### TBA on home stretch of another season

#### 'World' tournament again planned for late January

Jim Jasper continues to pile up the points on the Table Baseball Association's touring tournament circuit. In fact Jasper, who hails from Schaumburg, IL, has added another TBA tourney win and is starting to outdistance a strong field of challengers in the 1989 points race.

His lifetime total, where Jasper has a huge lead, is up to 531

His lifetime total, where Jasper has a huge lead, is up to 531 points, while this season he's at 183 and counting after recently winning the Chicago tournament.

"We had one tournament left in October (in Sacramento, Oct. 13-15) and then three in November and one in December," says TBA director John Kreuz of what's remaining on this season's schedule.

"The World Tournament will be in Chicago on January 19-21, the week before the Super Bowl," continues Kreuz. The four tourneys still remaining will be held in Baltimore (Nov. 3-5), San Diego (Nov. 10-12), Chicago (Nov. 17-19) and Newark, NJ (Dec. 1-3).

Since the Review last reported on the TBA-style shaking and rolling, six more tournaments have been played.

Jasper, as previously mentioned, won out in Chicago, with Alan Ellenby, the attorney from Deerfield, II, who is remembered for winning the World TBA Championship in 1988, finishing runner-up.

Jasper and Ellenby, it should be noted, also faced each other in a memorable face-to-face duel of the champions (July, 1989 Review). It should also be noted that on the day Jasper won the TBA tourney it was his 53rd birthday. his 53rd birthday.

At St. Louis, Tim Berry of Roseville, MN, took away the first prize money. Terry Rowan of Roberts, WI, finished second.

In Los Angeles it was Kreuz handing the first-place money to himself. Kreuz admits that he doesn't enter a tournament for the money, but rather to test his vast gaming skills against what he considers the best S-O-M players in the world. In some tournaments he doesn't have time, because of the myriad of detail he has to attend to, for such tabletop endeavors.

### MINIMUM OF 20 GAMES

Asked what the minimum number of games would be for a participant in a TBA event, Kreuz said: "There would be at least 20 games. And for someone who makes the playoffs (and about one-third of the gamers do), it could be as many as 32 to 36 games.

"For \$60 a player really gets lots and lots of action," enthuses Kreuz, who is closing in on running his 100th TBA tournament.

# '58 Colts win football 'star wars'

#### But Baltimore has nary an individual statistical leader

The 1958 Baltimore Colts didn't have anyone in the top 10 in any

offensive category in a replay of the oldies (teams prior to 1982) by the Dryden Strat-O Football League.

Only accomplishment by the '58 Colts, quarterbacked by Johnny Unitas and with Lenny Moore and Alan Ameche in the backfield, was winning the championship from a super-talented field that included such powerhouses as the '78 Steelers, '80 Raiders, '81 49ers and '62

Three coaches took 24 teams from the pre-super advanced version days and played a 12-game schedule. The league was further broken down into two conferences and six four-team divisions.

On the dice-rollin' and strategy making end of the action were Pete Schihl, Rodney Westich and Philip Jones. Each coach had his favorite teams, with Schihl getting a boot out of guiding '77 Denver, '74 Miami and '58 Colts; Jones the '63 Bears, '76 Oakland, '60 Philadelphia and '81 Cincinnati, and Westich the '62 Packers and '80 San Diego.

#### SO MUCH FOR STATISTICAL CHAMPS

Jim Taylor of '62 Green Bay led the Dryden League in rushing, Dan

Jim Taylor of '62 Green Bay led the Dryden League in rushing, Dan Ross of the '81 Bengals was tops in receptions and Ken Anderson, also of '81 Cincinnati, collected the most yardage with his passes, 3054.

Ameche of the '58 Colts was no better than the 12th-best runner (he had 942 yards in 258 carries for a 3.7 average and nine touchdowns) and Moore was no higher than 18th in receptions, pulling in 47 for 913 yards, a 19.4 average, and nine TDs). In a listing of the top 17 quarterbacks, Unitas was no where to be found.

So much for statistics!

Baltimore had an 8-4 regular-season record and then gathered steam in the playoffs. First it slipped past the '81 New York Jets, 17-14, scoring 10 points in the final quarter to erase a 14-10 deficit.

In the conference final, it was more high-wire walking as '81 Cincinnati grabbed a 14-0 halftime advantage. Later, trailing 17-14, the Colts moved 76 yards in the last two minutes, with a 42-yard run by Moore and a Unitas-to-Moore pass covering 34 yards the big plays in a 21-17 thriller.

Finally, in the Super Bowl against the defensive-minded '63 Bears, Baltimore had an easy time, taking advantage of five Chicago turnovers in the first half, three on punt returns, to rack up a 42-14 win.

During the regular season the Bears had allowed a league-low 135 points and had the best turnover ratio (+29). Chicago also won its last six games to get into the playoffs.

#### FAST GETAWAY FOR COLTS

Baltimore got out of the starting gate the fastest of any of the teams, winning seven of its first eight games. Highlight of that early surge was a 35-0 trouncing of the vaunted '78 Steelers.

Later Baltimore lost two of its last three games and its playoff

chances were dimmed.

'58 NEW YORK GIANTS - Possessed strong defense, but also had leag-

ue's weakest offense.

'80 DETROIT - Featured rushing of Billy Sims (204-965, 4.7) and good kicking game. Sims, however, was only offensive threat. Only had 4-8 record but was competitive in every game, except for 43-3 trashing by Denver

'80 ATLANTA - Had +17 turnover ratio and got great performance from QB Steve Bartkowski (18 TD/9 interceptions). Edged out Miami for

playoff spot via tiebreaker.

'74 MIAMI - Larry Csonka was sixth best rusher in league, but lack
of passing game in crucial situations hurt the cause immensely. '78 DALLAS - Average season for everybody, as attested to by 6-6

record.
'79 TAMPA BAY - Good defense couldn't hold up the Bucs forever Tampa was -18 in turnover ratio, Rickey Bell carried league-high 296 times, but averaged paltry 3.2 yards per attempt.
'58 BALTIMORE - Solid offense and big-play defense.

'58 BALTIMORE - Solid offense and big-play defense.

'78 PITTSBURGH - Terry Bradshaw supplied most of offensive punch.

Defense was good, although rushing attack was bad. Went 8-4, losing twice to both Baltimore and Philadelphia.

'60 PHILADELPHIA - Thanks to Norm VanBrocklin, Eagles had best aerial game in league. Blitzed Pittsburgh in first meeting of two teams, 48-21, and then won defensive duel second time around, 10-7.

'78 NEW ENGLAND - Kicking game was sub-par and had poor turnover ratio. Did win four straight at mid-season, but then finished back in pack by losing five of last six games.

'63 CHICAGO - Had great defense (only 135 points allowed). Won six in row at end of season to qualify for playoffs.

in row at end of season to qualify for playoffs.

'76 OAKLAND - Strong team on paper, but Ken Stabler had 31 interceptions and Raiders had -17 turnover ratio. Did defeat Denver twice, although losing twice to Chicago.

'77 DENVER - Three of four losses were to Chicago and '76 Oakland.

Had league's stingiest defense as far as yards allowed.

'80 HOUSTON - Earl Campbell, despite sitting out two games with injuries, managed to score 13 touchdowns. Houston's division had three outstanding defensive teams.

'80 OAKLAND - Easily won division, thanks to 1-2 running punch of Mark VanEeghan and Kenny King and strong start and finish. Biggest win was over Baltimore (24-17).

'80 SAN DIEGO - Finished strong, going 4-0. But 1-7 start grounded

#### MORE COMPUTER IDEAS

In response to your inquiry about proposed changes for the Strat-O-Matic computer baseball game, I have the following recommendations based upon considerable play with both the first and second versions of the diskette.

The roster expansion to 40 is apparently already in the works and the September Review contained some good suggestions from Gordon Holcomb, which hopefully will be incorporated

into the program.

A few additional suggestions

follow:

(1) Problem: Very infrequent advancement after fly outs. Advancement from second to third should be permitted on a "B" fly out to right field. On a "B?" the runner should be permitted to try for third, subject to the outfielder's arm as in a sacrifice fly situation.

(2) Problem: No adjustment on throws depending on where the ball is hit or fly out as mentioned above. An adjustment should be made depending on the field to which the ball is hit. If to right, the ball add +2 to the outfielder's arm; if to left, adjust -2.

(3) Problem: No variety in

infield force plays. On grounders with more than one runner on, the force play, or first out of the double play, is always at second base. Random variety should be programmed so that some forces occur at the lead base instead of second.

For example, on a bases loaded "B" grounder to the pitcher, some force plays should be at home instead of second.

(4) Problem: Lead runner

vanishing into twilight zone With runners on first and third, if the runner on first steals successfully with an error by the catcher on the throw, the runner on third vanishes into limbo. This is an obvious glitch.

(5) Problem: Lack of unusual plays. Although not of great statistical significance, the presence

of unusual or "freak" plays would add greatly to the flavor and realism of the game.

A randomized generator could be used to trigger unusual plays not otherwise provided for, as rainouts, interference, ejections, dropped third strikes with batter reaching first, rundowns,

- (1) When a play such as "DO 1-4, Fly (RF) 5-20" occurs, make that outfielder's arm rating refer to the right fielder, not the center fielder, as is the case
- (2) Make the game properly account for a steal and catcher's throwing error in a first-andthird situation.

  (3) Make 1985 pitchers' with
- "N" batting power able to hit homers off their opponents' cards.
- (4) Put in an option that would allow gamers to see the fielding chart results readings, so that we know when a "great catch" has occurred.

(5) Base relief pitchers' weakness inning on number of outs and not innings, just as the man-ual version of Strat dictates.

- (6) Allow gamers an editing capability to fix errors on the computer disks, such as the 1988 Damon Berryhill stealing asterrisk error.
- (7) Grant gamers the ability to import player ratings and and all statistics directly into Lotus 1-2-3 for further analysis. Or, offer 1-2-3 disks of player ratings each year as an additional product.

# Perseverance pays off for replay gamer

After what has seemed like an eternity, my 1983-84 hockey replay and playoffs are complete. In between the beginning and end of this replay, I have started two other hockey replays, and they should be finished around the year 2000!

I have been a Strat-O-Matic fanatic for 15 years, beginning with I have been a Strat-O-Matic fanatic for 15 years, beginning with the original basketball game back in 1973. I also began playing the other games that year as well, with baseball becoming my favorite.

I have completed seven actual team replays in baseball and one in

basketball, besides starting many others. The computer baseball game, which has become my game of choice, is excellent for completing many of the replays I had started but had yet to finish.

#### HERE COMES HOCKEY . . .

However, using the cries for more hockey as motivation, I put aside the baseball for a while and finished up the hockey replay. For the record, I used the super-advanced rules and adhered to the reallife number of games for each player.

The most glaring weakness of the game came from the number of power-play opportunities, which were down by 18.7 percent, despite the fact that I intimidated every time (which should have led to more penalties). Goals scored were also down by 14.6 percent (this could have

been a negative effect of intimidating every time).

I'm sure that different offensive modes and passing/penetration

frequency have an impact, but I think some revisions are necessazay if the game is to be as realistic as possible.

As the game is now, I see very little reason not to intimidate with a I-D (intimidation rating) penalty player. They will not take the puck away by their rating, but they have the least chance for a penalty and can still get an "automatic" take away from the split-deck.

#### TEAMS ARE CLOSE IN STANDINGS

As for the standings, most teams were within seven points of their real-life record, with the exceptions coming from the Norris Division where St. Louis improved by 17 points and Toronto was 17 points worse. The Norris also provided the best race as only 11 points separated first from fourth place.

Edmonton's big three of Wayne Gretzky, Paul Coffey and Jari Kurri totaled 523 points between them and improved the Oilers record by nine points. As it did in the regular season, Edmonton dominated the playoffs to win the Stanley Cup by defeating surprising Philadelphia, 4-1.

The playoffs were filled with upsets as Edmonton was the only regular season division winner to reach the conference finals. In the Wales Conference, Philadelphia came out of the Patrick Division over the favored New York Islanders and faced Buffalo, which had surprised

Boston in the Adams. Edmonton breezed through the Campbell Conference without a loss, beating Vancouver in the opening round, then Calgary, before taking care of Minnesota, which had surprised St. Louis, 4-0, in the Norris

Division final. The Stanley Cup opened with a 3-1 Edmonton win as Glenn Anderson The Stanley Cup opened with a 3-1 Edmonton will as Glenn Anderson had two goals. Philadelphia rebounded in game two to hand the Oilers their only playoff loss, 4-2. Three second period goals by Darryl Sittler, Bobby Clarke and Ilkka Sinisalo, along with excellent goaltending (continued on next page) by Bob Froese, were the keys.

Game three saw Edmonton score five unanswered goals to jump to a 6-1 lead going into the final period. The Flyers rallied as Ron Sutter scored a pair of goals and Clarke another, but they fell short, 6-4.

Edmonton scored quickly again in game four as Gretzky notched two

Edmonton scored quickly again in game four as oretzky notified the goals in a 4-2 victory.

Game five was the most exciting game of the series as Philadelphia scored three goals in the first period (two by Dave Poulin) to tie the game at three and send it into overtime. Near the midway point of the overtime period the "Great One" (who else?) scored on a breakaway to

win the game and series.

In all, Gretzky finished with 41 playoff points on 17 goals and 24 assists in 16 games. Kurri and Anderson both scored 13 goals, while Pat Hughes was the surprise of the playoffs, scoring 12 goals.

Roy, however, was so dominating at home I decided to give him minus and plus two. These are not based on actual stats. It would be nice if the game company could make the cards that way. If expert gamers such as Steve Dull, Phil Ledesma, Judy Goldberg, etc., know better, I'd be glad to see their ratings.

#### STOPOVER FOR THE STARS

Living only a few miles from the University of Notre Dame, I've had the opportunity to see numerous NHL stars beforre they hit the big time, including most members of the 1980 U.S. Olympic team.

I even had some of the former Notre Dame stars now in the NHL

autograph their S-O-M cards at a recent summer reunion benefit game. Dave Poulin, Greg Meredith, Jack Brownschidle and Don Jackson were

among the players who penned their pasteboards.

Jackson was curious about the cards and wondered out loud if Gretzky and Co. could have beaten the Boston Bruins and Broad Street Bullies (N.Y. Rangers) of the '70s. I told Jackson that those teams were not available from S-O-M.

# **Questions & Answers**

QUESTION: Could you explain Catcher-card X when runner is on second and a passed ball or wild pitch occurs, following a GB C or B. When does the infield move in, or can it? (Danny Myers)

ANSWER: We are assuming you're referring to the old X chart, before all such plays you describe were turned into either popouts or foulouts. This eliminated those situations where a runner could score from second on a passed ball/wild pitch.

# **Guest columnist** What ever happened to 'real' replays?

Editor's note: Dick Hunt is a frequent contributor to the Review, a 17-year S-O-M veteran of baseball and, in his words, "an S-O-M Basket-ball freak." He's commissioner of the l6-team, PBM draft Tabletop Basketball League. He's married (for nine years), with two children. He and his wife, Julie, both work at Jackson Laboratory in Bar Harbor, which is one of the world's leading providers of genetically pure laboratory

Personally, I have the feeling that the good old fashioned Strat-O-Matic beast known as a replay is quickly becoming a real dinosaur. This article is an attempt to rectify that problem.

After all, what is the cornerstone of S-O-M Baseball? Realistic statistical results achieved with cards and dice, right? And to truly appreciate the realism which can be attained with S-O-M, I feel that one simply must conduct at least one replay during his or her's S-O-M or career.

Between the popularity of draft leagues and the ease which the computer lends itself to their operation, we replay buffs are getting

fewer and farther between.

rewer and farther between.

I admit that I am like most people in that I prefer a draft league anytime when it comes to face-to-face play. But for solitaire gamers like myself, give me that full-season replay every time. I even prefer the replay to play-by-mail baseball, having severed all my PBM baseball ties some years back.

#### COMPUTER AIDS IN REPLAY EFFORTS

At one time in the S-O-M world, a full season replay was something every gamer dreamed of some day doing. Most people never even attempt it, simply because of the time required. Even replaying one six-team division requires a lot of dice rolling for one person.

With the addition of the computer to the S-O-M tool kit, however, solitaire replay is more of a possibility than ever. With a little research, a person can really dive into some of the recent and even not-so-recent card sets put out by the game company.

First, let's define the term replay. In the strictest sense, it's just that: a replay of a given season, using the real life schedule and reflecting as many of the real life roster moves as possible.

In a more conventional setting, a replay may not follow the exact schedule, although the formula should be the same (12 games vs. teams in the other division, 18 games vs. the teams in your own, or whatever the formula is for a given league/division/year).

It's also up to the individual gamer as to how strictly his roster moves will be monitored. For instance, the 1930 Hughie Critz card is with the New York Giants. The casual replay gamer leaves it there, but the serious student will put Critz with the Reds for the season's first month, which is where he started out the real life 1930 season. In either case, the basic premise of the replay is to use the

straight S-O-M teams as opposed to a draft league.

The first, and one of the most important steps to conducting any replay, of course, is to decide which year/card set you are going to use. To help with this decision, I am providing a list of my top choices:

1987 MAJOR LEAGUES - The 1987 season represents S-O-M's finest (continued on next page)

achievement in baseball card sets. The biggest advantage of this set is that it's the only one of my choices that has all of the game's features, including ballparks, clutch hitting, supplementary stealing and pitcher's holding on. The only feature lacking is the new wild pitch and balk feature, which is an unproven system anyway.

But the set's real attraction is the 1987 pennant races. The NL

has only two teams with less than 73 wins and the AL has only two teams with fewer than 75 wins. The best divisional race in S-O-M's history, the '87 AL West, is also included. All seven teams finished within 10

games of first in that division.

Close races are the replay gamer's best friend because they keep him from getting discouraged with the amount of games required. And best of all, '87 was the year of the alleged "juiced" ball. Home runs really fly as the AL alone has over 20 players with 30+ homers Disadvantage: Doing 1987 will require one to play over 2000 games.

1982 MAJOR LEAGUES - Among the 26 teams in 1982, only five won fewer than 73 games. This kind of parity can only mean one thing: close pennant races. The biggest challenge offered here may be getting St. Louis to win its division, let alone repeating its World Series triumph.

The 1982 World Series is the only one in which the most powerful team in a season (Milwaukee, 216 home runs) faced off against the weal est (Cardinals: 67 homers). The fourth-place team in each NL division finished only eight games back, so there should be some wild pennant races. And in the AL East there was only a 17-game spread from top to bottom.

Disadvantages: Besides requiring 2000+ games, the '82 card set has no ballpark factors, clutch hitting or pitchers' holding ratings.

1981 MAJOR LEAGUES - Placing the dreaded strike season third on my list may not be a popular ranking with some, but I did it because '81 offers all sorts of fantasy possibilities that other card sets lack.

First of all, you could play the entire 162-game schedule, pro-rating your at-bats and innings pitched limits from their real life that season. A wilder possibility could include entering each player's '81 stats into your records as if the games had been played - and then

finishing the season by playing the games canceled by the strike.

This season also offers Cincinnati Reds' fans who were cheated so badly in real life (the Reds didn't make the playoffs despite the best

record in the majors) a chance to make amends.
But even if you stick to the real life schedule and results, the pennant races are fabulous. The top five teams in the AL East finished

within 2 1/2 games of first.

Another unique feature about 1981 is that it was the first season offered with the supplementary stealing system. There were no asterisk (automatic-good-lead-if-they're-not-held) runners. Because of this, there are a lot of strange (by '80s standards) good lead ratings to get used to.

Disadvantages: Although the number of games depends on what you want to do, you must still do without the ballparks, clutch hitting and pitchers' holding ratings.

1950 MAJOR LEAGUES - Of the four full-season, full-major league replays which I recommend, the 1950 season is the most playable because it requires "only" 1,232 regular-season games. If that seems like a lot, remember it's only slightly more than half the length of my top three replays.

The major drawback: With each league consisting of only eight

The major drawback: With each league consisting of only eight teams, the NL is a five-team race and the AL a four-team race. In the American, the fourth-place Indians were only six games out of first, but the fifth-place Senators were a whopping 31 games back.

Of the 16 teams, seven of them didn't win 70 games in real life, but the tightness of the races among the contenders could make up for that, especially if you want a break from the more recent card sets. Also, the nostalgia factor (DiMaggio, Kiner, Snider, Musial, etc.)
makes this an attractive season to replay.

Although there is no supplementary stealing for the past seasons sets produced by S-O-M, the stolen base was of such diminished importance (and use) when compared to recent sets that you'll never miss it. Disadvantages: No ballparks or clutch hitting.

1930 NATIONAL LEAGUE - This is that infamous hitting set that caused such a stir when the game company printed it a few years ago. The league hit a whopping .303, and these teams are a ball to watch. It's an eight-team league (only 616 games) with five teams finishing

within 12 games of first place.

The 1930 NL offers a real treat: the last place Phillies. Philadelphia's team ERA was an unbelievable 6.71! The hitting was great, busimply couldn't make up for that pitching staff and the team finished dead last with a 52-102 record.

But I can guarantee you that you'll never enjoy playing the lousy teams in any replay more than you'll enjoy the 1930 also-rans. The hitting is so great that even the meaningless games (every replay has some) are fun to play. These teams have got to be seen to be believed. Disadvantages: No ballparks or clutch hitting. The stealing feat-

ures won't be missed, because the hitting is so good in 1930 that the

stolen base was more risk than it was worth.

1983 NATIONAL LEAGUE - No team was more than 22 games out of first in the NL in '83, a very good finish for a last place team in the 1980s. This set may offer the best races of any year S-O-M has printed.

The Wheeze Kids took the East and the Dodgers won out West, but with tight races like these, neither of those teams could coast through a replay. Remember: the closer the real life race, the better your chances are of crowning a different champion than the real life majors did. This league is a dream of "what if" situations.

Disadvantages: No clutch hitting or ballparks, no pitchers' hold-

ing. 972 games.

1962 AMERICAN LEAGUE - The 1962 AL offers a very good spread, with

1962 AMERICAN LEAGUE - The 1962 AL offers a very good spread, with nine of the league's 10 teams finishing within 24 games of first place. That is excellent for a 10-team league with no divisions.

The Yankees won the pennant with 96 wins and with a little improvement by the mediocre teams, the standings could get quite jumbled. For instance, the Tigers led the league in walks (651) and homers (209) and if you could improve their .248 batting average just a little (the league batted .255), the increased run production could help Detroit make a dramatic rise from its real life fourth-place finish.

This replay offers a lot of potential for this sort of standings

This replay offers a lot of potential for this sort of standings climbing. Can the mighty Yankees defend their crown?

Disadvantages: The usual - no supplementary stealing, ballparks, clutch hitting or pitchers' holding. 810 games.

Three more replays that Hunt would rank in his top 10 are the following: 8. 1968 NATIONAL LEAGUE; 9. 1970 NATIONAL LEAGUE EAST; 10. 1980 NATIONAL LEAGUE.
