Bears' defense against run: 'Supreme'

Thanks to the Chicago Bears, Strat-O-Matic has added another rating to its defensive listings.

"The Bears are excellent against the pass," says James Williams of S-O-M. "But the rating against the run is 'supreme.' That's the highest rating ever given. It's a new rating and something that has never happ-

ened before.

"Also," continues Williams, "the coach of the Bears can play short yardage defense anytime and can call pass instead of run. In the normal short yardage defense, you have to call run." But not with the Bears

short yardage defense, you have to call run." But not with the season.

Williams does admit that Chicago, which was so invincible most of the year (except for one game late in the season against Miami), can be passed against. But overall the defense is awesome. The linebackers are all rated "6s" against the run and such feared rushers as Richard Dent and Dan Hampton will have their ferocity evident in their sack ratings.

"The Patriots also have a good defense." says Williams. "New England's defense is rated excellent against the run and good to excellent against the pass."

As far as the price of the new pro football card set, which will be available to you soon, S-D-M reports that the preseason price is \$16.10. There will also be extra players available for \$3.25. Add in \$2.25 for handling and the total tab comes to \$21.60 for most gamers in the United States.

Strat-O-Matic's newest creation - the computer version of the

baseball game - continues to be a big hit.

Yankees, Royals, Mets, Dodgers picked to win divisions

Strawberry, Mattingly MVP choices

Darryl Strawberry will run away with Most Valuable Player honors in the National League. And Don Mattingly, even though the pack in pursuit is much closer, will win similar laurels in the American League.

That's the consensus of opinion from the Review's latest MVP Cont-

est, which closed May 10, almost six weeks after the regular season be-

readers picked the New York whiz kids duo, with Strawberry garnering 91 votes, 53 more than runnerup Dwight Gooden. Mattingly, meanwhile, totaled 45 votes, 14 more than Rickey Henderson. Interestingly, New York teams had both the top vote-getter and the runnerup in each league.

Mattingly was the real-life choice last season, while Willie McGee of the N.L. champion St. Louis Cardinals was also picked. McGee and the Cards are struggling this season and the performances are reflected in McGee receiving only one vote to repeat and St. Louis being tabbed to finish a distant. distant third in the N.L. East race.

Dale Murphy, who was such a big choice last year, wasn't in the running this time around - at least according to Review readers - as he received only 11 votes. Pedro Guerrero, who's expected to miss most of the season with an injury, got 15 votes, Dave Parker 14 and Gary Carter matched Murphy's 11.

Over in the A.L., Eddie Murray followed Mattingly and Henderson with 30 votes. Murray was the choice a year ago. George Brett and Kirk Gibson, who was off to such a great start before being sidelined with an injury, each got 19 votes.

THE YEAR OF THE METS

Review readers don't envision a single close division race this summer. The Mets will run away and hide in the N.L. East, according to voters, as they received a whopping 190 votes. In fact, the first 74 votes tallied were all for the Mets. One vote was finally counted for another N.L. East team...and then the Mets got 29 more votes.

Second place in the East? Try the Chicago Cubs, with nine votes. The N.L. West is predicted to have the closest race as the Dodgers received 97 votes and second-place Cincinnati 76.

Over in the American League, it will be the New York Yankees in the East and Kansas City will repeat in the West. It won't be close in other division, according to the voting.

Remember, the winner of the Review's annual MVP Contest will receive a set of the new baseball cards, replete with extras, in late January or early February of 1987. The winner will be announced this fall. In case of ties, the reader picking the division champs the closest will win the card set.

Now you can create Bears' 6-2 defense

All of pro football marveled at the Chicago Bears' devastating defense last season, right? Right.

Now, George Murphy of Los Angeles, CA, has the following playing tip to recreate that notorious defense in your table-top version of Strat-O-Matic when the new cards come out.

Here's Murphy's playing tip:

- * Move the defensive left end to the left tackle blitz area.

- * Move the defensive left end to the left tackle blitz area.
 * Move the right linebacker to the look in pass zone.
 * Move the strong safety to the right flat pass zone.
 * Move the free safety to the short pass zone and refer to the free safety as the defender for the tight end.
 * Move the middle linebacker to the defensive left end position and the left linebacker to the defensive left end blitz position. Either middle linebacker, left linebacker or both may be moved back into the left flat pass zone.

ue, most gamers only know of the old-time parks through books, ips and, perhaps, their fathers' reminiscences. Still, however, mers may wonder what it would have been like to play the Giants Polo Grounds (279 feet down the left field foul line and 257 to Ebbetts Field (where down the right field line it was only 297 and the old Yankee Stadium (301 in left and 296 in right, down nes).

This Charron of Tacoma, WA, has created an Old-Time Ball Park that is based on foul line dimensions. "It is based on foul line ions from the book, 'Take Me Out to the Ballpark,' a "Sporting ublication," says Charron.

Harron does note that the chart, because it is on based on foul imensions, gives higher home run ratings to parks like the Polo is and Yankee Stadium than they normally should have. Those parks leep center fields, which cut down on home runs.

'However," adds Charron, "I have found the chart to add a great as I have been using it in my 1969 replay and various solitaire aments. It works as follows:

Anytime a home run split number is rolled, use the chart. In games the elementary version, use the dice numbers 2, 4 and 6 for s to right, or 1, 3, 5 to left, unless the field is designated by plit number. (HR 1-10, FLYBALL (RF) B).

With the advanced version, assume the hitter pulls the ball unless wise noted by the split number. Unlike S-O-M's home run chart, if an adjustment occurs and the hit is not a home run but a fly-I use the original split reading. When a home run 1-12, double 13

Charron also notes that a couple of the stadiums may not be famil-such as Sicks Stadium in Seattle where the Pilots played in 1969. we Park in Cleveland was utilized by the Indians in the 1940s. Mun-al Stadium was the home of the Kansas City A's and Royals until Stadium was built.

Shibe Park in Philadelphia was another that may not be familiar to younger gamers. It was the home of the A's and the Phillies after Bowl. It was later renamed Connie Mack Stadium. Sportsman Park in Louis was home for both the Cardinals and Browns. Colt Stadium was first to be used by the Houston Colts, forerunner of the Astros, Jarry Park was the early home for the Montreal Expos.

Gamer compiles list of all-time leaders

Michael Huey has been playing Strat-O-Matic Baseball since 1970, when he was 13 years old. Since then he's been rolling 'em in approximately 15 leagues, most of them solitaire.

He gets the most enjoyment out of his S-O-M endeavors by creating all-star leagues, involving current and past players, with the latter including many Hall of Famers.

"Although I have played in face-to-face leagues and enjoyed them tremendously, I feel the relaxation I get out of spending two-three hours a day or night two or three times a week is a great way to get away from it all," says Huey.

The games are not just played and then forgotten, either. Huey keeps detailed records of all league play and many of his all-time leaders are worth a cursory look.

Roger Maris and Tony Perez, for example, have the single-season home run record of 54. Rogers Hornsby has driven in the most runs (147) and Nap Lajoie has the highest batting average, .392.

Ty Cobb has the most steals (163), Wee Willie Keeler the most hits (277), Cobb the most runs scored (138), Ralph Garr leads in triples (25), Rod Carew and Joe Medwick are tied for most doubles (52), Lefty Grove has the most wins (43) and shutouts (7), Steve Carlton once struck out 347, Goose Gossage had 34 saves and Walter Johnson the lowest earned run average, 2.65.

GKSML, Great Lakes drafts similar

Everyone has an opinion as to who should be drafted first, second, third, or not at all when the new cards come out and leagues are formed (or reloaded) at draft time.

It's always fun to compare drafts when the leagues are similar as far as number of teams and are from the same league.

The Greater Kalamazoo Strat-O-Matic League (GKSML), which Review co-editors Warren and Del Newell are charter members, held its American League draft in May. Earlier, the weekend of March 22, to be exact, the Great Lakes Baseball League had its annual gathering in West Allis, WI, for its draft and an elimination tournament.

For the GKSML, a 10-team, face-to-face league operating in the Kalamazoo area, the draft signaled the start of its 32nd full-season (154-game) replay. The National League had just finished up (more on that next month) and the American League was roaring out of the starting gate.

ing gate.

Both the GKSML and Great Lakes could draft from rookies, players dropped prior to the draft (the GKSML allows only 15 players from the previous year's roster to be protected) and players coming over from

the National League.

Ozzie Guillen, last year's rookie shortstop with the Chicago White Sox, was the No. 1 pick by both leagues. Most of the Great Lakes' first 16 picks were also among the top 20 in the GKSML. Floyd Rayford was drafted by Great Lakes, but in the GKSML Rayford's card had been claimed the year before in the draft.

In the Great Lakes Baseball League's third season, co-managers Brian Elwood and Don Martiniak guided the Madison Capitols to the title, marking the third different king the league has crowned. The year before, the Capitols reached the seventh game of the World Series. Other managers include Rod Melotte (Thunderheads), Fred Lambrecht (Regals), Bill Moonan (Golden Bears), Don Chandler (Cowboys), Warren Dunn (Panthers), Andy Baranoski (Stallions) and Craig Artl (Warhawks). One manager, Baranoski, had to give up his team because of lack of time, but Chris Anderson of Madison, WI, has quickly stepped in to fill (continued on next page)

the vacancy. "The league has been a picture of stability, as no managerial changes have taken place," writes Artl. "Although we have one new manager for the 1986 season, his predecessor remains in good standing."

All of the play-by-mail league's coaches, except one were on the scene for the draft and elimination tourney. The one exception was Moonan, who relocated his franchise from Minneapolis to Fullerton, CA.

The Great Lakes league plays a 162-game schedule, which runs from August through January. So, when most of the leagues are wrapping up this summer, the Great Lakes league will just be throwing out the first pitch for the start of its fourth season.

The GLBL sent along its latest results and also included an updated listing of lifetime statistics. Eddie Murray, for instance, last season became the first player in the GLBL to go over 100 homers.

Murray now has 117 roundtrippers plus 348 career RBI. Dave Stieb, a 20-game winner three straight seasons, has the most victories with 64.

Questions & Answers

Editor's note: Questions pertaining to individual and team ratings will not, in most cases, be answered, unless a mistake has been made on the card. The game company cannot, for reasons of security, divulge its card-making formula, which would be necessary to answer some of the questions completely.

QUESTION: Since S-O-M has introduced its newest changes in the base-ball cards (clutch hitting, etc.), will it issue a new set of nameless player cards that have the new features on them?

The game company reports that next year, when the 1987 cards come out, a new set of nameless players, replete with the latest changes, will be available. ANSWER:

QUESTION: I am involved in a draft league, where we want to use the clutch hitting and not the ball park feature. Have there been any estimates as to how much (what percentage) of the open triangle is a function of the clutch hitting and how much is due to the ball park feature?

S-O-M says that all the new features (clutch hitting, ball park power and singles) are tied in together. If you don't use any of the changes, then the first reading will be the same as playing the normal advanced game. S-O-M did mention that there's a two-four point difference in batting average when using the ball park feature and not clutch hitting.

QUESTION: If you fail to get a lead in baseball and get a must steal result on the hit-and-run chart, do you re-roll the lead?

ANSWER: No. We would check the second number on an attempted steal.

A DEMANDING JOB

I am the commissioner of the Universal Baseball Federation. I receive many replies from managers who are interested in join-

ing my league.

What I hear most often is
"I have been in many leagues
that have folded." This statement
can probably be said by most man-

agers.
I think I know what one of

I think I know what one of the reasons for the many unsuccessful leagues is.

People trying to form leagues don't realize the amount of time it takes to be a commissioner, therefore the lack of determination on their part to make the league survive.

I have many times wanted to fold my league, but I didn't want to add another defunct league to the manager's list. My point is that managers should first seriously consider the amount of that managers should first seriously consider the amount of time they can devote to a possible league. In the beginning, there will be rough times. But if you stick with it, the league should survive.

Another point I wish to make is that managers who want to form a league should not "pirate" managers from the league they were in

a league should not "pirate" managers from the league they were in.

One of my former managers called up half the league members and asked them to join his new league. He obtained six and eventually quit. This caused minor trouble, but was eventually resol-

ved.

In a past league (which folded) of mine, this action by one manager caused the league's demise as a number quit to join a new league.

The chart for artificial surfaces would have more doubles and triples on the outfield X.
You couldn't hide "4s" on such surfaces.

By the same token, there should be more error chances on grass.

Also, on the ball park effects chart, how about wind blowing in and out for some stadiums,

S-O-M IDEAL FOR PAST SEASONS

After many years of playing other baseball games, I am a recent convert to S-D-M. I have purchased all of the past seasons that are available because I enjoy playing teams from different eras against one another.

Has anyone ever commented before that S-O-M is the best game around for playing teams from different seasons against (continued)

each other? In fact, I think it is the only game (in my experience) which allows you to have a "fair" contest. This is the case because of the way S-O-M cards are calculated.

In S-O-M, the batter's card is calculated assuming one-half

of the results are coming from his card and the other half from the pitcher's card.

the pitcher's card.

To use an example: If the batter had an on-base percentage of .300 and the average pitcher allowed an on-base percentage of .330, the batter's card would be rated with a percentage of .270 (1/2 x .270 + 1/2 x .330 = .300). If this batter were playing a season against pitchers from another year, his expected on-base percentage might be different. rent.

Another example: If he were batting against a group of pit-chers who allowed an on-base perchers who allowed an on-base per-centage of only .290, his expect-ed percentage would be .280 (1/2 x .290 + 1/2 x .270 = .280). Bat-ters from the dead-ball era would see their averages rise when hit-ting against pitchers from the

The other baseball games I The other baseball games I have played take a different approach to rating the players. Batter cards are rated to produce the correct statistics independent of pitcher cards. independent of pitcher cards. Pitchers are rated in comparison to other pitchers of that season and will have positive or negative adjustments to the batter cards. Each game has its own method of making the adjustment. But the result is that a batter who hit .320 in a season will be expected to hit .320 against a group of pitchers from any other season.

Both methods of rating

from any other season.

Both methods of rating players will work for one season. But if you are playing players from one season against players from another season, only S-O-M's method produces satisfactory results.

In other games, if you play a team from 1930 (when teams hit .300) against a team

from 1968 (when very few players hit .300), the team from 1930 will have an unfair advantage. In S-O-M, the batters from 1930 will have more hits on their cards than batters from 1968, but the pitchers from 1930 will allow more hits to compensate.

With the other baseball games I played, I had to artifically adjust player ratings when playing different seasons. It is nice to be able to use the S-O-M cards without any adjustment.

"We are very pleased with the Apple version," enthuses Harold Richman, S-O-M's creator and owner. Creating the program took a long, long time, and a lot of testing. But it was all worth it."

Only very minor "bugs" have been found (the boxscore doesn't show if two pitchers combined for a shutout, for example). In other words, S-O-M batted almost 1,000. And that's as good as it gets!

Sims, draft choice of Washington, was the game's MVP, rushing for a whopping 190 yards on 31 carries. Art Monk had eight catches for 143 yards, including snaring a 28-yard pass from Joe Theismann (18-32, 248 yards) that kept the winning drive going.

Marino had a so-so game, completing 14 of 25 passes for only 194 yards, but for three touchdowns. Vernon Dean picked off a Marino pass — the third Redskin theft of the game — to finish off Miami's last hope.

Benton reports that ball-control made the difference as Washington ran off 82 offensive plays and totaled 500 yards, while Miami had only 56 plays and turned them into 377 yards.

It was not in the Cards to win the N.L. East title as St. Louis lost its last game to the lowly Pirates, 6-5, after carrying a 5-3 lead into the bottom of the ninth, and wound up in a tie with the New York Mets at 98-64... The Mets won a one-game playoff in Shea Stadium, 6-4, as George Foster hit a pair of home runs — both via ball park effect results... Bullpen was singled out for St. Louis' demise as at least 15 times leads were squandered in the ninth inning and extra innings... Super-advanced game was used and injuries were adhered to (Jack Clark and Darrell Porter sat out long stretches, just as in real-life)... Memorable moments: A 7-6 20-inning win over Houston, a team St. Louis whipped in 11 of 12 meetings, although five of the wins went extra innings; John Tudor tossing a one-hitter at Montreal, with Hubie Brooks' home run in the fourth inning (a "5" was drawn in a ball park effect situation) the lone hit; and Tudor racking up a 27-5 record with 1.73 ERA. Tudor's innings pitched-to-hits totals were an impressive 312-to-208, plus he had 234 strikeouts... Joaquin Andujar went 18-7 with 3.16 ERA, but served up 274 hits in 256 innings...
