Pittsburgh appears solid as steel

Pssst! If you have a chance to draft the Pittsburgh Steelers in a S-O-M Football league, by all means do it. You would certainly be in solid shape with the Steelmen.

The two-time real-life NFL champs have it all again, offense and defense as well as outstanding individuals--all of which is mirrored in the newest set of S-O-M football cards.

True, the likes of Earl Campbell, rookie Ottis Anderson, Walter Payton, Tony Dorsett and Chuck Muncie have outstanding running cards, and Roger Staubach, Dan Fouts and Ken Anderson have superlative passing cards, but Pittsburgh has the best overall balance.

Terry Bradshaw, while perhaps not having the best quarterback card in the new set, had one that has to rate an "8" on a scale of 10. Bradshaw is one of three quarterbacks—the others are Fouts and Ken Stabler—

shaw is one of three quarterbacks—the others are Fouts and Ken Stabler—to have a completion on both right and wrong columns on No. 7 for short pass. Bradshaw, in fact, has completions on Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 9 called wrong, plus, of course, a "receiver" reading on No. 8. He can also bomb 'em, having completions on long pass on Nos. 5, 7 and 9, guessed wrong. Pittsburgh has much more than Bradshaw, though, as Review co-editor Warren Newell found out when dissecting the cards. John Stallworth, with a card liberally "mined" with long gains, and Lynn Swann are the best pass-catching duo in the NFL, and in Franco Harris, Rocky Bleier and unheralded Sidney Thornton there's a one-two-three punch in the backfield. The defense, with six 6s, is again strong. Against off-tackle plays the defense, on a roll of No. 3 with one man at home, throws runners for a

TYLER'S BIG BREAKAWAY THREAT

Los Angeles, Pittsburgh's opponent in last year's Super Bowl, has a game-breaker in halfback Wendell Tyler (long gains on off-tackle and end run, guessed right and wrong, plus 60 and 63-yard gallops on the same types of run guessed wrong on No. 12). The L.A. passing game is sub-par, however, with the bulk of Pat Haden's pass completions of the flat pass variety, while Vince Ferragamo displays a definite tendency toward throwing the ball to opposing backs.

The Rams do have a pair of 6s at cornerback, though,

and Rod Perry, and an overall defense with five 6s and four 5s.

Even though Fouts completes over 60 percent of his passes, Warren ranks Staubach's card as the best overall. "Very few interceptions," notes Warren. Dorsett again has an outstanding card, but the defense,

against both run and pass, is not up to Dallas standards.

Anderson (Ottis), to the surprise of no one, has a super card. anderson (ottis), to the surprise of no the has a super tard. He says short gain right across on No. 6, right as well as wrong. Sleeper among the running backs, if you're in a draft league and looking for an unsung performer, is Clark Gaines, fullback of the New York Jets. Gaines has, guessed wrong on an end run, short gain, +19, and +18 on numbers 6, Gaines

The Jets, notes Warren, are an "explosive, exciting team. Gaines is super on all runs, Richard Todd is fine on short and long passes except for interceptions, while the defense is unusual in that it has, on No. 4, a reading of 0 on No. 4 on end run."

49ERS HAVE OFFENSIVE PUNCH

Another team that seems to have plenty of card power, at least on offense, is San Francisco. "Quarterback Steve DeBerg has a surprisingly good card," says Warren. And Paul Hofer (only 123 attempts) is a tough runner. But O.J. Simpson is only a shadow of his former great self.

San Diego is another that drew rave reviews for its cards. Fouts threw 530 passes and completed 62.6--albeit a lot of short ones--percent. Also on the plus side, the runners don't fumble on their cards. And the Chargers have a pair of super-charged cornerbacks in Willie Buchanon and Mike Williams, both of whom are a 6.

New Orleans should also be a fun team to play because of Muncie, who New Urleans should also be a run team to play because of Muncie, who has short gain on No. 7 on all but linebuck guessed right. And Archie Manning, continuing a run of recent good cards, has another that ranks him with the best. He also has a pair of receivers—Henry Childs and Wes Chandler—in the same class as Dallas' dynamic duo of Tony Hill and Drew

WHERE HAVE ALL THE RETURNERS GONE?

"There is no real return threat this year," adds Warren, reflecting on that aspect of the new cards. "No one has better than a No. 2 TO return chance." Green Bay is all but sub-nothing in punt returns as Johnnie Gray, its only return man, has only one number (2) that he can even gain off from. Everything else is either a fair catch, fumble or yardage loss.

Here are other interesting sidelights gleaned from the newest S-O-M

Football cards:

The once-mighty Minnesota defense has fallen on hard times. The defensive backfield, horrors!, has three 0's. And Ted Brown has supplanted Chuck Foreman as the Vikes' best runner.

* The Detroit Lions, New England, Houston, Chicago and Los Angeles all

e the same pass rush cards when it comes to No. 5 on short and long pass (-9) and No. 11 long pass (-9).

* Dakland utilizes two tight ends in Ray Chester and Dave Casper (Casper is listed as a starter as left end) and both are 3s blocking.

Stabler has a good card for flat and short passes, but Art Whittington, running back, has an unbelievably bad card as linebuck Nos. 6, 7 and 8, both guessed right and wrong, all read -1.

* New England has a super defensive backfield as Tim Fox, Mike Haynes and Raymond Clayborn are all 6s. Wide receivers Stanley Morgan (22.5 average) and Harold Jackson (22.8) have cards reflecting big-play performances -- in fact, their cards are almost identical.

* Tampa Bay is tough on defense, especially against the short pass and Rickey Bell is a good runner, but quarterback Doug Williams is an all-or-nothing thrower with an especially bad flat pass card. be tough to win with the Bucs.

* Earl Campbell has another great card for Houston, of course, and * tarl tampoell has another great card for Houston, of course, and
Oiler runners don't have fumbles on their cards. On short pass there's
an unusual reading in that on a roll of 12 there's an interception with
four men in the zone but a long gain if only three.

* Greg Landry has a good flat and short pass card, although 135 of

the catches were turned in by backs Don McCauley and Joe Washington.

* Check out Washington's specialty teams on defense -- both are either

the best or among the best.

* On the other side of the line of scrimmage, Atlant'a short pass defense has to be the poorest. The Falcons get shot down on Nos. 5 and 6, with either three or four men in zone, for pickups of 14 and 16 yards, respectively.

Islanders win full-season replay

The New York Islanders arrived a year early for Larry Scotti, a 17-year-old S-0-M buff from Staten Island, NY. Scotti, in a monumental effort, played an 840-game regular-season and full playoffs using the most recent set of hockey cards.

And the Islanders, who, although figured to do better, were eliminated early in the playoffs, this time swept through them, subduing Montreal in a tough seven-game Stanley Cup final. The table-top Islanders were

vastly superior to the real-life version.

Scotti, for his part, set up four line shifts to make his replay more realistic, adhered to real-life playing time in almost all cases, and used all super advanced rules. For the Stanley Cup, because of its significance, he even purchased and used new action and split deck cards. Fellow gamer Phil Stern helped Scotti on occasion, but mostly the

Fellow gamer Phil Stern helped Scotti on occasion, but mostly the replay, which took from Oct. 13 to May 2 to complete, was Scotti's pride and joy and a solitaire effort. The yearbook that Scotti compiled had to be another monumental task as not only did it include the basics of any replay--standings, scoring leaders and playoff results--but a team-byteam statistical report, replete with both regular-season and playoff results.

Scotti, who's currently in two PBM baseball leagues and commissioner of a PBM hockey loop, reported that 39 hat tricks were tallied and five times four-goal games were etched into his record book--by Don Marcotte, Boston; Mike Bossy, Islanders; Eric Vail, Atlanta; Wayne Gretzky, Edmonton; and Gil Perreault, Buffalo.

'EXCELLENT ALL SEASON' -- ISLANDERS

Scotti also appraised the season-long performance of each club and rated the Islanders, who won Patrick Division with a glittering 52-16-12 record, as "excellent all season." Of Boston, which narrowly edged Buffalo for first-place in the Adams Division, Scotti said: "Stumbled through first 40 games, then opened attack up. Excellent goaltending." Edmonton was called a "very exciting team. Dave Dryden (was) brilliant in nets [and] team had excellent soorer in Gretzky, but rest of team was inconsistent."

Montreal had a 27-game unbeaten streak during regular-season, while Mark Howe, son of the legendary Gordie, carried Hartford. In the all-star game, the Campbell Division was soundly beaten by the Wales, 5-1.

In the Stanley Cup playoff, Montreal won three of the first four games, only to have the Islanders capture the last three for a 4-3 series triumph. Montreal won the opener, 3-1, dropped the second game in overtime, 3-2, won the third, 6-1, and the fourth, 3-2. But then it was New York's turn as the Islanders captured No. 5, 4-3, in overtime, No. 6 by a decisive 6-2 count, and the all-or-nothing seventh game, 3-1. Clark Gillies of the Islanders was the series MVP.

It's a good thing the 80th Street Strat-O-Matic Hockey bers didn't, well, live on another street in Howard Beach, NY. did, the league, especially if the majority of its membership lived on 144th Street, would still be going on.

The 80th Street League, however, played an 80-game season and, despite numerous delays, did complete its second season plus playoffs. And Stephen Buonocore, obdest member of the league at 19 and coach of the Montreal Canadians, once again was crowned Stanley Cup king.

Other members of the face-to-face, five-member league were Greg Buonocore, president of the "street gang" and coach of the New York Rangers; Harry Buonocore, who guided the New York Islanders to first place during the regular season; Peter Fazio, who handled the Boston Bruins, and Ralph Facciolo, pilot of the Philadelphia Flyers. Whether the Buonocores are brothers was not revealed.

Problems were plentiful for the league, however, as vacations, final exams at school (resulting in a two-week hiatus from hockey, table-top style) and, finally, a siege of Chicken Pox cut through the ranks and sidelined three gamers:

Eventually, however, the 80th Street League reached the 80-game mark and the playoffs followed. The Ishanders, real-life disappointments, emulated the replay above in S-O-M by winning the regular-season title [46-20-14 record], finishing nine points ahead of runnerup Montreal. But Montreal followed the real-life script in the playoffs by first bouncing third-place Boston, 4 games to 1, then turned on the Islanders and

captured the Stanley Cup in six games. Guy Lafleur of the Canadians was the playoff MVP, scoring 16 goals and assisting on 10 others in the 11 $\,$

The 80th Street League, in addition to its perseverance, has an The 80th Street League, in addition to its perseverance, has an interesting method of maintaining interest and giving gamers incentive: coaches have to pay 15¢ for each loss and 10¢ for each tie. The payoff at the end of the season is the splitting up of that money. A total of \$37.25 was collected and the payoff was \$20 for first, \$10 for second, \$4.25 for third, \$2 for fourth and a "token" \$1 for fifth.

Recently I decided the best alternative to replaying a 162-game schedule is to pick up the actual season in progress at a given point in time. For example, I have decided to replay the 1979 season beginning on Aug. 17, 1979. I obtained copies of Sporting News and listed the statistics for all players having S-O-M cards, as well as the teams' won-lost records at that date.

I am following the actual schedule using the actual start-ing pitchers wherever possible. In some instances I have created additional players where necessary to maintain a full roster of 24 players. For example, Ken Griffey of the Reds was replaced by Manny Sarmiento on the roster because Griffey was injured from Aug. to September.

I would like to hear from other gamers as to their methods of replaying seasons.

Here's how to prepare PBM instruction sheet

We are frequently asked for more information pertaining to play-bymail leagues, how they operate, and for samples of what an instruction sheet for a team should look like.

So, this month we're presenting a couple of PBM team instruction sheets for your perusal. They're from the Any Game Draft League, an eight-team draft league divided into two divisions and now in its fourth 140-game season. Each team plays 10 series of seven games at home and away. And players cannot be utilized more than in real-life as far as at-bats and innings pitched.

Rick Derks and Ron Quick, who reside in Jefferson City, MO, and Des Moines, IA, respectively, organized the league in 1977. The name of the league comes from the fact that members can use any table-top game (six play S-O-M, one another game on the market and another a game of his own

Other current members of the league include: Ed Daniels (Des Moines), Wayne Benton (Fayetteville, NC), Bill Stotts (Anchorage, Alaska), Larry Kocur (Seattle, WA), Gary Lyndaker (Havois Mills, MO) and Shelly Bustow (Hartford, CT).

Now for those instruction sheets that may serve as a helpful guide in your gaming endeavors. The two presented are for Wayne Benton's Fayetteville Highlanders and Gary Lyndaker's Proctor Pioneers. far from the final word, but they give an idea as to the types of strategy, lineups and substitutions that can be made.

'54 Indians, '61 Yanks split replays

Jeffrey Wood, a CPA who resides in Mechanicsville, MD, conducted a pair of interesting baseball replays to see if the credits (wins) and debits (losses) compared if the same teams were used in both replays.

debits (losses) compared if the same teams were used in other replays.

What Jeff did was to take mostly World Series winners, plus the hard-hitting Detroit Tigers of '61 and one cannon fodder team, the '70 Montreal Expos, and play a pair of 162-game seasons.

The other teams were the '61 Yankees, featuring the M & M Boys, Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle; the pitching-rich Cleveland Indians of '54; '65 Los Angeles Dodgers and the '70 Baltimore Orioles.

As expected, Montreal had far more debits than credits, losing 122 games the first season, 111 the second and finishing last both times. Los Angeles wound up fifth both times while Baltimore, after coming on strong down the stretch and missing by two games to tie for the lead the first season, dropped to fourth the second time around and finished with 22

At the top, meanwhile, it was the '54 Indians, who won the first season with a 100-62 record. The Tribe had an 8½-game lead after 110 games but later had to hold off the high-flyin' Birds. Cleveland won three of four games in a late-season showdown series with Baltimore. The Orioles, during one stretch, won 33 of 42 games.

The BIG INNING—team erupts for 18 runs!

Even the most mundame games in Strat-O-Matic oftentimes turn into a momentous happening. Many gamers have experienced the thrill of a no-hitter--but many never realized what was happening until the late innings. In fact, many times such games in their early stages are looked upon as ho-hum low-hit contest.

And in football and hockey plus basketball, dramatic finishes and



stellar individual performances often take place in games that star ted in a routine manner.

One such happening occurred in a baseball game played in the Atlantic Draft Assoc-

draft league using the 1979 season cards. The game matched the West Texas Warriors (managed by Ben Francis, San Angelo, TX) and the Abilene Wind (managed by Carl Kieke, Abilene, TX).

It wasn't a no-hitter. Nor did a slugger belt four home runs. It was the BIG INNING! that made this game so different than any played previously in the ADA, a two-year-old league that has John Coggan, Gray, ME. as commissioner.

Baseball playing tips

If you're tired of trying to keep up with preventing pitchers from being overused or underused--in other words, giving them an accurate

amount of rest--you may want to give the following playing tip a try.
Submitted by David Stewart, Roby, TX, the rest playing tip has been used successfully for over three years. Here's how it works:

For Starters - Multiply innings pitched in last outing by 4. That's rest before that starter can pitch again. the amount of

For Starters with asterisk by name and all relievers - Multiply

innings pitched by 3. Fractions of an inning are counted as a full inning if 2/3 and no

inning if 1/3. Example: Frank Pastore pitches 7 innings. Multiply 7 x 4. Pastore has to rest 28 innings before he could hurl again. Tom Seaver, using another example, pitches 7 innings also. But he would need only 21 Tom Seaver, innings of rest because of the asterisk $(7 \times 3 = 21)$.

PICKOFF PLAYS

Here's a potpourri of pickoff plays for your perusal. Our biggest objections to such playing tips is that a pitcher's pickoff move is not considered--and there are no statistics to rate pickoff moves, anyway. But many gamers clamor for pickoff plays. HIT AND RUN, RUN, RUN...

Ron Patalena has a playing tip that should spice up your hit-and-run situations. Statistical accuracy may be affected, but probably not that much. Straight hits are down slightly, as far as chances, from the regular S-O-M hit-and-run chart, but the possibilities are there for more hits because of the "PITCH HIT" rolls.

For instance, an A hit-and-run rated batter, according to Patalena's chart, has six hit chances (out of 36 possibilities) compared to eight on S-O-M's chart. But there are 11 PITCH HII chances, any of which can result in base hits. Here's how the chart works:

Intended to make the better passing teams more effective, the tip has you total the points (assist rating on advanced side of card) for the lineup on the floor. Kevin Porter is a "17," for example; Adrian Dantley a "4."

The points are totaled (most NBA clubs are around 28-29 with a tall lineup) and then when a "9" is rolled on the defense card, playing the basic game, the chart below is checked and adjustment made regarding successful field goal or turnover.

High school senior wins FGCBC drafting contest

Alan Becicka, a 17-year-old senior at Aurora-Hoyt Lakes High School, Hoyt Lakes, MN, is the 1980 Florida Gold Coast Baseball Classic (FGCBC) Drafting Contest champion. His entries won out in a field of 99, reports Bob Lopeck, Miami, FL, who directed the third annual FGCBC drafting contest.

Becicka, a competitor in prep football, basketball and track, was the recipient of a \$100 check and plaque from the FGCBC for his drafting ability. Runnerup Junu Kim, 15, a junior at New Trier East High in Witmetta, IL, who's active PBM and face-to-face leagues, won \$40.

Bob Cebelak, Madison, WI, last year's drafting contest champion, wound up a respectable third and was \$20 richer for it. All told, \$200 in prize money was paid to the top ten places.

This year's contest was run on a different basis, pointed out Lopeck. There was a general contest (picking the best 15 hitters and 10 pitchers from the 1979 Strat-O-Matic baseball cards and putting them in the order of the way they would

draft such players] and then a final round whereby the top ten finalists (those with the highest percentage of accuracy rating) would be given a list of the top 25 players, listed alphabetically, and

then have to put them in the order they would draft such players.
"Scoring," notes Lopeck, "was accomplished by multiplying the player's rating by the point value of where the entrant drafted him. example, his number one choice would have his rating multiplied by 25, number two choice by 24 and so on."

Becicka finished eighth in the general contest (Kim was first), but improved by five percent in the finals and jumped to the top of the list. Cebelak was seventh in the general and also, as attested to by his thirdplace windup, improved his position as well.

But Dale Holland is crowned GKSML N.L. king

Kingman blasts record 60 home runs!

Dale Holland, after being so close the last two years, made the akthrough to the top in the Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League's National League replay. And while Dale was seizing pennant honors, Dave Kingman was smashing baseballs out of sight, unloading a momumental and eclipsing the previous GKSML standard set by Dick Allen, with 54, in 1973 (based on '72 season).

Those were the highlights, along with shortstop Larry Bowa's magni-

ficent fielding for Dale, as the Kalamazoo-Otsego-based face-to-face base-ball league completed its 19th full-season replay.

Review co-editor Warren Newell, as was pointed out in a recent issue, managed Kingman, who wound up with the record-setting 60 roundtrippers plus led the league with 139 runs-batted-in. Kingman got No. 60 with three at-bats remaining (at-bats and innings pitched are strictly adhered to in the GKSML), but was unsuccessful in his quest to tie Roger Maris' mark.

Dale, 29, married, the father of a young daughter and an employee

of Rockwell International in neighboring Allegan, shared first place in the East Division with Jeff Kik, each with 87-67 records. Ironically, the winner of the West, John Madden, also had an 87-67 mark. So Dale, who had finished runnerup the last two years in the N.L. (by one and twogame margins), then defeated Jeff Kik for the East title, 4-2, and followed up by dispatching Madden in three straight games in a playoff for the pennant.

George Foster had three hits and knocked in three runs in the win over Jeff Kik. Steve Rogers, who went the first seven innings, got the hurling win. And Rogers notched the first-game win over John Madden, too, being backed by home runs by Foster and Mike Schmidt. In the so game, Madden's pitchers issued 11 walks, the defense committed three In the second errors (three of the five runs were unearned), Jerry Royster hit a solo homer for Dale and Craig Swan and Greg Minton combined for an eight-hitter.

Dale wrapped it up in game three, 5-2, as Foster unloaded two homers

and knocked in four runs and Schmidt connected for a solo job.

BOWA: ONLY FOUR ERRORS! *

Dale, who won a N.L. pennant for the second time, had the league's top hitter (Keith Hernandez, .333), No. 2 slugger in home runs and RBI in Schmidt, 51 and 129, and also a pitching staff that had a composite 3.07

But, as Dale quickly pointed out in reviewing the season, "The defense bailed us out of many ballgames. Sporting 1s at first, short, third, catcher and center field killed many rallies (for the opposition). The pitching," continued Holland, "owes much to Bowa. Playing 150 games, Bowa made an unbelievable four errors all season."

Johnny Bench was the catcher and Garry Maddox patroled center--thus the impregnable defense. Foster, although his playing time was limited, smacked 27 homers and drove in 85 runs. Rogers and Swan each won 16 games.

THREE NEW MANAGERS

The GKSML added three new managers for its 19th full-season replay. Madden, 26, a teacher and previously a member of the GKSML until moving to New York to further his education, rejoined the league and took over Clif Sage's teams. It was Clif's N.L. teams, in fact, that had won pennants the last two years. And Madden just missed emulating those feats.

Bruce Mulder, 23, a resident of Byron Center, near Grand Rapids, was one of the three rookie managers in the GKSML. The others were Jeff Green, 22, who replaced Tommy Angel, the wheeler-dealer from Florida who migrated back to the southland, and John Brill, 15, a friend of Newell's and the youngest member of the league. (continued on next page)

Brill caught on to the rudiments of the game quickly, finishing second, one game behind, in the West, while Jeff Green won 21 more games than his predecessor and Bruce Mulder 11 more than the manager he replaced. The Newells, father-and-son combination of Del and Todd, in fact, finished at the bottom of their respective divisions. Del, of course, spends "all of his time working on the Review" and thus his performance as a manager suffers.

A noticeable lack of talent and power (73 home runs) added to his suffering. Warren Newell, on the other hand, finished at .500 and had

suffering. Warren Newell, on the other hand, finished at .500 and had many enjoyable moments, particularly when Kingman and Bob Hocher [38 homers, 99 RBI) were tattooing terrified pitchers.

Other highlights from the N.L. included Gary Tien's Omar Moreno swiping 124 bases and his team 251 (Jeff Kik had 241, including 56 by 6-6 Dave Parker), John Brill having four .300-plus hitters and a 21-game winner in Joe Niekro, Jeff Green spray-hitting for a lofty .281 team batting average; and Todd Newell's J.R. Richard again striking out over 300 (319 to be exact).

19...AND COUNTING!

As was mentioned earlier, this was the 19th 154-game season replayed. And the season, which got under way the first week in February, moved along without a hitch. The league gathered every Sunday night and

played 10-12 games.

And because of the closeness of the division races and Kingman's

long ball heroics, excitement was at an all-time high.



SEATTLE MARINERS REPLAY - Keith Miller, Willard, OH, turned this seeming mission impossible into a fun venture as the 1980 tabletop Mariners improved their record by four games over the real-life showing: Seattle won 71 games and lost 91 under Miller's handling, while the real-life mark was 67-95...many of the averages were amazingly close: Willie Horton clouted 29 home runs and drove in 106 runs for 'real' and had 27 and 106 totals in S-0-M; Jose Cruz batted .271 and .270 (S-0-M) while Danny Meyer matched his 20-homer output in five more at-bats...among the pitchers, Mike Parrott had 14-12 and 3.77 real-life credentials and was 16-15, 3.50 on 'table' turf. Bick Honeyoutt's ERA was 4.21 compared to real-life 4.04 and Odell Jones was equally unimpressive both ways (6.16 replay ERA; 6.05 real-life)...Leon Roberts hit exactly 15 home runs, although he had 50 more at-bats and saw his average shrink by 21 points (.271 to .250).

ALL-STAR BASEBALL REPLAY - Doug Simpson, Issaquah, WA, refers to himself as an innovator, and for good reason. He's played through three full-season replays solitaire and experimented in the third by keeping players together in their own eras: a team for the pre-1920's, '30's, '40's, '50's, and '70's--one each from the American and National League..."I used old Pacific Coast League cities (for names), noted Simpson, "with N.L. teams being named after California cities and A.L. after other western cities...The pre-1920's teams, just as Simpson suspected they would, dominated and the modern-day teams, also as Simpson figured they would, finished last in both leagues..."That great pitching and consistent hitting (by the 1920 teams) really does the job," praised Simpson, who added Rogers Hornsby and Ken Williams to the pre-1920 teams (even though their careers spanned a later period), giving each a power hitter...World Series winner was underdog Sacramento (N.L.) as Christy Mathewson won two games and scattered seven hits in notching a third triumph in the decisive seventh game, 6-3. Honus Wagner went 3-for-5 and drove in three runs in the finale.
