Along with snapping pictures and taking names, addresses and league information, S-O-M also found a few moments to pass along to the Review some card corrections for the

1989 set and also the 1962 reprinted season.

Main correction in the 1989 Main correction in the 1989 set would be to eliminate the asterisk on Damon Berryhill's card for stealing. The Chicago Cub catcher is a -3 throwing - that's not a mistake - but he shouldn't be an asterisk ("*2/-(20-6)" on the supplementary stealing.

Two other minor changes need to be made on the basic side of the

to be made on the basic side of the cards for Detroit's Luis Salazar and Chet Lemon. Lemon should have just right field listed on his basic side for position(s) played. So eliminate second and first base.

And on Salazar's basic side, add first base (1b-4), second base (2b-4) and shortstop (ss-4) to the ratings he already has for the three outfield positions and third base.

In the 1962 set, four cards have different (transposed) basic and advanced sides: Rollie Sheldon (pitcher, New York Yankees); Tom Morgan (pitcher, Los Angeles Angels); Howie Bedell (outfielder, Milwaukee); and Georges Maranda (pitcher, Minnesota).

Some of the corrections may have been made in later card sets.

In addition, S-0-M also has for sale the 3 1/2-inch computer disk for the 1962 season (cost: \$15).

And how about MVP Kirk Gibson, is he the top left fielder in the Or is Jose Canseco the best right fielder in the A.L.?

What stars do you have on your play-by-mail or face-to-face draft league roster?

And what about the rookies? Who are the stars of the future?
All of these questions and many more are answered - perhaps not to
your liking - in the position-by-position listings below and on the

following pages.

Again, like last year, Jeff Green, the super successful manager in a long-running PBM league and the face-to-face Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League (GKSML), has evaluated the new cards and come up with his ratings.

The player ratings are for each position and include, in order, a listing of fielding rating (1-4), 'e' number, throwing arm and on-base chances (hits, walks, hit-by-pitch, etc.) against left- and right-handed pitchers.

Pitchers have their holding-on rating listed and on-base chances

they give up to left- and right-handed batters.
Rookies are also rated in both leagues. "Only first-ever cards are

considered rookies," points out Green. "Also, rookie ratings are based strictly on future potential, not strength of card this year."

Oh, by the way, Green rates Will Clark slightly better at first base than Galarraga. And Gibson, because of defensive deficiencies, is only ranked No. 3 among N.L. leftfielders, behind Barry Bonds and Kevin

Rookies to go for first if you're in a draft league are Gary Sheffield of Milwaukee in the American League and Greg Jefferies in the

It's interesting to compare the recent GKSML National League draft with Green's rookie ratings. The first player chosen was Tim Belcher, who was listed No. 5 on Green's rankings. But Greg Jefferies was selected second in the draft - he probably would have been No. 1 if not for limited at-bats - and Chris Sabo was picked No. 4 in the draft, the same spot he occuppied on the rookie list.

Here's the way the others were drafted: Roberto Alomar (No. 10), Mark Grace (18), Ricky Jordan (28), Kevin Elster (12), Damon Berryhill (16), Pete Smith (24) and Scott Terry (15).

Remember also that the GKSML's draft always includes players traded from one league to another and players dropped from rosters in addition to rookies who have S-O-M cards for the first time.

Will Roberts shares 'World' TBA honors

Kreuz deadlocks for first place as 33 gamers earn prize money

Where there's a Will there's a way - to win a Table Baseball Asso-

ciation championship, that is.


The will in this case refers to Will Roberts, from New Haven, CT, who along with TBA director John Kreuz had the will and perseverance to survive over three days of rigorous dice-rollin' against the best S-O-M Baseball managers in the land.

When the final die was cast at 11:20 p.m. at the World Championship in the conference rooms of Glenview's (IL) Radisson Suite Hotel, Rogers and Kreuz were deadlocked for first place. Each had played 18 games on that final Sunday (Jan. 15) and 63 games over a five-day span.

"Everyone was exhausted by that time," said Kreuz. "So we just called it a tie. I didn't think it would look good for the tournament if I won, so I

cheerfully gave Roberts the first prize money (\$1,000)."

The two shared first place overall, with Kreuz compiling a 40-23 record for the total tournament and Roberts going 38-25. Kreuz's park, in case you were curious, was Houston, while Roberts'

was Kansas City.
"Three of the people to make the finals Sunday had pitchers' parks," noted Kreuz. "Those with pitchers' parks were at the top of the standings.'

SIXTY COMPETED FOR \$5,750

Sixty gamers competed for \$5,750 in prize money that was awarded at the World Championships, Over 100 gamers had qualified in earlier TBA tourneys.

"This was the largest, and also longest, World we've ever had," said Kreuz, who himself had qualified and earned the right to compete. "The 33 checks I wrote out were an all-time high. Each player paid \$100 and over half of them won money."

The 10 finalists when Sunday finally dawned were Roberts, Kreuz, Kevin Verduine (Mt. Prospect, IL), regular-season TBA champ Jim Jasper (Schaumburg, IL), Bob Scofield (Stratford, CT), Willie Dominquez (Miami, FL), Jeff Schwarze (Glendale Heights, IL), Jeff Watson (Upper Darby, PA) and Mike Wilson (Buffalo Grove, IL).

"From third through 10th place, everyone received a minimum of \$250," noted Kreuz. And there was also, for those who didn't qualify for the final 10, a consolation tournament. Alan Ellenby, last year's TBA champ from Deerfield, IL, and Vic Moise of Detroit shared first in the consolation tourney.

Schwarze, who had Atlanta or a hitter's park, was third and Watson

(park: Toronto) finished fourth.

BELIEVE IT OR NOT ...

"Everything went smoothly," enthused Kreuz of the overall tournament. "Some of the games, because of such great hitting, were very bizarre." (continued on next page)

One of those involved Kreuz and what he thought was a pretty fair reliever in right-hander Jim Gott. In that forgetable game Kreuz led by four runs, Gott was pitching and five right-handed batters were due up. "All five reached base off their own cards," said Kreuz incredously. "And then Chris James homered off a diamond chance. It was just unbelievable."

In another game, Kevin McReynolds, an e4 in the outfield, had three "x" chances in the first inning - yes, in just one inning! All three fell in.

And in still another, Hank Smith of Torrence, CA, watched in amazement as his Mark McGwire slammed five consecutive home runs in a game.

NEW TBA SEASON OPENS APRIL 7-9

Kreuz says no major changes are planned for the 1989 TBA season, which, incidentally, begins April 7-9 at Newark, NJ. A total of 26 tournaments are planned, with the last being Dec. 1-3, again back at Newark.

There's also a TBA gathering slated for Long Island, the weekend of August 4-6. "Luminaries from S-0-M will be in attendance," says Kreuz.

The 26 tournaments mean Kreuz, who's a family man, will be on the road for half the weekends this year. "I still enjoy it but there are times when I have burnout," he admits.

Partly because of that, and also because the entry fee cost is used to defray expenses, rent the conference room and pay for postage, the entry cost is going to \$60.

"Your first 1989 tournament (will cost) - \$90," says Kreuz. "All subsequent 1989 tournaments - \$60." Kreuz is also offering a special discount: if you preregister for your first two 1989 tournaments, the cost is \$120.

Based on 50 entrants for a tourney, the anticipated prizes will be \$100 for first place, \$250 for second, \$150 for third and \$100 for fourth. There will also, in most cases, be a consolation tournament in which the winner receives \$100

which the winner receives \$100.
"Prizes may vary and will depend on the exact number of entrants,"

says Kreuz

Format for a TBA tournament is to draft on Friday night, play regular-season games on Saturday (8 a.m., -11 p.m.) and conduct playoffs and consolation tournament on Sunday, "You are guaranteed a minimum of 20 games and could get to play as many as 37 games," says Kreuz. "For most entrants the cost will be less than \$3/hour."

DESIGN YOUR OWN PARK

Probably the only major change in the TBA rules is that gamers can now design their own ballparks as far as triangles and diamonds. When signing up in advance, a gamer can note what he/she wants the diamond and triangle chances to be.

"Entrants paying at the door automatically receive last year's Montreal with both diamonds and triangles of 1 to 10," says Kreuz.

There will be some effort made to speed up play, too.

* Now that we've got pitchers' hold-on, balks and wild pitches, we need only four more things to make pitchers complete.

Three of them are easy - individual fielding range (1-4), individual baserunning and individual bunting. I just can't accept that Goose Gossage and Roger McDowell are the same at preventing hits up the middle or elsewhere in the infield.

And the only thing you have to do to handle this is give us the new readings for the Pitchers' Fielding Chart (on the advanced chart, that's only a maximum of six result changes - which can be communicated on the sheet that accompanies the card shipments). And if a Tom Glavine or Orel Hershiser can help themselves with bunts and baserunning while an Al Holland doesn't bother to learn, that should show up somewhere.

The fourth thing is a biggie: double-play frequency for pitchers. not sure it's any more fair or real to have groundball/flyball frequency be identical for all pitchers than it would be to ignore DP fre-

for hitters or fielders. quency

You could accomplish this merely by re-distributing the "X" chances on pitchers' cards. And by doing this, you'd probably account for most of the so-called "clutch-hitting" arguments as well. The guys who most frequently get the double-play grounder are probably the same guys whose ERAs are lower than their hits/walks-allowed rate would indicate.

* An advanced computer version that, at the very least, requires fewer keystrokes in the manual game (a single key for outs other than Ks with nobody on, for example), 40-man rosters to account for all carded players and trades, an enhanced stats report with such things as on-base percentage, slugging percentage and perhaps lefty-righty breakdown. Many leagues need something that shows percentage of at-bats/innings pitched used.

Most of all, the computer game needs a computer manager and a computer-vs.-computer feature to conduct whole-season replays. If I'm replaying the '61 Yanks, I want to know where Maris ranks among the HR leaders, but I'm not sure I've got the time or patience to play all

those Angels-Senators games just to find out.

* I'd pay whatever asked for a card set that rates the all-time best players of each franchise (at least the original 16) on career

stats

Give me 25-30 players per team, spread them out among the various eras and make them with advanced-game features. I want them with career stats because we already have many of the stars' best cards available and, besides, an outfield with Mantle-Ruth-DiMaggio is awesome enough without using each of their best seasons.

Career stats will give you .300 hitters, but .270 hitters, too. And pitchers who are human. Can you imagine the Giants with a rotation

of Mathewson-McGinnity-Hubbell-Marichal?

MORE DEFENSIVE RANGES NEEDED

* The Larkin experience this year makes me wonder if a six-tiered

defensive range wouldn't work better.

This year you've made Dave Anderson a 2el2 at short. If (Alfredo) Griffin needs to be a 1 and Anderson a 2 to make the Dodgers win enough that's fine. But acknowledging that most Strat players play draft leagues, it can't be right that Anderson, who played a half-season at short, is better than Uribe, Cal Ripken and all but the five 1s.

And it can't be right that Chili Davis, a 4el6, is just as bad as

the club-footed first basemen who play one game in the outfield.

A six-tiered system would give is only to the Gold Glove winners and those who should have won Golds; 2s to the Joe Carters and Uribes, who starred but weren't quite among the elite, and to the Ripkens, who are consistently good without being flashy; 3s to Larkins, who are tal ented; 4s to the truly average, like Jeltz, Santana and many, many others; 5s to the true liabilities, like Howard Johnson and Chili Davis; 6s to the butchers, like Larry Sheets, and to the dozens who made token appearances out of position.

* This baby boomer can hardly wait for the 1959 set - it will be like playing with my first set of Topps cards - but I'm afraid we'll have to wait forever for 1964 and '67, two of the best pennant-race seasons ever. At the very least, let's see those before '63, '65 and

'66.

* Now that you've addicted us to the Supplementary Stealing and Ballpark effects, we need those for past seasons as well. For the years (continued on next page)

when caught-stealing stats are unavailable, we'd rather have something

nearly accurate than those A-B-C ratings.

* A real hit-and-run system. The current one is awful, to be ignored by all but the worst hitters.

FOOTBALL...BASKETBALL...HOCKEY

* It's time for past seasons and/or great teams and Hall-of-Fame sets. Football needs cards for Jim Brown-Layne-Tittle-McElhenny-Baugh-Hirsch and so many more. Basketball needs Cousy-Russell-Chamberlain-West-Robertson and Co. Hockey needs Howe-Hull-Richard-Plante-Harvey-

Orr, etc.

* The computer versions of these games might even be more valuable than for baseball, because these games are more difficult to play solitaire. Again, the computer manager is essential. And because these games take longer to play, a computer-vs.-computer function is indispensible for replays.

The pro football game needs two of the features in the college

Like the colleges, NFL teams should have their own interception-return columns. And college punters have some results with "no return" and split chances on blocked punts. NFL punters who sacrifice distance for hang time always have been at a disadvantage in Strat and those who

have had only one blocked will have too many in a full season of Strat. * Individual fumble ratings for ballhandlers.

Shouldn't you be able to hand off to a "safer" back in key situations? Why is it impossible to fumble after a pass reception? On teams with low interception rates, it is safer to pass when protecting a lead against many opponents than to run.

* More meaningful rebound ratings in basketball and assist rat-

ings in hockey. There is no meaningful difference between a 18 or 36 in basketball and hockey's playmaking geniuses are no better than the 40-assist men. Hockey could greatly benefit from something like the "dazzler" pass in basketball.

* A more realistic penalty system in hockey that takes into account the actual frequency of a player's minors, majors and misconducts and how often his penalties make his team shorthanded. Goalies should have penalty ratings, too.

* Another easy one: shooting ranges for hockey players that reflect their true-life tendencies, like the basketball game.

Balance back in S-O-M Baseball

Cards, ballpark charts reflect power reduction

Last year's Strat-O-Matic Baseball card set was a hitter's dream and a pitcher's nightmare. Frankly, the pitchers didn't stand a chance when it came to replays, tournaments, draft leagues, etc.

when it came to replays, tournaments, drait leagues, etc.

A total of 4,458 roundtrippers were knocked out by the 26 major
league teams - or an average of 171,5 per team.

But the balance is back in baseball with the 1989 set (based on
'88 real-life season) of S-O-M cards. Pitching and defense are going to have a big impact again as 1,278 fewer homers were hit last season than the year before.

Last year the home run average was 122.3 per team, or almost 50 fewer than the '87 real-life season.

The new cards, of course, reflect the power reduction, as do the ball park ratings in some cases. There weren't, except for Montreal and Cincinnati, any drastic power shifts, with 10 of the ball parks remaining the same with their ratings. ing the same with their ratings.

Montreal, which was a 1-10 home run chance the year before, dropped to 1-6, while Cincinnati, a 1-13 last summer, is up to 1-16. A decrease of four in Montreal's case and an increase of three for Cincinnation ati. In the American League, meanwhile, the biggest change was a plus/minus two. Seven of the A.L. parks had the same power rating.

In the ball park singles category, Philadelphia went from a 1-13 to a 1-10 and Los Angeles made the biggest gain, from 1-9 to 1-12.

This is the fourth year S-O-M has had ball park ratings and each

year there have been changes.

Below is a listing of the ball parks, their ratings for each of the four years and whether there's been an increase (+), decrease (-) or the 1989 rating is the same (SA) as in '88 (last column). The numbers listed are for a successful ball park single and home run.

LIKES SOLITAIRE CHART

I might be in the minority, but I actually enjoy using S-O-M Football's solitaire chart, as long as it is seen for what it is.

And that's a chance to play defensive coordinator and modern day quarterback when playing solitaire. I say modern day quarterback as the plays are given to you by the chart, but you do have audible capabilities when "option" pops up on the chart.

Nowadays, quarterbacks do not call their own plays, except when they audible.

Of course, there are times when playing solitaire that I would like to be able to play the role of a modern day offensive coordinator, or to be magically whisked back to the days when quarterbacks like Johnny Unitas, Bart Starr and Joe Namath called their own plays.

For this, Larry Larochelle's solitaire chart (originally printed in the 9/86 issue and reprinted in the 11/88 issue) makes an excellent addition to solitaire play.

I also use this chart and S-O-M's own in what could be considered an unconventional manner.

I sometimes, when playing face-to-face (this is mutually agreed upon with and used similarly by the face-to-face opponent) will randomly utilize these charts to call a defensive or offensive play. This can throw off an opponent who is predicating his play-calling on your tendencies and patterns.

Just one other point I'd like to make. Over the years the S-O-M Review has printed many outstanding football playing tips from both individuals and leagues. These tips have added tremendous enjoyment to the playing of an outstanding game.

But I am still waiting for somebody to come up with a playing tip to simulate fumbles for receivers who do so after catching the ball. I do not know what is the percentage of this occurrence, but I do know from watching NFL games that it occurs often enough that it needs to be incorporated into S-O-M Football, either by a playing tip or by the game company itself.

Baseball playing tips

PLAYS AT THE PLATE...TIRED PITCHERS

By WALLY BASS, Elmwood Park, IL

I have been playing Strat-O-Matic Baseball for about 14 years and have been very pleased with its realism.

When I subscribed to the Review I was delighted to read of others who also enjoy the game. Of special interest to me is when fellow gamers send in playing tips or rule changes they use. I'd like to pass along two that I have been using:

First, not enough credit seems to be given to the defensive skills of catchers. My brother, Tom, suggests that the range rating of the catcher come into play on throws to the plate.

Plays at the plate, while not frequent, are the most exciting single play in the game because they mean the difference between a run or an out, and they involved prolonged suspense waiting for the result of the throw

It seems that a quality catcher would be able to size up the play, block the plate, catch the throw and apply the tag better than someone with lesser abilities. Make the following adjustments on throws to the plate (in addition to the normal rules):

CATCHER'S RATING 1 2 3 4 5 (non-catcher)

ADJUSTMENT TO RUNNER'S CHANCE -2 -1 0 +1 +3

EARLY 'TIRING' POSSIBLE

Another change that seems to make the game a bit more realistic is in the area of pitchers' tired ratings.

Under current rules there is no reason to remove a pitcher who is getting shelled before he has reached his tired inning since his card doesn't change. More often than not his manager should yank him early to save him for a later day.

to save him for a later day.

To duplicate this, I change the meaning of the tired inning on the pitcher's card. Once a pitcher gives up hits and walks totaling the tired inning number on his card he becomes ineffective, and the tired (dot) rules apply.

If not already tired, a double play reduces the total hits/walks given up by one.

To give a slight home team advantage, home team pitchers have

their tired factor increased by one.

The net effect of this change is to create a more realistic pitching situation — after all, it should be apparent even a Dwight Gooden is ineffective if he has given up nine hits in the first few innings, or that your ace reliever doesn't have his good stuff if he comes in and gives up a couple of hits right away.

This rule also encourages using all of a team's staff and not just

the best five or six pitchers.

To reinforce this idea, I also increase the chance for injury or extended rest periods for tired pitchers. The original rules take precedence if a pitcher would get tired earlier under them.

Remember to take the asterisk off Damon Berryhill's card for the Chicago Cubs. The stealing rating is correct, but remove the asterisk.
