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1961 season most likely to be printed

The Review was hoping to have a verdict from Strat-O-Matic this month as to what its plans were for baseball reprints and past seasons. But as the May issue went to press, S-O-M creator Harold Richman was vacationing in the southwest, could not be reached, and thus a final decision is still pending.

The game company, however, has been sent the poll results (which are found on the following page) and, on the basis of a conversation with Richman the previous month, the most likely action by S-O-M would be to print the 1961 season.

Actually the 1961 season was second in the past seasons poll, behind the 1930 season, in balloting that attracted 386 votes--360 for past seasons, 26 opposing them. But, as was pointed out in the April Review, the 1930 season, while a great one for hitting, was marred by the fact the baseball was livened up in the National League. Thus, Richman feels that season was an aberration and doesn't wish to print it.

The 1964 season, of course, would be an extension of S-O-M since the first year all the teams were printed was based on 1962. The 1956 season was third on the list. 1959 fourth and 1927 fifth. All told. 75 seasons

attracting 158 first-choice votes.

As far as reprints of teams--and no decision has been made by S-O-M regarding this--the 1969 New York Mets [see above], 1968 Detroit Tigers and 1963 Los Angeles Dodgers drew the most votes, with 63.9 percent of those gamers who wanted reprints voting for the "Miracle Mets." Hopefully next month a decision will be known.

Who should you draft in baseball?

The draft scouting report on Keith Hernandez read: "At 25, one of best all-around first baseman in majors. Don't be dismayed by .255 average in '78, as whole team flopped. This Gold Glove has a textbook swing and by 1981 will be the best first baseman in the NL."

That was a year ago (May, 1979 Review) and was part of the offerings by Larry Fryer, 13-year S-D-M buff from Hamburg, PA, as to what players

should be drafted in baseball in your table-top endeavors.

Fryer was a soothsayer par excellence regarding Hernandez, who went on to lead the N.L. in hitting and shared Most Valuable Player honors with Willie Stargell. Fryer also had a clear crystal ball when it came to Steve Kemp ("Kemp will become more aggressive at the plate"), Garry leton, Sixto Lezcano and numerous others. He wasn't so on-target on Tommy John, Harry Chappas, Bob Knepper and Mike Caldwell, however. yer fried by saying, "Best years behind him. Trade him now." finished second with an earned-run-average of 2.97 and compiled a 21-9 record with the Yankees.

Knepper didn't live up to his billing as a "dominant force in NL for years to come," nor was Caldwell a "one-year flash" as Fryer predicted. But overall, Fryer was "in the ballpark" and not just "out in left field" with his forecasts as to whom should be drafted, traded, or just quietly dropped from one's S-O-M roster.

And, for sure, his offerings made for interesting reading. we go again, Larry Fryer's second annual "Who Should You Draft in Baseball" report:

JOE RUDI - You should have traded him four years ago.

TERRY KENNEDY - A future great if he ever plays. SID MONGE - At top of roller-coaster. His 2.40 ERA and 19 saves will never be repeated.

JUAN BERENGUER & NEIL ALLEN - Great young pitching prospects for the Mets.

WILLIE AIKENS - Only a team as strong as the Angels could give him Future home run champ. Great bat...label him untouchable.

BUCKY DENT - Overpaid glamour boy. HOSKEN POWELL - Bona fide .300 hitter, if he plays regularly. Hit .329 and .326 in minors.

OSCAR GAMBLE - It doesn't take a genius to realize the "Big 'O'" will never do that again! But if you're headed for the playoffs, who cares. BOB HORNER - 'Or. Strangeglove' should hit 500 home runs before he's through.

Kingman off to fast start in GKSML

Whenever a baseball slugger gets off to a fast start and slams a flock of home runs, comparisons always begin with the home run pace of the legendary Babe Ruth and Roger Maris. Ruth, of course, hit 60 homers in a 154-game season and Maris, in 1961, walloped 61* (* in a 162-game season).

The GKSML (Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League) is starting to check out those old home run paces--since it has, in Dave Kingman, a longball specialist who might eclipse the records established by both Ruth and Maris, at least in S-O-M.

Kingman, the property of Warren Newell, Review co-editor, in the Kalamazoo, MI-based face-to-face, continuous draft league, has already stroked 42 homers and driven in 101 runs--all in only 97 games! There are still 57 games to go and Kingman has plenty of at-bats (the GKSML strictly adheres to at-bats/innings pitched on the cards) remaining.

The current record for home runs in the GKSML is 54 (set by Dick Allen, '72 American League season replay) and Kingman, barring a horrendous slump, appears a cinch to break that.

"If it wasn't for Kingman, I'd probably have only about 20 wins,"

"If it wasn't for Kingman, I'd probably have only about 20 wins," says Warren, whose record at the 97-game mark is 50-47, leaving him in third place in the East Division of the 10-team, two-division league.

For the curious, the GKSML has already replayed 18 154-game seasons. The current National League season will make 19 upon completion, which is slated for the second week in May. Then the American League campaign will begin.

Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell are pioneer members of the GKSML, while Del's 16-year-old son, Todd, is in his fourth year. Regulars in the GKSML who returned were Dale Holland, runnerup the last two years in the N.L., Gary Tien and Jeff Kik, 25-year-old salesman who joined up at the end of the N.L. season a year ago. John Madden, who played three years ago, has returned from New York, where he was going to school, and taken over a championship team left by Clif Sage. Sage rode off into the sunset after being slaughtered in four straight games in the World Series by Warren's team late last summer.

Tom Angel, who made the trek to Michigan from Florida over a year ago, allegedly to join an S-O-M league, moved south again and turned the reins of his two promising teams over to Jeff Green, who resides in Kalamazoo and once played in a PBM league with Tom.

The GKSML, many of you will recall, protects 15 players per team from the previous season's roster and then a draft is held of discarded players, rookies (players with S-O-M cards for the first time) or players who were traded in real-life from one league to another. And, of course, the draft is done in reverse order of finish from the previous season.

The draft pickings were mighty slim this year in the N.L.--in fact, it may have been the worst draft ever--as Jeff Leonard (going to Jeff Green) was the No. 1 pick. Here's the remainder of the top 10 selections in the GKSML's N.L. draft: 2 - Rick Sutcliffe; 3 - Bill Lee; 4 - John Fulgham; 5 - Dick Tidrow; 6 - Dave Palmer; 7 - Scott Sanderson; 8 - Eli Sosa; 9 - Greg Minton; 10 - Enrique Romo.

And now, stepping into the batter's box, Dave (Kong) Kingman...

How to 'pitch around' the sluggers

How do you deal with a Dave Kingman in S-O-M Baseball?

Outside of giving him an intentional walk every at-bat, the "Kong" is going to hurt you (unless you have him on your team) sconer or later. Larry Hayes, an S-O-M gamer for 11 years and a recent subscriber to the Review, has a playing tip that gives an abternative to just layin' the ball in to a Kingman, or other slugger.

What Hayes proposes is to "pitch around" a slugger. Not every atbat, though, rather only after the sixth inning on, and then it should be restricted to use only once an inning and never on the same batter twice

in a game.

What does the "pitch around" allow the defensive manager to do? First off, it's a semi-intentional walk for the batter who is feared more than the hitter on deck; secondly, it gives a manager the opportunity to semi-intentionally walk a right-handed hitter in order to face a left-handed batter, or vice-versa; third, a batter can be semi-intentionally walked to set up a double play situation; and fourth, the maneuver reduces a hitter's chances of hitting a home run.

Here's how it works:

Defensive manager announces to offensive manager he wants to "pitch around" the upcoming batter. The following changes then occur on the batter's card only:

Three-dice roll result		Change it to read	
Strikeout	-	Walk	20

Notice that a slugger's chance of hitting a home run are reduced, but so are his chances of striking out, since the pitcher is "pitching around" or throwing "extra fine." In many instances, the batter will draw a walk, but that's the way it is in real-life.

The League Forming Editor's note: section is still best guide we know of for joining a PBM league. do recommend, however, that before joining, a potential league member might want to investigate the league more as to how it operates, backaround of commissioner, longevity, etc. An SASE sent to the commissioner, or party placing an ad in the Review, could result in just what you are seeking as far as a PBM league's modus operandi. Another method would be to check through back issues of the Review and see what leagues have been featured, or pore over the "League Scene" section

for leagues that pop up on an annual basis and appear to be stable.

The lineup of managers for the ISOMBA's second AL season consisted of: Jim McPherson, Washington, IN (Homesteads); Scott Fidler, Camp Hill, PA (Orkins); John Dormer, Philadelphia, PA (Enforcers); Bob Dormer, Philadelphia (Whizzards); Rich O'Neill, Philadelphia (Oumptrucks); and Jim Beauchemin, Albany, NY (Comets) in the East.

The West included Eric Simonsen, Sudbury, MS (Swedes); Don Femmel, Indianapolis, IN (Tators); Brad Hines, East Hopkins, MN (Sabres); Dave Miller, APO NY (Hawks); Steve Fidler, Camp Hill, PA (Clippers); and Niel Johnson, Santa Cruz, CA (Kinibers).

On the next page are league standings and leaders: Bench (30 HRs), Ken Griffey, Rick Monday and had the most feared trio of pitchers in J.R. Stats realistic in full-season replay

There were no tall tales emanating from Texas when it came to a replay conducted by Robert Hamilton of Woodville, TX. Realism was his goal with a replay of the Montreal Canadiens' 1978-79 hockey season. And that he achieved as, not only did Montreal compile a 49-21-10 real-life record, but Guy Lafleur produced 136 points (129 real-life).

"I feel that my stats were very realistic," reports Hamilton, a 21-

year-old assistant manager of a grocery store who's been playing S-O-M for three years. Two players--Jacques Lemaire (24) and Pierre Mondou (31)--had exactly the same number of goals in S-O-M as in real-life, plus both were close in assists.

Only player whose stats far exceeded those of real-life, in fact, was Mario Tremblay. He had 38 goals in S-O-M, only 30 in real-life. Lafleur, meanwhile, had 59 goals (52 real-life), 77 assists (exacta!) and 136 points, plus 18 power-play goals. Lafleur was a model of consistency, never scoring more than two goals in a game.

In goal, Ken Dryden was close to matching real-life performances, (continued on next page)

yielding 116 goals in 47 games for a 2.47 goals-against average (2.30

real-life]. Dryden's record was 30-12-4.

Defenseman Larry Robinson was third on the team (behind Lafleur and Mondou) in scoring with 74 points (17 goals, 57 assists), while Steve Shutt was third with 73 (40 via goals). The trio of defensemen, Bob Gainey, Robinson and Guy LaPointe, was particularly effective. when Robinson and LaPointe were both out, Montreal struggled with a 3-6-1

Buffalo and New England were the toughest on the Canadiens, with the Sabres winning three of four games, New England tying one and winning three and outscoring Montreal 12-8. Don Edwards, Buffalo's goalie, went 3-1 against Montreal with a 2.25 GGA--plus he blanked it one game, 3-0, stopping 38 shots, including 11 goalie rating shots (Edwards is a 4-11 as far as scoring a goal against].

Most exciting game, however, was against the Islanders. Montreal, trailing 2-1 and with one action card left, scored to tie the game when Yvon Lambert found the net with an inside shot. Montreal went on to go unbeaten its last 15 dames.

"The hockey game, in my opinion, is the most fun and most realistic game S-0-M puts out," concludes Hamilton. "The only improvement should be the cutting down of the number of shots on goal. There seems to be more than in real-life."

S-O-M STREET HOCKEY TEAM WINS

The game they played on a chilly January Saturday wasn't Strat-O-Matic, but it was S-O-M that brought the players together.

The happening was a street hockey game matching S-O-M players in the New York area against a team called floral Park, which competes in a regular league in the Queens area. In the S-O-M team lineup were Larry King, commissioner of the Empire State Strat-O-Matic League; Joe Paldino, another commissioner of a PBM league; Joe's brother, Anthony; Larry Kidd of Staten Island; and Steve Beren, organizer of the Gold Cup tournaments.

Most of the S-O-M lineup had played, or played, street hockey, although Kidd, 36, hadn't played since a youth and Beren had never played in his life. It looked like the U.S. against the "invincible" Russians in the Winter Olympics.

In fact, that's how the game came out--the underdog S-O-M team striking early for two goals and holding off a late Floral Park rush for a 3-2 victory. Joe Paldino, King and Goldson all scored goals for Team S-O-M, with King having a hand (make that stick) in all three goals. Harvey Klonsky was in goal for Team S-O-M, which was outnumbered eight players to six and wound up being outshot, 23-14.

SHORT SHAKES

...Who says you can't win with lefties in S-O-M Baseball? Dan Laflin, runnerup in his division of a PBM league and a playoff qualifier, had a staff that included eight southpaw hurlers. Jon Matlack (20-13), Randy Jones (14-16; was 2-7 early, 12-9 later) and Jerry Koosman (11-10) were all starters, while Terry Forster (9-2, 18 saves, 1.06 ERA) was ace of bullpen...Dub Todd Sharek, No. Dartmouth, MA, the "Mad Trader," as he's made a whopping 32 trades in two years as a member of the prestigious Empire State S-O-M baseball league...Led by George Gervin (37.2 points per game) and Moses Malone (11 rebounds), Jon Bourdon's all-star draft team

won nine of ten games, averaged 122.5 points and easily won a three-team mini basketball series. Scott Lindsey was 4-6 as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar averaged 31.1 points and led in rebounding (11.2), teammate Lloyd Free averaged 26.1 points. Rich Lindsey, college student at Syracuse, was third member of Lee, MA-based league. He wound up 2-8, lacking a center that could compete with Malone and Jabbar...Memorable happening for Barry Baumbach was when Bake McBride ('77 card) hit for the cycle, going 5-for-5, two singles, a double, triple and home run, pacing the Phils to an 8-2 win over the Cardinals...A 70-point favorite in football! That's what Chuck Gilardi was when he pitted an all-star team against a team comprised of the worst players of all-time (coached by Jay Hazari). Bart Starr, entering the game in the second quarter with the score tied 7-7, pitched two TD passes, completed 20 of 27 attempts for 305 yards and almost salvaged the point spread. The 'greats' scored 48 points in the second half and overwhelmed the no-talents, 72-7. Jim Brown, Franco Harris and Jim Taylor each scored twice, with Brown blasting to 129 yards in 18 carries, and John Gilliam had eight receptions for 161 yards. Oh, and Scott Bull, quarterback of the vanquished team, completed seven of 31 passes for 69 yards and was intercepted twice...Thomas Wesolowski of Buffalo, NY, recently conducted a test of strength between the pride of the NHL, Montreal, and the Winnipeg Jets. It was much closer than Wesolowski expected, however, as Montreal struggled to win the series, 4-3. Winnipeg, in fact, won the first two games, 2-0, 5-2, and held high-scoring Guy Lafleur to only a pair of goals, one an empty-net tally in game seven, which was won by Montreal, 4-2...

QUESTION: When a delayed penalty situation comes up in hockey the rules say: goalie can be pulled and extra skater comes on. But if advanced action card says "Inside Shot any Player--I Opp." and the extra player takes the shot, who should the intimidator be?

ANSWER: According to S-O-M, there is no intimidation on the shot.

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QUESTION: Dave Kingman's baseball card for the 1977 set was an "extra" extra player because he played with four teams. But how come

his card has only his National League stats?

ANSWER: Official statistics are kept within the league and not combined.

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QUESTION: Can the defensive team blitz a safety when employing a nickel

defense in football? If so, what is the result?

ANSWER: Yes. Refer to safety blitz under super advanced instructions.

By the numbers, this league figures to be success

Anyone who enjoys Strat-D-Matic plays the numbers game. But few produce the numbers spewed out by the computers that recorded the final statistics for the Louisville Sluggers Baseball Association.

Thanks to the efforts of commissioner Tony Auter, a computer programmer analyst, the LSBA's statistical data for 1979 [based on 1978 real-life season] ran 154 inches, or 14 computer printout pages. By the numbers, it was most impressive.

Actually, stats aside, the LSBA had some unique ideas for running a PBM smoothly that are worth sharing with the rest of the S-O-M world. The basics are that the Louisville-based league is two 8-team leagues, American and National, with a manager handling a team in each. Each league is further divided into two four-team divisions.

There are 30 players per team--24 are allowed on the roster--and

There are 30 players per team--24 are allowed on the roster--and each team plays 160 games--80 home and 80 away. Each team plays 10 series (a series consists of 16 games, 8 home and 8 away). Teams in the same division are played two series each while teams in the other division are played once.

The DH is used in both leagues, not just the AL, and players are limited to 10 percent at-bats and innings pitched beyond the totals on their cards.

UNIQUE FEATURES OF LSBA

Where the LSBA differs from most baseball leagues, though, is that both leagues are played simultaneously. This, as Auter explains, "helps deter managers from quitting in midseason. If a manager has one team in the cellar and his other team is competitive, he will have to continue playing his cellar-dwellers in order to keep playing his pennant contender."

The LSBA also permits trading through the first six series, but after that limits it to only players with less than 200 at-bats or 65 innings pitched on their cards. "This keeps a non-contending manager from helping a 'friend' down the stretch by trading his superstars to him," says Auter.

In case you're curious as to how the LSBA was born, it actually grew out of the ashes of a previous league--albeit unsuccessful--that Auter was party to. Determined not to be burned again, Auter started his own league. He researched the Review, looking for gamers who had complained about similar experiences; lured friends of those gamers in, as well as his own friends; and the LSBA was born.

Thus the first managerial lineup consisted of Robert Dormer (college student from Philadelphia), Scott Francis (student, Austin, TX), Wade Arnold (classmate of Francis), Rich Caracciolo (student, Syosset, NY), Kevin Alexander (college student, Newark Valley, NY), Glenn Bond (Firestone Tire store manager, Louisville, KY), and Joe Mudd (employee of the tire store).

CYCLONES SMASH OPPOSITION

It was Kevin Alexander's Cyclones that produced the best record (97-63), won the A.L. playoff over the Nuggets (Glenn Bond), 3-1, and then swept aside the N.L. champion, Coral Reefers II (Tony Auter), in the World Series, 4-1, winning the fifth game on Bobby Bonds two-run, 12th-inning homer.

The Cyclones breezed in behind the one-two pitching force of Ferguson Jenkins (22-6, 2.59 ERA) and Jim Palmer (23-11, 2.91), relief work of Al Hrabosky (10 saves, 2.35) and offensive might generated by Doug DeCinces (37 homers), Bobby Bonds (.284, 22 HRs), Don Baylor (26) and Eddie Murray. The Nuggets also had a pair of hurling sparklers in Jon Matlack (20-10), 3.02) and Larry Sorensen (20-13, 3.47), while over in the N.L. the Coral Reefers roughed up the opposition behind the bats of Johnny

Lafleur once scored four goals against Washington...Some of highlights were Lafleur's selection as MVP; Phil Esposito scoring 11 goals and assisting on 16 and goalie Wayne Thomas yielding only 2.08 goals per game for surprising Rangers; Mike Bossy's 17-goal production for the Islanders; Bobby Clarke's 32-point scoring package [9 goals, 23 assists] for Philadelphia; the goaltending by Don Edwards of Buffalo, who had three shutouts and 1.94 GAA; Chuck Arnason firing in four goals in one game; and surprising Atlanta defeating surprising New York (Rangers) in the finals, 3-2...lowlights included Vancouver's defense (4.05 goals per game) and Washington's offense (only 37 goals in 20 games)...Game of the season was when the Rangers and Buffalo hooked up in a marathon playoff encounter that lasted through 80 minutes--yes, 801--of overtime. Ed Johnstone finally goaled, giving the Rangers a thrilling 3-2 triumph. The game consumed all of 140 minutes.


