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Pass defenses are porous in new football cards

The 'Earl of Campbell' looks super

The following analysis was prepared by Warren Newell, co-aditor of the Review and a member of a face-to-face football league that operates out of Otsego, MI, home of the Review.

Warren, however, isn't a student of the cards like Robert Henry is in baseball. He scrutinizes the football cards searching for talent that would benefit him in the draft grid league. Defensive and specialist cards are also drafted, so Warren gave them all more than a cursory check. It only took a glance to determine that Earl Campbell, the NFL's top rusher as a rookie, had a super card. His card, as might be expected, is liberally sprinkled with "short gain" and, on guessed wrong on end run he breaks an 81-yarder on No. 2 and a "long gain" on No. 12. Guessed right he sometimes can't even be slowed. A "short gain" results on No. 6 even when called correctly.

Even when keyed, the Earl of Campbell has opportunities to gain yardage. Dutside of fumbling, worst fate that could befall Campbell would be No. 11, end run, keyed, when he's dropped for a four-yard loss.

Walter Payton of Chicago also has another good card. When he turns

the defense is in big trouble--he has "shor gain" on Nos. 6, 7, 8 guessed wrong. Also, regarding running backs, a couple of "sleepers" in any draft could be the Kansas City Chief tandem of Tony Reed and Ted McKnight. Reed has a solid all-around card, punctuated by a 19-yard pickup via an end run, No. 6, guessed wrong. McKnight, meanwhile, only carried 104 times, but wow! He's got 19 and 17-yard gains off-tackle and 16 and 29-yarders around the end on Nos. 7 and 8, respectively.

MANNING'S MAGNIFICENT

Archie Manning, who had his best year as a pro, is a devastating short passer. With only a minuscule chance to be intercepted, his card, guessed wrong, is sprinkled with good-yardage gains, including a 15-yarder on No. 7. In the Otsego League, it should be mentioned, Jim Myers has both Manning and Payton--the best of both worlds--on his team. Coaches are allowed to protect three players from last year's team. Myers is likely to protect those two.

Greg Pruitt of Cleveland is another with a good running card--but in his situation fumbles will be costly since the Browns, as a team, coughed

up the ball to the enemy a whopping 29 times.

Terry Bradshaw, although likely to be plagued by interceptions, can

throw long, and accurately. He also has a +14 on No. 7, short pass, either right or wrong, and that's a definite plus. Warren has three quarterbacks returning--Bradshaw, Jim Zorn and Gary Danielson--and says he will be keeping Bradshaw [come on 71] and dropped the other two.

Among the receivers, Wesley Walker's card for the New York Jets shouldn't go unnoticed. Walker averaged 24.4 per reception, has a card that the printer went amok with the "long gain" stamp and even has a "long gain" on No. 7, long pass, guessed right.

PASS DEFENSES POROUS

Many of the short pass defensive cards will be taken advantage of by on-target passers. "I've never seen so many gains on No. 6, both with three and four-man in zone," notes Warren. "Usually just a couple of teams have a gain at that number. Sut not this year."

Also there are many teams that will be plagued with a "long gain" on No. 4, short pass, three men in zone. Miami has the best defensive cards for interceptions with a 2-10 chance on a short pass, No. 9, 4-men in zone, and a straight 7 on long pass with 1-man home. The worst, ironically, is Atlanta (short pass: 4-men, No. 9, only 2-4, 12), although the Falcons are among the best at recovering fumbles.

Atlanta's recovery rate on a No. 5 roll is 2-11. The Browns are the worst at giving up the ball with fumble chances on No. 5 (2-5, 12) and No. 10 complete. Neither the Chicago Bears or N.Y. Jets have fumbles on their offensive cards.

HOW THE MIGHTY HAVE FALLEN

Remember the old "Purple People Eaters," the "Purple Gang," otherwise known as the Minnesota front four? Alan Page is now with Chicago, where he's a "4" at tackle, end Carl Eller has been demoted to sub status with the Vikes and is a "0" and Jim Marshall is also a "0". Tack on "Os" for Wally Hilgenberg, Nate Allen and Paul Krause and one can easily see how far the once-mighty Viking defense has diminished.

The 49ers have three "Os" in their defensive secondary while, conversely, Denver's linebacking trio is straight 6s. Los Angeles has four 9s on the offensive line, two 6s in the secondary and two 5s also in the defensive backfield.

The Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers have six 6s on defense and only two 4s, while on offense there are two 3s. Tight end Randy Grossman is only a 1, however, as is right tackle Ray Pinney, so the Steeler rushing attack may not be so potent to that side.

And, glancing at the specialty teams, Washington, Philadelphia, Buffalo and L.A. have "long gain" on punt returns and Seattle, Baltimore, New England, L.A. and St. Louis the same on kickoff returns.

Goalie to play more significant role

Hockey cards undergo revision

Look for a great game to be even greater this fall. Strat-O-Matic Hockey, a big hit in its first year, promises to be even better in 1979.
"The goalie will be much more involved in the action now," enthused Harold Richman, creator of the S-O-M games, in a recent phone conversation with Review co-editor Del Newell. "Last year when the goalie's ca was checked the result was more often than not routine. A score was a "Last year when the goalie's card shock. But not now. The best goalie can be beaten maybe six out of 20 times and the worst 15 out of 20. Seventy-five percent of the scoring will come off the goalie's card. When the goalie's card comes up, it will be very exciting."

S-O-M spent a lot of time testing the changes, however, and as a result the new hockey cards will not be available until Oct, 1, rather

than Sept. 1 as first thought.

"The first game was a tremendous success and very exciting," continued Aichman. "But we felt the goalie--because he is so important in the real game--should be brought into our game more."

The goalie's card obviously will not be consulted as often as in the past (routine shots will be consulted to consult the consulted as often as in the past (routine shots will be consulted to consulted the consulted that the consulted the con handled via the shooter's card), but those tough chances will bring the goalie's rating, and ability, directly into the action.

S-O-M plans another change to cut down on the number of goals scored by good percentage shooters, who otherwise don't score that frequently. Many gamers were utilizing the good percentage shooters (which was smart strategy) in "any shooter" situations. The result, however, was that statistics were oftentimes distorted. Top goal scorers were frequently passed over, because their percentages were not as high, in lieu of more accurate shooters.

The change consists of an offensive player possessing a certain offensive rating before being allowed to take the shot in "any shooter" "Any shooter 3 or more" might be a common reading, for insituations.

Remember, the hockey game and the new cards will be available Oct. 1. A new game will not be necessary to incorporate the changes in the ice version of S-D-M's newest creation; game boards will remain the same. Any other changes, for which results are not obtainable from player cards, will, as in the past, have S-O-M supplying the needed additional materials.

The league plays the advanced version and uses the super-advanced penalty chart. Every situation of the game is covered with either a chart, or with additional instructions.

LINE CHANGES

This section indicates to the other coach which action card within a period that you want to make a line change. The FGCHA, however, does use a third forward line change and a second defensive line change.



PLAY SELECTORS

Depending on the score and what period it is, each choice of the road coach is covered: O (Offense), DF (Defensive Forecheckers), I (Intimidation), P (Penetration). Offense and Defensive Forecheckers ratings are self-explanatory. Intimidation rating given denotes that, for that particular situation, if an intimidation situation came up, a player with that number given or higher would intimidate, and any intimidation rating which was less would allow the offensive player to take the shot.

Again, the penetration rating given for any situation would denote to the coach playing the game which players the visiting coach wants to penetrate. For example, if a 3 rating was given, that would mean that the player would penetrate if his rating was 3 or 4 and anything less he would either pass or take the outside shot (as per instructions). If a 1 was listed, that would mean all players would penetrate (unless contrary to the instructions). A 2 would mean that a 2, 3, or 4 would penetrate and a 1 would not. A 4 would mean only a player with such a rating would penetrate, everyone else would not. A 0 (or an x) would mean that the visiting coach wishes not to penetrate in that situation.

Upset trend in hockey replays shattered

We're fully aware that the split cards and dice don't have memories and that partisan gamers can't influence the outcome of a game, or a re-

play. Nevertheless it seems that many gamers in their solitaire endeavors do have favorites, and perhaps in many cases root for the underdog.

For example, most of the hockey replays, no matter how brief, have another team than the supposedly invincible Montreal Canadiens winning it all. S-O-M didn't create the Canadiens—it just affixed their real-life statistics onto cards.

A full-season, 80-game replay by Tom Connolly, Lynn, MA, broke the trend of upsets, however, as the Canadiens were as awesome on the tabletop as on real-life ice. Montreal mauled opponents for 449 goals en route to winning 63 games, losing eight and tying nine. The Habs were habitual winners from the outset, going 17 games without a loss until Vancouver surprised them 5-3.

Later Montreal won 17 straight and down the stretch went unbeaten in its final 20 games, winning 16 and tying four. The Canadiens performed like the invinible wingerpray all bookey face have gone to know love.

like the invincible juggernaut all hockey fans have come to know, love, sometimes hate, so well.

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Lynn reports that he played the full season using the basic game and that "his team" (at least geographically), the Boston Bruins, were beaten five times, including 7-1 in the last meeting. Buffalo, it turns out, was the lone team to beat Montreal twice--4-1, 4-3--while Vancouver suffered the worst thrashing, a 12-1 debacle, perhaps repayment for the earlier loss inflicted by the Canucks.
Guy Lafleur, as expected, led the Montreal assault, producing 202

points off 81 goals and 121 assists. He had 29 of the team's 144 power play goals. Jacques Lemaire had 190 points, 151 via assists, and Steve Shutt 159, including a whopping 95 goals. Shutt was on the payoff end of 49 power play goals.

In the nets, Ken Oryden played in 53 games (record: 43-3-7), had three shutouts and a 2.36 goals-against average.

Now that's more like it. Right, Montreal fans?

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AWA Football League completes 8th season

The good news in the AWA Football League was that Neil Christie's defending champions and much hated Cincinnati Bengals did not win the

The bad news is that Christie's Miami Dolphins did. Cincinnati's domination--some of the other coaches call it luck--was over, but Christie's good fortune continued.

Miami, as it turned out, defeated Houston in Super Bowl VIII, 10-3, in the eight-coach (each coach guides two or three teams), actual team, face-to-face league that calls Santa Clara, CA, its home base.

"Neil is no more talented than the rest of us as coaches," says Mike Applegate, without a trace of envy or bitterness. "But like the Yankees

in baseball and Montreal in hockey, something happens when the playoffs begin and...Neil suddenly becomes the team to beat."

Applegate, who continued to coach his beloved Kansas City Chiefs

(once a power in the AWA), points out that the most recent 15-game replay was marked by more defense. "Scores were lower and yardage came tougher

All were league records. The MVP, however, was Bob Griese of Miami, who completed 62.3 percent of his passes for 2,623 yards and 20 scores and had only five passes picked off.

The coaching lineup in the AWA (all members are in their mid to late 20s) consisted of: Mike Applegate (Kansas City, N.Y. Giants, San Francisco), Jeff Applegate (Cleveland, N.Y. Jets, St. Louis), Steve Barrett (Dallas, Denver, Suffalo), Neil Christie (Cincinnati, Miami, Seattle), Dave Jackson (Chicago, Houston), John Koeplin (Atlanta, Dakland, New Orleans), Ken Morse (Detroit, Pittsburgh, San Diego), and Mike Simonds (Los Angeles, New England, Tampa Bay). The league was responsible for Washington and Philadelphia.

DAKLAND FEATURES SOLID GROUND GAME

The AWA has its own conference and division alignment and again, as is customary, most of the battles for playoff berths were brutal. Here

are some of the highlights of those 'battles':

Oakland, despite an off-year from Ken Stabler (13 TDs, 33 interceptions), coasted in with a 12-2-1 mark in the Snodgrass Division (see final standings on next page]. Mark van Eeghen (1,168 yards) and Clarence standings on next page J. Mark van Eeghen [1,160 yards] and Clarence Davis (1,029) offset Stabler's off-target passing with their rushing... Cleveland surprised by winning its first six games as Greg ("Snake-Eyes") Pruitt rolled up 1,414 yards (5.5), but then collapsed down the stretch... New England had a sluggish offense (Steve Grogan stats: 48.7 percent, 9 TDs, 27 thefts) which dragged the defense down...Seattle provided some thrills, and hope for the future, as Sherman Smith gained 966 yards [5.2] and Steve Largent latched onto 41 catches, averaging 24.9 per reception... Buffalo had the league's worst defense, but Joe Ferguson's passing (241-488, 3,086 yards, 26 TDs, 30 interceptions) kept it in most games.

In the Duck Division, perennial power Cincinnati had a 6-2 record

early then went into a slump and wound up going into the finale at 8-6-same record as surging Houston. Houston won the showdown, 31-7, with Dan Pastorini continuing to spark the Oilers and, conversely, Ken Anderson (48.0 percent, 18 interceptions) struggling at the controls with Cincy... Washington was another disappointment in the Duck Division, as an inept

offense betrayed a strong defense.

Biggest surprise was found in the Black 'N Blue Division, as the (continued on next page)

traditionally sad-sack New York Giants walked tall to a 12-3 record and possessed the league's stinglest defense [232.9 yards per game]. Giants won eight in row to prove they were for real, including topping Dallas twice [28-27, 24-21] and Pittsburgh once [24-7]...Dallas, except for its lapses against the Giants, was a juggernaut, producing 358.1 yards per game, and featuring the running of Tony Dorsett [1,099] and passing of Roger Staubach. L. Fumbles killed Minnesota as the passing attack was formidable with three receivers catching more than 50 passes...Detroit had no offense while Tampa Bay, although 3-12, blasted Buffalo in the season's finale, 48-7, taking advantage of three blocked punts and six interceptions.

STEELERS STRUGGLE

Pittsburgh won five of its last six games, including a 23-9 showdown win over the Payton-led Bears, to win the Granada Division in the other [Citadel] conference...Philadelphia was in contention, too, as Ron ["Jaws"] Jaworski fired 27 TD passes...St. Louis, out of contention early, was nonetheless a foe to be reckoned with as evidenced by splitting a pair of games with Pittsburgh, losing 59-14 as Bradshaw threw seven TD passes, and then the Cards rocking the Steelers, 37-14, leading 37-0 at one point.

Miami won its last 10 games to claim honors in the Mongo Division, as the ground game produced 188 yards per and Griese provided balance with his passing...Denver had a devastating defense, efficient offense, but lost the key games and wound up 10-5...Delvin Williams (1,229) and Jim Plunkett (55.9 percent) were bright spots for the 49ers while the Jets were lackluster except for wide receiver Wesley Walker (47 catches).

Baltimore got great seasons from Lydell Mitchell (1,500 yards rushing; 69 catches) and Bert Jones, survived the humiliation of losing to San Diego (89-21) and Cincinnati (39-19), and clinched the Apple Division title with a 20-17 win over second place Los Angeles...Lawrence McCutcheon blasted to 1,261 yards for L.A...Atlanta, however, was, because of its defense, the team no one liked to play, surrendering only 191 points... San Diego was 6-1 with Dan Fouts at the controls but when he couldn't play the Chargers lost their zip and were 1-7.

HOUSTON, MIAMI CLASH

Houston, perhaps ahead of itself in going through its developmental stages, and Miami, perhaps reliving the glory days of the early 1970s, collided in the AWA's eighth Super Bowl.

The Dilers got there by blanking the Giants, 23-0, and then edging Dallas in the conference title game, 28-21, as Rob Carpenter raced 38 and 60 yards for TDs and Billy Johnson went 87 yards with a punt. Dallas, after trailing early 10-0, roared back to knock out Dakland, 34-24, in the other game.

Meanwhile, Miami rushed past L.A., 24-7, as Benny Malone gained 146 yards in 23 carries, and then crunched Pittsburgh, 31-17, as Malone shook loose for 143 in 24 attempts. Jack Ham's 98-yard return of an intercepted pass had given Pittsburgh an early 10-0 advantage. Pittsburgh's defense dominated Baltimore in the other game to the tune of 26-13.

In the Super Bowl, Miami struck first—and for the only TD—when Nat Moore caught a seven-yard pass from Griese. Defenses dominated thereafter as Garo Yepremian kicked a thard quarter field goal for Miami and Toni Fritsch a 42-yarder in the final period for Houston.

Houston made a desperate attempt to salvage a tie when it tried an on-side kick. It failed. But the Oilers had another shot when Miami fumbled. The Oilers got to the Dolphin 42 and, with 45 seconds remaining and no timeouts left, three long passes went astray. Houston coach Dave Jackson had contemplated sending Carpenter off-tackle the last play as a surprise ploy, but disdained the manuever for the "bomb." The dice roll was a 5-2-an incomplete pass...but a long gain if Carpenter had been toting the ball!

Moore was the game's MVP, catching seven passes for 101 yards, three of the receptions despite being double-teamed. Griese completed 19 of 30 (continued on next page)

One card correction needed

Questions and Answers

Editor's note: Questions regarding individual and team ratings will not be answered in most cases, unless a mistake has been made. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, divulge its card-making formula, which would be necessary in some instances in order to answer such questions completely. If your question regarding ratings does not appear in the Review within four months after being submitted, you may assume the rating is correct.

QUESTION: On page four of the hockey instruction booklet under "Pulling the Goalie," it is declared that he can be pulled only when there are two or less action cards remaining in the game. But earlier in the same column, the instructions state that in a delayed penalty situation it is good strategy to pull the goalie should the penalty be against the opponent while you have control of the puck. Is there a contradiction in the instructions?

ANSWER: No. The goalie can be pulled in both instances. However, an empty-net goal cannot be scored in a delayed penalty situation because as soon as the penalized team gains control of the puck play is stopped and the penalty begins.

QUESTION: In a delayed penalty situation, should the offense use the power play section of the advance action deck (assuming the goalie has been pulled for an extra skater while the penalty is against the opponent)?

ANSWER: No. The situation you refer to is when the goalie is pulled at the end of the game.

QUESTION: In the hockey game, what happens when you roll outside a skate rating? Does the player with the outside shot have an option to pass or penetrate?

ANSWER: The skater loses the puck to his opponent. And, yes, providing it does not say "Outside shot only."

ANSWER: S-O-M is taking steps to rectify this situation in the new hockey cards. The game company suggest, however, that an approach be adopted whereby the number of "any player shots" per power play be limited to two. Otherwise statistics could be distorted.

I also would like to see teams rated for penalties. Players should have either injury ratings or injury duration ratings. Also, running backs should be rated for blocking.


