In the news with Strat-O-Matic

Strat-O-Matic Games may not be in the news like a year ago, or during the Great Baseball Strike, but they are still seeing their share of newsprint.

Two feature stories appeared during the summer months in major newspapers: one in the Los Angeles Herald Examiner (Aug. 25) and the other in the Windsor Star, Windsor, Ontario (July 19).

The Windsor Star article deals with Marcel Letourneau, a 17-year-old gamer who has taken over his uncle's (Gary Trudell) team, the Moosonee Mallards, in the Florida Gold Coast Hockey Association (FGCHA), a play-by-mail league that is featured elsewhere in this edition of the

Review.

"It (the FGCHA) uses charts, dice and cards instead of sticks and skates," writes Star staff reporter Marty Beneteau. "The key to the game is strategy sheets compiled by coaches at the beginning of the season,

is strategy sheets compiled by coaches at the beginning of the season, the half-way point and before the playoffs begin. They spell out line combinations, penalty killing units, offensive and defensive strategy and even the amount of intimidation the coach wishes to employ."

"For me, this has gone beyond fun," says Letourneau, who makes his home on Shawnee Road in Tecumseh. "It's the best hobby I've ever had. Ouring the season I put in 10 or 12 hours a week." Each team, incidentally, plays 40 home and 40 away games. At least four games every 13 days is the anticipated playing pace.

Trudell, who is called the "Sam Pollock of the FGCHA and twice voted coach of the year," says of the transfer of the franchise: "Now I don't have enough time to put into it and I knew Marcel was interested and had the time to run the team properly."

'CASEY AT THE STRAT'

Baseball was the name of the game - Strat-O-Matic Baseball, that is - in a column by Carol A. Crotta (The Crotta Chronicle) that appeared in the Herald Examiner.

"Casey at the Strat" it was dubbed and it touched all the bases, beginning with Josh, "a friend of ours," who plays in a neighborhood league that is struggling through a 64-game schedule that was begun two

years ago, to all the stories about Strat-O-Matic.
"The best part about Strat-O-Matic is the stories," says Crotta. "We've heard of Fanatastic pre-season draft sessions, held in closely guarded private rooms, and people putting fists through walls when a .240

hitter hits a grand slam.
"Most players," continues Crotta, "very carefully create their playing environments. They sit in the same chairs, or play a special national anthem, or even build their own stadiums. There was one notorious player who kept his stadium engulfed in a heavy fog, produced by a certain illegal weed, to render the visiting team manager happily inert."

She also relates the story of the manager who was so disgusted with his team's performance, that he piled up wood and dry brush in his drive-way, put the cards on top and then "sacrificed" the entire team.

A tip of the topper to Christian Super of Los Angeles for sending along "The Crotta Chronicle."

A look at new penalty system

Avid S-O-M gamer Dick Hunt of Ovid, MI, is in ecstasy over the new football penalty system. Minor complaints, as mentioned in the September issue of the Review by the editors, or those of the game company, are

trifles, according to Hunt.

"So far, the biggest complaint I've seen in the Review about the penalty system is that it adds a lot of time to the game. I hope this doesn't discourage people, because in both of these complaints (one by S-O-M and one by the Review last month), the people doing the complaining seem to have kept pretty detailed stats," notes Hunt.

S-O-M, according to Hunt, reported that the penalty system added about 15 minutes to the playing time. "But it admitted it kept very extensive penalty stats," says Hunt. "So much for adding 15-plus minutes to each game.'

The Review's account of penalties in a Super Bowl replay also is dismissed by Hunt: "You told us how many declined penalties there were, how many penalty chart results ended up in no penalty being called, etc. Well, for someone who does use penalties, but doesn't bother keeping stats on every one, or close call, they add very little time to a game. At least this is true in my case."

Hunt keeps the following penalty statistics: number called on each team, yardage and penalty first downs.

"The penalty system has been just beautiful," Hunt enthuses. "Very

little time is used up and I still get my realism.

"If you play the game with penalties, but without penalty statistics, you will very probably play the game as quickly as ever. DF courthe new rules and timing systems take a while to get used to. But give Of course it a chance.

Florida Gold Coast finishes fourth complete hockey season

Baseball and football replays are frequently sent to the Review. In fact, the "in" basket is usually overflowing with such efforts.

But basketball and hookey, well, they're another matter. Full-season replays in either are like uncovering dinosaur eggs in one's backyard. That's true in most cases, excepting the Florida Gold Coast Hockey Association, which plays an 80-game schedule plus playoffs via the mail.

Organized by Bob Lopeck of Miami, FL, the FGCHA has completed four full seasons and is ready to embark on a fifth. It's a 16-team league that includes coaches from coast to coast in the United States and at least four that reside in Canada.

Lopeck, an organizational man par excellence (he organized the first FGCHA Invitational Cup series - July, 1982 Review), says that the most recent league season was anything but nirvana. The failure of two league members, including one who was a charter member, to turn in all their game sheets by deadline time, left Lopeck in a position of having to play 36 games (he completed the task within two weeks) so final statistics could be completed and the playoffs begun.

The 36 games in question (20 from one coach and 16 from the other) were all home contests, thus Lopeck came "rolling" to the rescue.

THE GOLD COAST LINEUP

Despite the departure of two league members, the FGCHA remains a model of stability when compared with most play-by-mail leagues. Ten of the coaches, for example, have been with the league since it was founded by Lopeck.

Other four-year members include John Helmbrecht, West Springfield, PA (Springfield Aces); Jerry Banko, Erie, PA (Erie Blades); Dave Lubera, Grosse Pointe, MI (Grosse Pointe Norsemen); Bob Dormer, Philadelphia, PA (Dacron Dumptrucks); Peter Stein, Flushing, NY (Albany Empires); Joe Nixon, Mount Vernon, NY (New York Nighthawks); Mark McLaughlin, East Weymouth, MA (East Weymouth Skatamoks); Cam Sebastian, St. Alberta, Canada (Saint Albert Barons), Gdry Trudell, Moosonee, Canada (Moosonee Mallards) and Carey Allen, Redford, MI (Thurston Eagles).

Other members are Neal Walters, Albert, Canada (Alberta Northern Lights); Dennis Martin, San Diego, CA (San Diego Gulls); John Van Note, Philadelphia, PA (Philadelphia Phantoms) and Steve Scott, San Diego (California Rangers).

One coaching change has taken place in that Marcel Letourneau, Tecumseh, Canada, took over for Trudell after the latter had to drop out because of starting a new business. Actually, Letourneau stepped in and guided the team the last 20 games last season.

Letourneau, thanks in part to a runnerup finish in the FGCHA's post-season playoffs, was featured in the July 19 issue of the Windsor Star. Trudell is Letourneau's uncle so it wasn't as if the franchise was moving out of the family for good. In fact Letourneau, in respect of his uncle's contributions and dedication to PBM hockey, continued to keep the team name as Moosonee.

RANGERS REAP PLAYOFF REWARDS

The FGCHA is broken into four four-team divisions, with the two top teams in each division qualifying for the playoffs, along with two wildcard teams. That means that 10 of the 16 teams earn berths in the playoffs.

Steve Scott's Rangers (California, not Texas Rangers) brought home their second straight championship as, after a slow start, California had a 34-10-16 down the stretch, including an 11-2-7 mark on the road.

Lopeck cites the acquisition (don't the Rangers always get their man?) of Mike Gartner (Stingers), Pete Peeters (Dumptrucks) and Reed Larson (Barons) as the key to turning the season around.

"This was a much stronger franchise than in 1980-81," says Lopeck.
"The Rangers were a surprise winner in last year's playoffs (finishing last in the division and 10th overall in the team point standings), but this year they finished first in the Coastal Division and second in the total team point standings."

In the Cloverleaf Cup championship series (the Cloverleaf Cup is the FGCHA's answer to the Stanley Cup, of course), the Rangers rallied to edge the Moosonee Mallards, with Letourneau doing the coaching, in a

seven-game thriller.

Pete Peeters, goalie for the victorious Rangers, and Kent Nilsson of the runnerup Mallards were chosen co-Most Valuable Players of the playoffs. Peeters had two shutouts and a sparkling 2.85 goals-per-game average, while Nilsson pumped in 24 goals, had two hat tricks and three game-winning goals in the playoffs.

After being blanked by Bob Sauve in the opener, 4-0, California tied the series at one game apiece when Mike Gartner scored two goals within 53 seconds to seal a 5-3 win. The third game went to the Mallards, however, as Bob Gainey scored the clincher with five minutes left en

route to a 3-2 triumph. Next time out, the Rangers had to go overtime before John Van Box-meer scored 2:22 into the extra session for a 5-4 victory. Van Boxmeer's goal occurred when he converted a 1-6 goal chance from outside.

Boxmeer drew a "4".

Reader critiques S-O-M Review

'Readers roll 'em' best part; tournaments, replays disliked

Although I enjoy the Review, there is much room for improvement. First of all, the trivia quizzes are rather dull. Instead of a trivia quiz, a better idea would be for someone to go through each card set, starting in 1960, and give an in-depth analysis of it. I'm sure this would be more interesting to a majority of your readers.

Steve Beren's Gold Cup Challenge is a good idea and I realize that he puts a great deal of work into it. However, two to three pages of it is too much. If only 70 gamers entered the competition, that means only 3.5% of the subscribers are participating. The other 96.5% are probably not interested in the results. Perhaps a shorter column dealing with some of the more exciting games in each round would be better suited for publication.

Playing tips should be carefully screened by the Review. What people fail to realize is that many of the playing tips are detracting from statistical realism of the games. The league and replay section is good, but I believe that a full season replay in any sport should be given more space than a play-by-mail draft league that has teams and results that few people can identify with.

Polls are useless by mail and should not be used by either the game company or the Review. I realize that they are the only ways of gamging gamers' opinions, but the Review has barely been able to get 10% faturn on its polls.

These polls have influence on the game company, I'm sure, but what about the people who play S-O-M but do not subscribe to the Review? The game company acts as though their opinions don't exist. However, these gamers probably make up a larger segment of the S-O-M population than subscribers of the Review.

The no-hitter column definitely should go. How about a column each month about a memorable game or one that had been won against impossible odds? A writeup and a box score could be printed.

I believe that both of you (editors) stay in the background too much. Why not use your column each month to give an opinion about the games; something you seldom do. Your constant praising of the game company makes it seem like you're on the payroll.

READERS ROLL 'EM BEST PART

Readers Roll 'Em is the best part of the Review. What is needed for the Review is for more people to express their opinions about the games or their experiences with them. Replays are fine, but I would prefer to read more about the human side of the S-O-M gamer.

A different guest columnist every month, for example, would be a

welcome addition to the Review.

Changes in the baseball game would be a mistake unless they were of a minor nature. The baseball game has built up a tradition over 21 years and this would be destroyed if the game was drastically changed. There is room for improvement in football, however, but the penalties are a welcome addition.

Despite my comments, I still think you do a good job. Please give consideration to my suggestions.

Editor's note: We're all for more input from readers and gamers, especially input with the human touch. And guest columns are welcome, too. But still, despite our pleas, the bulk of our mail is replays—many of them in the form of voluminous, statistically—filled yearbooks that may not be of interest to, well, to the bulk of our readers. As far as major changes in S-O-M games, the baseball will not be "tinkered" with, according to the folks at Glen Head, NY.

Surely, S-O-M players (and I have been one since '64) could relate to a season that had such greats as Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Al Simmons, Red Ruffing, Lefty Grove, Rogers Hornsby, Jolly Cholly Grimm, Hack Wilson (190 RBIs), Bill Terry, Carl Hubbell, Babe Herman, the Waners, Rabbit Maranville, Lefty O'Doul and Chuck Klein playing, and which had such an oddity as the Philadelphia Phillies which set an all-time record for the most hits by a single team in a season, 1,783, followed closely by the Giants with 1,769, and still managed to finish last in the National League.

Furthermore, there is some question as to the wisdom of printing old-time seasons which have so many of the same players playing. I personally would be hesitant to buy a '59 season on the heels of a '56 and a '61.

EAGLES WERE 'REAL' CHAMPS IN '80

One of the great features of Strat-O-Matic games is that it gives gamers a chance to replay any segment of the action and compare it to real-life happenings.

That's exactly what Phil Lee, a lab technician for the Clayton County Water Authority in Jonesboro, GA, and Terry Worley, an auditor with Presidential Financial Corporation in Atlanta, did with the 1980 (based on '80) football cards.

Their project, however, was not to replay the entire season, rather to do the playoffs, matching teams at random. Both are veteran gamers, having played close to 500 games of S-O-M.

Philadelphia was the 'real' champ, according to the Lee-Worley

Playoffs, as it met San Diego in the Super Bowl and claimed a 24-17 win as Leroy Harris scored three touchdowns and Wilbert Montgomery rushed for 118 yards in 13 carries and was MVP. Dan Fouts put the ball in the air 40 times for the Chargers but amassed only 158 aerial yards.

What happened to Dakland, real-life Super Bowl king? Well, Raiders were nipped by San Diego in the AFC championship game, 31-30, as Fouts passed for 253 yards and three touchdowns. Oakland led 20-10 late in the first half, but a John Jefferson 40-yard TD reception turned the

game around in San Diego's favor.

Kansas City shoots down Eagles

Largest face-to-face football league enters 13th season

The sounds emanating from the Terrace Inn, Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, were those of dice mixed with the staccato beat of a "tom-tom." The Kansas City Chiefs were on the warpath in the Canadian Strat-D-Matic Football League.

The CSFL, the largest face-to-face tabletop S-O-M Football league in existence, involving 28 coaches and teams, crowned a surprise champion at the conclusion of its 12th season when Steve Whitaker's Chiefs won the

Only 8-8 in real-life (based on the 1980 season), the Chiefs swept through the regular-season with a 14-2 record. And then, in the playoffs, Kansas City nipped Buffalo, 16-14, the New York Jets in the American Football Conference final, 26-24, and, finally, the Philadelphia Eagles in the 'Strat-O-Bowl,' 26-7.

Philadelphia, you will recall, lost to Oakland in the real-life But the Chiefs clobbered it on the table, rolling up 441 yards total offense, limiting the Eagles to 208, intercepting three passes and recovering a like number of fumbles. It was 17-0 late in the second period and Philadelphia never was to be in the game again.

CSFL ENTERS 13TH SEASON

Last season's results of the CSFL is just part of the success story of the Edmonton-based league that includes gamers from all walks of life. The real story, of course, is the league itself, which has been featured in numerous issues of the Review.

Allan Ropchan, the nightclub entertainer and self-avowed S-O-M fanatic, is still the commissioner of the CSFL, which he started in 1971. That was two years after Ropchan had been introduced to S-O-M by a sax player who was performing with him at the time in Vancouver.

It wasn't long after that that the CSFL quickly grew and soon no

franchises were available. Many of the gamers (coaches) traveled long distances every weekend to get in their games.

Ropchan once estimated that the average coach in the CSFL lasts about 3½ years. But a waiting list of coaches keeps the league at full

A publication--"Red Dog Review"--charts the progress of the CSFL every season and, after the last die has been cast and the Strat-O-Bowl is history, an awards banquet is held.

Paul Stoker, the league's statistician, was selected as "Coach of the Year," for instance, after taking the New York Jets (4-12 in real-life) from last to first place (11-5) in the AFC's East Division. Whitaker won the Strat-O-Bowl trophy, while Jon Dedek (Atlanta) had

the best offense, 547 points, and Gord Odegard (Philadelphia) was honored

for having the best defense, allowing a mere 214 points.

And what about Ropchan, organizer and senior citizen of the CSFL?

His Dallas Cowboys won 14 of 16 games in the regular-season...and then got bounced out of the playoffs in the first game by the Eagles, 24-9.

Gamer issues plea for 3-4 defense chart

BY DAVID DE LA FUENTE, Kent, Ohio

With the new football set, 17 teams employed the 3-4 defense last

year, more teams than in any other set previous.

Since I am primarily a solitaire gamer, I am slightly reluctant to use a 4-3 for any of these teams as is necessary for the solo chart. Has anyone devised a 3-4 solo defense? This is a public exclamation for help.

I have two ideas in my head as to how to go about it: (1) Have a chart, similar to the 4-3 now, which merely tells one how many men there are in each particular zone. There would have to be different charts for the weak and strong off-tackle zones, a linebuck chart which allowed for the possibility of only one man home, etc. It sounds simple, but is in reality extremely difficult to devise. I know - I spent hours on it before realizing that I could not do it on my own.

The second method considered: [2] A chart relative to each yardage situation concentrating on the rover himself. Example - First and 10, roving linebacker is positioned here on dice roll - vacated tackle - 2-7. Weaker end-run blitz zone 8 (weaker as in reference to defensive end's numerical rating. If ends are same numerically, their rover plays opposite tight end to counteract blocking). Weakest flat/look-in zone 9. Median flat zone 10. Strongest flat zone 12. Blitz zone 11 (how to determine?). As you can see, there are countless kinks to be worked out of such a system. A system such as (2) would probably require two dice rolls before each play, extending a game to unknown limits of time.

before each play, extending a game to unknown limits of time.

I am asking for help because it seems to me that a 3-4 selo defense would be more realistic than having to use a 4-3, providing it was realistic. I hope that this is a point Strat-O-Matic is considering in the game changes - the defenses are relatively inflexible.

A person cannot play a working 5-2, have seven defensive backs, or blitz nine men, having two back for the pass. These are not common, but a game should encompass these factors if it can call itself realistic. These tactics are used occasionally.

More factors? How about the zone stunts, play-action, option passes, fake kicks, reverses, true draws, field position, realistic blocked

kicks, fumble returns and so on?

As it is now, the Strat-O-Matic Football game encompasses a working, realistic world, but that world could seemingly be changed and expanded to contain even more. I am in favor of any new changes that are workable, so long as time and playability are not sacrificed.

Editor's note: Gamer De La Fuente raises a good question regarding a solo defensive chart for using the 3-4 alignment. He's issued a call for help - are there any innovative gamers who are listening (reading)?


