New cards arrive...finally Myriad of problems delays 1984 set

Better late than never...

That, in summation, is the bottom line when it comes to the 1984 Strat-O-Matic Baseball card set, based on the 1983 real-life season.

True, the cards were the latest they've ever been. But they did eventually arrive, aftera myriad of problems slowed and pushed back their departure from the game company at Glen Head, NY, by almost two full weeks.

weeks.

"This is unlikely to happen again," says Steve Barkan, a game company spokesman. "Putting out three sets of cards (including the 1970 and 1930 seasons) may have had something to do with it. But the fault also was due to our receiving some advanced-game statistics late. That was the main reason the cards were late."

Jeff Green, a member of the GKSML (Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League, whose managerial roster includes Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell) as well as PBM leagues, quickly looked over the new cards and passed word on to the Review of his findings.

Green, who's a student of the S-O-M cards, inspected the cards with a view toward drafting for the GKSML or his PBM endeavors. "The best rookies to take chances on," according to Green, "are Ron Kittle, Julio Franco, Matt Young, Mike Boddicker, Jose DeLeon, Charlie Hudson, Bill (continued on next page)

Dawley, Frank DiPino, Darrell Strawberry, Andy VanSlyke, Alejandro Pena and Carlos Diaz."

As far as leagues forming initially, Green suggests the following starters when forming a pitching staff: Lamarr Hoyt, Jack Morris, Scott McGregor, Ron Guidry, Dave Stieb, Floyd Bannister, Mario Soto, Steve Rogers, Bill Gullickson, John Denny, Bob Welch, Larry McWilliams and John Candelaria.

And when you need to turn to relief, the best cards belong to Dan Quisenberrry, Jesse Orosco, Tom Niedenfuer, Lee Smith, Al Holland, Luis DeLeon and Tippy Martinez.

When it comes to individual teams, Green's most impressed by the Detroit Tiger defense and Toronto's new-found hitting punch.

"The Tigers, with 1s at catcher in Lance Parrish, second (Lou Whitaker), shortstop (Alam Trammell) and center field (Chet Lemon), are reminiscent of the Cincinnati Reds in the mid-1970s when they had Bench, Concepcion, Morgan and Geronimo. Not only can the Tiger foursome field, it can also hit.

"Trammell is a 52 (card chances) to get on against lefties and 46 versus righties. Whitaker is a 45 versus lefties and 44 versus righties. Parrish, while not possessing a very good on-base card, does have a 1-7 home run and a -3 throwing arm. Lemon is a 42 both ways to get on and also has nine chances each way to get on by a HBP."

TORONTO'S TERRIFIC TRIO

Toronto, usually a weak sister when it comes to batting punch, will have a number of lively bats in the new card set. Jesse Barfield, for example, has 13 home run chances vs. righties and 10 vs. lefties. Willie Upshaw has a 1-8 and 1-9 (1-16) home run shot against righties plus also having 45 on-base chances against southpaws.

Lloyd Moseby also had a good year, with his card showing 47 on-base chances vs. righties, a 3-6 home run shot and also being a "2" in center field. Cliff Johnson and Barry Bonnell, plus spray-hitting Damaso Garcia, add more offensive weapons.

Wade Boggs has a spectacular card vs. righties, with 62 - yes, 62! - on-base chances plus a lot of extra-base potential. Jim Rice, Boggs' teammate, has another dynamite power card with 2-5, 3-6 home run chances against both types of pitching. Rice is also rated a "2" in left field, making him even more valuable.

George Brett, his card perhaps tainted by "pine tar," and Willie Aikens have solid slugging cards for Kansas City. Brett belts them out against righties on 1-5, 1-6 and 1-7 [1-2] and Aikens does likewise on 1-8, 1-9 and 3-5 [1-9].

Dave Winfield of the Yankees is a "1" in left and right field and has another rifle arm (-5]. He's also a 39 both ways as far as getting on base and has 2-9 and 2-10 home run numbers, again vs. righties or southnews.

Elsewhere in the American League, Eddie Murray and Cal Ripken form a great one-two punch for the world champion Baltimore Orioles. Murray has a 2-5 (1-17) and 3-6 home run numbers both ways. Ripken, a "2" at shortstop, is a 44 vs. lefties and 46 vs. righties to get on base.

Rod Carew will tatto righties, with 52 on-base chances, most of 'em hits, while Oakland's Ricky Henderson has 51 on-base chances vs. southpaws and 55 vs. righties. He is also once again an AAA stealer and a "1" in left field.

MURPHY MURDERS RIGHTIES

Dale Murphy, as expected, has a great card against righties, with home runs on 1-5, 1-6 and 1-7 (1-7). He has 56 on-base chances. But Murphy is a mere mortal against lefties. Bob Horner again is a power hitter deluxe, with 2-5 and 3-6 chances vs. lefties and 51 on-base card chances against righties.

Keith Moreland works over lefties as he has 1-5 and 1-6 (1-14) home (continued on next page)

run chances and also a whopping 63 on-base chances. Pedro Guerrero is another with plenty of home run and on-base chances, including eight HR chances vs. righties and 10 against southpaws. He also has 47 on-base chances vs. righties.

One of the best all-around players has to be Montreal's Andre Daw-He's a "1" in center field, a -4 throwing and has 2-5 and 3-6 home

run blasts vs. righties plus plenty of other extra-base chances.

Tim Raines has 55 on-base chances vs. lefties – and he's one guy
you don't want to allow on base as he's also an "AAA" stealer. Another
invaluable player is Tony Pena, catcher for Pittsburgh. He's a "1" with
a –3 arm and has hits all over his card, including 2–9 (1–4) and 2–10 home run chances vs. righties.

Mike Schmidt has a typical Mike Schmidt card with home runs on 3-5. 3-6 and 1-9 (1-15) against righties, although having a better on-base card (50 chances out of 108) vs. lefties. Bill Madlock also mauls lefties as he has 1-5 and 1-6 (1-14) home run shots and 54 on-base chances against the portsiders.

There's much, much more. But we're not going to spoil all your fun.
The rest of the poring over the cards and figuring on-base and home run chances is up to you.

FOOTBALL SUGGESTIONS

I have played the football game for over four years and consider the latest edition of the game the best. However, I have three simple suggestions that will make the game a little more realistic.

First, individual fumble ratings for each player would make the decision to run certain backs a cautious one and the decision to run others a very safe one.

Next, giving linebackers different ratings for both run and pass defense would further

develop the idea of substituting on passing downs. Finally, a home advantage using the fumble recovery chart would give a littlee more importance to playing at home, You could let the home team recover fumbles on a roll of 2-9, 12 and let the visiting team recover on a roll of 2-4.
You may have received sug-

gestions similiar to these in the past, but please take these into consideration.

Spurs surprise finalist after ousting Lakers 76ers outclass NBA playoff field

Offense can only carry a team so far, right?

If it's San Antonio in basketball that's right - offensive can spur it on to victory, at least until someone with more firepower comes along.

In a playoff of the 1983 NBA post-season games, conducted by John

McTernan and Clark Schulte of Belleville, IL, the Spurs did surprise some teams with their run-and-gun style of play, most notably the Los Angeles Lakers, runnerups in real-life, who fell in four straight games of the Western Conference finals.

San Antonio, in fact, disposed of first Phoenix, 4-1, and then L.A. before taking on the Philadelphia 76ers, real-life champs, in the finals. There the Spurs were out-offensed by the 76ers, with Philly winning in four straight games to duplicate its success against L.A. in the real-

life championship series.

The Spurs saw too much Julius (Dr. J) Erving in the final, as the Doctor was MVP after averaging 30.3 points versus San Antonio and 26.4 for all playoff games. He had a high-game of 43 points against New Jersey

and scored 30 or more points in seven of 14 games. Here's a game-by-game breakdown of the finals:

Game 1 - Philadelphia 103, San Antonio 97 .- Andrew Toney and Erving each pumped in 31 points, with Dr. J collecting eight assists and seven rebounds, for the winners and Johnny Moore scoring 20 points and dishing out 14 assists for the Spurs.

Game 2 - Philadelphia 142, San Antonio 111 - 76ers shot a scorching 65 percent from the floor and had four players with 20 or more points, led by Toney who finished with 34. The Philadelphia bench also helped, outscoring San Antonio's regulars, 18-15, over the final six minutes of George Gervin rang up 28 points for the losers. the opening period.

Game 3 - Philadelphia 122, San Antonio 115 - Bobby Jones came off bench for 15 points and key bucket off offensive rebound to spark 76ers

to commanding 3-0 lead. Six players, led by Erving's 25, scored 20 or more points for winners, while Gervin had 29 for Spurs.

Same 4 - Philadelphia 122, San Antonio 121 - A dunk by Dr. J, off a switch, on the final play ended the series. Philly had trailed by three points with 36 seconds left but came back to pull out victory as Mo Cheeks swished a jumper and Erving, after a 75er press forced a turnover, took advantage of a mismatch and went inside on Mike Dunleavy, rolling an

Where was Moses Malone during the playoffs? He was very evident as, even though Erving was the MVP, Malone averaged 22 points and 18.9 rebounds. "He was the glue for the 76ers," enthused McTernan.

In the Western Conference playoffs, Seattle knocked off Portland and Phoenix did likewise to Denver, 2-0, in mini series games. Seattle got 29 points and 10 assists a game from Gus Williams, while Maurice Lucas sparked Phoenix by averaging 28.5 points and 13 rebounds. Dennis Johnson's shot at the buzzer gave Phoenix a 114-112 win for a sweep.

The semifinals found Los Angeles edging Seattle, 4-3, and San Antonio rolling over Phoenix, 4-1. L.A. won the last two games, 111-97 and 105-96, to capture the series with good defense. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar averaged 20.6 points, Magic Johnson 17.1 (plus 13.7 assists and 8.9 rebounds). Jack Sikma's 19 points and 12.7 rebound averages led Seattle.

Gervin averaged 32.6 points and Moore 17.8 assists in the rush past

Phoenix.

SAN ANTONIO SWAMPS LAKERS

First real big surprise was San Antonio's wipeout of the Lakers, with only the second game close (115-113). Gervin again was San Antonio's triggerman, averaging 23.8 points, with Moore averaging 13.3 assists.

Artis Gilmore dominated Jabbar, holding him to 12.3 points and only one offensive rebound in four games. San Antonio shot a torrid 61 percent in (continued on next page)

sweeping the Lakers, who got 23 points and 11.8 rebounds per game from Magic Johnson.

Over in the Eastern Conference the New Jersey Nets ousted the New York Knicks, 2-1, as Buck Williams poured in 26.7 points and averaged 14 rebounds, and Atlanta ambushed Boston, 2-1. Larry Bird's 29.7 points were not enough to save the Celtics against Atlanta, which got 20.3 points and 12 rebounds from Dan Roundfield.

Philadelphia pummeled New Jersey in the semifinals, 4-0, as Erving averaged 27 points and Malone 21.8 plus a whopping 20.1 rebounds. The other semifinal went to Milwaukee, 4-2, as the Bucks won the last three games to put Atlanta away. Sidney Moncrief averaged 27.5 points for th winners, Dominique Wilkins 19.5 for the losers. In a hard-fought Eastern Conference championship series, Philadel-Sidney Moncrief averaged 27.5 points for the

In a hard-rought tastern conference championship series, rhilader phia held Milwaukee under 100 points in three straight victories and then won game six, 114-98, to end it. The 7Gers won game two, 98-73. Dr. J led the winners with 23.3 points and Malone was right behind at 23.2 and just under 20 rebounds per game. Monorief paced the battling Bucks with 25.8 points.

What type of league is best for you?

Editor's note: Kurt Smeby is a 28-year-old elementary school teacher in Las Vegas, NV, who has operated or been a participant in play-by-mail leagues since age 15. He currently operates the highly successful Fede-League, a baseball PBM loop that is soon to begin its seventh season. In addition, he's a member of the Federal Hockey League (FHL) and David Oldham's NAHA (another hockey league). Smeby, who's married and the father of two potential dice-rollers, is a frequent contributor to the Review, including the popular, "Strong commissioner is the key to successful PBM operation" article.

The most frequently misunderstood concept about play-by-mail leagues is the format.

So, for those of you new to this mode of sports game enjoyment, let me pound home a universal truth: there is no "playing" by mail in a play-by-mail league! There is a vastly differing operational network whereby managers trade and exchange game instructions by mail (or phone), but the games themselves are essentially solitaire.

What you get in a PBM league is the opportunity to act the part of a general manager by acquiring talent, selecting starterss, exchanging instructions to use in games (in your absence) and, in general, pitting your organizational prowess against other gamers.

As I said, methods of doing this vary greatly. But don't be misled into expecting a hybrid of the "chess by mail" production in the PBM world - it simply doesn't exist and relies on a solitaire gamer, his

instructions from visitors and his honesty in playing the games.

As there are differing methods of employing a PBM system, there are varying degrees of competency in operating one. The trick is to find a PBM league that will be both competent and have a long life. It's possible for a league to look great for one year and then fold. It's also possible for a league to look quite ordinary at first and then improve greatly over the years.

GUIDE TO PICKING A LEAGUE

Here are some tips when selecting a PBM league: 1. EXAMINE YOURSELF - Don't join the league if you don't have the for it. It's important to realize that leagues requiring you to send instructions for each series to opponents require more time (as opposed manuals). If you dislike writing lettto preseason "league instruction" ers or shudder at the thought of making or receiving a long-distance phone call, by all means - keep playing solitaire!

2. EXAMINE THE AD - Not to generalize, but the ad can give valuable insight into the man who will be running the organization you want to devote your time to. Short ones, even enthusiastic ones, are more risky

than longer, more specific ads.

Many ads don't list league dues but the general rule-of-thumb is: "You get what you pay for." The gambit runs from the \$2 annual dues (and one-page, occasional bulletins) to \$25 (FL magazine-like bulletins of the 5-0-M Review mold). And, there are more expensive ones (the highest dues in S-O-M, to my knowledge, are \$40) you might investigate. For league over \$10 in dues, ask to inspect a recent newsletter. If the

quality is poor, where does the money actually go?

A basic truth to PBM leagues: the bulletin is the soul of the league. One last point on ads: well-known S-O-M reputations (big-time leagues found in the S-O-M Review and persons of repute in the S-O-M world] are the best bets. But, leagues like this are popular, , , you may ways get in! Frequently, a spell on a "waiting list" is your fate.

3. THE DECISION - Dkay, so you've found an ad you are intrigued with. The general procedure is to write a letter of inquiry. Be sure and

Slow rollin' is way to play

Jim Elliott is '90-minute' gamer

In the article below he comes out on the side of slow rollin' when it comes to playing S-O-M Baseball. The '50 Red Sox are his creation.

Put me down as another 90-minute gamer. I so thoroughly enjoyed Jack Kettles' letter (Readers roll 'em, Jan., 1984), that I'd like to explain to you the very essence (and rewards) of slow rolling. First let me say that I've been rolling 'em in S-O-M Baseball since

First let me say that I've been rolling 'em in S-O-M Baseball since 1962 and I used to be like everyone else, always in a hurry. In fact, I once rolled a complete nine-inning game in just seven minutes! The game was nothing more than cards, dice, pencil and paper.

was nothing more than cards, dice, pencil and paper.
But, somewhere during the intervening years I slowed way down and a strange thing began to happen - I began to "live" the games and to enjoy them as never before. Let me give you an example from my latest replay in the South Coast League.

The game was important, having first place possibilities for one of the teams and I could sense a feeling of anxiety welling up inside me even before the opening roll. The 1954 New York Giants were playing my beloved 1950 Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park.

The game developed into a pitchers' duel with Sal Maglie of the Giants matching Ellis Kinder of the Sox pitch for pitch. Finally in the fourth inning the Sox plated twice and I was really rooting for Ellie to hold them as the game moved along into the seventh. The Giants scored one run in the seventh and I could feel the tension setting in and my heart start to pound. One of the tough things about slow rolling is that you "feel" every crucial roll of the dice.

Kinder survived the seventh, but the Sox couldn't add to their advantage so it stood 2-1 after seven. Then it happened; my worst fears were realized. The Giants, who batted for Maglie, struck hard in the eighth as Willie Mays belted a three-run homer to chase Kinder. It felt like somebody had thrust a knife in me. Mickey McDermott eventually restored order, but gave up another run in the process. So, it was now 5-2 Giants with Hoyt Wilhelm pitching in relief.

'LUCKY SEVEN' SAVES SOX

The Sox went quietly in the eighth and the Giants failed to score in the ninth, leaving the score at 5-2 in the visitors favor with an impending doom starting to grip me. Wilhelm is so tough in these situations that it almost seemed like trying to climb Mt. Everest, especially after Birdie Tebbetts fanned to open the home half

But, Billy Goodman, batting for McDermott, singled and moved to
second on a groundout by Dom DiMaggio. Two down and one to go. It seemed
too easy for Wilhelm.

However, Johnny Pesky answered with a double to cut it to 5-3, as I let out a sigh. Ted Williams then sent a grounder down to "1" rated Whitey Lockman at first and I figured it was "lights out." But, Lockman booted the ball, putting runners on first and third. The Sox were still alive.

The tension had escalated to such a point that my heart started to pound like a jackhammer as Vern Stephens stepped to the plate. I picked up the tiny 7-millimeter dice, nervously shook them up in the small yellow shaker and let them go. They spun like a top, round and round, for what agonizingly seemed like an eternity. Finally the white one settled with a "2" showing and the two red ones added to "7". A big smile came across my face as I knew what that result was: "Home run 1-7, Double 8-20," So, I picked up the dice and let them fly with even more confidence. The split number picked was a "5."

I let out a real loud shout, standing as I "saw" the small white ball some higher and higher and finally over the left field wall. I "heard" the roar of the crowd and saw the base runners circling the bases. The noise level grew in intensity as Stephens neared the plate to be congratulated by his teammates and out of the corner of my eye I

to be congratulated by his teammates and out of the corner or my eye I saw Wilhelm walking dejectedly back to the Giants' dugout, a loser.

I just sat down, taking it all in for about 10 minutes, as the crowd noise gradually played out. Then I completed the game totals. Final score: Boston 6, New York 5 - and a share of first place for the Sox.

What a classic finish! Even now I get goose bumps just thinking about it. But, that's what it's like to roll 'em slow - every game a

stress test filled with big plays. Actually, they aren't all so dramatic - thank goodness - or I'd never survive the raplay! Even so, I wouldn't have it any other way, as the ultimate joy is seeing it all unfold so realistically, while savoring the big moments, that you actually feel like you're in the stadium rather than at home sitting at a

list all your questions in the initial letter and try to get a copy of a recent newsletter. Most of your questions should probe what your duties will be: "Do I send out instructions for every series or does the league publish a league instruction booklet?"

"How much time is allowed to play my games? What is the consequence if I'm late?" All of these are relevant questions (except the last one might impart an image of your lateness, so I advise specifically avoiding it). If the league you've contacted doesn't have a league constitution, or rule book - beware! It's either disorganized or the commissioner dictates everything.

4. YOUR NEW HOBBY - Perhaps you're on a waiting list - many of the truly great PBM leagues demand this. But, don't despair, the wait could be very short (ask for estimated waiting period for the league you've applied for).

If you have joined a league (and newly formed ones will accept almost anyone until the teams are gone), you'll have new responsibilities

to a group of fellow gamers. The major ones are:

A. Play your games on time.

B. Play your games honestly.

D. Trade wisely.

B. Play your games honestly. D. Trade wisely.
Although these responsibilities are essentially identical from league to league, be well read in the rules of your new league. There are far too many intricacies to delve into here - all leagues are different

so be familiar with those rules you have to abide by.

PBM leagues can be enjoyable and help you meet many lifelong friends.

But, like an engine in an auto, all the parts must work in unison.

Select your league carefully, then uphold your duty as a PBM member

honorably. You'll like it.

Federal League completes seventh

In case you're curious - and even if you're not - as to what's happening in the Federal League, the play-by-mail league that Smeby has been the main driving fonce in, the FL has completed seven seasons and is eagerly awaiting the start of an eighth.

The FL is 24 managers strong and apparently getting stronger year by year. A convention spiced the league's most recent season, plus Smeby, who had won two FL titles in the '70s, once again emerged as champion as

his St. Louis Cardinals defeated Ken Flesher's Milwaukee Brewers in seven hard-fought games. "It was a rematch of the real-life World Series in 1982," notes Smeby, "except ironically less than one-third of the two teams' makeup was actually comprised of Cardinals or Brewers. Such is the fate of older PBM leagues."

Flesher's Brew Crew entered the playoffs with the FL's best record (106-56) and an attack force that slammed 277 home runs. Robin Yount, the American League's MVP, led the assault on rival pitching by belting 43 home runs, batting .342, driving in 129 runs and scoring 129 plus spraying a total of 242 hits. Add in Dave Winfield (51 HRs, 145 RBI), Gorman Thomas (36 HRs, 83 RBI) and Fred Lynn (29, 102) and it was easy to see why the Brewers busted up the offensive records in the FL.

St. Louis countered that with an offense featuring Gary Carter (39 HRs, 121), Doug DeCinces (33, 116), Al Oliver (.312, 25 HRs, 116 RBI) and Bill Buckner (.302) plus the best pitching staff in the league in Nolan Hyan (22-9, 2.89 ERA, 303 strikeouts in 302 innings), Fernando Valenzuela (22-10, 2.85, 201), Len Barker (20-10, 2.65, 202) and Mike Witt (19-9, 3 RBI)

Pitching won out in the Series as flyen captured three gemes, tossing a one-hitter in the opener (4-0), being backed by a 25-hit attack in No. 4 [a 17-4 win] and then winning the decisive seventh geme, 4-2, with an 8-hitter. Gary Roenicke's two-run homer in the second inning, his fourth roundtripper of the Series, was the big blow in the finale.

Incidentally, since both Smeby and Flesher live in Las Vegas, NV, the championship series was played face-to-face, a rarity for PBM leagues. The win by the Cards also marked only the second time an NL team had won the league championship. Smeby had only the fourth-best regular season record (99-63) among the 24 teams and was a modest 48-33 at home.

Individual awards went to Ryan and Mike Schmidt, of the Dodgers, who crashed 53 homers and knocked in 135 runs, with Ryan Cy Young Award winner and Schmidt the N.L.'s MVP. Over in the American, Yount was MVP and Mario Soto of Detroit was the pitching choice after fashioning a 24-8 record, 3.08 ERA and fanning 347 in 332 innings.

The Federal League now has gone the full-season route all seven seasons - a credit to Smeby, the league's organization man - and not only does it complete what it starts, but it finishes the playoffs and distributes final statistics before the real-life major leagues do every year. Baltimore repeats Series conquest

It didn't last five games, it lasted six instead, but the end result was still the same - the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Cincinnati Reds in a replay of the 1970 World Series.

Baltimore's front line pitching and the booming bat of Frank Robinson did in the Red Machine. Jim Palmer won two games, the first and the fourth, while Boog Powell finished off the Reds with a two-run, eighth-inning homer that broke a 5-5 tie in game six and led to a 7-5 victory.

The Series opened like it wasn't going to last long as Baltimore, behind Palmer's seven-hit pitching, downed Cincinnati, 5-2, in the opener. Dave Johnson stroked a two-run homer and had three hits and the same number of RBI. An error by Tony Perez at third base (4-e37) opened the gates for four unearned runs in the eighth inning.

Game two was all Mike Cuellar as the crafty southpaw scattered eight hits and tossed a shutout, winning 3-0. Paul Blair doubled in Don Buford, who had tripled, with one run in the fifth inning and Robinson [Frank, that is] clouted a two-run homer in the eighth to clinch it.

Cincinnati rose up in game three and pulled out a 3-2 win as Jim

McGlothlin hurled a three-hitter for 7 2/3 innings and got hitless relief help from Wayne Granger. Bernie Carbo drove in two runs and had three hits. The Reds also overcame three errors.

Baltimore again rode the big inning - a five-run bottom of the eighth - to victory, this time 6-2 in game four. Paul Blair's bases-loaded double drove in three runs and was the big blow. Wayne Simpson of Cincy had a two-hitter through seven innings.

Cincinnati's power, shackled through four games and held to one home run, exploded for four home runs in a 10-2 win in game five. Johnny Bench's three-run homer in six-run fifth inning highlighted charge. Lee May (No. 2), Perez and Bobby Tolan also had roundtrippers as the Reds 13 hits off Cuellar and two relievers. Gary Nolan got the pounded out

win with relief support from Clay Carroll.

Baltimore ended the Series in the sixth game, with a 7-5 win, as
Powell's two-run shot in the eighth was the decisive blow. Frank Robinson, who homered in three straight games, collected three hits to finish with 10 hits in 25 at-bats and with six RBI.

And that's the way it was in a replay of the 1970 World Series - only this time it was six games rather five.

Something old and new in 1970 set

There's something old and something new about the 1970 baseball card set recently released by the Strat-O-Matic Game Company.

The old, of course, is that the 1970 set has been released before. But it was in the basic side only. Now, 13 years later, out comes the advanced version, too, replete with righty-lefty batting and pitching,

catcher's throwing ratings and the new e ratings on defense.

Remember, beginning with the 1971 set (real-life 1971), S-O-M produced the advanced game. So, 1970 was the last of the basic game cards

Since the 1970 set was the first of this year's "Big Three" to arrive at the Review - the others are, of course, the 1930 and 1983 real-life

seasons - it's also the first to be reviewed.

There still are only five "AA" stealers and a cursory check of theft ratings indicated there were 20 "A" stealers, including such power hitters as Carl Yastrzemski and Reggie Jackson, who was at that time performing for Oakland, and eccentric owner Charles Finley.

PITCHING CARRIES BIRDS

Refreshing memories means pointing out that pitching-rich Baltimore captured the World Series that year, defeating Cincinnati in five games in real-life. Jim Palmer, who has a good card against lefties, and a pair of southpaws, Mike Cuellar and Dave McNally, combined to win 58 games. Cuellar was 24-8, McNally 24-9 and Palmer, the only one of the trio still active, posted a 20-10 record.

Defense was also an Oriole strong suit as Brooks Robinson was a "1 e18" at third base and Dave Johnson a "2 e8" at second. Frank Robinson and Boog Powell supplied the power, while Merv Rettenmund has a super card against southpaws, with home run chances on 1-5, 1-6, 1-7 [1-14]. Add in center fielder Paul Blair, a "1", and Baltimore doesn't have any major weakness.

Over in the National League, Cincinnati can send out a murderers row, too, in Johnny Bench, Tony Perez and Lee May. Only problem here is with the defense, with Perez (4 e37) having to play third if May is stationed at first base. Bench, who belted 45 home runs, is Babe Ruth and Roger Maris rolled into one against lefties, having homer chances on 1-5 (11-8 split), 2-8, 2-9, 2-10 and 3-7. That's 19.6 card chances - out of 108 - for collecting a home run.

Bench is a -4 catcher, plus plays four other positions, while Pete Rose is a "1" in right field with an e rating also of "1." Bernie Carbo has an action card, with 59 on-base card chances against righties, and wayne Simpson doesn't give up a straight hit versus right-handed swingers.

HOUSTON - Denis Menke plays all four infield positions (best rating:

28-3 e8) plus right field.

SAN DIEGO - Ollie Brown is a -4 throwing arm in right field...Nate

LOUIS - Richie Allen is consistent in long ball department, homering versus lefties on 1-8, 1-9 and 3-5 (1-15) and vs. righties on 1-8, 1-9 and 3-5 (1-13)...Joe Torre (.325 average) has great card against southpaws with on-base chances on 1-5 through 1-10, 2-6, 3-5-7 and 3-9-10... Bob Gibson is stingy to hit, by righties especially, having hits on only 5-4. 5-5. 6-6 (1-8) and a walk on 6-9.

CALIFORNIA - Andy Mossersmith doesn't give up a straight vs. lefty


