S-O-M conducts past-seasons poll

The Strat-O-Matic Baseball fan has another opportunity to let his/ her voice ring out.

The game company, after observing the increased demand for printing past seasons, has decided to let a poll be conducted to gauge the interest in just such a project. Nothing for sure, but S-D-M wants to feel the "pulse," so to speak, of the gaming public.

What S-D-M wants to know, in essence, is whether or not the bulk of the S-D-M world is interested in past seasons and, if so, what seasons?

"This would include seasons 1961 and before," relates Harold Richman, breator of the S-D-M games. "We are thinking seriously about printing seasons of the past but want to know if enough people are interested."

Richman also pointed out that creating seasons of the past would be quite time-consuming, particularly the research, and that other S-D-M

quite time-consuming, particularly the research, and that other S-O-M projects would have to be put on the shelf during that time--thus perhaps many gamers might not really desire such seasons.

"The cards would probably be just the basic version (not two-sided),"

adds Richman, noting that complete statistical data (such as righty-lefty batting and pitching) is not available for most seasons of the past. Some of the advanced game components may be offered, though.

Montreal overpowers Rangers

New cards used for Stanley Cup replay

Yes, the goaltending will really make a difference in the new set of SuO-M Hockey cards. And, yes, the Montreal Canadiens are going to be mighty tough to defeat--as real-life performance didtates they should be. Review co-editor Del Newell came to those conclusions after replaying the Stanley Cup series with the new cards, which arrived Thursday, Oct. 4. As pointed out in the September Review, more action would be coming from the goalie cards in the second set of hockey cards issued by the game company. No longer would a check of a goalie's card bring a yawn from a gamer. Whereas before a save was a routine happening when consulting a goalie's card, and a goal a rarity, now the goalie is an action man, indeed.

Ken Oryden's card, for instance, has save chances on split numbers 1-10 and 17-20--but 11-16 is a goal! John Davidson of the New York Rangers, who allowed 3.52 goals-per-game compared to Dryden's 2.30 yield, has a card with saves 1-7 and 18-20 and a goal 8-17.

When the last card is turned up and the result calls for "Goalie Rating," there will be thrills and chills galore this season.

MIGHTY MONTREAL IS TOO TOUGH

The Canadiens, emulating real-life, captured the Stanley Cup series, although it took six games to subdue the stubborn Rangers. The basic version of the game was used, with the advanced face-off and penetration [new] charts.

Montreal appeared bent on making short work of the Rangers at the outset of the series, winning the first three games by scores of 4-1, 6-2 and 5-1. The high-scoring first line of Guy Lafleur, Jacques Lemaire and Steve Shutt was awesome, being on the ice when 11 of the 15 goals were scored. In game two, won by the Canadiens, 6-2, Lafleur blasted home three goals--producing the only hat trick of the series--and Lemaire had five assists.

But New York didn't fold its tent despite the bad start, instead striking for four rapid-fire goals in the first period of game four and going on to a 4-1 triumph. Then in game five, after falling behind 3-0 midway through the second period, the Rangers rode roughshod of the Montreal defense and wrested away a 4-3 win. Don Murdoch scored twice in the final period for the Rangers.

Montreal finally finished off the Rangers in game six, scoring five times in the second period en route to a 7-4 victory. Lafleur, not so surprisingly, was the top scorer, goaling seven times and assisting on 10 others for 17 points. He triggered the five-goal fusilade in game six, assisting on two goals and scoring a third.

Linemates Lemaire and Shutt had 16 and 11 points, respectively, while

the trio produced all six of Montreal's six power-play goals. Lemaire finished with a series-high 11 assists. Meanwhile, Murdoch and Anders Hedberg scored three goals apiece for New York, which didn't have anyone with more than five points.

The goalie's rating, and eventual performance, had a big impact on the outcome as Dryden allowed 14 goals (out of a total of 16) off his own card, while making 24 'difficult' saves. Davidson was riddled for 21 goals via his card, made 22 'tough' saves and surrendered 26 goals. Davidson's best performance was in game No. 5 when he made seven spectacular (off his own card) saves and was beaten only twice.

SUPER HOCKEY TOURNAMENT

Bob Lopeck and his associates in the Florida Gold Coast Association have embarked on a new S-O-M venture, this one an attempt to find out who is the best hockey coach in North America.

Many of you will remember that it's been the FGCA that has sponsored

the popular baseball drafting contest for the past two years.

Now comes hockey. There won't be any entry fee for contestants--but there will be one major qualification: he or she must be a league champion/ representatives from various play-by-mail and face-to-face S-O-M Hockey In other words, the FGCA wants only the best coaches, those who have proven themselves in league competition.

Guidelines for determining representation from each league/club will be: 4-10 members, 1 representtive; 11-20 members, 2; 21-30 members, 3; and 31 or more members, 4. Each representative will be sent three strategy sheets. He or she will then select two teams from either last year's est, or the new cards, or one from each, as long as the combined point totals don't exceed 160.

The strategy sheets are to be used for the two teams, with the third sheet being used for a combined team comprised of nine players from each of the two teams--11 forwards, 5 defensemen and 2 goalies. The filled-out strategy sheets (similar to that which appeared in the Sept., then will be sent to Lopeck, P.O. Box 2031, Opa-Locka, FL 33055.

Lopeck hopes to get the tournament under way by mid-November, with entry deadline Dec. 31, 1979 if not sooner. Each entrant will play 18 games, six with each strategy sheet, with the best two records facing off in a final best-of-seven-game series.

Advanced version of the game will be used. And instructions regard-

ing how to fill out the strategy sheets, plus the sheets themselves, will be sent out when Lopeck has received an official entry from either the commissioner or representative of a league/club. A plaque will be donated by the FGCA, symbol of hockey supremacy, S-O-M-style.

Dice set the defense

Pro Football solitaire defensive chart

Playing Strat-O-Matic Pro Football face-to-face is one of the ultimate thrills. Nothing can top matching strategy against another armchair quarterback.

But would do you do when playing solitaire. How can you call the plays both ways—and yet be impartial? Obviously you can't. So that's where Frank Kastelic's solitaire defensive chart—probably the most popular football playing tip to appear in the Review--comes in. All that's needed is an extra die to determine whether the defense called the play right or wrong, as well as the number of men in the zone.

The chart first appeared in 1973 and has reappeared at two-year in-

tervals since. Many new subscribers, obviously, are unaware of it, plus

perhaps older subscribers may appreciate having their memories jogged.

The solitaire defensive chart has stood the test of time, as well as realism, well. It doesn't provide for the 1-man (linebuck, end run) or 0 men (off-tackle) occurrence, however, so when playing you will have to stick with the standard four-man front line, rather than the 3-4 setup that some teams use today.

Now, here is the chart, along with a solitaire pass rush chart that is also activated by the roll of one die:

Now receivers can run reverses

How about reverses for wide receivers and tight ends in S-O-M Pro

It's an increasingly popular play, but one that hasn't been incorporated into the game as yet. But now you can add it to your S-O-M play-book--thanks to David Klonsky. He breaks his chart for such a run into four categories: A, B, C and D. And which category to use depends on the receiver's yards-per-catch average (perhaps you may wish to use your own system for rating running receivers).

Klonsky also suggests such a play be used a maximum of three times

a game. And since it is an end run, that should be checked when the defensive card is needed to determine the result. If the white die reads 1, 2, or 3, then the chart below is used.

Another way of rating receivers for their running ability on a reverse would be to check actual results of the previous season, and then determine how the receiver whould be classified. For instance, Luther Blue of Detroit tried reverses five times last season and wound up with nine net yards, a 1.8 average. He would obviously be a "D" or "C."

Common sense, based on actual statistics, would prevail with this

method.

Here is Klonsky's ratings, according to yards-per-reception average:

O Class - 10-12 yards; C Class - 13-15 yards;

B Class - 16-18 yards A Class - over 18 yards

Football playing tip

Another playing tip adding excitement to football is for the defense to put on a big rush in an attempt to block a punt. The defense simply announces that it's "going for the block," and if a 11 or 12 are rolled the punt is blocked, -9 yards and defense recovers. If unsuccessful, the punt return is reduced by 10 yards, which could lead to a safety.

Shooters galore in basketball cards

Strat-O-Matic Baseball and Football cards are annually given an indepth examination and analysis by the Review staff, as well as the more avid gamers who roll 'em in those particular sports.

But one S-O-M game--basketball--has seldom had its new cards given

even a cursory look.

Now stepping into the so-called basketball breach is Tom Nahigian of Arlington, MA, a self-confessed Boston Celtics fan who's been playing the S-O-M version of the hardwood sport since its inception. "I think S-O-M has an excellent basketball game," lauds Nahigian, "and I think the reason it isn't played as often as the other games is because it takes so long to play."

Nahigian, however, breezes through an average game, replete with statistics, in an hour, so he's no slow-poke. But, as he quickly points out, the baseball game can be played in 10-15 minutes and football, with its much shorter number of games, takes only about an hour.

A LOOK AT THE NEW CARDS

Nahigian, nevertheless, plays beat-the-24-second-clock whenever he can, thoroughly enjoys the game and is looking for a great deal of improvement from his beloved Celtics in the upcoming real-life season.

Tom is also a student of the basketball cards, poring over the new cards every year, comparing them with the past sets and noting the "good, bad and ugly" among them.

The 1978-79 S-O-M set, for instance, contains many outstanding shoot-and passers, but lacks the rebust rebounders and team defense. New York Knick fringe player Mike Glenn, San Antonio's George (Iceman) Gervin and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar of the Lakers all have great shooting cards. "They're totally awesome," praises Nahigian. Gervin, the Spurs' ree 6-7 guard, does most of his scoring from outside while Jabbar gets his points inside, or within sky-hook range.

PORTER'S 'PERFECT'

Guard Kevin Porter of the Detroit Pistons was a perfect passer, being rated Dazzler 1-6 after averaging 17.0 assists, an all-time best in the National Basketball Association. Rick Barry [1-3 Dazzler, 4-5 Percentage Shot, 6 Turnover] was outstanding as a passer also, especially considering he was a forward.

In the lane it was Moses Malone of the Houston Rockets taking charge and becoming the NBA's premier big man. Malone was rated a staggering "-24" as an offensive rebounder and "-5" off the defensive board. Interestingly, nary a pivotman received a "-6" rebounding rating on defense, although there were a number of "-5s."

Malone was also a good scorer and superb defender (a "6" inside which gives the Rockets an intimidating look). His card and ratings reflect

his MVP-winning season, for sure.

On the elementary side of the cards, Jabbar was rated a "4" on defense for the seventh time and Dave Cowens, after six straight "4" ratings, fell to a "2." Dennis Johnson, 6-4 guard with the defensive-minded, world champion SuperSonics, received the best defensive card ever for a guard. He was rated a "5" outside, "6" against penetration and "3" inside. Only Don Chaney [1974-75] was rated better [6-6-2], but was also a forward and not solely a backcourt performer.

MOST TEAMS SHAKY ON 'D'

Most of the team defensive cards are aptly suited for high-scoring games, with Boston and Cleveland having two of the worst of all-time. Seattle, of course, is good on defense, but the best team overall, at least in Nahigian's opinion, is still Washington, which he claims is "good and (continued on next page)

deep and excels in all aspects of the game."

He also notes that Jim Brewer (Pistons) has a poorer free throw percentage than field goal and that only the following players, from S-O-M's original set in 1972-73, remain on the same team now as they were then: Randy Smith (San Diego), Larry Steele (Portland), Bingo Smith (Cleveland), Sam Lacey (Kansas City), Earl Monroe (Knicks), Calvin Murphy (Houston), Mike Newlin (Houston), Elvin Hayes (Washington), Wes Unseld (Washington), Dave Cowens (Boston) and Fred Brown (Seattle).

Nahigian closed his analysis of the new cards by saying that next year's set should be even better, what with the addition of Larry Bird, Bill Walton with San Diego after a year's layoff and Earvin (Magic) joining Jabbar in L.A. It will also be interesting to see how S-D-M handles the three-point shot.

RECHECK THE RECORDS

I have noticed in the Sept. Review two leagues that had mistakes in their won-and-lost records for teams. When the four teams of John Reid's league are added up the won-and-lost record comes out 347 wins and 301 losses.

And in Kevin Lawless' league, the four teams won-and-lost record added up to 293 wins and 307 losses.

It should come out even -the same number of wins as losses -- when everything is added up.

I think all commissioners should make sure of things like this. The "wrong" team might win a championship.

In response to inquiries by readers regarding hitting patterns, I have a suggestion that might placate all involved. Why not simply have different patterns for each side of the batter's or pitcher's card?

In my opinion, it would be almost like having 24 hitters' patterns, or 20 pitchers' patterns. Since it has been established that players receive their patterns based on their batting average, or ERA, why not sub-divide the patterns to have two different ones on a card?

By having to think about both patterns of a hitter's card (righty and lefty would be different as far as type of pattern), the monotony (and I use that term very loosely) would be broken up, and an already great game would be even better.

Gamer waits 3,916 games and then...

Okay, you malcontents among us, quit your grumbling. No-hitters only come along once in a while as far as seeing the Review's pages...and they happen even more seldom in Strat-O-Matic Baseball.

For most gamers, in Fact, no-hitters are a long-awaited, cherished experience. Some gamers may argue that to read about them is a bore, but they're certainly not that to those who have experienced a rare mound gem.

The Northern Kentucky Baseball Association, for instance, waited

The Northern Kentucky Baseball Association, for instance, waited 3,916 games before witnessing a no-hitter. James Hartley, secretary of the league and resident of Independence, KY, said "The no-hit thing has been strange for us (the NKBA). This year alone, (J.R.) Richard went 8.1 and 8.2 innings on consecutive starts, only to be knocked out both times. And recently (Ron) Guidry went 8.2 before giving up a homer to Enos Cabell. We thought it would never happen."

But it did. In fact the draft league had two quick no-hitters.

Nolan Ryan got the first, hurling for the Billies against the Cakeaters, a 3-0 whitewash that was marred only by his walking eight and hitting a batter. Ryan even walked two in the ninth to keep it tense to the end. He finished with 10 strikeouts against a lineup that included the likes of George Foster, Steve Garvey and Gary Carter.

Even before the Billies' management had time to savor the no-hitter, the team got another when unsung Rick Langford turned in a six-strikeouts,

three-walk performance against a team called the Amoebae.

Another vigil ended recently when David Bohlander, Glenham, SD, a 10-year S-O-M vet, got his first via Paul Splittorff, Kansas City hurler who stopped Toronto. Luiz Gomez's bid for a hit (S1* 1-13 - LO (ss) 14-20) was the only close call. Splittorff fanned three, walked four. The newest cards were used.

1,000 GAMES LATER ...

Scott Roscovius, Tomah, WI, is another to whom no-hitters are anything but an everyday occurrence. He's had two in 1,000 games, along with a pair of one-hitters. The no-hitters were: Ken Brett, subbing for injured Jim Rooker, setting down the hard-hitting Cincinnati Reds in a matchup of 1975 teams, walking two and striking out seven; and John Candelaria, '77 Pirates, duplicating a real-life feat by no-hitting the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Jim Bibby was the subject of toasts from Rich Caracciolo, Syosset, NY, a member of the Louisville Sluggers Baseball Association, a PBM league that has Tony Auter of Louisville as commish. Mr. Bibby set down a hard-hitting team managed by Bob Dormer. He struck out six, walked two and came away a 4-0 victor. Bibby came back in his next outing and won a two-hit shutout, not giving up a safety until two were out in the sixth inning. For Caracciolo, the no-hitter was the first in four years and 500-plus games.

Chris Wilbur, Berlin, MA, only waited three years to witness a no-hitter. It happened in a PBM draft league when his J.A. Richard claimed a 2-0 win, striking out 11, walking five and working around three errors.

OTHER NO-HITTERS

Also reporting no-hitters in recent months were:

* Scott Jordan, Columbus, GA, who couldn't believe his eyes as Bill
Lee of the '75 Boston Red Sox shackled the prodigious hitting '75 Reds in
a World Series matchup. Boston won the game, 2-0, and the Series, as

Jordan called it "the most exciting game I've played in four years of S-D-M."

* In a game pitting a couple of oldies -- 1964 Houston Colts and St.

Louis Cardinals -- Bob Gibson of the Cards corraled the Colts, striking out
10, walking two and escaping unscathed the only serious threat when shortstop Dick Groat ("3") scooped up Bob Lillis' grounder in the ninth. Watching the action was Emery Kurts of Phoenix, AZ.

* While most gamers are lucky to experience one no-hitter, Keith Markman reports that he had two back-to-back pitching gems recently, both by Waite Hoyt of the '27 Yankees. The first was against the '76 Yanks, 4-0, and the second was a shackling of the '75 Red Sox, 8-0. He allowed only two walks in each game. For Markman, who resides in Great Neck, NY, the no-hitters were Nos. 2 and 3 of his table-gaming career.

* Towering J.A. Richard got one for Greg McGill, breaking the young gamer's string of near misses. Richard set down the hard-hitting Cincinnati Reds, 1-0, with Terry Puhl's homer off Fred Norman the decisive blow. J.A. struck out seven and, as customary, managed to walk six. A groundball to "4" shortstop Craig Reynolds was the closest call, but a "7" split number bailed Richard out.

Close calls suffered through by McGill included: Frank Tanana ('76) giving up a leadoff single to Ralph Garr of the White Sox and then retiring the next 27 batters; Jerry Koosman serving up a two-out homer in the bottom of the ninth to Mike Schmidt in another battle between teams from '76; and Phil Niekro ('77) lost out on his bid with one out in the ninth when Rowland Office couldn't catch up with a fly ball off the bat of Ellis Valentine.

* The close-but-no-cigar award this time around, however, goes to Pat Isada, Burin, Newfoundland, who hasn't witnessed a no-hitter in six years of rollin' S-O-M dice. Closest he came was this past summer when Burt Hooton of the Dodgers blanked the injury-riddled New York Yankees, 7-O, allowing one hit. Platoon player Gary Thomasson, pinch-hitting, came on in the ninth with one out and lined a single. And the wait goes on for Pat Isada...

GKSML completes 17th baseball replay

It's 17 and counting for the Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic Baseball League (GKSML).

The continuous draft league involving Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell, has now completed 17 full-season, 154-game replays, the latest the 10-manager National League.

As was pointed out earlier in the spring (April, 1979 Review), the GKSML expanded from eight to ten teams in the N.L., with Warren Newell and Tom Angel (who moved from Florida to Michigan with the lure of S-O-M drawing him to the frigid northland in the heart of winter) guiding expansion teams.

Also, as you may remember, established teams were allowed to protect nine players from their rosters (rather than 15), expansion managers then picked nine players from the pool of talent unprotected and then, after each team protected or picked one more player, a draft was held, in reverse order of finish from the previous season. The expansion teams drafted ninth and tenth in the first round, led off the second and then drafted ninth and tenth the remainder of the draft.

All told, 276 out of a possible 288 players were on teams. Even Pepe Frias--all 15 at-bats worth--was drafted.

NO. 3 FOR CLIF SAGE

Clif Sage, schoolteacher, basketball official and longtime GKSML member, captured the N.L. pennant again, winning for the third straight time and fourth overall. A quick getaway aided Clif as he had a 11-game lead in early July. Dale Holland, perennial runnerup, came on strong the second half, but dropped his final three games and finished two behind Clif. The year before, Dale wound up one game to the rear.

Clif then polished off GKSML newcomer, Jim Weissert, who had won the

Clif then polished off GKSML newcomer, Jim Weissert, who had won the East (while Clif was winning the West Division), in three straight games in the playoffs. The West proved to be a much stronger division, as all fiveteams finished above .500. Meanwhile, only two teams topped the .500 plateau in the East.

Clif led in a number of offensive categories--runs scored (753), home runs (154), hits (1,514)--was runnerup in batting (.274) and pitching (2.97) and his defense committed the fewest errors in the league, 96.

He presented an awesome lineup for opposing pitchers to try and work through: Dave Winfield (.319, 28 homers, 112 RBI), Steve Garvey (.315, 91 RBI), Jack Clark (.298, 28 HRs, 112 RBI, 106 runs), Ted Simmons (.296, 32 HRs, 98 RBI) and Pete Rose (.292, 100 runs). Bob Knepper (21-10, 2.42), Steve Carlton (20-10) and Dennis Lamp (18-6) were the heart of the starting pitching rotation.

ANGEL UNAWARE

Transplanted floridian, Tom Angel, received a rude introduction to S-O-M Baseball, GKSML-style anyway, finishing in the celler of the East with a 50-104 record. But Tom was undaunted throughout, vowing that next year--with a lineup featuring Gary Matthews, Lee Mazzilli and Dale Murphy, among others--"we are expecting a big comeback...with at least a divisional title, and perhaps a pennant."

Warren Newell, meanwhile, surprised everyone, especially the two established teams that finished beneath him, with the showing of his expansion club. It finished 10 games over .500 (82-72) as Larry Christenson just missed winning 20 games (19-8), an almost unheard of feat for an expansion team, and Dave Kingman (wait until next year!) crashed 33 home runs, Bob Hoerner 21, both in limited at-bats.

On other fronts, Dave Parker (Doug Towne) was the MVP after leading the league in hitting (.346), hits (200), triples (15) and runs scored (113).

Dale Holland's George Foster blasted 43 home runs to rule that category again, while Ed Halicki (Jim Weissert) compiled an amazing earned run average of 1.56 while going 20-6.


