Countdown to opening tipoff under way

Strat-O-Matic's newest creation, the revamped pro basketball game, will be coming your way soon.

And it should provide you with everything you always wanted in a

basketball game, but were afraid to ask for them for fear of how long

it would take to play.

The Review editors have not played the new game, nor have they actually seen it. But we have had an opportunity to examine the playing instructions, see the new cover that will go on the game box, and pore over some of the sample cards, both individual and team.

First major change noticed is that a GO-card action deck activates play, rather than dice, and that the dice are used only in shooting situations. The concept is similar to that used in the hockey game.

situations. The concept is similar to that used in the hockey game. The action cards are loaded with action, too, as the upper portion is divided into "Home" and "Visitor" sections as to what type of action is occurring ("Switth-Defender LG (C) Any open shot," or "Inside shot only for player positioned inside"). There's also a section if the opponent is pressing. And, finally, there's a "control" section, whereby the offensive team is in a normal situation or fast-breaking or even

in possession after a successful press.

It's not a case of one result per action card, either, as many times the cards will be referred to on the current play and then the following

The action deck is also used to time a game, with 60 cards consisting of a quarter (two minutes equals 10 cards). Cards are always dis-

carded face up "as additional information on crucial plays and control for the next shot will be obtained from that card."

MANY CHOICES ON 'D'

On offense, a coach can position a maximum of two players inside while any number can be positioned outside. The right forward and left guard are assumed to be your better shooters at those positions.

On defense, however, the choices are many. A team can play close, Also, one player should be designated to play inside normal or sag. (usually the player with the highest block rating).

Here's S-O-M's description of the defenses:

Close - reduces the offensive team's outside shooting efficiency and increases its penetration effectiveness.

Sag - increases the offensive team's outside shooting efficiency and restricts its inside effectiveness.

Normal - all-purpose defense that does not weaken itself in one area in order to stop a specific type of shot or player.

A fourth option is a pressing defense in which a team is deployed after a successful field goal or free throw or any stoppage of play. defense moves a disc on the playing board on to the press circle and it's in effect. Results again come from the action card.

MORE OFFENSE, TOO

The game has not only been expanded as far as defense; offensively it has been opened up, too.

Players are rated for outside shooting, penetration shots, rebound and inside shots, and fastbreak shots. Each shooting category is a single column, with the former close and back columns being dispensed with.

At the top of each player card there is also a free throw shooting rating and also a rating for three-point field goal attempts--with those similar to the former game.

The dice used for field goal shots (other than a three-point attempt) are different. Two white dice are still combined to find out a number reading. But a larger black die has various readings. The black die has two "D" results, one "X" and three blanks.

A blank reading results in the white die being combined and checking the appropriate column on the shooter's card for the result. If the die yields a "D" reading, then refer to the opposing team's defensive card

A die yield of "X" means refer to the opposing team's derensive card to the column that describes the shot attempted.

A die yield of "X" means refer to the "X" column of the defensive player guarding the shooter. In other words, here's when a defender's defensive prowess, or lack of, comes into play. Defenders are rated against outside shots, penetration, inside shots and fastbreak--plus ability to block shots.

PASSING ALSO IMPORTANT

The players are also rated for rebounding, assists, shooting tendency (inside, outside, etc.) and passing. Passing this time falls into two categories: (1) normal play situations, and (2) fastbreak situations.

Overriding all the changes, however, is the fluidity of play. This was S-O-M creator Harold Richman's No. 1 goal in restructuring the bask-etball game. Testing results always brought out the 'flow' of the game. "We're sure everyone who likes basketball will like the new game, $^{\mathrm{u}}$

says Richman. "It has everything that pro basketball has--fast-breaking, pressing, blocked shots--and the flow is beautiful. "I'm very excited

about it.

Alcohman also admits that the exhaustive amount of testing done on the basketball game has caused the game company to fall far behind in some of its other projects. The hockey cards, for instance, will be out later than usual, probably very close to the time the basketball cards and game become available.

And then there's the 1956 baseball season--S-O-M's project for the winter -- which the game company plans to have ready by early next year,

This PBM league has some better ideas

With the opening face-off soon to occur, it might be of value to many gamers to understand some of the innovative ideas incorporated by the Floreda Gold Coast Hockey Association (FGCHA).

First off, Bob Lopeck, Miami, FL, is and has been commissioner for the three years of the FGCHA's existence. What's unique about Lopeck is not only that he is super-organized -- to the zenith degree, in fact -- but

that he does not coach a team in the PBM league that he organized.

"I have never coached any team in the FGCHA and have no intention of coaching (or holding) any franchise," he says. "Second, no coach that is in the FGCHA lives within 1,200 miles of me, therefore creating no conflicts of interest."

As far as the \$GCHA itself, it's a draft league that plays 80 games, has no entry fees or dues and will start its fourth season with 16 coaches, and 12 of the original 14. As far as the draft, 15 players are protected from the previous season's roster and then rookies, free agents and players out loose are drafted.

Another innovative idea that has worked extremely well is that coaches fill in a strategy sheet at the beginning of the season and at the half-way point. They're sent to Lopeck who checks them out to make sure they conform to FGCHA and S-O-M rules, and then Lopeck photo-copies them and sends copies to every coach.

them and sends copies to every coach.

"Every team plays 40 games at home each season," adds Lopeck. "These 40 games are broken down into 10 playing periods (each one is 13 days long). The four games that each coach plays each playing periodcare against four different teams." Lopeck adds that this method eliminates the constant sending back and forth of strategy sheets.

All scoresheets for each playing period are sent to Lopeck who then are sent to be a sequence of the season of the second of the sec

HANGERS GET THEIR MAN -- AND TITLE!

Lopeck swings into action, as far as rolling dice, with the playoffs, as he plays all games through the first three rounds. All the coaches get into the playoff act after that and through a draw may play one or

two games after that.

The latest FGCHA champion turned out to be Steve Scott's California Rangers -- Cinderellas on ice, really -- as they rose up from last place in Division 2 during the regular-season (with a 24-40-16 record) to skate through the playoffs.

the 15 teams in the FGCHA qualified for the playoffs last year, with points the determining factor. The Rangers, although finishi fifth in Division 2, had more points (64) than the third-place Islanders The Rangers, although finishing (60) in Division 3.

The opponent for the Rangers in the Cloverleaf Cup Playoffsfinals was the Thurston Eagles, coached by Carey Allen of Redford, MI, a team that wound up runnerup (44-25-11) in Division I and featured the awesome forward line built around Gay Lafleur and a defense featuring Tony Esposito in goal.

Main strength of the unheralded Hangers was in the forward line of Orest Kindrachuk, Richard Martin and Dave Taylor.

In the best-of-seven-game series it was the Rangers winning in a surprising five games. They dropped the opener, 4-2, then evened the series at 1-1 by capturing a double-overtime thriller, 4-3, after Taylor had scored twice to erase a 3-0 Eagle lead and tie the count at 3, Bill Barber ended matters with a goal at 1:17 of the second overtime.

Barber, Martin and Taylor each scored twice in an 8-5 romp in game No. 3; the Rangers unloaded 43 shots on goal in a 6-2 runaway in No. 4 and then wrapped it up, 6-3, tallying five times off nine shots in the opening period.

Martin rang up a sensational 24 goals in 22 playoff games and totaled 35 points, while Taylor had 18 goals, 26 assists and topped playoff scorers with 44 points. Kindrachuk had 33 points. The "Terrible Trio" obviously played a key role for the Rangers.

The FGCHA coaching lineup features gamers from Canada (naturally!),

The Fourth Coaching lineup reatures gamers from Canada (naturally!), Pennsylvania, Michigan, New York and California--in other words many of the franchises are separated by close to 3,000 miles.

A new addition this season is Stephen Herring, who promises to make the FGCHA even stronger. Herring "runs what I consider to be the best PBM hockey league around, the Western Canada Summer Hockey League (WCSHL)," says Lopeck.



In the baseball, each team played the others once and then the two managers with the best records met in a best-of-seven World Series. Sanders didn't enter this tournament, opting instead for football, but two Californians--Joe Garcia from Fresno and Brad Bains from the same city--were participants. The California duo obviously traveled the farthest of anyone to roll 'em.

Finalists in the baseball turned out to be Mike Kasrich of Lake Station, IN, with his '75 Reds and Pat Tafelski, also from the Hoosier state, residing in Mishawaka, and his '77 Reds. Pat breezed through the Series in four games, winning by scores of 6-1, 8-5, 2-1 and 2-0.

Luke Kraemer, another Hoosier (West Lafayette), ran the baseball tournament for Sanders. The two had met through the Review, reported

'68 JETS FOOTBALL CHAMPS

The football tournament attracted eight coaches and many of the greatest teams ever, including the '62 Packers (coached by Brown) and '58 Colts (coached by Peck). Also entered were '72 Miami (Joe Craig, Gary, IN), '71 Dallas (Jim Perkins, Edmore, MI); '69 Kansas City (Randy Bigelow, Edmore, MI], '79 Pittsburgh (Joe Dragovich, East Chicago, IN) and '88 Baltimore (James Sanders).

It was double-elimination--and that was a good thing for '69 Kansas City as the Chiefs, after being humbled 48-17 by the Packers in the first round, came out of the losers bracket and almost won it all.

Sanders didn't originally plan to play, but filled in when another gamer couldn't make the scene. Oh, and Sanders proved to be an excellent host when it came to gaming, being eliminated early as the '68 Colts lost to the '68 Jets (40-27) and '65 Chiefs (26-16).

The Super Bowl turned out to be a classic, pitting the once-beaten

The Super Bowl turned out to be a classic, pitting the once-beaten '69 Chiefs and unbeaten '68 New York Jets. The Jets had reached the fi The Jets had reached the finals by routing '68 Baltimore, nipping '62 Green Bay (25-23) and squeezing past '72 Miami (32-31).

It all came down to the last play of the Super Bowl in a fitting windup as the Jets, trailing 20-16 and with the ball on Kansas City's 31. struck for the winning touchdown when Matt Snell, the Jets' fullback, hauled in a pass from Joe Namath.

Sanders describes the scenario as follows: "Randy went into a 3-man line with an extra defensive back placed in the long pass zone. rolled a pass rush on long pass and rolled an '8', the only number he could have rolled to win!"

WIDE BANGE OF OCCUPATIONS

Sanders, in closing, pointed out that voluminous stats were kept but that he didn't feel the rest of the S-O-M world would be interested. "Stats are nice. But to me it was more important that people traveled so far for this event and had such a great time. Everyone who participated has vowed to come back and to bring friends who couldn't make it this time."

Baseball playing tip

The Milwaukee gang of eight, headed by Kary Kintzel, passes along a playing tip regarding a pitcher's point of weakness.

Kintzel has been playing S-O-M Baseball since 1975 and has been experimenting with ideas trying to program the game for computer use.

Meanwhile, he and his friends play a draft league every year with the newest cards. It is from that that the playing tip springs forth.

What Kintzel and friends
do is to double the stamina number.
A pitcher who becomes, or can
become, "weak" in the 8th inning
would thus become a "16."
Second step is to subtract

Second step is to subtract one point for each walk, hit, HBP and earned run. One point, however, is added for a strikeout and a perfect inning (up to his starting limit only). Each reliever must have two games off to regain his points, but may be used before that with points left over from his last outing.

Of course, once the point total reaches O, regardless of the actual inning, the point of weakness has been reached. Thus a pitcher with a "9" (18) or "8" (16) weakness inning could be bombed out early, as occasionally happens in real-life.

But the good news is that B.J. Fischer, Bowling Green, OH, has sent along the ratings. Fischer contacted Gilardi, obtained the ratings and has forwarded them to the Review.

The system remains the same, It can be used only inside the 45-yard line, and ratings are determined as follows: total number of punts inside the 20 is divided by total of touchbacks and punts inside the 20. A percentage of 74-and-up is an "A" rating, 66-73 a "8", 57-65 a "C" and 0-56

Code: Yardage listed is where punt went out of bounds; TB - touchback, ball goes into end zone and is brought out to 20 to start next series.

THIS SACK CHART HAS REALISM

Another football playing tip, this one contributed by Stefan Feuerhart, a student at the University of South Florida in Tampa, deals with

Feuerherdt has long felt that most of the charts printed in the Review did not adequately give credit to the proper defensive player.
"The only charts to appear in the Review concerning this were very limited," he points out, "with the same players always being credited time and time again."

So Feuerherdt rolled up his sleeves, sharpened his pencils and drew up a sack chart that he believes fills the bill.

To determine which defensive player gets credit for any sack which occurs (except on safety blitzes, where the blitzing defensive back is credited), roll three dice. References to specific linebackers in parentheses call for the sack to be credited to the LB <u>only</u> if he was blitzing on the play. Readings in parentheses which do not call for a specific LB, call for credit to be given to the highest rated linebacker, or highest rated outside linebacker (OLB), that was blitzing on the play. If no LB's were blitzing, or if specific LB was not blitzing on play, refer to second reading.

Feuerherdt also has another football playing tip, this one dealing with the wide receiver reverse. He admits it's not frequently used, but feels the play should be part of every gamer's playbook. The chart below is based on true-life receiver's rushing averages.

To run with a wide receiver or tight end, simply call the play and roll three dice. If white die reading is 1, 2, or 3 consult chart below; if 4, 5 or 6 refer to defensive card under end run section. Use receiver's real-life rushing average (statistics can be found in The Official NFL Guide) to determine which chart to use:

Questions & Answers

Editor's note: Questions regarding individual and team ratings will not be answered in most cases, unless a mistake has been made on the card. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, divulge its card-making formula, which would be necessary in some instances in order to answer such questions completely. If your question regarding ratings does not appear in the Review within four months after being submitted, you may assume the rating is correct.

QUESTION: If a punt is blocked into the end zone and does not go out of the end zone, is it regarded as a fumble and a roll of 7-11 (defense recovers) results in a touchdown and 2-6, 12 (offense recovers) a safety? Or is it an automatic safety or touchdown?

ANSWER: A blocked punt that rolls into the end zone is treated as a fumble as far as recovery and result.

QUESTION: In baseball, who rolls the dice, the team at bat or the defense?

Also, who rolls when a split number is called for, or a play
on the X-Chart for fielding?

ANSWER: An interesting question. Most gamers, we thought, had the offense rolling the dice for all situations. But that may not always be the case. Playing directions don't stipulate who rolls 'em. Really, it's an individual gamer (or league) decision. The GKSML has always had the offense doing the rolling. For a couple of weeks this season, however, it did experiment with the defense (or pitcher) rolling. But the experiment was short-lived and all 10 members went back to the more familiar style of play.

QUESTION: What should Tommy Aaron, 1962 Milwaukee Braves, be rated in left field? The card I have is not clear.

ANSWER: Tommy Aaron should be rated a "3" in left field.

QUESTION: What should Linebuck, No. 4, guessed wrong be on 1976 Walter Payton's card?

ANSWER: Early printings had "+27" as the result on No. 4. It should be "+22" instead on No. 4, guessed wrong on a linebuck.

QUESTION: In the 1979-80 hockey cards I'm wondering if the two goalies for the Philadelphia Flyers are correct. Myre's chances are goal 1-12 with a 3.57 average and Peeters is 12-20 goal with a 2.73 average. Compared to any other goalies with similiar averages, the Flyers goalies seem slighted.

ANSWER: According to S-O-M the ratings are correct. S-O-M also mentions that goals allowed is not the only criteria for such ratings: the number of shots taken against the team also plays a big role. Goals allowed against actual shots taken is the main criteria.

QUESTION: On the Super-Advanced Power Play, when you pick a split card and the first number reads "Outside shot for center," does this mean outside shot only, or can he advance, pass, etc.? If there is a rebound, on the first number, do you play it or do you go to #2?

ANSWER: This question is best answered by remembering the game is an (continued on next page)

QUESTION: In hockey do you have to get a goalie rating in order to score on an empty net reading? I recently had a game in which a breakaway occurred and had an X (shot stopped). Who stopped

ANSWER:

If the shot is taken on an empty net--which occurs when a coach pulls his goalie near the end of a game to gain an extra attacker-the rules state that any "goalie rating" is scored as a goal. "Goalie rating" covers any action by the goalie. He is not in the net and, therefore, anything on his card doesn't count. The same goes for an X result. In normal play an X is scored as a save, but if the goalie is not there a save cannot be made.

QUESTION: In regards to last year's edition of hockey cards, I guestion some of the positions assigned to numerous players. I checked the Sporting News Hockey Register and The Hockey News and found 10 players listed at different positions than those assigned them by 9-O-M.

ANSWEA: Probably the best way to get around this question is for the coaches (if involved in league play) to have someone, preferably the commissioner, check hockey guides to see what positions should be assigned to the players in question. Dual positions could be assigned and noted on the card. S-O-M likely picks the predominant position for a player. Over a long season, once-in-awhile use of a right winger on left wing, etc., shouldn't alter statistics. No matter what the position, the player's rating remains constant within the statistical framework that is the basis of the game. I would not, however, shift a player from wing or center to defense. Nor would I shift a defenseman to a forward position. Such changes would make a difference in the stats.

QUESTION: In baseball, when there are runners on first and third does the defensive manager have to designate which runner he intends to hold for steal purposes, or does holding a runner only include baserunners on first? Can you hold a runner on second?

QUESTION: When one bunts for a hit (with no other runners on) do you simply refer to the sacrifice hit chart?

ANSWER: Yes. ***************

QUESTION: Does a HBP count toward the tiring of a pitcher when he is at his endurance inning?

ANSWER: S-O-M Baseball rules don't mention HBP (rather hits and walks), but the GKSML count them toward "weakness." To the GKSML, a

S-O-M league, replay scene

BURLINGTON SOLITAIRE LEAGUE - Charles VanDenCorput, Burlington, Ontario, replayed the 1979 NFL season and found that San Diego's offense was for real, that Philadelphia had arrived a year earlier than in reallife and that Pittsburgh could be beaten... VanDenCorput didn't stage an life and that Pittsburgh could be beaten...VanDenCorput didn't stage an actual replay, deviating from the standpoint of putting teams in divisions according to geography (i.e. AFC West - San Diego, Oskland, Los Angeles, etc.) and striving for balance in each division...Real-life Super Bowl foes Pittsburgh and Los Angeles had mixed success, with the Steelers finishing runnerup to New England in the NFC East with an 11-5 record and L.A. winding up third in the AFC West at 7-9 and failing to chalify for the playoffs...Pittsburgh fall to Philadelphia in the NFC record and L.A. winding up third in the AFC West at 7-9 and failing to qualify for the playoffs...Pittsburgh fell to Philadelphia in the NFC title game, 23-17, and then San Diego, behind MVP Mike Thomas' 88 yards rushing in 14 carries, and one TD, nipped Philadelphia in the Super Bowl, 24-20...Dan Fouts was a one-man wrecking crew for the Chargers, completing 61.2 percent of 541 passes for a league-high 30 TDs...other highlights included: Walter Payton missing the 2,000-yard rushing plateau by a scant 15 yards; Wendell Tyler of L.A. averaging 6.2 yards per carry; 19 players accounting for over 1,000 receiving and 14 rushing for over 1,000; Steve Grogan of New England throwing only seven interceptions and falling under 100 in passing rating on the last game (he finished at 93.9), and Houston winning its first nine games...lowlights included Terry Bradshaw throwing 27 interceptions; Atlanta, although possessed of one of the stingiest defenses, winning only three times because of an inept offense; and Pittsburgh failing to reach the Super Bowl when two passes were "dropped" (rolls of "7") in the final minute of the NFC title game...VanDenCorput, although admitting to having a lot of fun, added that "nothing beats face-to-face football. No-Hitters

Sometimes in the hustle and bustle to play games, the big happenings go unnoticed. Even no-hitters, believe it or not, sometimes go undetected.

such happenings came to the attention of the Review. in the NSSML (North-South Strat-O-Matic League), a first-year PBM league with members in Michigan (North), Pennsylvania and Texas (South), with Mario Soto taking the bows for a no-hit performance. The other, by unsung Doc Medich, occurred in a 1981 solitaire league operated by Jeff Jackson

of Cape Elizabeth, ME.
Commissioner Steve Schumacher of Houston, TX, acquired Soto in a
free-agent draft and thus he was pitching for Montreal against Philadelphia when the big happening took place. "It was the third no-hitter of my 15-year S-O-M career," said Schumacher afterwards. "And would you bel I didn't even know he had a no-hitter until I compiled the stats after the game?" "And would you believe

Soto walked four and struck out 10 in a 5-0 victory.

Medich's no-hitter was even better--in fact it was perfect! He shut down California, pitching for Texas, and didn't allow a runner to reach Not bad for a hurler who entered the game with a so-so 6-7 record. At first Medich's accomplishment didn't sink in with Jackson, but

after tallying the stats he jumped for joy and soon the whole town of Cape Elizabeth knew about Medich's perfecto.

COMBINED NO-HITTER

Another interesting no-hitter to cross the desk of the Review editors was one reported by Bill Fedock of Baltimore, MD. It was the 1977 Phils, with Randy Lerch pitching, against the 1978 Reds and Paul Moskau.

Lerch, despite setting the Reds down in order, wasn't to see the second inning. He was injured and Ron Reed came on in the second, eventually pitching the last eight innings, yielding nary a hit, striking out seven and walking two. A combined no-hitter—a rarity, indeed!

Oh, and while the Reds couldn't muster even one hit, Philly batters

pounded out 24, including eight home runs, and romped 15-0.
Fedock, who's been playing S-O-M since 1971 and now has been witness to three no-hitters, also mentioned a pitching gem by Richard Dotson of the Chicago White Sox. · It was a solitaire game, with Oakland providing the opposition, and Dotson walked the leadoff batter, flickey Henderson, retired 26 batters in succession, and then walked Henderson again before getting the final out.

CHIPS IN WITH HOME RUN, TOO

Other no-hitters reported recently include:

* Larry Dierker of the 1976 Houston Astros blanking the '76 Brewers, 4-0, and hitting a home run to boot. Dierker walked one, Charlie Moore opening the minth, and struck out nine. The game was played basic by Greg

* Matthew Legere, manager in a PBM league, had two no-hitters in a span of Four games--by Bill Travers and Moose Haas. Only six teams comprised the league, says commissioner Kevin Colton, so every pitcher has to

face all-star batting orders.

* William Lewis, Jersey City, NJ, reports all the nœws, good as well as bad, whenever it comes to noteworthy items in the PBM CanAm league. The good news was that Lewis reported the no-hitter, by Craig Swan (1979 card). The bad news was that it was against his Highlanders in a home game. Swan fanned seven and walked two and had only one close call; when Barry Bonnell had a 1-12 chance for a single, but a "19" was drawn. Ironically, Lewis has been party to one other no-hitter in 15 years of gaming--that by his 1978 Craig Swan. But it occurred in an away game and Lewis only heard about it rather than experiencing the visual thrill.
