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Here's closer look at baseball cards

Youth is being served in the form of the 1986 Strat-O-Matic Baseball cards. Never before in recent memory has such a galaxy of good cards been given to younger players.

The obvious super cards went to Dwight Gooden, Darryl Strawberry, Willie McGee, Pedro Guerrero and Ryne Sandberg, all of whom were featured in last month's Review.

But there are plenty of other stars whose cards are shining bright this year.

Jesse Barfield, Lloyd Moseby and Tony Fernandez all were main ingredients in the success of Toronto. Barfield is a 1 e4 in right field, with a -4 arm. He has 46 on-base chances versus lefty pitchers (out of 108 possible chances) and 43 against righties. Moseby is a "1" in center field and Fernandez is a 1 e31 at shortstop.

For the Seattle Mariners, Phil Bradley and Jim Presley are two good ones, for sure. Bradley is a 1 e5 with a +1 arm in left field and has 36 on-base chances against lefties and 46 versus righties.

Presley, meanwhile, is a 2 e18 at third base with 48 on-base chan-

ces vs. lefties.

On the Astros, Bill Doran is a 1 e19 at second base. At the plate he has 45 on-base chances vs. lefties and 40 against righties. And catcher Mark Bailey has a -1 arm while having 52 on-base chances vs.

lefties and 40 vs. righties.

Mike Marshall of the Dodgers, continuing the parade of young talent, is a 2 e3 in right field, with 1-5, 1-10 and partial 1-6 rolls resulting in home runs against both types of pitching.

The list goes on and on. There are also Kirby Puckett (1 e4, -4 arm in center field), Glenn Wilson (1 e13, -4 in right field), Andy Van Slyke (1 e1 in RF and LF, -3 arm), Gary Pettis of California (1 e6, -2 arm in center), Brett Butler (2 e1, -1 arm in center), Brook Jacoby, (continued on next page) (continued on next page)

Mike Young, Mike Davis, Mike Brown and Rich Gedman.

But the old standbys still have good cards, too.

Dale Murphy is a 1 e7, -3 arm in center field for the Braves, with 58 on-base chances vs. lefties and 44 against righties. Dave Parker was rewarded for his great comeback with a 2 e10, -3 arm rating in right field and on-base chances numbering 42 vs. righties, including 11 home run chances and all kinds of extra-base potential.

Tony Gwynn is a 1 e4 in right field for San Diego. He has 43 on-

base chances against pitchers from either side.

Tommy Herr is a 2 e13 at second base and has 51 chances to get on base when going against righties. Jack Clark of the Cardinals is again a tough out with a whopping 61 chances vs. lefties and 42 against RHPs. Clark's fielding continues to go down, though.

CARTER HAS BEST CARD AMONG CATCHERS

Among the catchers, Gary Carter is once again the best as he has 52 on-base chances vs. LHPs and 36 vs. RHPs, plus joins a group of Bob Boone, Lance Parrish, Gedman and Tony Pena with a rifle (-3 throwing) for an arm.

Tim Raines is a 39 vs. LHPs and 53 vs. RHPs and is a 2 e2, +2 arm in left field. He's an added threat because of his speed, naturally, being rated a AA stealer.

Mike Schmidt has his usual card, being a 50 vs. LHPs and 47 vs. RHPs and having 11 home run chances. His defense, though, continues to backslide as he's now a 3 e37 at third base.

The Yankees have a trio of stars as Rickey Henderson is an eye popping 68 vs. LHPs and 49 vs. RHPs as well as a 1 e11 in left and 2 ell in center. Don Mattingly, a 1 e7 at first, is a 36 vs. lefties and a 47 vs. RHPs, with lots of extra-base chances. Dave Winfield is a 1 e3 -5 arm in right, though he is only 33/34 as far as on-base chances after his offense dipped.

Eddie Murray has a typical Eddie Murray card. He's a 44 vs. LHPs and 46 vs. RHPs. He's a 1 e20 at first base. Teammate Cal Ripken and Alan Trammell of Detroit are both 2's at shortstop this year.

The only 1's at shortstop are Fernandez, Alfredo Griffin of the A's, Ozzie Smith of the Cardinals and San Diego's Garry Templeton.

BOGGS, BRETT BOTH HAVE GREAT CARDS

The two real-life buddies, George Brett and Wade Boggs, are great, as can be expected. They are both 2's at third. Brett has 49 chances vs. lefties and 54 against righties, while Boggs is a mind-boogling 54 vs. LHPs and 63 vs. RHPs.

When filling out a pitching staff, grab off for starters Dwight Gooden, John Tudor, Sid Fernandez, Fernando Valenzuela, Orel Hershiser, Rick Reuschel (yes, Reuschel, as he's got a super card!), Ron Guidry, Dave Stieb, Bret Saberhagen, Bert Blyleven, Dan Petry and Jimmy Key. you have two of the above on your staff, you're in great shape.

When calling for firemen, you'd want Willie Hernandez, Goose Gossage, Tom Niedenfuer, Dave Smith and Jeff Reardon.

Besides the young players already mentioned, there are rookies such as Vince Coleman, Mariano Duncan, Chris Brown, Shawn Dunston, Glenn Davis, Len Dykstra, Jose Uribe, Mitch Webster, Jose Canseco, T. Browning, Ozzie Guillen, Oddibe McDowell, Ernest Riles, Harry Salas, Tim Burke, Don Carman, Scott Garrelts, Joe Hesketh, Roger McDowell, Tom Henke, Brian Fisher, Ted Higuera, Danny Jackson, Steve Ontiveros and Stu Cliburn.

It's hard waiting those four long months for the cards to come out but when the cards finally arrive the wait is well worth it.

Two corrections needed

The Review has received word that two corrections are needed for the new baseball cards, according to the Strat-O-Matic Game Company.

Both of the corrections pertain to the supplementary stealing chart.

(1) Gary Carter of the New York Mets has a "O" listed under the column "out stealing." It should be just a dash.

(2) And Terry Francona of Montreal is not listed on the supplementary stealing chart and should be. His numbers are: Terry Francona * 5-5 2-6. 8 and (15-7).

He has an asterisk, stole five bases and was caught stealing five times. He gets a good lead on 2-6 and 8 and is picked off on 7. His rating is (15-7).

Many of the orders have the changes, but some of the early pickup and mailings did not, thus the reason for listing the two corrections.

Review has another birthday

First issue rolled off presses March, 1971

It's birthday time for the Strat-O-Matic Review. It was back in March of 1971 that the first issue - 14 pages worth at a cost of 35 cents - rolled off the presses.

Now, 179 issues and 4,176 pages later, the Review is still going strong and continuing to fill its role as a link between the Strat-O-Matic Game Co. in Glen Head, NY, and its gaming public. And. of course, the Review, has also always been a link between S-O-M gamers, the vehicle of communication, so to speak.

Over the years many, many changes have occurred, both in S-O-M's games and in the Review.

Back in March, 1971, for example, S-O-M Basketball, Hockey and College Football were still on the drawing board, or more likely still in Harold Richman's ever-functioning creative mind.

The baseball cards at that time did not have an advanced version. The cards were just skeltons of the amply-filled out cards of today. No lefty and righty batting and pitching, and, of course, no throwing arms for outfielders, "e" ratings, supplementary stealing, etc.

That first issue of the Review contained 16 pages, including a replay of the 1969 pro football season (which Kansas City won as in real-life), a brief introduction to the joys of league play, two letters (the birth pangs of Readers roll 'em), a couple of other replays (including the 1968 American League baseball season) and the first part of a three-part series about S-O-M's creator and his games.

The editors were introduced - at that time the Review's editors were Mike Allison, Dave Thompson and Del Newell, with only Newell still a partner in the enterprise — and an all-time records section was included. The so-called all-time records would be folded, spindled or otherwise mutilated in the next few months, so much so that all-time records were eclipsed by "all-world" marks. The all-time records were

soon discontinued.

Thompson was the first editor to leave the Review and Allison followed a few years later as he pulled up stakes and headed for Tennessee to study for the ministry. Upon his departure, Warren Newell, Del's younger brother, and his wife Karen came aboard.

Warren and Karen handle all the subscriptions and mailings, plus the bulk of the correspondence work, while Del, a sports writer at the Kalamazoo Gazette since 1968, does the editorial work.

Changes in S-O-M's games have always come to readers of the Review first, including the latest changes in baseball (additional extra players, no injuries on some players' cards, clutch hitting, ball park adjustment and the soon-to-be-delivered computer version).

In the January, 1972 issue (the price was still 35 cents, by the way), the Review broke the good news about advanced baseball coming out. The changes made a good game the best on the market as far as realism and continued speed of play.

As far as the Review, the first eight issues - March-Oct., 1971 - contained 16 pages. Beginning with the Nov., 1971 issue, the Review expanded to 20 pages. Sixteen more issues were churned out before, on March, 1973, the Review expanded to the current 24-page format.

READERS HAVE ALWAYS HAD VOICE IN REVIEW

Over the years many changes have occurred with the Review. too. As more games were developed, the Review had to "cut its coverage pie" into thinner slices. Guest columnists and the Readers roll 'em section have always given the readers a major voice in the Review - a voice Strat-O-Matic has always listened to.

Richman, for instance, has mentioned frequently that many of the changes in the games were prompted by comments made by readers.

And how many gamers have joined play-by-mail leagues or made new friendships because of the Review? Many "closet" gamers have found out they are not the only ones rollin? 'em.

Some readers have cried for an expanded Review and a few have wanted to join as partners. A couple have even suggested we send them our subscription lists so they could start up a rival publication devoted to the sports that they didn't think we covered adequately.

Mailing costs have prevented expansion of the Review beyond 24 pages. And, as far as rival publications, there have been and are a few of those in existence today. The trend today seems to be toward evaluating and rating player cards, particularly in baseball. Check the "For Sale" section under advertisements this month (or any month) and you will see what we mean.

The biggest problem with publishing the Review every month has nothing to do with other publications, or gleaning through and evaluating 200-page league yearbooks. The real problem is and always has been time! If the Review was not published, think of all the Strat-O-Matic game playing that could take place.

Only kidding, of course. Although the Review does take time, the editors still roll their dice in local face-to-face, long-running baseball and football leagues, plus occasionally replay the playoffs or championship series in all the sports.

180 ISSUES ... 4, 192 PAGES!

The readers of the Review have been the major reason for those 180 issues and 4,192 pages...without your interest and support the publication would have expired long ago.

It's been a labor of love for 16 years now. And the labor of love will continue.

Coleman is first pick in N.L.

Two blockbuster trades highlight start of GKSML's 31st season

Who would you draft first if you were picking the rookies in a 1986 (based on 1985 real-life) National League draft league?

If you're shy of pitching, would it be Tom Browning, the Cincinnati Reds' 20-game winner?

Or would it be speedster Vince Coleman, provided there were no ill effects from the episode with the mechnical tarp in last year's World

Series?

Or how about some ex-American Leaguers who are in the N.L. now? Veterans like Lamarr Hoyt and Rick Reuschel, the latter of whom is making his second trip into the N.L. ranks, should go high in any draft, too.

Well, as far as the Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League (GKSML) which includes Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell in its ranks and has already begun its 31st full-season, 154-game replay, the answer

lies in Vince Coleman.

Coleman was chosen No. 1 by Del Newell, who 'earned' the pick by finishing last in the N.L. a year ago with a 59-93 record. Newell hesitated briefly, mainly because he was concerned about Coleman's ineffectiveness against southpaws, but then decided with all that speed, a good card against righties and youth on his side, to go for it.

The GKSML has played 17 games of its newest season and Coleman, although kept off the bases in four games and out for another with an injury, has stolen 14 bases in 17 attempts.

A good pick - certainly for the future!

The second choice was Mariano Duncan, shortstop for the Los Angeles Dodgers who's rated a 2 e38 at shortstop and is another roadrunner on the bases (stealing: 6-7 for a good lead; 19-14; running: 1-17). Gary Tien, a data processor, tabbed Duncan.

Gary King, a computer programmer and the newest member of the GKSML, took over a team that had the third-round choice and he picked Browning.

The oldies, Hoyt and Reuschel, went fourth and fifth, with Todd Newell, Del's 22-year-old son, selecting Hoyt and Jeff Kik, manager of a Gordon Food Service store, choosing Reuschel, who has a very good and tough to hit card.

Del Newell, in case you've forgotten or are a new subscriber, is a sports writer at the Kalamazoo Gazette and the 'senior citizen' of the GKSML, being 44 years young. He and his brother Warren, a junior high band instructor in Otsego, located about 18 miles north of Kalamazoo, have played Strat-O-Matic games for 23 years.

Both Gary's, Tien and King, are 33 years old, Warren is 40, while Jeff Kik is 31. Other members of the GKML include: Mike Pryson, 24, a student at Western Michigan University and part-time sports writer at the Gazette; Pat Stemas, 32, guidance counselor at Galien High School; Jeff Green, 28, a paint manufacturer; and Bruce Mulder, 29, a factory supervisor.

Mulder and Stemas hear traveling music every Sunday night during the season, with Mulder motoring to Kalamazoo from Grand Rapids (about a 50-mile drive) and Stemas from Dowagiac (also about 50 miles).

TWO BLOCKBUSTER TRADES

Before the GKSML had its annual draft, a three-hour period was used to look over the new National League cards, including extras, and discuss trades.

Trade talk for almost two and one-half hours was just that: talk. But suddenly one trade was made...then another...and before long two (continued on next page)

blockbuster trades were consummated. They were two of the biggest ever

in GKSML history.

One of the trades had Todd Newell giving up perennial all-star center fielder Dale Murphy (remember, Todd also has Dwight Gooden on his team, but he feels two superstars aren't enough to carry him to a pennant). Murphy was traded to Mike Pryson, who the year before traded Gooden to Todd for Walt Terrell, Tim Raines and the seventh player overall in the draft. Payback time? Perhaps.

Pryson minutes before had sent second baseman Juan Samuel to Pat Stemas for his first-round draft pick (No. 7 overall). Pryson had both Tommy Herr and Samuel on his team, thus he could afford to part with one of the second basemen.

So, Pryson traded his first (No. 4 overall), the pick acquired from Pat (No. 7) and his second-round selection (No. 14) for Murphy. Todd then turned around and drafted Hoyt (4), Kevin Bass (7) and Chris Brown (14). Todd had previously traded away his own first-round pick.

Blockbuster II occurred when good buddies Jeff Kik and Bruce Mulder traded the likes of Pedro Guerrero, Mike Marshall and relief ace Ken Howell.

Bruce sent Guerrero and his first-round draft choice (No. 5 overall) to Jeff for Marshall, Mark Bailey, Graig Nettles and Howell. Kik took Reuschel with the draft pick.

PITCHING AGAIN AT A PREMIUM

Pitching again was all-important as 11 hurlers were chosen in the first two rounds of the draft and six went in the first round.

In addition to Hoyt and Reuschel, Joe Hesketh was chosen No. 8 by Warren, Don Carman No. 9 by Kik and Roger McDowell No. 10 by Jeff Green. The fact that Carman and McDowell are relievers and that Hesketh only hurled 155 innings, further indicates the lack of pitching available in the draft.

Two other significant trades had Gary King sending Nolan Ryan to pitching thin Del Newell for his second round pick (No. 11 overall) and Bruce giving up his second round choice (No. 15 overall) to Pat for Joaquin Andujar, who during the off season was traded to the American League and thus is unlikely (unless traded back to the N.L.) to have a card in the N.L.

It's interesting to note the number of veterans drafted high. The future for those players is obviously limited. But in many cases it was a matter of trying to secure players with enough at-bats and innings pitched to fill out a representative roster.

The GKSML adheres strictly to at-bats and innings pitched, with no percentage basis. A pitcher can start a game with one inning left and go the distance, however. A 26-player roster is allowed, providing there are three catches as part of the 26. Otherwise, a 25-man roster is the rule.

Readers roll 'em

PLAYING TIP UNCLEAR

One quibble - in your December issue (page 22) you give a basketball tip that is, I think, incomplete and maybe a little misleading.

You state "1-shot fouls are not shot until the guilty team has four personal fouls in the quarter."

Of course, a team does not starting shooting the oneshot fouls until the other team has accumulated five team fouls. Your statement could be read this way, but it implies that the team will start shooting when the other team just gets to four team fouls.

Also, even if a team does not get five team fouls it will be in the penalty situation when it commits two fouls (excluding offensive fouls, of course) in the last two minutes of any quarter.

Editor's note: Reader Gercken is correct that a team is not in the penalty situation until the fifth team foul is committed. We said the fourth foul was the last before the penalty situation when into effect, which is saying the same thing. Gercken makes a good point - and one the Review did not make - when he states the penalty situation is in effect during the last two minutes of a quarter after two fouls are committed, even if the team fouling has not been charged with five fouls.

Play-by-mail leagues, other than in baseball, are usually shortlived undertakings. In hockey, football and basketball - Strat-O-Mat-ic's other table games - such PBM leagues are usually ready for the undertaker shortly after birth pangs have sounded.

Baseball is, of course, the easiest board game to play by mail because the instruction sheets are much simpler and do not have to take into account as many situations in the other sports, especially regarding substitutions.

That's why whenever a full-season FBM replay of any of the other sports is accomplished, it's a happening worth noting in the Review.

Take for example the Florida Gold Coast Hockey Association, founded seven years ago by Bob Lopeck of Florida. The first couple of years saw a revolving door of coaches, with most of the departures directly proportional to records with a disportionate number of wins at home and on the road.

Some coaches dropped out for the usual reasons: not enough time, lack of interest, losing teams, illness, family problems, etc.

Lopeck was a tower of strength in keeping the FGCHA alive when it appeared one die was already in the grave. Remember, Lopeck was the gamer who created a realistic penalty chart that was used by many other hockey gamers. His contributions were many in the world of S-O-M.

Lopeck is no longer affiliated with the FGCHA today, but it has continued to survive and, in fact, is now playing the 1985-86 season. "The 1984-85 season...was our first complete season without our

founder and only commissioner, Bob Lopeck," relates Joe Nixon, a charter member of the FGCHA who coaches the New York Nighthawks.

"We also lost three original coaches this season, as well as two other coaches. The coaches we did have went through illnesses, deaths in the family, job changes and business trips. Fortunately, all the new coaches finished the season and all but one are back in 1985-86.

"The FGCHA seems to have survived its worst crisis and looks strong as we face the start of what hopefully will be the rebirth of the best PBM league in S-O-M," says Nixon.

GRETZKY REPEATS AS MVP

Wayne Gretzky of the Schaumburg Skatamoks (meaning unknown) was, to the surprise of no one, the league's Most Valuable Player for second straight season. Gretzky led Schaumburg to a 46-30-4 record in the Eastern Division of the Lopeck Conference (see, he's not forgotten) and a sweep through the playoffs until losing to coach Cliff Dolgins' New York Dolphins in the Cloverleaf Cup final (the FGCHA's Stanley Cup).

Gretzky's stats included 94 goals, 59 assists, 154 total points. 22 power play goals, 15 short-handed goals, 15 game-winning goals, 11

hat tricks and an on-target shooting percentage of .284.

New Rochelle, NY) - New York Dolphins; Steve Scott (Alta Dena, CA) - California Rangers; Bill Severn (Baltimore, MD) - Essex Cougars; and Bill Ziem (Union Lake, MI) - Union Lake Owls.

The lengthy Cloverleaf playoffs finally came down to two teams - the N.Y. Dolphins and Schaumburg - both of whom were in the finals for the first time.

The Skatamoks, behind Gretzky's hat trick and a pair of goals by Paul Coffey, including the game-winner, captured the opener in an overtime thriller, 6-5. But the Dolphins demolished Schaumburg in the second game, 9-2, as John Tonelli had a Texas hat trick (four goals) and Rick Middleton two.

Game three also went to New York (6-3), as well as game four, which was a defensive battle (3-1). Kent Nilsson assisted on all three Dolphin goals. New York then wrapped up the Cloverleaf Cup by winning game five, 7-6, holding off a Dolphin attack that almost overcame a 7-2 disadvantage with four third-period goals.

Brian Bellows of the Dolphins was named MVP of the playoffs after scoring 16 goals, including three game-winners. Gretzky, for his part, produced playoff highs for points (43), goals (21) and assists (22).

Earlier in the playoffs, the Skatamoks were victimized by the California Rangers who bombed 'em for five goals in seven minutes in an 8-7 shootout won by the Rangers after five players from the two teams had each scored a pair of goals.

In another game in the same series, Marcel Dionne and Glenn Anderson each had Texas hat tricks as the Rangers rang up a 12-7 victory. Standings, playoffs and leaders:

Strat-O-Matic spotlight

A couple of more marathon Strat-O-Matic Baseball games have crossed the desk of the Review, including a 'legitimate' one that went 41 innings.

The 1978 Cincinnati Reds and the '75 Philadelphia Phillies were the combatants in the 41-inning battle played by Dave Donat of Glenview, IL. "It was impressive because it pitted two legitimate, quality teams," says Donat.

Each team, because of limited availability, used only four pitchers. The most exciting inning was the 25th when Greg Luzinski hit his second home run of the game, a two-run shot. But the Reds, now trailing 5-3, struck back in the bottom of the 25th when Dan Driessen doubled in two runs with the bases loaded and two outs. Fete Rose, the runner on first when Driessen delivered, couldn't deliver the winning run as he was cut down at the plate on a throw from Ollie Brown.

Finally, in the top of the 41st, Luzinski doubled in Garry Maddox to end the marathon. Luzinski was MVP (8-15, 2 HRs, 4 RBI), while Larry Bowa was non-existent at bat, going O-for-14. Ron Reed preserved the win by striking out Driessen, George Foster and Johnny Bench in the bottom of the 41st.

The Phillies finished with 7 runs, 29 hitts and committed no errors, while the numbers for the Reds were 6. 34 and 1.

Another marathon game reported was a 25-inning encounter between the '62 Yankees and '64 White Sox. Joe Cortese, of Brooklyn. NY, an S-O-M player for 16 years, engaged longtime friend Tom Gacatoca.

The Yanks finally won what Cortese calls "my most unusual game" by scoring four runs in the 25th for a 7-3 triumph. Tom Tresh's RBI single and a three-run homer by Elston Howard finished it off. Jim Bouton pitched eight innings and got the win, while Roger Maris collected two doubles and a homer for the Yanks.

TOURNAMENT FIELD - 272 TEAMS!

James Earnisse of Chicago played the Big Daddy of the S-O-M solitaire baseball tournaments when he took 272 teams and over a six-week period managed to whip off 286 games - an average of six per day for 46 days.

All the teams from the 1984, '83, '82, '81, '80, '79 and '70 seasons were used, as well as many others from the '70s and 26 old-timer teams. It was single-elimination until the semifinals, which was best-of-five, with the finals a best-of-seven affair.

Semifinals were - and this should make long-suffering Cubs' fans happy - the 1929 and '06 Cubs, '77 California Angels and '48 Indians. Cleveland defeated the '29 Cubbies, 3-0, and the '06 Cubs downed the Angels, 3-1.

In the championship series it was all the Indians as Cleveland wrapped it up in five games. Overall, the Tribe had a 13-1 record, a team average of .332, the leading hitter in Thurman Tucker (31-61, .508) and the MVP. Bob Feller, who was 5-0 and struck out 27 in 45 innings. The '06 Cubs were the swiftest, stealing 33 bases in 40 attempts.

had a game like this one"...Jimmy Goetz, 14, of Brockport, NY, threw out the first die for his first official game of S-O-M Baseball by visiting neighbor LaVere Curran (Curran's age was not listed but he has fond recollections of the Hall of Fame players). Goetz managed the National League HOF and Curran the A.L. Whitey Ford hit a grand-slam in the fifth inning that carried the A.L. to a 5-4 victory. "Sandy Koufax had pitched great for four innings." relates Curran. "It was an unbelievable home run by Ford!"...Another 14-year-old, Jeff Hale, Buna, TX, is president of a fall-winter, mostly face-to-face league that currently includes all eighth-grade junior high students... The Woolridge Hall League of Lock Haven, PA, University - now a three-member league consisting of Mick Miller, Mike Grubb and Scott Crispell - also had a marathon as Grubb's Aces and Crispell's Firefist hooked up in a 19-inning duel that was finally decided when Don Mattingly's error led to a pair of runs and a 3-1 Aces win. Steve Bedrosian ('84) and Willie Hernandez ('84) pitched for the Firefist, with Hernandez going the last seven, while John Denny ('83) and Jesse Orosco ('83) pitched for the Aces, with Orosco getting the victory after also a seven-inning relief stint.

Questions & Answers

Editor's note: Questions pertaining to individual and team ratings will not, in most cases, be answered, unless a mistake has been made on the card. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, divulge its card-making formula, which would be necessary to answer some of the questions completely.

QUESTION: Does "plus injury" apply to the designated hitter, or is it ignored like injuries to pinch-hitters?

ANSWER: No, it is not ignored. Injuries to designated hitters are treated the same as other injuries.

QUESTION: On a 4 on 4 situation in hockey, home left wing has the puck. The next action card reads "possible breakaway" and the split number reads "LW (C)." Can the LW still get the breakaway shot?

ANSWER: Yes, according to S-O-M.

QUESTION: How can there be an offensive foul in S-O-M Basketball on an open position shot, especially when the offensive player is not penetrating?

ANSWER: S-O-M's explanation is that an open position shot does not mean the defensive player disappears. He is still guarding the offensive player - albeit close enough to draw a charge - although the offensive player does dictate the action and that an open shot by a guard from outside should seldom result in a charging foul. Inside players are usually not completely open either. They would have more of a tendency to draw a charge, even on so-called open shots, than the backcourt players.

Nuggets, Natt shine in NBA playoff replay

'Healthy' Denver surprises L.A.

There are many reasons for playing Strat-O-Matic games; to replay your favorite team through an entire season, to replay an entire league, to beat the neighborhood bully in something to make up for the physical beatings he's adminstered to you, for camaraderie and good times, etc. The list could go on and on, ad infinitum.

One of the most popular forms of gaming methodology is the "what if?" What if the 1927 Yankees played the '53 Dodgers, the '68 Chiefs met the '72 Dolphins, or the best Islander team skated against Edmonton

and Wayne Gretzky, 1984 or '85 vintage.

Neal Linkon, who resides in Denver, CO, and is a fan of the Denver Nuggets, naturally - wanted to find out what would have happened if the Nuggets had been at full strength when they faced eventual champion, the Los Angeles Lakers, in the playoffs.

Remember this is the Denver team that had acquired some defense to go with one of the NBA's most explosive lineups offensively. Wayne Cooper, Calvin Natt, Fat Lever and two draft picks went to the Nuggets in exchange for high-scoring Kiki Vandeweghe in a trade with Portland.

And remember also that Denver has traditionally given the Lakers

trouble in the Western Conference playoffs.

In real life the Nuggets battled L.A. with point guard Lever hurting with a bum knee and, with the series at 2-1 in the Lakers' favor and the fourth game being played in Denver, Alex English, the Nuggets' leading scorer, broke a finger.

The Lakers breezed the rest of the way, as they did through most

of the playoffs.

"The question burning in the minds of most Nugget fans, and perhaps NBA fans nation-wide," says Linkon, "centered on the 'what ifs' that make Strat games so fascinating. What if Lever and English had been healthy?

"Could Denver have beaten the high-powered Lakers with a full deck? We will never know for sure, but a replay using the Strat cards from last year's season could provide some clues.

THE 'NATT' ATTACK

Calvin Natt, one of the acquisitions from Portland, turned out to be the difference as Denver surprised L.A. in Linkon's replay, winning in six games. Natt averaged 34.5 points and grabbed 9.1 rebounds, plus managed to draw enough fouls on Kurt Rambis to keep one of the Lakers' unsung heroes on the bench for long spells.

The Nuggets were deployed in a sag defense to shut down Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and James Worthy inside. Bryan Scott and Michael Cooper did hurt Denver from the outside with 3-point shots, however. L.A. used

a normal defense and both teams ran a fast-break.

The Lakers opened the series by scoring a 104-96 victory as Jabbar rang up 36 points. Natt had 33 for Denver. Rambis was a major force as he blocked five shots and had four steals to go with six points and five rebounds.

Denver captured game two as the Nuggets began to go inside more to draw fouls on Rambis. Natt poured in 34 as Denver won 107-101. Jabbar had 32 for the Lakers, who faded in the fourth quarter as Denver ruled the offensive board.

Game three was a two-point thriller, won by Denver, 111-109. Natt had 32 points and nine rebounds, Jabbar 34 tallies, but Rambis got into immediate foul trouble and the Lakers again lagged on the offensive boards. Denver's inside game also slowed L.A.'s fast-break to a walk.

Game four was another thriller, with Denver winning 116-114, (continued on next page)

despite Magic Johnson being credited with a whopping 18 assists. The Lakers, however, were hampered by foul troubles as Jabbar, Rambis and Scott all exited via the six-count. Cooper of the Nuggets also fouled out, but Dan Issel, Denver's greybeard, turned in a 21-point, five-rebound performance. Worthy led the Lakers with 28 points and eight rebounds.

The series returned to L.A. for game five and the Lakers pulled out a 107-106 squeaker as Magic had a scoring/assist double of 17. Denver had trailed by 23 points midway through the third period, however, before almost overtaking the Lakers.

Denver did clinch the series in game six, winning 123-122. Never more than seven points separated the two teams in another tight battle that wasn't decided until the last action card.

Natt again led Denver, pouring in 36 points, while English and Lever chipped in 21 apiece. Magic was spectacular for the Lakers in a losing cause, pumping in 24 points, grabbing eight rebounds and dishing out 20 assists. He was perfect from the field, swishing all 10 of his attempts, plus was four of five from the free throw line.

The result of the playoffs has Linkon convinced that a healthy Denver squad could have toppled the Lakers in real-life, too. But Linkon stresses "how well the Nuggets have always matched up against the Lakers," and adds, "I doubt the Nuggets would match up very well with the Celtics."
