GKSML, NTL drafts compared

Every tabletop baseball manager would, if possible, pick Dwight Gooden No. 1 in a draft. Goodens are too good to be true. No argument there.

there.

But who would you pick No. 2, behind Gooden, if conducting a draft of National League rookies or other newcomers to the N.L.? The National Texas League, a 10-member league that includes former Atlanta Braves pitcher Tony Brizzolara in its managerial ranks, and the GKSML (Greater Kalamazoo Strat-D-Matic League), which includes Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell, disagreed on that one.

The NTL choose Orel Hersheisher of the Dodgers No. 2, while the GKSML, with Del Newell trading away his pick for help at two other depleted positions (pitcher Charlie Lea and centerfielder Jerry Mumphrey) selected outfielder Dan Gladden.

Hershiser was No. 3 man in the GKSML, where a league rule allows a manager to reacquire a player that has been traded to another league in real-life by declaring his intentions before the draft and using his

in real-life by declaring his intentions before the draft and using his first-round pick to do so.

In the GKSML, for instance, longtime league member Gary Tien, who would have picked No. 8 in the first round, had lost Rick Sutcliffe

from his American League team when he was traded to the Cubs. So, Gary used his draft choice to reacquire Sutcliffe. John Tudor was also reacquired, by Pat Stemas, a high school teacher who had the best won-and-lost record in the N.L. the year before and now had the No. 10 pick.

Sutcliffe was the No. 3 draft choice in the NTL, with Goose Gossage No. 4 on both draft lists. All told, seven of the top 10 in each league were the same. On the next page are the top 20 draft choices in each league.

The rest of the GKSML managerial roster, in addition to the Newell brothers, Tien and Stemas, includes Jeff Kik, Jeff Green, newcomer Bob Hoyt, Bruce Mulder, Mike Pryson and Todd Newell, 21-year-old son of Del (continued on next page)

Newell. The GKSML includes students, a sports writer, band instructor, high school teacher and a food store manager. It's entirely face-to-face, plays a 154-game schedule and the biggest claim to fame is long life, with the GKSML having complete 28 full-season replays.

In the GTL, in addition to Brizzolara, who pilots the Pirates, the managerial lineup has John Blomstrom, organizer of the league; Brent Goodwin (Braves), Rick Blount (Expos) and Jim Woods (Mets), all of Houston, TX. Craig Becker (Giants) is another Texan, calling Austin home. The others are Kirk Gassman (Cubs), Monticello, IA; Rick Weber (Gods) St. Louis MO. Make Turnis (Cards), Maguelata, IA; and Dennis (Reds), St. Louis, MO: Mike Turnis (Cards), Maquolata, IA; and Dennis Tiemeyer (Dodgers), Florissant, MO. S-O-M is at every port of call

Hong Kong, Singapore and the Philippines are not usually consider-

ed hot spots as far as rolling Strat-O-Matic dice.

But they've been the site for the Super Bowl, World Series and Stanley Cup, respectively, in the International Strat-O-Matic Association's championship series over the gaming seasons.

The ISOMA, you see, is a five-member face-to-face S-O-M league that is truly international in scope. All five are shipmates on the USS Kiska, which calls Concord, CA its home port.

"The ISOMA is a firm believer that Strat-O-Matic is the next best

thing to being there," says Bruce Lindgren. "Currently, the ISOMA has in progress a baseball league comprised of both NL and AL teams from 1978-1983, a six-team football league, a six-team basketball draft league and, most recently, a hockey league with teams from 1983.

Lindgren, 25, of Brookfield, WI, is the founding father of the

Lindgren, 25, of Brookfield, WI, is the founding father of the ISOMA. He's been playing S-O-M Baseball since 1970. His dice duties include acting as commissioner of the baseball and basketball leagues. Also in the ISOMA managerial lineup are Ed Mondello, 21, Boston, MA, who is married, the father of two boys and commissioner of the hockey league; Jim Galoppa, 22, Mare Island, CA, also married, and known for his long bombs to Mark Duper in football; Mark Hutchinson, 23, Harrisburg, PA, whose trademark is using the one-back offense in football; and John Rhoten, 21, Detroit, MI, diehard fan of all Detroit teams and currently commissioner of the ISOMA's football league.

ISOMA'S PLAYING TIPS

The ISOMA, along with playing in different "stadiums" than most leagues, also has some unique playing tips it uses.

First off, it uses a 20-sided die in place of the split deck.

That's nothing new, of course. But it has a <u>hit-by-pitch rule</u> that is activated whenever a HBP occurs. Then the die is rolled and if a 1, 2, 3:

Roll the split die again and...

1-5 - Batter is injured and out for the rest of the game.*
6-10 - Fight erupts, pitcher ejected from the game.*
11-15 - Fight erupts, batter ejected from the game.*

16-20 - Fight erupts, both batter and pitcher ejected from the

If the roll is 4-20: Normal play, batter is awarded first base. * Batter awarded first base in all cases.

Shallow Qutfield rule (outfield in) - In certain situations, the defensive manager may elect to play his 'outfield in' to try and prevent the runner on third from scoring. This may be done individually or as a unit. If the outfield is playing "in," the following changes take nlaces

* All flyball (B)'s become flyball (B)?

* All flyball (B)? - do not add two (2) to the runner's total.

* All flyball (A)'s become DOUBLE **.

Wild Pitch/Passed Ball rule - When a wild pitch or passed ball occur, even with no runners on base, roll the split die:

If it is a 1, 2, or 3: It is the third strike (batter is out on (continued on next page)

strikes, disregard the results on the fielding chart), but the ball has gotten away from the catcher and the batter may be safe at first. Roll the split die again and by referring to the batter's running rating and

the catcher's throwing arm, determine if the batter is safe at first.

Keep in mind that the "T" rating of the catcher will come into
play on a roll of 1, 2, or 3 (just as in base stealing).

If it is 4-20: Follow the results listed on the fielding chart.

FOOTBALL PLAYING TIPS

Quarterback Sack Rule - When a sack occurs, roll two dice to determine the yards lost on the play. It will vary from 2 to 12 yards.

First Down Measurement Rule - In some instances, play results in the ball being on the exact yard line needed for the first down. In this case, roll two dice and if it is 2, 3, 11 or 12, the ball is inches short of the first down.

If it is 4-10, it is a first down.

This rule also applies to the goal line when the ball ends up exactly on the goal line. Once again, roll two dice and if 2, 3, 11 or 12. the ball is inches short of the goal line. If it is 4-10, touchdown!

Moncrief leads ASOMBA with 34.3 average

Basketball league goes the distance

The American Strat-O-Matic Basketball Association (ASOMBA) is one of those rare tabletop basketball leagues that has gone the distance. In other words, it played through a full season of games plus playoffs.

The ASOMBA was founded by Alan Joffrey, who's finishing up his

senior year at Glenbrook South High School in Glenview, IL. Joffrey, in addition to his coaching a team (Chicago Mobsters) and commissioner duties, also found time to play on his school's varsity football and

Altogether there were 10 teams in the ASOMBA's inaugural season, a

Altogether there were 10 teams in the ASOMBA's inaugural season, a season that consisted of 80 games plus three rounds of playoffs.

In addition to Joffrey, league members included Chris Degarmo (Georgia Jets), 15, of Roswell, GA; George Peete II (Buffalo B-52's), 26, Buffalo, NY; Keith Bangs (Owatonna K-Bangers), 41, Owatonna, MN; Ed Perlmutter (California Carreras), 17, Aptos, CA; Paul O'Connor (Los Angeles Fast Lane), 22, Los Angeles, CA, and Brad Scrade (Atlanta Gunzar), 15

Gunners), 15, Roswell, GA.

Tim Sellner (Minnesota Squires), Carey Miller (Saskatoon Lakers) and Jonathan Bing (New Jersey Smog) also guided teams in the ASOMBA.

Degarmo, Joffrey, Perlmutter and Scrade are all in high school. Peete, however, is an office clerk and newsfilm curator at a museum (Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society) as well as a member in

good standing of the USBA (United States Basketball Association).

Bangs is a high school math teacher and coach (volleyball and golf). He's been married 20 years and has four children, ranging in age from 8-17. He also officiates collegiate and high school basketball games. And Bangs is also in a four-team league with his three sons:
Nathan (17), Greg (15) and Scott (11).

O'Connor was a rarity to the S-O-M play-by-mail league in that he

drafted a team without ever having played the game before. "I determined my draft list from my limited stock of basketball savvy and a basketball stat guide," relates O'Connor.

The Fast Lane, as might be expected, finished last in the South Division with a 27-53 record, which still wasn't the worst in the ASOMBA. O'Connor is a video game designer and also currently belongs to

ASUMBA. Urtonnor is a video game designer and also currently belongs to one baseball and two hockey draft leagues. "Despite the fact that my team was seemingly out of it from the start, I always had a good time playing my (ASOMBA) games," enthuses O'Connor. "The ASOMBA is the best S-O-M league I've ever been involved with."

ADVANCED VERSION IS PLAYED

The ASOMBA uses the advanced version of S-O-M Basketball and a schedule is played that consists of four quarters of 20 games each. As far as rosters, each team has 14 players, but only can use 11 in a

All players must rest the number of minutes shown in the upperright hand corner of the playing card. And any player that played in less than 70 games in real-life is restricted to his real-life totals.

No injuries can occur, according to ASOMBA rules, and double-teams not permitted, since there is "no suitable system for employing ing is not the S-O-M double-teaming rule in a fair and realistic manner without abuses.

All scoresheets are funneled into the commissioner at the end of each quarter for compilation. A myriad of statistics are kept, including 3-point field goals attempted, made and percentage; offensive and defensive rebounds, assists, steals and blocks. The home coach also writes a short paragraph of highlights of each game and an MVP is chosen-

When it comes to the playoffs, a neutral coach plays such games. Home and away games are split, with the team with the best regular-sea-son record having the home-court advantage for a third, fifth or seventh game.

"SWEET SIDNEY'S" SENSATIONAL

Sidney Moncrief of the California Carreras was the ASOMBA's Most Valuable Player as he led the league in scoring with a whopping 34.3 average, had over four assists per game and shot 83.1 percent from the free throw.

Because of Moncrief, plus such players as Larry Nance, Junior Bridgeman, Clark Kellogg and Robert Parish, the Carreras carried off

Bridgeman, Clark Kellogg and Robert Parish, the Carreras carried off regular-season honors and also won the playoffs.

Nance was No. 8 in field goal percentage with a .568 percentage, Bridgeman No. 3 in free throw success (87.4%) while Kellogg was No. 7 (11.8) and Parish No. 10 (11.1) in rebounding.

California also had the second most prolific scoring team, averaging 130 points, and the stinglest unit on defense, yielding 115.2 in a free-wheeling league.

Moncrief had a great season...and it was a good thing he did as Magic Johnson of Georgia matched or exceeded him in most departments, except in scoring where the Magic man averaged 'only' 24 points.

Johnson was No. 2 in field goal percentage (60.4!), and No. 1 as far as assists (14.9) and steals (3.1).

CALIFORNIA REIGNS AS ASOMBA KING

California proved its league-best 64-16 regular-season record wasn't a fluke by also capturing the playoffs.

The Chicago Mobsters, third-place team in the North Division with (continued on next page)

a 44-36 record, met California in the final best-of-seven championship

California won the opener, 117-102, as Parish was MVP after scoring 28 points, grabbing nine rebounds and coming up with four steals.

Moncrief added 24 points for the winners, while Jim Paxson had 32

points and Terry Cummings 23 for Chicago.

Chicago rebounded to win games two (114-109) and three (111-110)

Chicago rebounded to win games two (114-109) and three (111-110) and seize a brief 2-1 lead. Cummings went on a 41-point tear in game two, Paxson added 21 points and Tree Rollins was named MVP after coming up with basketball's "triple" by scoring 11 points, grabbing 11 rebounds and blocking an eye-opening 11 shots. Moncrief had 23, Kellogg 20 points and Parish 15 rebounds for California.

Cummings poured in 41 in game three also - this time winning MVP honors after also snatching 21 rebounds. Paxson added 24 points while Parish had 21, Kellogg 20 for the losers.

The Carreras rolled in games four and five, evening the series when Moncrief joined the "41 Club" and had seven assists to garner MVP laurels. Cummings had 36 in a losing effort. Game five was no contest as California used a 37-25 third-quarter advantage to go up 3-2 in the series with a 137-111 romp. Unheralded Brad Davis was MVP after scoring 17 points, dishing out 11 assists and making four steals. Moncrief had 40 points, Nance 21, with Cummings tallying 34 and hauling down 17 rebounds for the Mobsters.

Game six was a rerun of five as California routed Chicago,

Game six was a rerun of five as California routed Chicago, Davis was again MVP, with 27 points and 16 assists. Moncrief added 37 points and Parish 22 to go with 15 rebounds. Cummings, unstoppable throughout the series, had 33 and Ruland 26 for Chicago.

PITCHER'S POINT OF WEAKNESS

(1) A pitcher's point of weakness (POW) occurs if he allows a combination of six hits or walks in one inning or eight hits or walks in two consecutive innings.

(2) A starting pitcher's POW will automatically take effect if he hurls four innings beyond his POW inning. A relief pitcher's POW is automatically effective two innings after his POW. For example, a starting pitcher with a POW of 8 is automatically tired when he starts the

STEALING - SOLITAIRE PLAY

Prior to stealing, roll a white die and a red die. If the white die is a 4, 5, or 6, then subtract the red die amount from the stealing rating and add or subtract the catcher's arm rating.

Example: You steal an "A" runner. His safe splits are 1-15.

Assume the catcher has a -1 arm. His safe split drops to 1-14. Now roll a white die and a red die. You roll a white "5" which indicates a drop in the rating. If the red die is a "4" the final stealing rating is 1-10. Page you roll the white and red die you must steal. 1-10. Once you roll the white and red die you must steal.

'REPRESENTATIVE' CARDS

Regarding the question of additional baseball cards, I agree with Strat-O-matic that to printn 27 or 28 cards for each team is not the solution.

Pitchers with few innings or batters with few at-bats, if the cards are good, will tend to be overused when possible.

One solution which S-O-M has already recommended is the use of nameless player cards. I, however, would not feel particularly attached to a player (blank card) who gets the game-winning hit or

pitches a great game.
Maybe S-O-M could add a
short list of player names and
their significant stats (positions played, etc.), and then recommend which nameless card would
be useful for representing that
player.

One alternative solution is to add two additional cards per team; one pitcher card that represents all the innings and won-and-lost records of all the pitchers not on the other cards, and

one hitter's card that represents all the at-bat and hits of the hitters not represented on the other cards. Maybe this, too, can be done as a recommendation to use one of the nameless set.

The most I've ever spent is \$3.50 for the '68 Cowboys and \$1.50 for baseball teams. I've actually been given some teams and players I've needed. To those gamers I salute you.

Recently I received a letter asking if I've ever bid before. He was asking \$7 for '68-70 baseball teams down to \$2 for 1980. He said some were "collector items." What is a collector item? I'm a gamer. I don't sit, never playing the game, waiting for my teams to accumulate value. If these guys played the game the way it was meant to, their cards wouldn't be in mint condition.

Some observations I've

made include:

If the same ad appears each month, he's a collector. If it says serious bids only, he's greed-invested. If we keep paying these ridiculous prices, they'll continue to go up.

I see nothing wrong with doubling or tripling your investment, but \$7 for a baseball team, come on.

Editor's note: Since we have not actually engaged in either buying or selling, we may not be much help to you as far as a fair bid-ding price. For sale advertisers should list a minimum bid that they expect as a starting point. We prefer to have sellers (those who are selling a large number of teams) ask interested buyers to write them for a list of what's available and the prices they (sellers) expect. The Review's advertising rates have always been reasonable, we feel, because we are not out to make a big profit off the advertising section. But some sellers run long lists of teams available - lists that take up valuable space - and we do discourage that. As far as transactions, there's not much we can do as far as lowering prices. Our main concern is that no fraud or selling of photo-copied cards takes place. If enough people don't buy, however, then sellers are going to have to lower their prices. Simple supply and demand (what buyers are willing to pay) economics.

PITCHERS' HOLDING

I am a 10-year veteran and I belong to three PBM leagues. I think S-O-M is the best tabletop game ever created. My hat is off to Mr. (Harold) Richman (S-O-M's creator).

In baseball, however, I think it would be a good idea to put a "holding on" rating on each pitcher's card. Catching a runner trying to steal depends highly on the runner's ability to get a good lead and a good jump; not as much on the throwing ability of the catcher.

Indeed the catcher's throwing ability is important, but not as much as the pitcher's ability to hold the runner close to the (continued on next page)

base. This problem could be taken care of very easily by giving each pitcher a rating much the same as the catcher's throwing rating.

A pitcher with an excellent move could have a 'holding rating' of -3, those with an average move could be a 0, and those with a high deliberate leg kick would be a +3. This rating would not add any time to the games and would make this portion of the game much improved.

Now instead of bringing in a right-handed reliever to get the batter with a runner on first, you will have to measure the percentages of what a left-handed reliever with a -3 rating would make.

It would sure make it a lot more interesting in the late innings.

* Lower the goalie assists

* Maybe introduce a penalty shot (in real-life there are quite a few penalty shots).

* Get rid of "lose puck to opponent" in the action deck cards and putting in offsides, then a faceoff, instead. How many times in pro hockey does an offsides nullify a good scoring threat?

* Add more games missed due to an injury. Players in reallife are injured for more than two games a season.

One of the more ambitious Strat-O-Matic projects has to be the "S-O-M junkies dream" that a trio of gamers from Salem, VA, have undertak-

The threesome includes Joey Philpott, salesman for a local beer distributor and S-O-M gamer since 1975; Freddie Shockley, a route supervisor with the Roanoke News Agency and also a gamer since 1975, and Dirk Leonard, co-manager of a local department store and a dice-roller for nine years. It was Leonard that gave the venture the 'dream' label.

The project is taking the eight original baseball teams in each

league, splitting them into four divisions, and then using their vast card libraries to create the best team for each franchise (advanced

Several cards had to be created for Hall-of-Famers that the trio wanted in the league, such as for Walter Johnson, Cy Young, Dizzy Dean and Christy Mathewson. A typical season for them was used as the basis for the stats.

"There were also some players that we put with teams that they had never played for, because we wanted them in the league," points out Philpott. George Brett and Dan Quisenberry, for example, were placed on the St. Louis Cardinals. Nolan Ryan was put with Pittsburgh and J.R. Richard with Philadelphia.

The DH was going to be used and a 162-game season played, with 14 games versus teams in the same league and eight against teams in the other league. All told, the trio will play 1,296 games, plus playoffs

(four division winners qualify).

Some of the favorites are, in the American League East, the New York Yankees (pitchers: Whitey Ford, Ron Guidry, Sparky Lyle; batters: Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Dave Winfield) and Baltimore Orioles (six 20-game winners, including Jim Palmer, Steve Stone and Mike Flanagan; and all "1" infield). Minnesota and Washington were combined, with the result a lineup of the likes of Rod Carew, Sam Rice, Larry Hisle, Harmon Killebrew, Tony Oliva and Frank Howard.

In the A.L. West, the favorite is the A's with Vida Blue, Catfish Hunter, Lefty Grove, Rollie Fingers, Al Simmons, Reggie Jackson and Jimmy Foxx. Detroit has a big three on the mound of Mickey Lolich, Denny McLain and Jack Morris. And Cleveland has the fireballing duo of Herb Score and Sudden Sam McDowell.

Oh, and the Chicago White Sox own the best bullpen of any team with Hoyt Wilhelm, Goose Gossage and Terry Forster.

Over in the N.L. East, the Chicago Cubs are favored (Hack Wilson, Billy Williams, Ernie Banks, etc.), with Cincinnati, which has an awe-some hitting attack, good defense, but no pitching after Tom Seaver, pegged for second.

The Giants are favored in the N.L. West, thanks to an offense featuring Bill Terry (.401), Willie Mays, Willie McCovey and Orlando featuring Bill Terry (.401), Willie Mays, Willie McCovey and Cepeda and a pitching rotation of Mathewson, Gaylord Perry, Carl Hub-Don Drysdale, Sandy Koufax, Don Sutton, Don Newcombe and Fernando Val-

Charlie Joiner had six catches for 150 yards and two scores, Wes Chandler eight for 150

The Chargers charged to 625 yards in offense. All told there were 51 first downs (all but six passing), three fumbles, seven interceptions and nine sacks.


