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Happy days are here again

New baseball cards plus '69 season have arrived

When first looking at the new Strat-Q-Matic Baseball cards this year, you notice, among many things, the deterioration of infield defense in the National League. There are a lot of outstanding cards, like

Dwight Gooden's, Dale Murphy, etc., but for those managers in draft leagues the lack of "Big D" is certain to be a concern.

There are only single rated 1's at first base, second base and shortop and none at third base in the N.L. Compare this with the American League where there are three 1's at first, two at second, two at shortstop and one at third base.

It is interesting to look at shortstop, especially in the N.L. where there are only two 2's while in the A.L. there are eight. So, if you are looking for a decent fielding shortstop in an A.L. draft league this year the position is well fortified - but in the N.L. it's a disaster area.

1984: YEAR OF THE TIGER

The story of last baseball season was the Detroit Tigers and when you look at the cards you can see how they did it. Once again Detroit has 1's up the middle in catcher Lance Parrish, second baseman Lou Whitaker, shortstop Alan Trammell and center fielder Chet Lemon.

Detroit also has a well-balanced offense, topped by Trammell and Kirk Gibson, and great relief pitching by William Hernander, who has

only 16 on-base chances by right-handed batters and eight versus left-handed batters against him.

As for the rest, let's highlight the hitters first. Boston, as one might expect, is awesome. Tony Armas has 14 home (continued on next page)

run chances vs. righties while only three vs. lefties. Dwight Fyans just might have the best card in the set as he is a 1 in RF. -5 arm, e2, while he is a 64 to get on vs. lefties and 45 vs. righties, enhanced by a 1-8 and partial 1-9 HR both ways.

Mike Easler is a 51 against righties, with a 3-6 and partial 2-5 HR, while Wade Boggs has 50 on-base chances vs. righties.

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The two frontrunners for the A.L. batting crown. Don Mattingly and Dave Winfield, are great. Mattingly is a 1 at first base, with 46 chances vs. lefties and 44 vs. righties (OB), while Winfield is a 48 vs. lefties and 49 vs. righties while being a 1 in left and right fields.

For Baltimore, Cal Ripken is a 1 at shortstop while being a 46 both ways with a 3-6 HR and partial 2-5. Eddie Murrav is a 50 to get on vs. RHPs with a 1-5 and 1-6 (1-15) HR chances.

Toronto has a balanced attack led by George Bell. Cliff Johnson.

Toronto has a balanced attack led by George Bell, Cliff Johnson, Dave Collins, Willie Upshaw, Lloyd Moseby and Jesse Barfield. While none has a great card, all have good ones.

Kent Hrbek is a 45 vs. lefties with 1-5 and 1-6 (1-18) HR shots.

And against RHFs he is a 44 with almost the same HR chances.

Rickey Henderson has his typical card as he is 47 vs. lefties and 55 vs. righties to get on while being an AA stealer and a 1 in left field.

Buddy Bell, in addition to being a 1 at third base, has 53 on-base chances vs. lefties and 45 vs. righties. And Ken Phelps, while not a household name, has 14 home run chances vs. righties as he hit 24 HRs in only 290 at-bats.

GWYNN HAS GLITTERING CARD

In the National League, Tony Gwynn of San Diego is a 1 in right field plus has 47 on-base chances vs. lefties and 53 vs. righties. Dale Murphy of Atlanta hzs 1-5, 1-6 and 1-7 HR shots vs. lefties and against righties he has a 1-5 and 1-6 (1-14) channee. He is also a 1 in center fielder with a -3 arm.

While Jack Clark only batted 203 these in an incurvenlagued casses.

While Jack Clark only batted 203 tmes in an injury-plagued season, he has a great card with 64 on-base chances and 1-5, 1-6 and partial 1-7 (1-4) HR chances vs. lefties. Against RHPs. he has 55 on-base chances.

As was seen in last month's Review. Ryne Sandberg has a great card. Also for the Cubs, Gary Matthews is tough, being a 51 vs. lefties and 59 vs. righties, although he again has problems in the field, being rated a 4 in left with an e14. Keith Hernandez of the Mets has a card that reflects his coming in

second in the MVP balloting. He is a 1 at first base, with 49 on-base chances vs. lefties and 54 vs. righties.

SCHMIDT'S POWER SUPPLY NEVER-ENDING

Year after year, Mike Schmidt. it is thought by many, has the most consistent cards. And this year is no exception. For those lucky enough to have him on their team, he has nine HR chances vs. LHPs and 11 vs. RHPs. He did drop to a 2 at third base this year, however. Gary Carter has the best card for a catcher in either league as he has a 1-5 and partial 1-6 HR shots both ways, while being a 51 vs. LHPs and 42 vs. RHPs. He also has a -2 arm.

GOODEN'S CARD IS GOLDEN

Among the starting pitchers the best card, of course, belongs to Dwight Gooden, who was also featured in last month's Review. He's a (continued on next page)

'StatsMaster I' is now available for baseball How to figure stats via computer

If you have a computer and are looking for a method (program) to keep baseball statistics with it, StatsMaster I may be just what you're

looking for. The program, designed for baseball or softball stat-keeping, at Little League through Major League levels, is put out by TNA Software, 1266 White Daks Drive, Suite 101, Campbell, CA 95008. It sells for \$39.95 plus \$2 for shipping and taxes.

So much for those numbers. The real numbers are those you can ob-

tain with StatsMaster I's easy-to-follow instruction booklet for set-

ting up stats for your team or league.

Stats can be set up for an entire league or one team and totals

can be arranged for seven innings (for most softball, high school and Little League games) or nine innings.

As the printout of the National League stats for Review co-editor Del Newell's GKSML (Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League) National League's team shows, most of the basic categories are included.

Initially, of course, all the data has to be fed into the computer

Initially, of course, all the data has to be fed into the computer — but then the program takes over and totals all team results. "Right now this program is set up for these stats only," reports Jeff Aronoff of TNA. "But we can add to it if customers want more."

Aronoff spent four years working on the program and instruction booklet (24 pages of large-sized printing) and the 32-year-old Californian says other such stat programs will soon be in the offering for the other major sports.

As far as the GKSMM, the stat program covered all categories ex-

As far as the GKSML, the stat program covered all categories except for stolen base attempts, walks and errors committed for batters

cept for stolen base attempts, walks and errors committed for batters and games started, shutouts and home runs allowed for pitchers. Slugging percentage is included in the program, although the GKSML does not keep that statistic. Each team has up to 40 player listings. The only depressing thing about StatsMaster I was the final stats it had to print out about Del's team — which finished last in the N.L. The GKSML plans on using it for its 1985 N.L. season, which just got under way. We'll give you an update on StatsMaster I later in the 'season.' season.

'What if' you are the manager of Montreal and Toronto?

Strat-O-Matic is many times called the "What if games?" What if you were the manager, coach, etc., in other words. This is your cha to manage the good, bad and the downright ugly teams. Most of the replays sent the Review don't involve the 'what if' This is your chance

aspect. Most are crammed with statistics and not much else.

Two individual team replays sent in by Charles Van DenCorput, of Dundas, Ontario, Canada, do focus on the 'what if' - what if he had managed the 1983 Montreal Expos and Toronto Blue Jays?

Both improved their real-life won-and-lost ledgers, but Van Den-Corput doesn't pat himself on the back for the improvement.

In the case of the Expos, the team scored 80 more runs than in real-life and allowed 70 fewer. But, despite the big difference, only

six more wins were registered. The pitching staff was about on par with real-life, although reliever Jeff Reardon had a bad season, losing 11 games with a 3.30 ERA. Steve Rogers, as expected, was the ace of the staff with a 19-7 record ERA. Bill Gullickson (16-14) and Charlie Lea (14-14) were the

other primary starters. Offensively, the Expos were about on target, as Andre Dawson (.291 29 homers, 128 RBI), Gary Carter (.269, 18, 109), Tim Wallach (.270, 16 92), Tim Raines (.293, 100 walks, 128 runs, 84/16 stolen bases) and Al Oliver (.309, 88 RBI) stood out.

Only real major difference in the attack was in doubles, with the

real-life Expos hitting 297 and the paper Expos 346.

Van DenCorput's major managerial move was on defense, where he installed Doug Flynn at shortstop full-time and platooned Bryan Little and Manny Trillo at second base. Flynn batted a respectable .259 and

committed only 15 errors.

"Little and Trillo both had decent years," points out Van DenCorp-"so the infield problem wasn't as accentuated as it was in reallife."

Van DenCorput does point to Bill James' (Baseball Abstract) pyth-agorean projection, however, that, based on runs scored and runs allow-ed, the Expos should have won 102 games, rather than going 88-74. Oh, well. The Expos did beat on San Diego and Cincinnati (10-2),

but got beat on by Atlanta (2-10).

TORONTO HAS TWO 20-GAME WINNERS

Toronto, thanks to 20-win-plus seasons by Dave Stieb (24-9, 3.17) and Luis Leal (21-10, 3.27) and an awesome hitting attack, improved its record from 89-73 to 97-65 - exactly James' pythagorean projection. The team ERA dropped from 4.12 to 3.75 because of Stieb's Cy Young type of season (22 complete games in 36 starts, 293 innings, 233

strikeouts and only a paltry .228 batting average against.

Toronto's relievers got little work under Van DenCorput as starters hurled 65 complete games. Jim Clancy (13-17, 33 home runs allowed) ers hurled 65 complete games. Jim Clancy (13-17, 33 home runs allowed) did have a bad season, but that was offset by surprisingly solid seasons turned in by Doyle Alexander (13-8) and Jim Gott (13-10).

Gott, however, did provide the relief corps with plenty of work as he finished only two of 30 starts.

As far as the offense, which exploded for 856 runs, an average of 5.2 per game, Van DenCorput says, "A trained monkey could have operated this team's offense." Only difference between he and Robby Company

this team's offense." Only difference between he and Bobby Cox, says Van DenCorput, was that Cox liked to run more.

Almost everyone shared in the hitting spoils as Willie Upshaw (.295, 24 homers, 113 RBI), Damaso Garcia (.321, 102 runs, 217 hits), (continued on next page)

Lloyd Moseby (.309, 14, 95), Barry Bonnell (.350, 17, 64), Jesse Barfield (29, 85), Dave Collins (38/6 stolen bases) and Cliff Johnson (.293, 21, 93) all performed up to expectations. The platoon players did, too, as Rance Mulliniks/Garth Iorg (58 doubles, 92 RBI) and Ernie Whitt/Buck Martinez (31 homers, 107 RBI) added to an awesome attack.

The Blue Jays sent 172 baseballs into the seats, an increase of

five over real-life.

Boston was Toronto's "cousin," dropping 11 of 13 games to the Blue Jays. In one game, with Toronto leading 8-0, Boston struck back for eight runs in the ninth inning...only to lose in the 12th to Toronto.

Guest columnist How to draft future talent

In the Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League (GKSML, which includes Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell and has played through 28 full-season 154-game replays) in 1979 I drafted Alan Trammell, Lou Whitaker, Lance Parrish, Jack Morris, Carney Lansford, Gorman Thomas,

Paul Molitor, Jim Beattie and Rick Honeycutt.

How was I able to land such a wealth of future talent in one highly competitive draft? Here are the methods I used:

HOW TO EVALUATE NEWLY ELIGIBLE DRAFTEES

The next couple of sections are the most important parts of this column. You must be able to identify the most talented of all the draftees who are available. Otherwise, little in this column will have

(1) Researching stats - Obtain or compile the minor league histories of all draftees from the "Sporting News'" "Baseball Register" and "Baseball Guides." Current season's stats on any minor leaguer can be obtained from "Baseball America" (a sports newspaper). Compare the stat records of the available draftees. Rank the draftees' talents from best to worst.

(2) Interpreting statistics - When evaluating a player's potential, look for the following: (a) standout seasons with exceptional stats; (b) unusually rapid progress even if with poor stats; (c) uninterrupted success, or a string of good years without an intervening poor season; (d) youth, or about 25 years old or younger; the younger the better. Youth is especially meaningful in conjunction with rapid progress; (e) big size. This reassures that the potential shown in the minors is for real, indicates home run power and may indicate endurance for mitchers; (f) home runs page 500 at the contract of the contr for pitchers; (f) home runs per 500 at-bats.

(3) Gossip and rumors - Tidbits of information from "The Sporting News," "Baseball America," and a book called "The Scouting Report: 198-" may reveal information on a fielder's range, throwing arm and a pitcher's velocity, movement, what pitches he throws and their effectiveness.

DRAFT STRATEGY

Draft strategy is the second, most important, part of this column. separates the good drafters from the excellent drafters. Draft the best player regardless of need or card value. If you (continued on next page)

can resist temptation and if you can draft a bad card with few at-bats or innings pitched in the first round because your research shows that he is the most talented, then you have arrived.

On the other hand, if you draft to get the best cards, or to ful-fill your team's needs, and/or to enhance your chances for winning the title, then you are in trouble because you are letting your competitors

draft the most talented players.

The most talented players usually start off with poor cards (as do most rookies who are receiving S-O-M cards for the first time). Examples are: Dale Murphy (65 at-bats), Dave Winfield (141 AB), Mike Schmidt (.196 average), Lance Parrish (.219), Kent Hrbek (.239) and Jack Morris (4.33 ERA).

Amassing ever more potential stars: Do not let up on the procedures outlined in this report. Apply them unmercifully by continuously adding to your team's increasingly larger pool of star players with

each annual draft.

One year later: If a player you had drafted a year earlier regres-

However, if he is continuing to make good progress, then keep him even if he has poor major league stats. Remember, that it took Dale Murphy and Winfield four or five years to really blossom after they received their first cards.

Editor's note: Thomas Angel is the author of the article "How to create your own cards" that appeared in the December, 1984 issue of the Review. He's been a winner within a short time in almost every play-bymail or face-to-face league he's participated in, including the GKSML. Although Angel had to leave Michigan, and his well-drafted teams, after one season, the foundation was laid for future success. Both his teams (National and American League) finished last the first year...but the next year both were vastly improved, with the A.L. squad winning a pennant and World Series!

How to rate value of hockey cards

Here is a simple method for rating the overall value of Strat-O-Matic Hockey cards. Each card is rated in four basic categories: Pro-jected Goals, Passing J K L, Ratings and Minus Penalty Minutes. Using the 1983-84 Mike Gillis card as an example, here's how it

First, we want to find out how many goals Gillis would probably score if he played 80 games. He scored six in 50 games. Multiply his six total goals by 80, then divide by 50. The equation six times 80 equals 480; 480 divided by 50 gives the projected total goals of 9.6.

That is Gillis' base rating. Next give 10 points for each inside shot in the three passing sections. Gillis has one inside shot on J, so add 10 points to his base rating and you get 19.6.

The Ratings category is calculated by adding up the offense, defense and breakaway/penetration ratings to total one number. If this total is more than nine, then add 10 points for each number over nine; if under nine, subtract 10 points.

Gillis has a total of four (two offense, one defense and one breakaway/penetration), so you would subtract 50 points to get a new

total of -30.4 (not too good).

Now look at the Intimidation rating. Add five points for each forward's intimidation number and add six for each defenseman's. Gillis gains another 15 points to make his rating -15.4 (1-3 intimidation).

The final category, Minus Penalty Minutes, is figured just The final category, Minus Penalty Minutes, is figured just like total goals, but you figure the projected penalty minutes for 80 games.

Multiply Gillis' 35 penalty minutes (PM) by 80 to get 2800, then divide by 50 (his games played), and you get 56. Now slide the decimal point one spot to the left (56.0 to 5.6) and subtract that total from the rest of the calculations and you have a -21 rating for Gillis.

Players who played all 80 games will not need as many calculations

because the total goals and penalty minutes are already based on that number of games.

HOW TO RATE GOALIES

To rate goalies, award points for each save split on the goalie card as follows:

* Save - to a player...... 9 points (DLD, DRD, DLW, DRW, DC or any 'D')

* Save - faceoff...... 8 points * Save - rebound...... 7 points

Using the system above, goalie Doug Keans would be rated 92 and Pete Peeters 88.

DEFENDS PLAYING TIP

On another hockey matter, I wish to defend my playing tip (Nov., 1984 Review, page 20) and your critique that it "eliminates" the work of individual defensemen. The use of the word eliminates will have an impact on your readers because of the faith they have in your consistent objectivity.

tion. My calculations still tell me that my chart does not necessarily encourage excessive penetration in power-play situations.

The error factor of the chart could be as high as five percent on power-play situations, so if any change should be made, simply adjust the total combined defense ratios (TODE) the total combined defense rating (TCDR) by one to slightly discourage

penetration by a power-play team.

However, I still swear to the accuracy and realism of this chart as it is and believe that it neither eliminates nor does it even alter the effectiveness of the hard-hitting defensemen.

The Review critiqued the penetration playing tip, thought it eliminated the work of individual defensemen, and reported it thusly. 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Laker balance too much for Celtics

Bird averages 30.8 but Boston bows in five games of playoff replay

Larry Bird averaged 30.8 points per game. Larry Bird averaged 30.8 points per game.

And Robert Parish pulled down an average of 14.6 rebounds.

That was the good news for the Boston Celtics in a solitaire replay of the NBA championship series conducted by Review co-editor Del

The bad news was that the Los Angeles Lakers, real-life losers in seven thrilling games, emerged triumphant, almost sweeping the Celtics and winning in five games that were also of a thrilling kind.

Balance was the key for the Lakers, and also Boston's downfall in the mini series, as six L.A. players averaged in double figures, led by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's 22.6. Jamaal Wilkes tossed in 18.2 per game, Magic Johnson 16, James Worthy 13.8, Bob McAdoo 12.8 and Michael Cooper 12.6.

Bird was by far the most prolific scorer, racking up 154 points in the five games, with a high of 41 in the lone Celtic victory. His shooting average was a so-so 46.8 percent (67-143), but Bird did have to contend with a strong L.A. defense as well as launching most of his shots from outside.

L.A. IS MAGICLAND

Magic Johnson, although he didn't come close to matching Bird in the scoring department, was the series' MVP. He averaged eight re-bounds to go with the 16 points, plus had to have averaged 12-15 assists a game (via dazzler), even though assist stats were not kept.

The first game set the pattern for the series as L.A. moved out to 37-26 first-quarter lead and sailed off with a 127-100 victory. Seven Lakers scored in double figures, while Bird had 31 in a one-man performance for Boston.

Another pattern was set in game one as L.A. outboarded Boston, 65-47. Five Lakers had seven or more rebounds, while Parish had 13. Bird

11 for Boston. Again balance offset individual performances.

Game two was the real turning point as L.A. trailed most of the way - including by eight points with four minutes left - yet rallied to pull out a 116-113 win.

Boston turned the ball over three times in the last crucial minute

and L.A. again had seven players score in double figures. Bird had 26 and Gerald Henderson came back with 25 (13-of-18 floor shooting) after being held to eight in the opener (3-13).

RUN, RUN, RUN....

Both teams employed fast-break offenses with normal defenses throughout the series. The games were fast-paced and, if you were a Laker fan, an exhilarating experience.

Boston seemed at times snakebit as it turned the ball over, missed crucial shots or lost key rebounds in the final minutes of almost every

game.

For the series, L.A. outshot Boston from the field, 48.2 to 46.8 percent. Not a great difference, perhaps; but the Lakers did connect percent. Not a great difference, perhaps; but the Lakers did connect percent. for 25 more baskets. L.A. also won the rebounding war, 55.8 to 51.4, although Boston got the better of the shot-blocking, 25-18.

Game three was more of the same as the Lakers led the entire game, dashing Boston's last hope with a 30-22 fourth-quarter advantage en

The Johnsons - Boston's Dennis and Magic of L.A. - both had sub-par games. Dennis was 1-11 from the field for a miserly four points and Magic was 6-17 for 12 although grabbing 11 rebounds. L.A. proved it could win even when Magic was off his game.

Boston stayed alive by capturing game four. The Celtics fell behind - almost out of sight! - 41-28 after one quarter. Later, after Boston caught up at 79-all going into the fourth quarter, the Celts

Boston caught up at /y-ail going into the Tourith quarter, the outstored L.A. 34-25 to claim a 113-104 win.

Bird flew high all-around in game four, pouring in 16 of 34 field goal attempts, 9 of 9 free throws and grabbing 17 rebounds (Parish had goal attempts).

goal attempts, 7 of 7 free throws and grabbing 17 rebounds (Parish had a one-game series high of 19). Bird had 26 of his total in the second half, including 14 points in the fourth.

That was Boston's last-hurrah, however, as L.A. didn't let a big early lead slip in game five, holding off the Celtics 126-121. L.A. led by 21 points - 44-23 - after one quarter. Seven Lakers scored in double digits, again offsetting blue-chip performances by Parish (30 points digits, again offsetting blue-chip performances by Parish (30 points, 13 rebounds) and Bird (28, 15 rebounds).

Making the last game amazing was that Jabbar, heretofore having been whistled for six fouls in four games, fouled out with over 10 min-utes to play. Six points by Cooper in the final minutes staved off a final Boston counterattack.
