.

The other expansion teams were, in addition to the Gretzky-led Minnesota Lynx and the Maple Leafs, Kurt Smeby's Las Vegas Polar Bears and the Calumet Cardinals, coached by Duane Lyons, Highland, IN.

In the playoffs, the Steamer chugged past the defending champ Kingsmen, 4-1, in the semifinals, and then disposed of the Delmarva Voyageurs, coached by Oldham, in the championship series, 4-2. Lance Nethery's goal two minutes into overtime gave the Steamer the first game, 5-4. The Voyageurs evened the series at a game apiece by winning 5-3. But then the Steamer romped 8-6 and 5-3 in games three and four, with Dionne's hat trick--his only goals of the finals--deciding game four.

The Voyageurs kept their flickering hopes alive by winning game five, 4-1, but Sittler's goal early in overtime snapped a 2-2 deadlock and gave the Steamer the series in game six.

But that was it as the Suns were obliterated in the next four games, losing by scores of 107-105, 110-108, 112-105 and 127-113...Kevin McHale was the hero of the second game for the Celtics, scoring 19 points in only 18 minutes of playing time...McHale was also indomitable in game three, scoring 25 points, grabbing 14 rebounds and blocking six shots as Boston outboarded the Suns, 63-43...Larry Bird--remember him?--rang up 30 points and had 14 rebounds and 7 assists in game four, while Robert Parish totaled 27 points and 17 rebounds. Dennis Johnson led the Suns with 30 points...Boston clinched it in game five as Bird scored 25, Parish 23...In the Eastern finals, Boston swept Philadelphia in four straight, while in the Western showdown it was Phoenix surprising Houston, 4-2...First-round playoff results: Boston d. Milwaukee, 4-1; Philadelphia d. Detroit, 4-0; Phoenix d. Kansas City, 4-3; Houston d. San Antonio, 4-2.

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1972 DETROIT TIGERS REPLAY - Nick Saidoo, II, of Flint, MI, was on the dice-rollin' end of a 155-game schedule [due to baseball strike at start of season]...Playing the basic version, Saidoo couldn't guide the Tigers to a division title as Billy Martin did, instead finishing four games behind Boston and in second place...Four straight losses at the end of the season squelched Detroit's playoff hopes...Tom Timmerman, although inconsistent most of season, had seven shutouts. Tiger pitching delivered a 3.17 ERA, but only three hurlers had winning records...Al Kaline (.307) was the only regular to bat over .300...Injuries devastated Detroit as Mickey Stanley, Jim Northrup and Dick McAuliffe all were sidelined for key games down stretch.

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FACE-TO-FACE FOOTBALL REPLAY - The new penalty system was incorporated into a full-season replay conducted by Tom Tigges, Dale Wiederholt, Dean Brown, Arnie Fritsch and Steve Olson, all of Dubuque, IA...Olson said realism was increased but that an offshoot of new timing system was that 25 of 28 teams had to go over in attempts...San Diego scored a whopping 626 points and Philadelphia had the best record, 15-1, and allowed the fewest points, 338.
